MINUTES OF THE FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING  
of the  
CONVOCAATION OF THE MISSIONARY DISTRICT  
OF HONOLULU

Monday, 6 February 1956

Convocation convened in Tenney Memorial Hall, St. Andrew's Cathedral at 9:15 A.M. Meeting was called to order by the Right Reverend Harry Sherbourne Kennedy, Bishop of Honolulu, who took the chair as President, and delivered the Invocation.

The Rev. Canon Wai On Shim was appointed Secretary Pro Tempore.

Motion was made by the Ven. Norman R. Alter, seconded by the Rev. Robert Sheeran, and passed, that the nominations be closed, that the secretary cast the ballot, and that Canon Shim be elected as Secretary.

The Secretary called the roll of clergy, canonically resident in the Missionary District. A Quorum was declared present.

Roll call of the Lay Delegates was read by the Rev. Norman C. Ault.

The Rt. Rev. Henry Herbert Shires, D.D., guest of Convocation, arrived at the meeting, and the President asked the Rev. Mellick Belshaw to escort Bishop Shires to the speaker's table. Bishop Shires was introduced to delegates and guests of Convocation.

Bishop Shires brought greetings from the Diocese of California, and from the Province of the Pacific. Bishop Shires expressed approval of the work being done here in this District, and said that the problems of this Diocese were the same everywhere, and were identical with those presented in the recent Convention in California.

Bishop Kennedy's Challenges, as set forth in his Annual Address, were recounted. In addition, Bishop Shires stressed the importance of Evangelism—of the responsibility for everyone to bring people to Christianity, including people not only from Asian countries, but from the mainland as well. In discussing the early migrations to the Western areas of the United States, Bishop Shires said it had been told that those who came West tossed their Prayer Books in the Mississippi, and their Bibles in the Missouri. The resurgence of religion is evident by the numbers of persons over twenty-one who seek Confirmation. Never before in the life of the Church has this fact been more obvious—this, then is the time when souls are ripe for harvest. What we say, or what we hear—what happens here depends on our Evangelism—in bringing others to Christ. We never know the real joys of religion until we share our experiences.

In missionary development we have never had the support of the Episcopal Church as we have today. At one time, as Missionary Districts opened in the West the Church was so weak some Bishops thought it not necessary to consecrate additional Bishops. If our Church had been able to take advantage of its missionary opportunities, instead of 4,000,000 people, it would be a Church of 20,000,000 people.

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It was moved by the Ven. Norman R. Alter, seconded and passed, that courtesy of the floor be extended to the Rt. Rev. Henry Herbert Shires.

Mr. Arthur Smith asked that the 54th Convocation extend to the Rev. Karl Morgan Block congratulations on the honor conferred upon him by the British Empire.

Motion was seconded by Canon McDonald, and approved.

A group of communicants of the Episcopal Church living in the area of Nana-kuli, Maile, Waianae and Makaha have been holding weekly services in the Waianae School, under the leadership of the Rev. Robert H. Challinor, Hawaiian Congregation of St. Andrew's Cathedral, and the Rev. Gerald G. Gifford II, St. Stephen's Church, Wahiawa.

The group wishes to be recognized as an organized mission of the Missionary District of Honolulu and has chosen the name, THE CHURCH OF THE TRANSFIGURATION. We, therefore, submit this petition for your approval at this 54th Annual Convocation, February 6, 1956.

We have listened with keen interest and enthusiasm to the 13th annual address of our beloved Bishop, delivered in St. Andrew's Cathedral at this the 54th Annual Convocation of the Missionary District of Honolulu, and

WHEREAS,  
The Bishop has called attention to the great contribution made by this Missionary District to the whole Church at the time of the 58th General Convention; and



WHEREAS,

Since the eyes of the entire Church have been focused on this Missionary District, we are challenged to meet certain obligations and responsibilities which are inevitable to a growing missionary field;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

That we, the 54th Annual Convocation of the Missionary District of Honolulu consider seriously and prayerfully certain recommendations made by our Bishop in his annual address.

Resolution was seconded by Dean Cox, and approved.

Canon Savanack continued with part 2 of his resolution.

WHEREAS,

The Bishop of Honolulu has suggested that every Episcopalian in the Missionary District of Honolulu be called upon to attend at least one church service on Whitsunday, May 20th, 1956, the Birthday of the Church,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

That as the disciples on that first Whitsunday were challenged, and rose up as witnesses, so every member of our Church be urged to attend at least one service on Whitsunday and "stand up and be counted."

BE IT FURTHERMORE RESOLVED,

That a Committee be appointed by the Bishop to make plans for and to promote this Diocesan day of witness.

AND WHEREAS,

The Missionary District of Honolulu has during the past decade engaged in a conservative program of building expansion, and

WHEREAS,

The National Council of our Church and the United Thank Offering of the Woman's Auxiliary have been most helpful in assisting in the reduction and elimination of certain building debts, and many parishes and missions have through the generosity and sacrifices of individual members and groups been able to reduce or eliminate these building debts; and

WHEREAS,

More necessary advance work could be promoted in parishes and missions if a building indebtedness were eliminated;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

That a fund of approximately \$40,000 be secured to be used as a means of further reducing and eliminating building indebtedness throughout the District;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,

That when such fund is secured, it be used to match dollar for dollar up to \$3,000, each dollar raised by a parish or mission in the reduction or elimination of its building debt.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,

That a committee of laymen be named by the Bishop to carry forward the intent of this resolution.

Resolution was seconded by the Rev. Paul Wheeler, and approved.

Mr. George Gray stepped to the speaker's table with greetings from St. Mathias Church in Victoria, Canada. Mr. Gray said he counted himself honored to have been a delegate for 13 years to Bishop Kennedy's Convocations, that during that time we have ventured forth with courage, much has been done, and much accomplished. He appealed to members present to aid in launching this program, and asked for the help of those who served infrequently.

Resolution was continued by Canon Savanack as follows:

WHEREAS,

Many Bishops, clergy and laymen visiting Hawaii at the time of the 58th General Convention were duly impressed by the spirit of the people of our Church; and

WHEREAS,

Honolulu and the Islands made a most favorable impression upon our guests, economically, socially as well as culturally; and

WHEREAS,

Our church buildings, parish houses, rectories and schools caused much enviable comment; and

WHEREAS,

The frequent question put to us by deputies and visitors to General Convention directed toward this Missionary District becoming an independent diocese;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

That in the Triennium which lies ahead, we strive for greater local support so that in 1959, the year following the meeting of the next General Convention, our Askings will have been reduced by at least \$50,000. And,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,

That the Bishop instruct the Board of Missions to initiate plans to achieve this goal.

Resolution was seconded by the Rev. Paul Kim and approved.

Canon Savanack continued with part 4 of his resolution.

WHEREAS,

Through the forethought of devoted churchmen of the Church of England and the interest of leaders of the Kingdom of Hawaii, the Cathedral Church of St. Andrew was built in Honolulu to bear witness to Christ and His Church; and

WHEREAS,

For more than seventy-five (75) years this Cathedral building has been bearing witness to people of many "races, kindreds and tongues;" and

WHEREAS,

This Cathedral has mothered many of the congregations now serving in these Islands; and

WHEREAS,

During this long period of time, the Cathedral building has stood unfinished;

NOW BE IT RESOLVED,

That this Convocation commend the Bishop and Chapter and the Cathedral Parish Vestry for the plans now being set forward for the extension of the Cathedral Nave and the completion of the West Front, and that we express our approval and good will.

The Rev. Robert Sheeran stated that more and more St. Andrew's Cathedral is considered the Diocesan Church, and that every clergyman should support this effort and pledge support.

The Ven. Claude Du Teil stated that he and his people look to St. Andrew's as the Church of the Diocese, and they hoped it would be completed.

The Ven. Norman Alter, Kauai, stated that Kauai would add its support.

The Rev. John Caton said it was the duty of those who used the Cathedral to lend every support.

The Rev. William Grosh said that most missions have received help from the clergy and people of St. Andrew's, and he wished to add his support.

With these favorable comments, resolution was seconded and approved.

Motion was made by the Rev. John J. Morrett, and seconded by the Rev. William Grosh, that the nominations be approved. Motion carried.

The official photographer arrived, and pictures of the 54th Annual Convocation were taken.

St. Stephen's-in-the-Fields, Wahiawa, acquired land and house for Sunday School at cost of \$16,500.

The present market value of trust investments compared to the original cost represented an increased value of some \$350,000, with some stocks reflecting an increased value of 82%. The Treasurer expressed deep appreciation to Mr. Herman Von Holt for his guidance and handling of Church investments.

Quotas and assessments were paid in full by parishes and missions with some over-subscribing. Several parishes and missions are subscribing to the Chronicle for each member. It is the Bishop's hope that all will subscribe to this practice.

The Treasurer expressed his appreciation for support in his work during the past ten years, and that it had been a great pleasure to serve the Diocese, and that he would always hold an interest in the work here.

Mr. Herman Von Holt gave the report as Secretary of the Board of Directors of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands for the year 1955. See page 54.

Motion was made, seconded and passed that the report be approved and filed. The Bishop expressed personal appreciation to Mr. Von Holt for his services.

Mrs. Barbara Goss, Diocesan President of the Woman's Auxiliary read her report. See page 56.

It was moved, seconded and approved that the report be accepted and filed.

It was explained to all members that these revisions and changes must be read (and/or explained as required) in order to be approved. Inasmuch as these changes were somewhat lengthy, and some matters not readily resolved, the following motion was presented by Mr. Arthur G. Smith: That the present committee be continued in existence until next Convocation and with power to add to its membership as it sees fit, and with authority to make such grammatical and other changes as will bring the various Canons into harmony with each other, and, that a copy of this, as amended, be sent to all parishes and missions.

Motion was seconded and passed.

Noon Day prayers were offered by the Rev. Gerald G. Gifford, II, followed by The Lord's Prayer recited in unison.

Motion was made by the Very Rev. James Cox that Mr. Smith be given an expression of appreciation for his work in bringing the Canons up to date. Motion was seconded by the Ven. Norman Alter, and passed.

Mr. James Taylor, Headmaster of the Hawaii Episcopal Academy, Kamuela, Hawaii, was introduced to the Delegates and Visitors of the Convocation. Mr. Taylor spoke briefly on the advantages of attending parochial boarding schools.

The President asked Mr. Taylor whether or not it would be possible to show slides of the Academy a bit later in the meeting. The showing depended upon whether or not the slides arrived in Honolulu.

The Rev. Canon Paul R. Savanack made the following motion:

1. That the minutes of the 54th Annual Convocation be prepared and submitted to the Ecclesiastical Authority for approval.
2. That an expression of appreciation be sent to Mrs. Raymond K. Hoefener for her assistance as secretary.
3. That an expression of appreciation be sent to the Clergy, Vestry, and Staff of St. Andrew's Cathedral for all they have done to assist with our Convocation.
4. That an expression of appreciation be sent to our visiting guest for coming to our Convocation and for the inspiration he has given our meetings.
5. That an expression of appreciation be given to the Rector and Vestry of St. Peter's Church for the use of the parish hall during Convocation for the breakfast.

Motion was seconded and approved.

Mr. Joseph Reed asked and moved that approval be given of quotas and assessments as set forth in the Financial Report be approved. Motion was seconded and approved.

Announcements by the President included notices concerning the Diocesan Banquet at the Reef Hotel at 6:30 P.M., Monday, February 6th; the Woman's Auxiliary Annual Meeting—Tuesday and Wednesday, February 7-8.

Meeting was adjourned, with benediction by the Bishop, at 12:50.

EXCERPTS FROM THE BISHOP'S ANNUAL ADDRESS  
CONVOCATION—1956

My Brethren in Christ, Grace be unto you and Peace:

While we are standing, and before we turn our eyes to what lies ahead, I bid your prayers for those Bishops of our Church who have gone from this strength to a greater one.

The names of the faithful departed in this Diocese will be read later in this service.

When the necrology is read tonight you will have many names of your own to add to those we read. Pray for them all.

The reading of the faithful departed is a link with the past, and a tie with the eternal. It is a way of reminding ourselves of the continuity of the congregations of all faithful people.

As members of this Convocation and Congregation, we are not an isolated company of individuals. We are the annual gathering of the faithful in this part of the Lord's vineyard, responsible to Him for the leadership He has by election and appointment placed in our hands.

We are a representative assembly. We are the Church, and while conscious of our duties and activities of the past year, 1955, and looking ahead to the next 12 months, we are at the same time conscious of a long heritage, into whose body the blood of many lives has been poured.

We come as trustees of the estate of the Church in this Diocese, some 200 of us, clergy and laity, charged to think and act in the name of the whole household.

Year after year, God has blessed our endeavors with munificent increase. Tonight we speak for 15,328 souls in our parishes and missions, fathers and sons—mothers and daughters in Hawaii in the thousands of families in the Diocese.

We assemble tonight as a company of faithful people. Faithful people are people full of faith: Faith in God, faith in His Objectives, faith in His Plans, faith in the means He has created for us to achieve His Holy Will.

The first action of the Christian soul is to commit himself to our Lord Jesus Christ, personally. Out of that personal commitment springs his life of Prayer, of Devotion, of Meditation.

While we meet in Convocation in Honolulu largely to do with the affairs of this Diocese, we must remember that we also meet as canonical representatives of the whole vast Anglican Communion throughout the World, whose well being is our responsibility as well as those who reside in New York, in Liberia, or Japan or Australia.

The Church is in no sense of the word a mere organization like the Rotary Club, or any other Civic organization. The Church is the very Body of Christ, engaged in the creation of a New Heaven and a New Earth, and the redemption of the whole world from Sin, Satan and Death. Our Lord came to seek and save the lost, and it becomes the duty of the Church to save and bring Grace to every man, woman and child on this whole earth.

Our basic objective is not the adoption of budgets and reports, although they have their proper status, however, they are not the cause for which Christ endured the cross and rose from the dead.

For this reason, I make no apology for not dealing with such matters in detail in this address. You will have an opportunity tomorrow to see these reports in detail as directed by Canon.

So tonight I bring you my 13th Annual Report, as your Bishop. It represents your achievements, not mine.

The Outstanding Event of 1955 was General Convention. It is hard to believe that it has come to our Islands and gone. Every Person and Organization moved with unflinching, precision-like effort and accomplishment. One could not begin to name names of those who took leadership in our preparations and our fulfillment of this tremendous task. Any worries or heartache the Bishop had, came from those outside the Diocese. Our people from Mr. Arthur G. Smith, as General Chairman, the Reverend Canon Paul Savanack as Business Manager, and Mrs. George Goss as President of the Woman's Auxiliary down to the last person to move a chair, cook a hamburger, print a sign, arrange a flower, or tease a typewriter, carried out their assignments without complaint, asking for no reward nor praise, but fitting into a perfectly coordinated machine with each cog, each gear, synchronized and functioning in perfect order.

You all have received many letters of appreciation from our newly-made friends all over the world. I wish that I might share with you all the official and personal letters of thanks addressed to the Diocese.

Our friends have been kind enough to tell us how much it has meant to the whole Church to have had General Convention here. However, if we reflect upon the after effects of General Convention we will fall to our knees in thanksgiving for the privilege and joy we had, and for the great benefits it brought to every congregation, as well as the good impact it left upon our island people of all faiths.

Many mainlanders who came to scoff and criticize the Presiding Bishop, left singing Aloha Oe.

General Convention has left a challenge to our clergy and laity. The year of 1955 has been a banner year for Confirmations. We would be derelict in our endeavors if we failed to take advantage of the interest stimulated in our Islands by this visit of our Church's largest and foremost governing body.

Since our last meeting 1,077 have been confirmed; Hawaii 756, Okinawa 105, Formosa 216, the largest total in our history. During the year 771 were baptized in Hawaii and 571 in our Pacific posts, making a grand total of 1,342 added to our numbers; and more than 5,977 are enrolled in our Sunday Schools and day schools in Hawaii and 1,160 in the Far East.

How thankful we should be to our Lord for accepting and using our Witness, imperfect though it be.

The growth of our baptized membership reflects that in twelve years we have more than doubled our strength. There should be no slackening of this forward progress.

Our Lord taught us to say, when things go well and we are pleased with our work, "We are unprofitable servants!" I hope it does not seem ungracious to say that; indeed, I say it to none more than to myself.

I can see how abundantly God gives the increase when we sow the seed honestly and in faith. But being one of the chief offenders, I can say, how often we do not sow the seed.

I do not say this simply to confess my own faults, which you know better than I. I say it because to some degree we are all guilty. How much greater our Church would be if we were more constant in our devotion and discipline and more ardent in our witness.

BUILDINGS

My Episcopal eyes are becoming more and more accustomed to plaster, plans, cement blocks, shingles, paint and concrete.

Many congregations have completed major repairs and built new structures, in 1955. We have been witnessing a large building program in our Diocese and we are grateful to our people for their generosity. We offer our congratulations to all our congregations, large and small, for their programs of painting and repairs, much of which has been done by parishioners and friends. Our property must be kept in good order and attractive. However, I wish to add as a reminder, that what happens in these buildings is even more important than the buildings themselves.

#### FINANCES

We wish to commend our congregations for paying their assessments in full, and give them our heartiest thanks. Some missions have increased their salary contributions, and Holy Nativity is to be commended for accepting the full salary of its Vicar.

Building debts are being reduced by regular payments on interest and principal. We will not make real progress toward self support until these debts are eliminated and the amounts paid on interest and principal diverted toward salary payments.

I have a plan and with it a challenge. It will call for some real heart searching and personal sacrifice. This is an appeal to laymen upon whom I shall call for assistance. Our total building indebtedness amounts to \$318,994.56. Interest on this amount is staggering. The Bishop sees funds that should and could be used more advantageously for the Kingdom of God than being paid annually in interest.

I have a plan in which I hope some brave souls will be willing to support their Bishop at tomorrow's business sessions. I have thought about it and prayed about it for many weeks.

Here it is. I beg for some laymen who will help me raise \$40,000 this year towards retirement of building debts in small missions. If the diocese could approach a mission on the basis of a dollar gift for every dollar raised by the mission up to \$3,000, we would wipe out debts completely in 12 places, and assist more with considerable reductions. As Bishop, I promise to do my share to raise the \$40,000 from outside sources, but I will need the generous help of our laity. It can be done, if we have faith in God and ourselves. It must be done, if we are to keep our heads high in the eyes of the whole Church. It will be done, if we have the right spirit, and real love of God and souls in our hearts

#### CLERGY

Our clergy roll now stands at 56 of whom 39 are actively engaged in the ministry in the Diocese.

There were transferred to other dioceses this past year, the Rev. David Coughlin to the Diocese of Louisiana, the Rev. Richard Smith to become a member of the staff of the Department of Christian Education of the National Council.

The Rev. Chester G. Minton was transferred from the Diocese of Indianapolis to become rector of St. Christopher's Parish, Kailua. The Rev. Samuel Van Culin, Curate of St. Andrew's Cathedral, the Rev. Alfred Krader, Vicar of St. John's, Eleele, and the Rev. Harvey Buxton, Chaplain, Iolani School, were ordained to the priesthood.

A new position was created in the Diocese by the appointment of the Rev. Burtis Dougherty as Chaplain of St. Andrew's Priory and Chaplain to the Episcopal students at the University of Hawaii. He was appointed a Canon to serve on the staff of St. Andrew's Cathedral.

The Rev. Canon Frederick A. McDonald was elected Provincial Representative on the National Council.

Canons of the Cathedral are appointed when they have specific Diocesan positions.

There have been occasions in the past when Canons were appointed for sentimental reasons, when they had no official Diocesan status. We will not perpetuate this mistake. Those appointed in years past felt that it was an empty title, since it carried no diocesan responsibilities. We are not appointing Canons for honorary positions. There are many loyal clergy in the Diocese who serve their congregations and Diocese well. We wish we could honor them all with titles, but such action would be empty form.

We have two of our clergy on active duty as Chaplains—Kenneth Perkins in the U.S. Navy, and Lewis B. Sheen in the U.S. Army.

In our theological seminaries we have five candidates from Hawaii and two more who plan to enter seminary in September.

Our layreaders number 77, although some are not called upon often, especially in the city where clergy are more readily available in emergencies to fill vacancies; however, our layreaders on Maui and Hawaii have given invaluable service this past year in vacant places.

New buildings have been erected this past year—St. Columba's, Paauilo, Church, Parish Hall and Rectory; St. Matthew's, Waimanalo, a Chapel; Parish Hall for Grace Church, Molokai, Dormitory for Hawaii Episcopal Academy; Dormitory for Mokuleia Camp.

Work has started on the new church for St. Timothy, Aiea, and contracts will be let in a few weeks so that work may begin on Calvary, Kaneohe, and St. George's, Pearl Harbor.

St. Stephen's purchased land and a house adjacent to the present Church-site at a cost of \$16,500. The house is being used for Church School classes.

The Cathedral has made extensive improvements at a cost of \$58,260.47.

The Gateway at the entrance to the Cathedral is in memory of T. Clives Davies, faithful communicant and benefactor.

There will be printed in Convention reports a complete list of gifts and memorials, as well as the improvements made in our parishes and missions this past year.

We wish to acknowledge the generous gift of the McBryde Plantation, and Mr. and Mrs. John Sandison to St. John's, Eleele, Kauai. They made extensive repairs and improvements to the Parish Hall at a cost of \$9,000.

The new chimes in St. Andrew's Cathedral are in memory of Dean and Mrs. William Ault, the gift of their son, Mr. Kenneth Ault.

A large building has been acquired by Grace Church, Molokai, for class rooms and Parish Hall. The members have done much of the work of rehabilitating this building.

Church services were started in the Waianae Area on November 6th, by the Rev. Robert Challinor. Services are held weekly in the Waianae School with the Rev. Gerald Gifford and the Rev. Mr. Challinor taking alternate Sundays.

Hawaii Episcopal Academy has completed a new dormitory at a cost of \$30,000. Gifts from Parker Ranch friends and the National Council made this building possible.

The Laymen's League accepted responsibility for the new dormitory building at Mokuleia Camp. The men have done much of the work. The project cost over \$11,000.

St. James Church, Papaalooa, was redecorated inside and out by the plantation under the direction of Theo. H. Davies and Company.

I know that our good wishes go to every one of these new ventures, as our congratulations go to our comrades where bold steps have already been courageously taken.

The Bishop has a Second Appeal to present for action to this Convocation.

How many REAL Episcopalians are there in Hawaii? I should like to have that question answered on Whitsunday, May 20th. With some real effort on the part of the clergy and laity, let us see how many of our Episcopalians we can get out to Church through this special endeavor. Let the Episcopalians in our Islands, for once in their lives at least, Stand Up and Be Counted.

We record 15,328 baptized members in Hawaii. A great many of them are inactive or disinterested. Let us discover on May 20th how many people we really have who are interested in the Church.

A committee may work out plans, and each congregation may have its own idea as to how to carry out this endeavor. Being the "Birthday of the Church," perhaps a social period with a birthday cake, following one of the services might be helpful.

You can help in this project first by being in Church yourself that day; second, by bringing members of your family; third, by calling churchmen whom you know and urging upon them their attendance at a service on May 20th.

We will really take a count in every Parish and Mission. So I challenge our people in Hawaii to "Stand Up and Be Counted."

The third Challenge I wish to throw out to you is a program of Witness. In this Triennium let every congregation, large or small, carry on a program of Witnessing to Our Lord Jesus Christ. Every scheme, every plan, every project must be God and Church centered. Of ourselves we can do nothing, but with God the impossible will come within our reach.

We need More Study—Fewer Bazaars; More Prayer—Less Talk; More Worship—Fewer Excuses.

I cannot emphasize too heavily the importance of having laymen all over the Diocese working on all these projects. We dare not fail in these endeavors, but I can assure you of failure, if the clergy have to do it alone. Just as readily, I can assure you of success, if the laymen will work on the projects conscientiously, with the Kingdom of God as our goal, and with Christ as our inspiration.

The Bishop has another plan. The General Convention has made us known to the world-wide Church. Bishops, Clergy, Laymen, and Laywomen have been in our Islands and have seen for themselves the work being done. We hope they have returned to their homes feeling that the 53 years of investments in Hawaii have been rewarded.

Our friends also saw new Churches, Parish Houses, Rectories and Automobiles.

One priest told me that his small church had refrained from putting a much needed new roof on its church and rehabilitating its parish hall in order to pay its missionary quota in full. His concern, as well as the concern of thousands of others who give for the missionary program of the Church, makes it possible for our missionaries in Hawaii to receive their salaries. We cannot continue to buy new automobiles, nor build more buildings, unless we also increase our giving toward the whole Church. Missions can play fair with the Church by paying a larger share of their Vicar's salary. Parishes may assist by over-subscribing their Diocesan Assessment, enabling us to do more for ourselves.

Some missions do well enough in the proportion of salary they pay. Others need a great searching of conscience, when they see how much they receive—and how

long they have been receiving it - and how little they pay in return - and how much they spend on themselves. To clergy and treasurers, as well as members of Bishop's Committees, I ask you to review immediately your giving for 1956. National Council tells us that we are not in the banking business; therefore, it is not the purpose of a mission to accumulate bank balances at the expense of the whole Church. Funds received are to be used and not hoarded.

Therefore, in this Triennium let us set a goal of reducing National Council's yearly giving by \$50,000 so that in 1959 we will have cut our askings from New York to approximately half of what we now receive. You have three years to plan and work toward this goal—therefore begin Now.

May I also remind all Mission Clergy and Bishop's Committees, according to Canons, that no indebtedness may be incurred by the Mission without approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

#### INSTITUTIONS

The reports of Iolani, the Priory, Episcopal Academy, Cluett House and Canterbury House will speak for themselves. As Bishop I wish to say that I cannot remember when these institutions were functioning better, nor when the leadership was finer. We should all be grateful to have these institutions as part of our Diocese.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese proved to the whole Church that we have a live organization in Hawaii, and leadership second to none. The Bishop is grateful for all that each branch of the Auxiliary is doing to hold high the arms of the Church. We know that without the Woman's Auxiliary in our congregations the spiritual life would sag; the building debts would not be paid, and the programs not be carried out.

#### GIFTS

It is well for the Diocese to know that we could not function as we have, if it had not been for generous friends who made special gifts, as well as the U.T.O. and the National Council. This past year we received gifts totalling \$155,225.54. How grateful we all should be for this generous support. Without this financial aid it would have been impossible to do any of the building we have done. Some of our missions and institutions would have been deeper in debt. Advance work would not have been possible, and many major repairs and improvements would have been omitted.

Many an opportunity do we seem to lose because we do not have the funds to take the initiative and grasp opportunities. It is indeed difficult to say "No" or "Not Now" to practically every appeal for necessary expansion of present facilities, and the numerous requests and opportunities for advance work.

We wish that more of our people would make special gifts to the Church. It is always a joy to the Bishop to have some one come to him and offer to assist some of the Church's work. It is fine for us to remember our Church's institutions and Diocese in our wills and we hope more people plan to help God's work in this way. However, it is also a wonderful experience to give while we live, and see our gifts become a reality. It is still a great truth that "God loveth the cheerful Giver."

#### THE CATHEDRAL

I have as yet said nothing of the most commanding of all building plans in our Diocese—that of the completed Cathedral.

No man, no matter how insensitive, could live and work for 12 years in Hawaii without understanding completely how urgent our needs are for even the elemental necessities in our Church life.



I dare say that no congregation is really adequately housed. Children sprawl in every corner, we double and triple our services, classes meet in private homes, public schools and nooks and crannies of every available building and garage. We are short of housing for at least six of our clergy and Church workers.

These things I know, and I know, also, that it will never be any different in our time, nor should it be, as long as we are carrying the battle into the enemy's camp. What a foolish dream it is, when we are tired and blue, to imagine a time when our building job will be done! The most you and I can hope for is that God will not only give us our daily bread, but enough strength to do today's job well.

Therefore, I am confident that it is right for us to dream and to work for a completed Cathedral to bear our corporate witness in the heart of the Diocese and in the center of the Pacific.

This Cathedral, when it is finished, must stand for our time as a symbol of us all and all we care for—great enough and fine enough so that every Churchman and every Christian in the community will thrill to see her like a citadel of God upon this site. You and I would not be here tonight if we did not stake our lives on the truth of our religion and our Church. Of that faith, the Cathedral will be a symbol to us and to our whole society.

A Cathedral is far more than a Church for its own congregation or even the Mother Church for a Diocese. Our Cathedral will also be a spiritual symbol for Cross Roads of the World or else it will not be a true Cathedral at all. For we need the outward and visible sign that man does not live by bread alone.

It is right and good that there be canneries, sugar mills, factories, hospitals, libraries, schools in which we take pride. But I say to you that I do not choose to have our times measured only by factories, refineries or clinics. We are a people who believe as well as manufacture. We are a people who worship as well as buy and sell.

It would be untrue of us and wrong if we did not give voice to these deep truths.

T. S. Eliot spoke of this generation as "A decent, godless people: Their only monument the asphalt road and a thousand lost golf balls."

I long to see our society interpreted properly, with Justice to its faith and hope and love, as well as to its skill, production and wealth. I firmly believe that to our Cathedral is given a unique privilege to bear this witness, not only for ourselves but for generations to come.

To alleviate any misunderstanding I wish to make this comment about this project of finishing the Cathedral. As long as I am Bishop, there will never be a quota assigned to any congregation in the Diocese for the completion of this Cathedral. Cathedrals are not built that way. I would freely ask that the good will of every congregation be given this great plan, and I am confident that it will be, but quotas and assessments are not the means to do it.

What can this Convocation do about the Cathedral plan? Clearly we cannot order it done. I think that what Dean Cox, in whose leadership I have the utmost confidence, Mrs. Walter F. Dillingham, Chairman, and members of the Vestry, hope for is an expression of the Convocation's feeling, that you share their resolution that this work be done, and that you desire to see this endeavor move forward as rapidly as the practical steps can be taken to the ultimate realization of this plan. I do not see how anything more than that can be decided at this time.

Changes take place each year in our Diocesan family. Old friends leave and new friends come.

Mr. Joseph Reed, our treasurer for ten years, will leave us this month. We shall miss the Reed family, but we are grateful for the years they have devoted themselves to our Church life in Hawaii.

I am sure that they will take with them a bit of Hawaii in their hearts, but we also want them to take with them the affectionate best wishes of the whole Diocese, and our prayers for God's richest blessings.

The Rev. Paul Savanack has been appointed by National Council to serve as Administrative Assistant and Treasurer. He has been a devoted priest in our Diocese, serving as missionary, headmaster and rector. It was a joy for the Cathedral Chapter to appoint him a Canon. This came as the suggestion of the Presiding Bishop who knows him well. In this new position of Administrative Assistant, he will be able to relieve the Bishop of many administrative details, and at the same time initiate new plans for the Diocese.

We are pleased and grateful to have Mr. Robert McCuaig as Assistant Treasurer and Accountant.

So I bring to a close this review of our family concerns, I do it, as in every year, with a very grateful heart for all the energy and devotion so generously given by our clergy and the hundreds of laity.

Not everyone stops to remember how few there are of us who are free for full time service to the Diocese and to the Church, and how many there are who give themselves far over and beyond their duty. Our Department and Committee Chairmen, members of councils and staff workers who are like iron in their steadfast willingness to answer any call. How could I possibly say to them all what I daily remember in my prayers, that without them our life and work would be well-nigh impossible.

As a good Episcopalian, I realize that I have not said many things that might have been said. I have not touched at all on Okinawa, Formosa, Wake, Midway, Guam and Samoa. However, this report is not a farewell to mankind, so everything cannot be included.

I simply ask you to make what I have said a matter of prayer, a matter of conscience, a matter of effort, and a matter of sacrifice.

My challenges to this Convocation are clear. I expect you will take them back to your congregations, and plan immediately to do your full share in this Diocesan endeavor.

1. Stand Up and Be Counted. Every Episcopalian attend at least one service on Whitsunday, May 20th.
2. A Witnessing Program in every congregation: Group Life Conferences—Study Groups—Evangelistic Campaigns—and Schools of Prayer.
3. Elimination of Building Debts Program. To raise a \$40,000 fund to pay dollar for dollar, up to perhaps \$3,000 for each dollar raised locally.
4. This Triennium to be used as a time for the increase of local support, so that in 1959 our Askings will be reduced by at least \$50,000.
5. Diocesan-wide approval and good will for the program to complete the Cathedral.

Brethren, if our duty often is a humble one, building churches, paying debts, making surveys, it is also and always a very exalted duty, none other than to live Christ's life in this world.

I do not say that Christ fails if we fail; God is not the prisoner of His creatures. I say that what we should be and do, and the measure of it, is what Christ is and does—that is what it means to be a witness to Him.

To teach, to heal, to love, to forgive, to offer, to reconcile, to be in the world and yet not of the world—this is the Church's work for it is Christ's work.

And this work is to be done in the present world—confused, broken, homesick, and fearful, and yet eager for religious security as few generations have been.

It is fashionable in some circles to mock this stirring and restless hunger in so many hearts for a return to religion. I do not share this attitude. It is not for us to make fun of our brothers who are feeling earnestly for what we profess to have.

If they do not find faith in God with us, it may not be their fault but our own for having obscured Christ and His work rather than witnessing to it.

I do not defend the charlatans who fatten on fear and hunger—I only say that every charlatan in a religion is a judgment on us who hold the Christian witness and historic faith in the full Gospel of Christ and who so often fail either to teach it or live it.

So pray with me for the Church in this Diocese, that in the years ahead and always, we may be what He commissioned us to be—Witness to Him, Who lives and reigns, with the Father and the Holy Ghost, God forever and ever, Amen.

## REPORT OF ST. ANDREW'S PRIORY—1955

### ENROLLMENT

On January 1, 1955 St. Andrew's Priory had an enrollment of 490, and on December 31st there were 485 students enrolled for the school year 1955-56. The breakdown into departments is as follows:

### GRADUATES - 1955

On June 7, 1955, 57 girls were graduated from the school and of these 47 are now continuing their education in various colleges, business schools, or nurses' training schools. The other 10 are working in offices or stores in Honolulu or its vicinity.

### FACULTY

The Administrative and teaching staff include—

### SERVICE PROJECTS

It is our belief that scholarship, important as it is, should not be our only goal. Therefore we encourage our girls to assume responsibility in church and civic projects as well as school sponsored ones. Inasmuch as the school uses the Cathedral five days a week, various student groups made donations to the Cathedral pew fund. It is unnecessary to tell most of you of the various ways in which our girls, especially from the Junior and Senior classes, helped at General Convention. They also gave assistance as need arose from January 1955 until the actual event in September. This was a wonderful opportunity for the girls and they themselves acknowledge that they learned a great deal from the experience.

The school choir has taken part in several important services:

- The Woman's Auxiliary service at Convocation 1955
- The Opening Service of General Convention
- The Great United Thank Offering Service at General Convention
- The Ordination service for the Rev. Samuel Van Culin and the Rev. Alfred Krader

In civic projects the school has worked for the Jr. Red Cross, the Volunteer Bureau, Humane Society, provided singing and leis for a naturalization ceremony, and has contributed to the various drives for community aid programs.

In October the school inaugurated a new policy and held a St. Andrew's Priory Welfare Drive from which the funds derived would be prorated among the various groups that call on us to make annual donations. This was very successful and we are able to double our contributions from the students to each of the drives with a minimum of effort. It is planned to make this an annual affair.

The school buildings are also giving their share of service other than just for our school use. During the past year they have been used for meetings and con-

ferences sponsored by the Christian Education Department. The church schools of the Cathedral Parish and the Hawaiian Congregation have used some of the school areas each Sunday. From January until October two of our classrooms were given over to General Convention use, and one room is presently being used as a sort of Diocesan storage area.

### ALUMNAE

An attempt is being made to revive the Priory Alumnae Association. On December 11th a Homecoming was held at the Priory. Between 400 and 500 former students and teachers gathered for this very joyous occasion. There was even a representative present from the group who entered in 1867, the year of the founding of the school.

### BENEFACTORS

The Parent-Teacher Fellowship is proving itself very much alive under the presidency of a Priory "grandson," Leon M. Straus, Jr. A candy sale sponsored by them during November and December has netted \$2300.00 to be used toward the reconstruction of the second floor of the makai wing of the main building. We are greatly indebted to this group of parents who give time and energy for the improving of the school.

The local chapter of the Associates of the Transfiguration is giving scholarship aid to two girls who otherwise would not be able to remain in the school. This is a very real way in which help can be given to the school for we do not have sufficient scholarship funds to meet all the requests made by very desirable students for some help with their tuition.

### RELIGIOUS EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

Religious education continues to be the unifying center of the curriculum with daily Chapel services in the Cathedral, religious instruction in the classrooms, corporate communions of the various divisions of the school and all subjects taught with a Christian emphasis and interpretation. Canon Burtis M. Dougherty has been appointed school chaplain and for the first time in current memory we have a chaplain who can devote the greater part of the school day to the Priory. This is not only of great value in the religious education department but has helped make available to students and faculty alike a fuller guidance and counseling service.

The religious census shows that of the 485 enrolled in the school this year 297 are baptized and 151 confirmed. The unbaptized number 188, and of this number the larger proportion comes in grades 4 through 8. As these girls go on into high school at the Priory the tendency is to accept Christianity for themselves and to be baptized and confirmed. It is this group of immature first generation Christians that we especially commend to the care of the local clergy since they have no family tradition to hold them firm in the faith and practice of the Church.

### GUIDANCE PROGRAM

In keeping with the rapidly growing national interest in school guidance programs, the Priory has opened this year a full-time guidance department. Of course, the Sisters are always available to the girls for counseling service. But two other members of the Priory staff also give much of their time to the guidance program. Canon Burtis M. Dougherty serves as school chaplain and spiritual advisor; and Miss Barbara H. Ching is vocational and personal guidance counselor. The guidance program is designed not only to give individual girls counseling when it is needed but also to serve as a connecting link between the school and the girls' out-of-school living. In these and many other ways, the guidance program strives to bring the school, the home, and the community closer together.

## CAFETERIA

The school continues to participate in the Government School Lunch Program and is thereby enabled to serve daily a substantial and well-balanced lunch including milk for the cost of twenty-six cents. On October 1st Mrs. Jean Hata, a graduate of the cafeteria training course of the Honolulu Technical School took over the management of the school cafeteria.

## IMPROVEMENTS

During the last two months of the year the remodeling of the second floor makai wing of the main building of the Priory was underway. Out of this former dormitory area we now have two new classrooms and some much needed storage space for school supplies and equipment. The project became a larger one than at first anticipated when serious damage by termites was revealed. However, the main structural timbers were found to be sound. To meet with safety regulations and to take the traffic load away from the inside stairways that were never intended to take the punishment from hundreds of feet daily an outside stairway has been put up. We cannot claim that it adds to the beauty of the building, but we have had to sacrifice looks to utility and safety. We plan to compensate with paint and landscaping.

We have continued on our project of the last few years of gradually replacing the outmoded and uncomfortable classroom furniture with attractive and modern equipment.

## CURRENT NEEDS

Our needs are in three areas. The first and in some respects the most pressing is a new classroom building to replace the decrepit frame buildings still in use left over from the days when Iolani school was housed in Queen Emma Square. Two of these rooms were used during the year as General Convention offices, but one of them is in no condition to be returned to use as a classroom. The other three cannot be secured against the depredations of either prowlers or termites and therefore cannot be fitted out with modern and improved classroom equipment of which they are in need.

That brings us to the second need—equipment. That is within our present financial ability to provide, thanks to the generous benefactions of our Parent-Teacher Fellowship, but only if we have an adequate and secure building in which to house it as well as the students who will use it.

The third need lies in the field of personnel. We have become convinced over the years that the elementary grades need a full-time supervisor to give both the teachers and the students the help and guidance they need. Ideally this should be one of the Sisters, but at the present time there is not one of them who can take the time from her present responsibilities to devote to this task without serious neglect of other aspects of the administrative department of the school. The next solution would seem to be to have someone who is already familiar with the school and its policies as well as with the local educational and social conditions to take over this supervision.

## ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

We wish to express our grateful appreciation to the former rector of St. Peter's Church, the Rev. Paul R. Savanack, the vestry and congregation of the same for their continued generosity in permitting the use of their parish church and parish hall to the Priory school during the past year. To the Bishop and the diocesan office workers who have come graciously to our assistance on numerous occasions, as well as to the Cathedral clergy who have aided and encouraged us in our life and work we give our heart-felt thanks. We call the attention of Convocation to the devoted and loyal service of the Priory faculty and office staff who in spite of a small remuneration shared with us cheerfully in the vicissitudes as well as the joys of

the past year, and without whose help the Sisters could not do this work for God and His Church.

CONVOCATION OF 1956  
REPORT OF THE HAWAII EPISCOPAL ACADEMY  
Kamuela, Hawaii

GENERAL STATEMENT

When I reported to this body last year, I spoke of the Academy's clear emergence as a well defined college preparatory school, demanding highly of its students in both conduct and scholarship. In the twelve months that have intervened I feel that I can say confidently that we have gone well beyond the "emergence" state, that we have entrenched that position and that we are preparing to achieve goals in the near future which a year ago we had thought much farther away.

THE ADMISSIONS PROGRAM

Though we are still a small school, we doubled our boarding enrollment for this last fall even after introducing a much more selective admissions program (i.e. selective in the sense of good conduct and school records and mental ability) and having to reject a considerable number of applicants who would not have been rightly placed in a school with the standards we are seeking to maintain. I did accept one or two calculated risks just as I announced I would do last year. We are pleased with the way in which those particular boys are beginning to develop.

Because of the considerable interest which has grown in the school and because of the possibility that we shall not be able to increase our physical capacity more than gradually, I can sincerely state that early applications for admission are the safest. We have already received several applications for the fall of 1957, two years hence! Those who are interested may contact the bishop's office or, preferably and more directly, write the school in Kamuela. The headmaster will then send the necessary information and make arrangements for an interview on one of his two or three winter admissions trips.

SOME INTERESTING DEVELOPMENTS

Our new dormitory building, finished in January and now occupied by 24 boys, a married faculty member and his wife, and a single faculty member, is of course tremendously exciting to us and a fine step forward in the physical plant. We owe heart-felt thanks to many kind friends who have made this necessary improvement possible. Moreover, we are encouraged to think that we shall be able to continue a further building program without too lengthy a delay. In addition to the new building we have added a laundry which will pay for itself over a two or three year period and have made a number of necessary repairs to the other existing buildings. Thanks again to the generosity of many of you, we have also added substantially to the equipment needed in our Science laboratory.

The fashion show was successful beyond our dreams. I can't tell you how thrilled and heart-warmed we were to see such a response. The show itself was delightful, and Mrs. Betty Higgins was wonderful. The practical results are making it possible for us to meet the cost of furnishing our new dormitory. To name Mrs. J. Gordon Halstead and Mrs. James Tabor for all that they did for this enterprise would be but to name a few. Everyone pitched in magnificently.

One of the greatest excitements and pride of the Academy is the faculty we are beginning to develop. We have an unusually outstanding group of men, several of them aided and abetted by charming and capable wives who also throw themselves into every school activity with enthusiasm and effective help. Many of our men have had experience with some of the finest New England boarding schools and eastern colleges, and those who have not had this particular experience are no less a strength in their capable teaching and in the kind of people they are. I know that in our small classes averaging about eight to twelve students per section and in the

kind of enthusiastic, able faculty that we are lining up, we are able to give our students the finest sort of training and education.

DETAILS

Enrollment Figures: Total student enrollment--50.  
Boarding students--42; Day students--8.

Fees: Fees continue to total \$864.00 for new students, \$854.00 for students who have been in previous attendance. Day student tuition fees total \$274.00. The possibility still exists that the future total fee for boarding may be in the range of \$1,000.00.

Activities: The Academy maintains an excellent and seasonal athletic program with such sports to choose from as soccer, six-man football, tennis, basketball, baseball, and track. In addition to the conventional sports are horseback riding, swimming on a beautiful ocean beach, hiking and camping out, and trips to points of interest on the Big Island, including the volcano areas.

Also part of the full program, though not permitted to interfere with the primary academic job are the school paper, the yearbook, dramatics and debate, the art club, the chess club, and similar organizations. A boy has much to challenge him, and every day is a full day. At commencement time appropriate honors and awards are given to students winning them in each phase of the school life, academic, athletic, and spiritual.

Horseback riding deserves a special mention among the Academy's activities. Few schools are privileged to have so many acres of beautiful ranch and riding country right at their door. Believing that learning to feel at home on a horse and to take responsibility for the horse's welfare at the same time is a wonderful experience for any boy, the school, which has its own horses, is building a fine riding program in which every boy may participate at no extra cost. Whether he has never been on a horse before or is an experienced rider, he will have the opportunity of numerous short trips in the surrounding countryside and an occasional longer ride, sometimes culminating in an overnight camp-out on a week end. Each boy receives careful attention and training in how to ride effectively and how to take proper care of a horse.

OUR THANKS

The Academy finds that it has such a growing host of friends that it cannot begin to give adequate thanks to each one, and it takes this opportunity to express the personal gratitude of all of us directly connected with the Academy for all that each of you has done and is doing.

CONCLUSION

The headmaster is always happy to talk with any family and will make appointments on any of the Islands if they are desired. He plans a number of trips for that purpose. Just write directly to the Hawaii Episcopal Academy, Kamuela, Hawaii, or call the bishop's office.

## RECTOR'S REPORT—IOLANI SCHOOL

### RETROSPECT

The present rector assumed the responsibilities of his office at the dedication of St. Alban's Chapel October 3, 1954. A year is a very short time for retrospect, but the School has enjoyed much growth and accomplishment:

1. In place of Dr. Thomas A. Jaggar, whose death occurred two years ago, we now have on our Board Mr. Gayer G. Dominick.
2. There are 890 boys enrolled in Iolani School, compared to 848 boys last spring. These boys are grouped in the present grades:

3. We have ten (10) new faculty members whose seriousness of purpose give promise of greater strength to our whole teaching force.
4. In administration we have a new Registrar in Mr. Elton Cathcart who, after an absence of four years, has rejoined our staff at Iolani. We have also added a Public Relations officer, in the person of Mr. Larry Grant, well-known radio and TV personality in the Territory.
5. We have 28 boarders in our new dormitory, 15 of whom are 7-day boarders and 13 are 5-day boarders. We had more late applicants whom we could not take because our classrooms were already filled.
6. We have overseas students who come from Japan, Okinawa, the Marshalls and Samoa.
7. Last year we graduated 90 members of the senior class. Some of them have won very fine scholarships. We are not yet ready to give a complete report on those who have gone on to higher studies.

### THE CHURCH

The rector's great desire is that we should strengthen the living power of the Church within the School organization. We see evidences of growth in this direction. Our fine new Chapel has proven a great boon since its opening a year ago. There were four of last year's Senior class who were seriously facing the problem of the ministry's call. The 58th Triennial's assembly on the grounds of Iolani School did much to acquaint leaders of the National Church with the work and witness at Iolani. The presence of the Convention, we trust, will be in evidence for many generations to come as the "Trees" named by many officials grow and flourish.

### DEVELOPMENTS

The great change for the year 1955-1956 is the placing of the Upper School on a six-year curriculum instead of the customary four years. We are rearranging our foreign language schedules so that boys begin their study of Latin in the seventh grade. We have added German. We look forward to the time when, with a competent teacher, we can add the Japanese language.

Our English courses are in the process of being re-designed. Every boy from the ninth grade on now has one period each week devoted solely to Oral English. This change accounts for the larger number of boys in the School. We will now

take in 100 boys at the seventh grade, and endeavor to keep them right straight through the twelfth grade.

We look forward this year to a visit from Mr. E. K. Bennett, President of Caius College, Cambridge. He is coming out to consult and counsel with administration, faculty and gifted boys.

### INDEBTEDNESS

The School's indebtedness is high. We owe the Bishop National Bank \$72,500.00, and the Property Fund owes the Working Fund over \$67,931.00, which should be repaid. We must have the help of all those who see the value of Iolani's future in removing this weight to our further progress. Appeals will be made to churchmen, alumni, parents, and friends in the community. We hope that to whatever degree they are able to do so, they will generously respond.

Iolani School is now in its ninety-fourth year. When the fall of 1962 arrives we hope the diligence and the warm kokua of all Iolani's friends may have so developed our curriculum, our spirit, and our physical plant, that it will be an occasion of great rejoicing. Iolani has a treasured past, but our eyes are towards a great future.

## REPORT OF DIOCESAN HOUSE--ARMY-NAVY SERVICE CENTER

The year 1955 in the Diocesan House was a very full and rewarding one.

Hundreds of young men used its facilities, as every weekend there was a full house. There were always some young men staying here during the week, either while on leave or travelling to and from the Orient.

The majority of the young men were Episcopalians, and were interested in the services in the Cathedral and the Young Adult Group. We have provided several Sunday School teachers and Scout leaders, and at least two of the young men are considering going in the ministry.

The men here were very active in the Young Adult Group, attending the meetings, planning outings, and even doing the cooking for some of the lunches held after the service on Sunday. They were willing at all times to assist the Hostess or the Cathedral Office in any jobs they were asked to do. Several of them painted the walls and floor of one of the dormitory rooms.

The Young Adult Group has been most active, as aside from their usual Sunday lunch and meeting Sunday night, they have had several parties, including a Christmas dinner for their group and any service man who knew about it.

There have been several weddings of members of the group, and two of the wedding receptions were held in the Diocesan House.

The House has also been used for receptions and teas by outside groups, and lunches given by members of the Cathedral and Diocesan Staff.

It is in constant use as a meeting place for many of the organizations of the church, including the St. Andrew's Guild, Business and Professional Women, St. Andrew's Hawaiian Congregation's St. Martha's Guild, Friends and Strangers, Clericus, Alter Guild, Young Adult Group, Diocesan Committees and occasionally by the Couples' Club.

## REPORT OF THE CLUETT HOUSE

The Rt. Reverend Harry S. Kennedy, Delegates to the 54th Annual Convocation of the Missionary District of Honolulu, and Friends:

During 1955 an average of twenty-eight girls lived in Cluett House. We try to provide a wholesome life, as nearly approximating family life in a Christian home as is possible with so large a group.

Cluett House girls always like to come back—even from vacations at home, or while they are taking summer courses at the University. One girl has written from the mainland to ask if she may have her old room back when she returns next year.

We have Christian girls from several denominations and a few Buddhists. The latter we try to interest in the services at St. Andrew's Cathedral or St. Peter's Church, and have had some success. Church attendance is required each Sunday.

Four of our girls were confirmed by Bishop Kennedy the last year.

Two of our girls sing in the Hawaiian Congregation choir and three assist with the work of the Altar Guild. During the General Convention two of the girls worked in the Information Booth, and at least three were official "Hostesses."

The storms in January were rather hard on the roof which had to be repaired along with various other spots that were found to let in the rain. A beautiful, old

milo tree was torn up by the roots, but when it did not wither in the sun the next few days we had the tree men come in and replant it. It is growing very nicely, and we really do need the shade as several trees were lost to us when the street was widened.

In the fall we found it necessary to replace our old refrigerator, to buy a new rug for the living room and a new vacuum cleaner. All have been paid for and have made living more pleasant and have raised morale. The girls are just as pleased with a new rug in the living-room, as any girl is pleased when the living-room of her own home is refurnished!

Mrs. Ruth Gaza is an invaluable assistant, and our aim is to give Cluett House girls help, counsel, and encouragement in their daily lives and endeavors, that they may merit the good opinion of the community.

We extend our grateful appreciation to Bishop Kennedy, the Rev. Mr. Savanack, the Rev. Mr. Challinor, and Mr. Joseph Reed for the spiritual and material help given us during 1955.

We thank the Diocese of Wisconsin for \$50.00 sent us in April which we used for household linen. We also thank the friends of the Church Periodical Club for magazines which we receive monthly and for the books sent to us.

REPORT OF CANTERBURY HOUSE  
The Episcopal Student Center, University of Hawaii

The Episcopal Church is at work on the campus of the University of Hawaii. The center for that work is Canterbury House, on Metcalf Street near the campus. The Chaplains in charge of this work these past few years have been priests who must divide their time and energies among other duties. As a result only part of the work on the campus is being done. A report on that part of it follows:

In May the Rev. Keith Kreitner, whose splendid leadership had so well guided our Church's work at the University during some crucial years, returned to the mainland to take up new duties there.

Physically speaking, the students have sought to maintain and improve the fabric of Canterbury House within the limited resources available to them. In many respects their efforts have met with success. A new retaining wall around the patio was erected by student labor, the kitchen was painted, and general repair and up-keep work was done. The students still continue to pay utility bills and smaller operating expenses out of their treasury. However, in other matters student efforts to keep up the property have failed to stem the tide of damage done by storms, poor drainage, termites, and inadequate plumbing. Any honest appraisal of Canterbury House facilities cannot help but pronounce them to be something less than adequate. Certain definite and realistic plans for improvements in the physical plant are an immediate necessity. A few hundred dollars each year for usable equipment and necessary replacements would be a most rewarding investment for the parishes and missions of the District whose future leadership largely lies in Canterbury members.

The membership of the Club at the close of the year included some 60 actively involved students. There are purportedly three times that many Churchmen, or supposed ones, on the campus. Yet we who are Canterburians are concerned with everyone on the campus who is outside our membership and the slow but steady work of personal evangelism is our approach to them.

The program at Canterbury is one that seeks to strengthen the Christian Fellowship. Weekly services of worship are held at the House. Instruction in the Faith and Practise of the Church is given in talks, inquirers' classes, and personal conversation with students. Our students participate in all areas of campus life as individuals and groups. Our cooperation with and respect from other organizations on the campus have both materially increased this year.

Our program is a limited one because only a limited time is available to us in a situation where students live at home. This fact together with the active participation of Canterburians in their own congregations precludes our doing many things we would like to do. To the best of our ability, to the limits of our resources, and in complete dependence upon God, we are seeking to do the Church's work and live the Church's life on the University campus. The challenge is beyond our achieving, but not beyond our striving.

4. Preparing a service for Lenten Family Worship.
5. Arranging for the Children's Mite Presentation.
6. Writing special courses for local use.
7. Encouraging the Birthday Thank Offering.
8. Promoting the Rally Day Offering for Visual Aids.
9. The Stewardship program.

### CONFERENCES CONDUCTED BY DR. DAVID R. HUNTER

We were fortunate to have with us in January 1955 Dr. David R. Hunter, Director of the Department of Christian Education for the Episcopal Church. Dr. Hunter introduced the Parish Life Conference in Hawaii by conducting one for the clergy. This was followed by another attended by representatives from nearly all parishes and missions on Oahu and by several from the neighboring Islands.

Before leaving Dr. Hunter also held a Regional Teachers' Institute for our Sunday School teachers at which time he presented the understandings necessary in preparation for use of the new curriculum.

### CONFERENCES CONDUCTED BY THE REV. GERALD G. GIFFORD

Following Dr. Hunter's visit, the Rev. Mr. Gifford, having had previous training on the mainland, conducted a Parish Life Conference at Iolani School for St. Mary's, St. Mark's, Epiphany, and Good Samaritan; one at Kailua, Oahu, for St. Christopher's Parish and another at St. Andrew's Priory for Holy Trinity, finally going to Wailuku, Maui, for the Church of the Good Shepherd. A Life and Witness Conference planned for Kauai had to be postponed because of General Convention; it will be held early in 1956. We are greatly indebted to Father Gifford for his ever-willing cooperation and for his fine leadership.

### CONFERENCES CONDUCTED BY THE VEN. CLAUDE DU TEIL

Parish Life Conferences have been conducted by Archdeacon Du Teil at Lahaina, Maui, for Holy Innocents' and on Molokai for Grace Church. Reports were gratifying in each case.

### LENTEN FAMILY WORSHIP

In an effort to more fully include children in the Lenten Family Worship, a simple service with prayers and suggested readings from St. Mark's Gospel was prepared and printed as a "prayer card." This was chiefly the work of Deaconess Swinburne and so favorably was it received that a similar service is to be prepared for 1956.

### MITE BOX PRESENTATION

Bishop Kennedy was preacher at the Annual Mite Box Presentation Service held at St. Andrew's Cathedral April 22, 1955. Boys' and Girls' choirs from several parishes and missions sang, and there was the usual procession of banners. Each Sunday School represented a foreign field by having a representative in native dress and by arranging an exhibit. Miss Bessie Sims was in charge of exhibits in Parke Memorial Chapel cloister.

## REGIONAL TEACHERS' INSTITUTE

Members of the Oahu clergy held a Regional Teachers' Institute at St. Andrew's Priory, Sunday, August 14th, as an introduction to the use of the new Seabury courses, the Rev. Gerald Gifford acting as director. The Rev. Samuel Van Culin presented Course One; the Rev. Lawrence Ozaki, Course Four; the Rev. Mellick Belshaw, Course Seven; and the Rev. Paul Wheeler, the Course for Parents.

## ADULT EDUCATION

The Rev. John B. Midworth, Chairman of the Adult Division of the Department of Christian Education arranged to stay for a week after General Convention to offer his services to us. A meeting for clergy and other educational leaders was scheduled for September 18th and arrangements made for The Rev. Mr. Midworth to visit nearly every parish and mission on Oahu as well as those on Maui, to confer with individual clergymen. All travel, hospitality and speaking engagements on Maui were helpfully arranged for by Archdeacon Du Teil.

## THE NEW CURRICULUM PRESENTED BY THE REV. WILLIAM SYDNOR

On September 25th, the Rev. William Sydnor, Editor of the New Seabury Series, kindly consented to interrupt his vacation and address clergy, superintendents, and teachers. We have been especially fortunate to have in Hawaii this year three of the leaders in the National Department of Christian Education.

## VISUAL AID LIBRARY

Our diocesan library of films, filmstrips, slides, and other audio-visual material is now located at St. Andrew's Priory and is efficiently cared for by Sister Lois.

## STEWARDSHIP

A new emphasis upon Stewardship is part of the future program in Christian Education and the Rev. Paul Wheeler has recently been appointed our diocesan chairman.

## COURSES PREPARED

Courses for the summer camp program were prepared to fill local needs; one for children, New Testament Heroes, by the Rev. Gerald Gifford; one for young people, The Episcopal Church, by the chairman.

## GENERAL CONVENTION

Assistance was given the National Department during General Convention through providing clerks for the Seabury Book Store, and projectionists for the Audio-Visual division.

The chairman wishes to express his appreciation to the Bishop and the clergy for always being willing and ready to assist in the program of the department, to St. Andrew's Cathedral and Iolani School for the use of their buildings, and especially to Sister Evelyn Ancilla for so graciously putting the Priory facilities at our disposal for meetings, meals, and conferences.

## REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICE

Bishop Kennedy, Delegates to the 54th Annual Convention, and Friends:

During the year 1955 the clergy and laity in our District have performed many good works which may be considered under the classification--"Christian Social Relations."

The clergy on Oahu and on the other Islands have been making regular hospital calls and have been counseling in institutions and privately wherever there has been an apparent need. Services have been held for both Boy and Girl Scout Troops, organizations have sent baskets of food to needy people at Thanksgiving and Christmas. Woman's Auxiliary Branches have sent clothing to Japan, to Korea and to Molokai, and have taken clothing and magazines to Hale Mahalo (Hansen's Disease) Hospital at Pearl City, Oahu. Other groups have contributed clothing and food through their local welfare associations and still others give material aid to old people's homes. Some missions have let their buildings be used by Scout Troops, Lion's Clubs and other community organizations. Many clergy serve on their local welfare and hospital boards.

In one mission the social secretary has written to all servicemen and to the new families who have made themselves known to the local Church. This mission has also contributed \$100.00 to a school for retarded children, and \$100.00 to the building fund of a hospital to furnish a meditation room. Another mission has supported one entire destitute family.

A parish has entertained underprivileged children at a Sunday School picnic, and has given an outing to the children from the depressed area surrounding the Hawaiian Air Lines airport. They have also given free meals to the needy and have counseled alcoholics and people with domestic problems, and its clergy work in the jails. Its Woman's Auxiliary provided Christmas gifts for the men at the Maluhia Hospital, and the young people put on a program of Christmas caroling in hospital auditoriums.

Many parishes and missions have entertained the servicemen at the Honolulu Armed Services YMCA.

All of the clergy and their congregations have done much along the lines of Social Relations, but some feel that they have done nothing to report. The above is a sample of the work which is being quietly done in the District, and many who feel that they have done nothing will some day hear the King say, "I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me."

We are glad to have an active committee formed in 1955, composed of the Rev. Messrs.: John Caton, John Morrett, Mellick Belshaw and Sam Van Culin. In 1956 we hope to add some lay people to our group. Our plan is to look into conditions in our several communities with a view to assisting where possible.

## REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF FIELD AND PUBLICITY

The Department had as its major effort for the year the assisting of the Publicity Committee for the 58th General Convention. The Department Chairman served as a member of this Committee, succeeding the Rev. Richard U. Smith as chairman in May, 1955.

A brief summary of Convention publicity work follows: Prior to Convention monthly articles in FORTH, stories and articles for various Church periodicals were our main concern. In terms of space and content the various Church magazines presented as full and fair an account of the Church's life in Hawaii as possible.

Local publicity was prepared for use in our churches to supplement the generally excellent job done by the several congregations in the District in publicizing and informing people about the Convention. Honolulu newspapers were briefed and supplied with a constant flow of news as Convention dates approached. Radio and TV stations were similarly briefed and supplied with program materials and personalities. A 40-page special Convention Issue of the Hawaiian Church Chronicle was prepared for distribution. The work of Mr. William Simonds in Radio-TV, Mr. Henry Iseri in photography, and the Rev. Fletcher Howe in writing material was especially helpful.

Actual Convention publicity was the direct responsibility of the Press Officer of the National Council, but the local committee worked long and hard under his direction. The Convention received the most sustained coverage of any local event since Pearl Harbor. Wire services averaged 3,000 words daily, one cable company averaged 10,000 words daily, 125 Press Releases were prepared in the Press Room, together with much background information material. Some 77,000 sheets of paper were used to provide this material.

In any enterprise of this magnitude mistakes were inevitable and criticism to be expected. Both things happened, but the Episcopal Church in Hawaii came through Convention the beneficiary of a new and healthy respect from the working Press. An increasing awareness on the part of the newspapers to the importance of Church news is evident. For example, the Honolulu Advertiser hosted a luncheon for the Oahu clergy in December at which plans were announced for better Church coverage on the part of that paper. Efforts are being made by this Department to cooperate with the Press and consolidate our hard-won gains in this matter. We hope that more and more use will be made of the Department as a clearing house and liaison agent in Church publicity.

The debt of the Department to Bishop Kennedy for his concern and active interest in all areas of its activity can only be mentioned with thanks. Miss Katherine Morton continues to surpass her previous records of achievement in the preparation and supervision of the Hawaiian Church Chronicle. She seems to thrive on the long and tedious hours so freely given to the Chronicle, despite her many other duties.

Parishes and missions and institutions in the District have effectively used every media of communication to steadily improve their public relations. In so doing they have shown again and again that there is good news in The Good News.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDING BISHOP'S COMMITTEE ON LAYMEN'S WORK  
THE LAYMEN'S LEAGUE IN HAWAII

In 1955 the Laymen's League undertook, and successfully completed, two major tasks:

The building (or rebuilding) of the Boys' Dormitory, Caretaker's Cottage, rewiring (electrical) of the incoming power distribution panel, and two new Cesspools at Mokuleia Youth Center.

The General Convention.

Both were major undertakings, and my thanks go out to all who participated.

The work at Mokuleia was completed in time for the opening of Summer Camp sessions and, from the reports, our efforts were well worth the time and money. There are still things to be done at Mokuleia, and we hope to accomplish some of them this year of 1956, before Summer Camp.

The Laymen's League was authorized by the Board of Directors of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii to borrow the necessary money for the completion of our work at Mokuleia. Repayment will be made over a period of five years. Our job now is to raise this money.

Preparation for General Convention took a great deal of our time in June, July and August; and during September we were actively engaged in General Convention duties, which were carried out with great success. This is evidenced by the many gratifying comments of our visitors, and congratulations of our own Bishop.

Before General Convention the men were engaged in moving equipment and supplies, and setting the stage for the Convention. During the sessions, our men had many duties such as ushering at the Services, selling tickets for the various events and dinners, and transporting people. Removing everything at the close of Convention was also a big task.

The annual Laymen's Training Course was held at Iolani School June 10, 11 and 12, under the leadership of the Rev. Howard Harper, Executive Director on The Presiding Bishop's Committee on Laymen's Work, John Reinhardt, Director of Dept. of Promotion, and William Sigmund, Key Layman for the Eighth Province. This was a most successful course. Approximately thirty persons attended, including two representatives from Maui. Kauai and Hawaii did not send representatives due, primarily, to the fact that with General Convention nearing, they could not afford the time or money, or both.

Another event in which our Church and men participated was the Bryan Green Mission in early March. This was a very interesting event and much was gained by everyone participating and attending this Mission. Although the Mission was under the sponsorship of the Honolulu Council of Churches, our Church had a leading part.

We had one note of sadness, in the passing of Charles Hookano, a devoted churchman, and one of the oldest Lay Readers, from point of service. We have all felt his loss deeply.

Our special Corporate Communion Service on George Washington's Birthday, held at St. Peter's Church, was another great success. The turnout was very gratifying. After the Communion Service we adjourned to St. Peter's Parish Hall for breakfast. Our guest speaker was the Very Reverend James S. Cox, Dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral, a newcomer at that time. His talk was most inspiring and he endeared himself to all of us immediately. We are planning to continue this Service in 1956.

Because of General Convention, and the preparation beforehand, our meetings were somewhat irregular; however, because of our joint efforts, we were brought

close together frequently during this time. We have again scheduled regular monthly meetings, and are looking forward to a very active year for the Laymen.

In closing I would like to express my sincere thanks to the many people who have given me counsel and assistance during my first year in office, particularly all the Parish and Mission Keymen, who have supported me so wholeheartedly, Bishop Kennedy, the Rev. Paul Savanack, Canon Frederick McDonald, Katherine Morton, Tom Major, and Joseph Reed. My sincere thanks also goes to the Rev. Howard Harper, the Rev. George McCray, and Mr. John Reinhardt who, during our June conference and General Convention, gave me so much real help and encouragement.

It has been a most inspirational year.

REPORT ON THE YOUTH DEPARTMENT

To the Right Reverend Harry S. Kennedy and Guests of the 54th Convocation:

The following report is a brief summary of the activities of the Department of Youth for the year 1955:

YOUTH CONFERENCE OF THE 53rd ANNUAL CONVOCATION  
February 11th and 12th 1955

The theme of the conference was "Know Your Church"—the lecture including the organization, program and the General Convention of the Episcopal Church.

The banquet was held in Davies Hall, St. Andrew's Cathedral. Our guest of Convocation, the Very Reverend Paul Roberts, Dean of St. John's Cathedral in Denver, Colorado, was the main speaker at the banquet Friday night.

Saturday morning the young people from Honolulu proper boarded buses and went to Mokuleia Youth Center for the day's activities. The Saturday sessions included the Holy Communion, lectures and discussions, swimming, recreation, and a YPF business meeting and election. The clergy of the Episcopal Church participated in the program. We are indebted to them for the preparation of their work and for leading the discussion groups. The total attendance at the conference was 348 young people.

SUMMER YOUTH CONFERENCE—June 12th to 17th 1955

A very successful youth conference was held at Mokuleia Episcopal Youth Center. Theme of the conference was "Your Future, Spiritual and Social." Those attending were young people between the ages of 14 and 21. The leaders of the conference were the Rev. David J. Coughlin, Director, and the Rev. Messrs.: William R. Grosh, Paul M. Wheeler, Joseph Turnbull, Paul Kim, Burton L. Linscott.

The general course offered for all the young people was "The Social and Physical Development of Teen-Agers." The speakers were Dr. Sylvia R. Haven and the Very Rev. James S. Cox. A course in hymnology was offered to all. Then the young people were allowed to choose two courses for study. The following were offered: How to Study the Bible, How to Pray, The History of the Episcopal Church, World Religions, Christian Vocations.

The camp program included games, swimming, sports, hikes, religious instruction and entertainment. Forty-seven young people of high school age attended the conference, six clergy, one nurse, one senior advisor for the girls. In 1956 the

same type of program will be carried out early in the summer for the young people of high school age.

#### THE 58th GENERAL CONVENTION—September 4th to 16th 1955

Young people of all parishes and missions were privileged to serve in many capacities during the General Convention. The Youth Department did not sponsor any particular activity, but gave general information and help in organizing and carrying out many of the activities of the General Convention. Our young people were in the choir, acted as acolytes, pages, messengers, typists, file clerks, drivers of automobiles in the motor pool, they met planes and ships as they arrived, they furnished some of the entertainment during the Convention, and were available for work as volunteers in many of the booths in the exhibit halls. They also served as hostesses at some of the social activities, some of them wearing the dress of their particular racial groups.

Many of the youth activities of the local congregations were curtailed so that all available interest and service could be put into the General Convention. I am certain that part of the success of the General Convention was due to the activities and service of our young people.

#### SUMMER CAMP ON MAUI

Although not under the direct leadership of the Department of Youth, one of the youth activities outside the island of Oahu was the summer camp on Maui, and I make direct quotations from a report sent in to us by the Rev. Lani Hanchett:

"A good camp was held at Camp Pecusa, Kapalua Beach, Maui, this past summer, 1955. With the Rev. Lani Hanchett as Camp Director, the Ven. Claude Du Teil in charge of Christian Education, and the Rev. Norman Ault in charge of recreation, the camp provided fun and Christian fellowship for 60 campers and twelve junior counselors. Two sessions were held, each a week long. The first week had 7-8-9 year olds as campers, and in the second week the 10-13 age group."

The camp on Maui has not been as fortunate as Mokuleia as far as housing is concerned. These campers used tents and army cots, also, they used tents as their dining-hall and did most of their cooking out-of-doors.

"The one thing that was probably most responsible for the success of the camp was the food. Under the supervision of Puanani Hanchett, who was helped by volunteer workers from the Church of Holy Innocents, wonderful meals were served. Working with very inadequate equipment, they were able to produce the most surprising and delicious menus. Their working area needed to be seen to be appreciated."

Marion Wright, senior counselor and camp nurse, was most helpful in many ways. Wilbur Evans was jack-of-all-trades for the camp.

"Camp Pecusa is here to stay on Maui. It has already proven its popularity and need. The present camp site was made available to the Church through the kindness of Baldwin Packers, Ltd. It is our hope that we will be able to acquire our own site in the not too distant future."

#### SUMMER CAMP PROGRAM FOR CHILDREN HELD AT MOKULEIA

The 1955 summer camp program included 165 children and a staff of 28. We were fortunate in having the Rev. W. Edwin Bonsey, Jr., Vicar of Grace Church, Molokai, as the Camp Director for the six weeks of camp. Also, we are indebted to the Rev. David P. Coon, Vicar of St. James' Church, Kamuela, the Assistant Director. Our staff included three cooks, one dishwasher, eleven junior counselors, six clergy instructors and a nurse. We were fortunate in having as craft director and "mother of all the youngsters," Miss Margaret Monteiro. Senior girls'

counselor was Miss Charlotte Kastenbein, and the nurse was Miss Beryl Terry. Five of the junior counselors came to us from the mainland; the remaining junior counselors were young people from our own parishes and missions. The clergy who assisted as instructors were the Rev. Messrs. Mellick Belshaw, John R. Catton, James S. Nakamura, Lawrence H. Ozaki, Samuel Van Culin, Jr., Paul M. Wheeler.

The course of instruction entitled "Our Episcopal Church" was compiled by the Rev. Gerald G. Gifford of St. Stephen's Church, Wahiawa.

For the past several years Dr. Joseph Lucas has been our camp doctor. He has given generously of his time and talents to the Episcopal Church Camp. We appreciate his help so very much, and it would be difficult to have our camp without him.

We were able to house more campers this past summer because of the wonderful new dormitory that was built for the camp by the Laymen of the diocese. The new building is a reconstructed bachelor officers' quarters barracks. It has private rooms and is divided into two sections—one for the boys, one for the girls. At one far end of the dormitory there is a room large enough for a classroom, and can be used for crafts, lectures or meetings. The new dormitory will house 72 persons and is a grand contribution to the life of the campers and to the Youth Center itself.

\* \* \*

Plans for 1956 include the Summer conference for young people and Summer Camps for younger children. The schedule is as follows: High School Conference, June 10th to 16th; First Camp for 8-9 year olds, June 17th to 29th; Second Camp for 9-10 year olds, July 1st to 13th; Third Camp for 11-12-13 year olds, July 15th to 27th.

The Rev. Paul M. Wheeler was appointed this past year as assistant on the Youth Department. I wish to thank him for his help in the past year.

#### REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

1955 was a year of excitement, fellowship and growth. The coming to our Islands of the General Convention gave great impetus to our missionary work not only here in Hawaii, but throughout the entire Church. Each parish and mission in our District had many mainland churchmen as guests and made a great witness for the missionary work of the entire Church. This witness was made possible because we have so many dedicated men and women working for the spread of Christ's Kingdom. We must continue to witness to our own people. Upon every member is laid the duty to "Work, and pray and give for the spread of His Kingdom."

At the Convocation last year St. George's Mission, at Pearl Harbor, was admitted into union with the Missionary District of Honolulu. The Bishops, Deputies, and Delegates to the General Convention and Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary have given approximately \$10,000 towards the building of a new church for this congregation. The plans for this Church are going forward and it is hoped that the building will be started in the near future.

St. Timothy's Church, Aiea, admitted into union with the Convocation just two years ago, has completed its building plans, and expect to be worshipping in its new building this spring.

St. Columba's new Church was consecrated by the Bishop on June 26th. A report on the new buildings will be noted on the attached sheet.

In November the need for new work in the Waianae area was recognized, and the Rev. Robert Challinor, Rector of St. Andrew's Hawaiian Congregation, and the Rev. Gerald Gifford, Vicar of St. Stephen's-in-the-Fields, Wahiawa, were charged with developing the work and ministering to those in that area. At present services are held at the Waianae School.

We are looking forward to the time when we shall become a self-supporting Diocese. This can only be accomplished when every mission takes on more of its own support—chiefly in paying a greater portion of the Vicar's stipend. The Church of the Holy Nativity, Aina Haina, is to be congratulated in that they are now paying the full salary of the Vicar. It is heartening to note that almost every mission in the Diocese has accepted a larger share of its Vicar's stipend for 1956. Every Bishop's Committee is urged to take on a larger portion of this item each year. As our missions become more and more self-supporting more money is available for advance work—and the need is great.

One of our greatest needs—one that has been on our Bishop's heart for many years—is a chapel in the Waikiki area. In this densely populated section of Honolulu the Church is needed both for the permanent population, and to minister to the tourists.

In the Portlock area of Honolulu, a rapidly growing part of the city, we need to have some work. There are other parts of our District that have no ministry of the Episcopal Church, and they need us.

Missions and Church Extension are jobs for every member of the Church. A Christian who is not a missionary is not carrying out his Lord's command. We must work earnestly, pray daily, and give regularly that Christ's kingdom may come on earth.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE  
PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS

During the year the Board of Directors met on various occasions for transaction of business affairs of the Diocese. Members of the Board met with and counseled with the Bishop and other Administrative Officers of the Church Corporation in the conduct of the Church Corporation's finances and legal matters.

Officers of the Church Corporation elected for the year were as follows:

Official action was taken on the following:

1. Authorized the expenditure of approximately \$9,500 for the construction and installation of the new pews in St. Andrew's Cathedral.
2. Authorized the expenditure of approximately \$7,500 for improvements to the property given by the Kaneohe Ranch Company to the Church for the location of Calvary Mission. This was for paving, sewers, etc.
3. Authorized the Diocesan Treasurer to merge all of the Cathedral Canonry Fund balances in the Church's Trust Endowment Account, to be called the "St. Andrew's Property Maintenance and Renovation Fund."
4. Authorized the loan of \$11,500 to the Laymen's League for the purpose of constructing dormitory facilities at the Mokuleia Recreation and Conference Center.
5. Authorized a loan of \$3,000 to St. John's Church, Kula, for the purpose of liquidation of an outstanding debt on the parish hall.
6. Authorized the construction of driveway, walk way and parking facilities at St. Andrew's Cathedral at a cost of \$1,156.
7. Approved construction in the amount of \$4,200 for repairs to the roof of Parke Memorial Chapel and the Cathedral bell tower.
8. Approved contract with the Hawaiian Dredging Company in the amount of \$14,960 for repairs and renovation of the chancel and sanctuary of St. Andrew's Cathedral.
9. Approved the sale of 2,280 square feet of property on Emma Street to the City and County of Honolulu at a price of \$9,120. Proceeds from this sale are to be divided on a pro rata basis between St. Peter's Parish and Cluett House.
10. Approved a loan of \$16,500 to St. Stephen's-in-the-Fields Church for the purpose of acquiring contiguous property which had been needed by the Church.
11. Approved the loan of \$10,000 to St. Timothy's Church, Aiea, for the purpose of financing the new Church building. The balance of the cost of this construction will be financed by gifts from the National Council and from Building Fund pledges made by the congregation of St. Timothy's.
12. Accepted with regret the resignation of Joseph Reed, Diocesan Treasurer, effective January 1, 1956. The Board voiced appreciation for the services rendered by Mr. Reed while serving in this capacity for the past ten years.
13. Approved the appointments of the Rev. Paul R. Savanack as Administrative Assistant and Treasurer and Mr. Harold Waldegrave as Assistant Treasurer and Accountant, effective January 1, 1956.

## REPORT OF THE HONOLULU BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

To the Rt. Rev. Harry S. Kennedy and Delegates to the 54th Convocation:

Early in the year, with an eye toward General Convention, a motion was made to continue the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary Executive Board Meetings during the summer. Ten meetings were held during 1955 with excellent representation at all meetings.

There were no resignations during the year but as this report was being compiled, Mrs. L. W. De Vis Norton, our faithful assistant supply secretary, felt it necessary to resign. We are sure she will not rest on past laurels (which are many) but will continue to be active in the work of the church.

The district Altar Guild had an exceptionally active year. A very small group of faithful workers prepared articles for the large altar in the civic auditorium as well as maintaining two altars in hotels during General Convention. They were assisted by branch altar guilds in making 220 purificators necessary for the United Thank Offering Presentation Service. All articles used during General Convention were later forwarded to Okinawa for distribution. During 1955 many articles were made or reconditioned for use in this district. It was noted that there were many demands from the different churches for instruction in the making of articles and less demand for finished articles which shows a fine and independent spirit.

The excellent attendance at the Lenten sewing project held each Friday during Lent made it possible to send 586 pieces of infant wear to St. Barnabas Hospital, Osaka, Japan, Elizabeth Saunder's Home, Japan, and St. Luke's Hospital in the Philippines. During the weekly sewing sessions, Mrs. Marguerite Black presented a review of a book on India, entitled "Under Three Flags." This book was recommended for study by the National Council and proved to be of great interest to all who attended.

Once again, a Chain of Prayer was held in conjunction with the Lenten Program. The Diocesan Prayer Group has disbanded as a great percent of the branches are now conducting their own prayer groups.

The 3rd Sunday of every month found many of our auxiliaries assisting in the pleasant task of providing hospitality at the Armed Forces YMCA. Questionnaires distributed to all branches pointed out that our women, as individuals, are contributing their time and talents toward the welfare of the community.

1955 saw an increase in the Church Periodical Club. 311 magazine subscriptions were placed through the diocesan C.P.C. director, 38 of which were gift subscriptions to Canterbury House, The Hawaii Episcopal Academy at Kamuela and 15 clergymen. A sum of \$20 was forwarded to the National Book Fund. Many of the branches have participated in re-mailing magazines, sending books and magazines to hospitals and sharing magazines with their neighbors. 14 auxiliaries now have C.P.C. secretaries. However, only 9 of the 14 have been active during 1955.

Many interesting programs were planned by the Diocesan Educational Secretary and presented at the monthly Executive Board meetings. The primary purpose of the programs was to highlight our fields of interest and endeavor and to assist the branches in preparing programs for their own auxiliary meetings. The panel on "General Convention and the Triennial Meeting" was presented to all but 4 branches on Oahu prior to September. Since that time, delegates to the Triennial Meeting have given their reports to all but 4 auxiliaries on Oahu. One delegate has reported to the women on Kauai and our own Mrs. Harry Kennedy spoke to the women on Molokai.

The women of this district have participated in the program of the United Council of Church Women. Mrs. Marguerite Black serves on the board of this ecumenical council and keeps us well informed of its activities.

More and more of our women are sharing in the United Thank Offering and we have reason to be jubilant over the increased number of participants as well as the amount contributed during 1955. The total amount contributed during 1955 alone was only \$600 less than the total amount contributed during the previous triennium. We look forward to the day when every woman in the Missionary District of Honolulu is a "Blue Box" devotee.

Voluntary contributions from all branches made it possible to send a check to the Canon William Heffner Discretionary Fund at Christmas, and to assist in the purchase of laboratory equipment for The Hawaii Episcopal Academy at Kamuela. "Specials" for 1955 included the Bishop's Discretionary Fund, Hawaii Episcopal Academy, Theological Seminary Fund and St. Timothy's Mission. The total amount pledged toward these four "Specials" was \$5,359.50. "Unusual disbursements"



from the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary during 1955 included a check to Bishop Kennedy for his discretionary fund and a check to Iolani School toward remodeling of St. Alban's Chapel.

This report would not be complete without a brief mention of General Convention. It was a great privilege for the women of the Missionary District of Honolulu to be hostess to the Triennial Meeting held in conjunction with General Convention. Those who were active, and there were many, will long remember this great experience. Future Triennial Meetings will certainly have a deeper meaning for the women of this diocese now that they have had an opportunity to participate in or to assist at a General Convention.

I close with heartfelt appreciation to the women of this diocese for their loyalty and cooperation and in particular the members of the Executive Board who have been such faithful supporters and diligent workers throughout the year. I only wish it were possible to name every faithful worker, for it is because of each individual's devoted service that we have accomplished so much as a group.

THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS  
TREASURER'S REPORT 1955

Herewith is a comparative Balance Sheet, Statement of Receipts and Disbursements and Consolidated Schedules covering the Financial activity of the Diocese during 1955.

Financially the greatest gain noted in the Diocese during the year was in the reduction of Notes Payable. During 1955, Notes Payable were reduced \$66,700.00. Interest on all Notes was paid. Additional bank loans were made, in the amount of \$31,000.00, the proceeds of these loans being spent for additional land and buildings.

During 1955 our Lands and Buildings values increased \$144,000.00. This increase by locations is as follows:

All Parishes and Missions are making good progress in the reduction of current liabilities, and in addition are making considerable expenditures for upkeep, maintenance and renovations of local properties.

We have a return from our Invested Funds of nearly 8 1/2%. Schedule 5 of this report shows an appreciation in the current value of our Investments of our \$300,000.00. Investment transactions are handled on the basis of largest potential income to our endowees, while at the same time, we are reasonably assured of sound investments. Our Investment policy is under the personal direction of Mr. Herman V. Von Holt, Secretary of the Board of Directors. I believe I can speak freely for the Diocese in expressing to Mr. Von Holt, sincere appreciation for his interest and excellent foresight in handling the Church's Invested Funds.

Quotas and Assessments were paid in full by all Parishes and Missions during the year with many Parishes over-subscribing their quotas. In addition, most of our Churches are subscribing to the Hawaiian Church Chronicle for each member of the individual congregation. It is the Bishop's hope that all Parishes and Missions subscribe to the Chronicle one hundred percent for their entire Parish list.

If I may, I would like to express my personal appreciation for the cooperation and support that the Diocese has given me in my work during the past ten years.
