MINUTES OF THE FIFTY-FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING of the CONVOCATION OF THE MISSIONARY DISTRICT OF HONOLULU

Monday, February 11, 1957

The 55th Annual Convocation of the Missionary District of Honolulu opened with the Administration of the Holy Communion at 8:00 a.m. in St. Andrew's Cathedral, Honolulu, Monday, February 11, 1957, with the Bishop of the District, the Right Reverend Harry Sherbourne Kennedy, D. D., as celebrant.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

At the close of this service the Convocation met in Tenney Memorial Hall, where the Bishop presided as President, delivered the Invocation and called the Convocation to order.

The Reverend Canon Wai On Shim was appointed Secretary Pro Tempore.

The Committee on Privilege reported all parishes and missions in the District in good standing. The Secretary read the roll of clergy canonically resident in the Missionary District, and a quorum was declared present.

The Roll Call of the Lay Delegates was read by the Reverend Robert Sheeran. and a quorum was declared present.

The Reverend Canon Wai On Shim was nominated for Secretary of the Convocation and on motion the nominations were closed and a unanimous ballot cast for Canon Shim.

The Bishop presented to the Convocation the clergy who had come into the District during the last Convocation year, namely, the Reverend Messrs: Shunji F. Nishi, Ph. D., Richard L. Aiken, Morimasa Kaneshiro, Gerald P. Loweth, William Smythe, and Richard A. Kirchhoffer, Jr. Visiting clergy introduced were The Rev. Paul Barbour, D. D., and Chaplain J. Edgar Livingston.

Cabled greetings from the Reverend John R. Caton, of Taiwan, and the Reverend Canon William C. Heffner, of Okinawa, were read; also a letter from the Rt. Rev. Richard A. Kirchhoffer, Bishop of Indianapolis.

The Reverend J. Robert Jones presented the motion, which was seconded and passed, that the following persons, canonically resident in this Missionary District, be sent messages from the Convocation:

The Reverend G. P. Mellick Belshaw, Chairman of the Committee on Necrology and Memorials, presented the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That

WHEREAS the Reverend Benjamin Shuntaro Ikezawa was a priest in the Missionary District of Honolulu from 1931 to 1940;

AND WHEREAS, in his office as Priest-in-charge of Good Samaritan Mission, Honolulu, faithfully devoted himself to the work of the Church and to the Glory of God:

AND WHEREAS, as Priest and Pastor of the Church, he endeared himself to his congregation and to others in this District from the date of his arrival from Osaka, Japan, through the time of his retirement, and to his death in 1956;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Fifty-fifth Annual Convocation of the Missionary District of Honolulu, convening on the eleventh day of February, 1957, go on record to recognize his priestly influences upon the people of the Church and of the Community at large;

AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that the Secretary of this Convocation be instructed that this record be kept in the annals of said Convocation.

It was moved by the Ven. Norman R. Alter that the courtesy of the floor be extended to the Rt. Rev. William Fisher Lewis, Bishop of Nevada. The motion was seconded and passed.

The guest of Convocation, Bishop Lewis, was introduced to the delegates and guests of Convocation. He expressed appreciation for the infinite hospitality which was being extended to him and Mrs. Lewis during their stay in Honolulu. He brought greetings from the Missionary District of Nevada and from National Council.

It was moved by the Rev. Canon Savanack that reports be limited to the Treasurer's Report, the Board of Directors' Report, and the report of the Woman's Auxiliary. Motion was seconded and passed.

Announcement was made of the Synod of the Province of the Pacific to be held in San Francisco, California, May 7, 8 and 9, 1957.

Motion was made by Mr. Arthur Smith that ecclesiastical authority be given to search for and appoint delegates to the Synod. Motion was seconded and approved.

The date of next Convocation was set for February 9, 1958. Motion was made by the Rev. Paul Wheeler, seconded and approved.

The Treasurer, Mr. Henry F. Budd, was introduced. Mr. Budd stressed the need of continued efforts toward self support. Every Mission has accepted an increased share in 1957 towards clergymen's salaries. During 1956, paid-off obligations amounted to some \$120,000. Trust endowments increased over \$94,000. During the year returns on investments came to a little less than 8%, and appreciation for guidance in these matters was extended to Mr. Herman von Holt. Mr. Budd concluded his very brief oral report by stating that the financial program is one that now can be looked forward to with great pride.

Following Mr. Budd's report, Mr. von Holt was asked to stand and be recognized, followed by enthusiastic applause of the delegates.

It was moved, seconded and passed that the National quota of \$8,000.00 be accepted.

Mr. Herman von Holt, Secretary of the Board of Directors of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands, read the report of that Board for the year 1956. (see page 53)

Motion was made by the Rev. Robert Sheeran, seconded and passed that the report be approved as read.

Mrs. Barbara Goss, Diocesan President of the Woman's Auxiliary, read her report for the year 1956. (see page 56)

The report was approved as read.

Mr. James Tabor, Vice-Chancellor and Chairman of the Committee on Canons, was introduced to members of Convocation. Copies of the proposed Amendments were distributed. Mr. Tabor said that reviews and revisions to such instruments was an ever-continuing work. Mr. Arthur Smith, Chancellor, advised that amendments to the Constitution, Canons and By-Laws must be voted upon by orders.

It was moved by the Ven. Norman Alter and seconded that the proposed amendments to the Constitution be accepted. Voting by Orders the Clergy and laity approved.

Next order of business concerned the proposed amendments to the Canons. Question was raised as to whether the change to Section 2 of Canon 3 was proposed strictly as an economical move. Members were informed that this was definitely so.

The Rev. Dr. Nishi raised a question concerning a definition of the word "Rectorate". Dr. Nishi recommended the word "Cure" be substituted for the word "Rectorate" as set forth in Canon VI, Section 4.

It was moved by the Rev. Samuel Van Culin, and seconded, that the amendments to the canons be approved as set forth in the proposed list, including the change of the word "Rectorate", wherever it appeared in the Canons, to "Cure". Voting by Orders the Clergy and laity approved.

Motion was made by the Rev. Samuel McCain, Jr. that the Committee be commended for excellent work accomplished in connection with the Constitution, Canons, and By-Laws. Motion was seconded and approved.

Mr. Arthur Smith felt that some explanation should be afforded in connection with the wording used in the instruments affecting real estate. Mr. Smith stated that the American Church has nothing in its governing body called "Commissary"; that the English or Anglican Church did have, and in the interests of clear meaning, rather than "Commissary", that a "Reviewing Committee" be authorized. The revised wording was approved as suggested.

Mr. James Taylor, Headmaster of the Hawaii Episcopal Academy, was introduced to the delegates of Convocation. Mr. Taylor thanked everyone for the wonderful support of the school. Enrollment fees will be slightly raised this next term. This past year the school had capacity enrollment, and a waiting list maintained. Applications are already on hand for next year's enrollment.

Plans are going forward for a better campus, and for adequate and proper buildings.

Mr. Taylor invited all interested persons to speak with him concerning any questions they might have concerning the school.

Sister Evelyn Ancilla, C. T., of St. Andrew's Priory was introduced to delegates of Convocation. Sister Evelyn invited all members to visit the Priory, particularly directing attention to the new building now under construction. She pointed out that this was the first class room unit to be constructed at the Priory intwenty (20) years. The building will cost an estimated \$100,000. This venture was started by a grant of \$30,000 by National Council from the Builders for Christ Fund. \$10,000 was added locally, and the balance will be borrowed. The building is expected to be finished this spring, and will replace four frame class rooms, and will house the laboratory.

Tuition fees will be slightly increased at the Priory this coming year.

The Rev. Canon McDonald invited members of Convocation to visit Iolani School in the afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, for the dedication of the first unit of the Elementary School. Adequate plant facilities practically amounts to an operation against time. Iolani is getting \$172,000 in pledges for a new building program. Some \$62,000 was used for the building being dedicated this afternoon; another \$15,000 will be used for equipment, leaving \$130,000 for a new Student Center Building. Nine hundred and fifty lunches are processed every day.

Canon McDonald cited the fact that Iolani has some very distinguished persons in the faculty, who would not often be found teaching at the secondary level. He also said the day had passed when a boy could get into the school because he is a good athlete. Every boy must be college preparatory material.

Boys are instructed in sacred studies. Canon McDonald expressed the need for a closer association of the students with congregations -- a Church home -- thereby enabling the boys to have better understanding of Christian living.

The President informed members of Convocation that in approving the Proposed Amendments to the Canons, a Finance Committee must be appointed, and the following were named to serve on this Committee:

It was moved, seconded and approved that this committee be appointed.

The Bishop asked Dean Cox, of St. Andrew's Cathedral, to briefly present the plan for the proposed extension of the Cathedral. He explained the structural deterioration and ravage of termite infestation, making it necessary to replace the roof at a cost of \$100,000. A new organ must be purchased at a cost of \$50,000. The extension of two bays and porch would cost \$150,000; wiring, ventilation, etc. would add \$50,000; and the new facade including stained glass window would cost \$60,000, making a total of \$400,000 for the proposed completion of the plans. The Cathedral Chapter must approve all memorials. The drive for funds from Cathedral members was to be completed by March 3rd, the work started on April 1st and the project completed by December 15th.

The Bishop asked the delegates from neighbor islands to stand, calling first on Maui, then Kauai, Hawaii and Molokai. Mrs. George Spencer from St. James' Mission, Papaaloa, was introduced. This was her twenty-seventh time to attend Convocation.

EXCERPTS FROM THE BISHOP'S ANNUAL ADDRESS -

55th CONVOCATION

My Brethren in Christ, Grace be unto you, and Peace:

STATISTICS

In 1956 there were 916 baptisms, 839 confirmations. There are now 15,895 baptized members in the Diocese, and there are 10,266 confirmed persons. There are 6,306 pupils in our Church Schools.

The statistics indicate that within the District we have had some share in the revival of religion in the nation in all religious bodies. By some individuals this revival is neither greeted with enthusiasm nor welcomed with hope. There are fears for its genuineness and permanence. But surely the primary interest of the Churches in this, as in all human relationships, is not to prejudge, but to strengthen people, not to have a critical spirit but to speak the truth in love and act accordingly.

Obviously genuine and permanent discipleship rests upon intelligent conviction and faithful dedication, and those in turn rest upon knowledge and devotion to the truth.

There cannot be a revival of religion without a revival and improvement of religious education which includes confirmation instructions. In our Church an increased emphasis, zeal and enthusiasm has been shown for religious education. There is the sound conviction that our children must be given more adequate instruction in the things that matter most, or else we shall deny them their spiritual birthright as children of God.

This is the work of the whole Church, Clerical and lay, with special claims upon parents to bear witness to the truth of their faith before their own children.

The Church places the responsibility for religious instruction upon the clergy of the parishes and missions. It is a fearful as well as a rich responsibility. They cannot possibly do it all by themselves. That is why the new curriculum leans heavily upon teachers and parents as well. It ought to be the concern of every one of us as citizens and as Christians.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

The Woman's Auxiliary of the district, has shown marked progress. As one woman remarked to me, "Our programs are better, the attendance is better, and the interest in the Church, the meaning of the Auxiliary to the Church, and the interest in religion, especially the prayer life, showed a marked upward trend."

Your Bishop lends his hearty accord. I do not know how we could possibly get along without the aid and support of our Auxiliaries.

A congregation without an active Auxiliary program is losing one of its most potent forces for growth and strength. Again this year the women contributed mightily to the entire Church program through the United Thank Offering, \$6,115.11, and in many local and district ways. Our thanks go to all the women of all the branches, and especially to Mrs. George Goss, our Diocesan President, for their encouraging and fine leadership.

LAYMEN'S LEAGUE

There is much that could and should be done by our laymen for their congregations and the District. We appreciate what has been done, but realize we have not felt what should be the full impact of our layman on the life and work of our Church in Hawaii. We need a revival of enthusiasm in many congregations. I shall urge as one of the Bishop's objectives for 1957, the Layman's Offering for the dormitory at Mokuleia. In lieu of benefit programs or sales of any kind, the laymen of Oahu are asked to contribute \$5.00 or more, at the time of the Layman's Corporate Communion on Washington's Birthday, February 22nd. The debt on the Dormitory is approximately \$12,000. Clergy and laymen are asked to cooperate in the collection of this offering.

CLERGY

We have as fine a group of clergy in Hawaii as can be found in any Diocese or Missionary District. I appreciate their loyalty and support in our District plans and programs.

We have 38 active clergy and 8 retired. In 1956 we transferred the following clergy:

We have received the Rev. Dr. Shunji Nishi from the Diocese of Los Angeles; the Reverend Gerald P. Loweth from the Diocese of Connecticut; the Reverend Richard A. Kirchhoffer, Jr. from the Diocese of Tennessee; the Reverend William Smythe from the Diocese of Bethlehem; the Reverend Morimasa Kaneshiro from the Diocese of Missouri; the Reverend Richard L. Aiken, graduate of Virginia Seminary.

We have three candidates for the ministry who will graduate this June: Charles Crane; Masao Fujita; and George Hayashi.

We have the following postulants for the Ministry: Norio Sasaki, Roger Melrose, Iver J. Torgerson, Covy E. Blackmon, William Aulenbach, Darrow L. Aiona, Bruce Kennedy.

It is interesting to note that more and more of our clergy are sons of Hawaii, either by birth or residence here before entering the ministry. Eight are Island born or reared, and nine either lived here previously or served in the Armed Forces here.

We have eight retired clergy receiving \$11,327.28 in pensions and six widows of clergy receiving \$4,207.56.

Six of our ten candidates and postulants for the ministry are Island men.

We have 71 lay readers who are giving invaluable service to our Church. Especially do I wish to commend the lay readers of Holy Apostles, Hilo, and Good Shepherd, Wailuku, Maui, who have served so faithfully filling vacancies in Paauilo, Papaaloa, Hilo and Kula.

We have one of our clergy serving as a Chaplain in the Armed Forces, Commander Kenneth Perkins of the U. S. Navy.

This past year the Rev. Norman Ault has taken over the Chaplaincy of St. Andrew's Priory and Canterbury House.

The Rev. Canon Paul R. Savanack has served as Administrative Assistant. His help has been invaluable. Our work has grown and is growing, so that his services are filling a great need in our District's program.

Our parishes and missions in the District own and operate 43 vehicles.

National Council now furnishes the necessary large pieces of furniture for our clergy residences, saving much of the shipping expense between the mainland and Hawaii.

BUILDINGS

This has been a year of much construction and many real estate changes, indicating the forward progress of our Church in Hawaii.

Many improvements and repairs have been made in many of our Churches. Gifts and memorials have also been made. These will be reported by the Department of Missions.

On new construction alone, we invested \$258,000 this past year.

We have received gifts from the UTO, National Council and other mainland sources amounting to approximately \$97,000 for buildings and other purposes.

New construction and plans are under way for St. Andrew's Priory Class Room and Laboratory Building, Parish House and Rectory for St. Elizabeth's Parish; Rectory, Parish Hall and Church for St. Mary's Mission - Honolulu; a chapel for the Church of the Transfiguration, Waianae, new Educational Building for St. Christopher's Parish, Kailua; the completion of St. Andrew's Cathedral; additional dormitory and classrooms for the Hawaii Episcopal Academy, and two apartments for Church workers on Emma Square.

INSTITUTIONS

All of our schools - Iolani, the Priory, the Academy, plus Cluett House and Canterbury House - are in a healthy state of activity and service. They are fulfilling their purpose under able leadership, and we are grateful and pleased to have them represent our District in their several fields of service. Their reports will reflect their progress.

Summer camps at Mokuleia, Oahu, and Camp Pecusa, Maui, have been most successful, and have filled a great need in our Church life. Over 500 children attended these camps.

Mr. Henry F. Budd is our new District Treasurer. He came to us from Japan where he has served as treasurer of the Church. He has taken over our bookkeeping system, revised it and corrected it where necessary. This has been an important but laborious task. We are indeed pleased to have him as part of our Diocesan staff, and grateful for the splendid work he is doing.

Our Parishes and Missions have all paid their assessments and quotas in full. We are especially grateful to St. Andrew's Cathedral Parish, Good Shepherd - Wailuku, Maui, who overpaid their assessments. We never have enough funds to meet the demands and needs of our district. We are hindered and bound in every direction because of lack of finances. If it were not for friends in our Islands and on the Mainland who make special gifts towards our work, our program in the Islands would be seriously handicapped. If those who are able to give extra gifts would remember the needs of our Church, we would certainly be able to press on our Lord's work with greater vigor.

We wish our people throughout the District would remember the Church in their wills. Attorneys would render the Church a great service if they would suggest to their clients such a remembrance of our Lord's work in making bequests.

If donors are especially interested in some particular feature of the Church's work -- Missions, Schools, Buildings, Scholarships, Theological Training, Discretionary Funds, we would be pleased to have their support. We have no regular income to take care of these needs.

Building Debts have been reduced approximately \$132,229.58 since last Convocation. Our present building debt, including notes at the bank, FHA, and private loans, etc., totals \$254,619.31.

Our Missions have all accepted increased salary payments for 1957. This is commendable and of course makes our National Council very happy. This is a step in the right direction toward self support. The other step is increased local support for District operating expenses.

The Hawaiian Congregation, Holy Innocents, Lahaina, St. Mark's, Honolulu, St. John's, Kula, St. Clement's and St. Luke's, Honolulu, and Grace Church, Molokai, have paid their building debts in full during 1956.

In 1956 we had a successful "Stand and Be Counted" program on Whitsunday. All congregations reported increased attendance and interest. Parishes and Missions may well make this an annual homecoming event each Whitsunday.

Our matching fund of dollar for dollar helped eliminate and reduce some building debts, but was not as large as we had hoped for, nor did many congregations take advantage of this opportunity to decrease their indebtedness.

The Cathedral Extension program which we endorsed at last Convocation is proceeding well. The active campaign for the necessary funds will be completed this month.

PREACHING MISSIONS

It would be well for us to consider a District-wide Preaching and Teaching Mission this year. A concerted evangelistic plan directed primarily at ourselves, but with a power outside of our Diocesan Family, showing that we are seeking better discipleship and stronger faith in order that we might the more effectively give what we can to our communities. I hope most sincerely that this year we shall plan extensively for this sort of common endeavor.

The face of our Church must always be turned outward. The test of our witness is the degree to which we communicate our faith to the world outside in its best form, at its deepest level, and in its clearest tone.

Fine as it is to have a confirmation record like ours this year, we must still acknowledge that we are hardly yet more than scratching the surface of our work.

The strategy of the Church in our time is not a strategy of numbers or of geography; it is a strategy of ideas where one clear and certain truth, bravely held and boldly proclaimed, counts for more than a legion of men.

We need to let it be known what our Church stands for; what we teach; what we believe. I am convinced we have a faith that our Islands need.

A well planned Mission on every Island, perhaps in Advent, where we enlist every man and woman in this common endeavor to make Christ more real to ourselves, and known to those who have not yet learned about Him, should be undertaken.

We will have two visitors in our District this year who will be available for these Missions. The Rev. Dr. Shelton Hale Bishop from New York City, and the Very Reverend Paul Roberts of Denver, are experienced Missioners, and will be glad to be of service.

Now we must have some goals and some plan of strategy for our District. Each year some congregations respond wholeheartedly to these objectives and I can see it reflected in the life and vigor of their effectiveness.

I lay before you these objectives for 1957, praying that you will accept them readily and fulfill them effectively.

OBJECTIVES - 1957

- 1. The Layman's Offering to eliminate the Mokuleia Dormitory debt of \$12,000. Every man on Oahu giving \$5.00 or more, and thus eliminating special benefit programs and food sales, which cost each more, but the net income is less than such an offering would bring.
- 2. Every parish and mission should have some interest outside of themselves to support and study, to keep from becoming ingrown. It may be another work or mission in the Diocese or something abroad. Select something now and keep it as your objective for the year. Study it. Pray for it. Work for it and give for it.
- Schools of Prayer and Teaching Missions. Every Island, every congregation, and every man and woman participating, will bring new spiritual life and vigor to our District.
- 4. A revitalized layman's organization in each congregation. We have much skilled manpower in our Church going unused because no program, no work, no need seems to call them to use their talents in the service of Christ and His Church.
- 5. A well organized plan to bring non-Church people to baptism and confirmation. This may sound like a very trite statement, and one you may easily thrust aside. But let me assure you that every enterprise -- religious or secular -- must grow in numbers and strength. To invest \$8,000 each year in a work where only four were baptized and three confirmed makes Episcopalians come at a very high price.

LOYALTY

Let me close by calling for loyalty to Christ and His Church -- loyalty to parish and Diocese, loyalty of people and priest, one toward another.

Loyalty abounds when people care more about others then they care about themselves. For in devotion to others, men have always been most ready to forget themselves and to serve others without counting the cost. Such loyalty must be a basic quality in every Christian character. How else can we really follow Christ who gave Himself to save us and called His followers to lose themselves in being servants of all?

On June 5, 1956, 32 girls were graduated from the school and of these 29 are now in college, nursing schools, or business schools. One is in the Women's Air Force, one is employed and one is married.

Changes in staff during the year occurred when Harold B. Waldegrave took over the bookkeeping in March; Sister Eva Dorothea arrived in August; and in September Florence Kimura (Priory '50) became the school secretary in place of Miss Stella Kong who had been with us in that capacity for the past four years.

SERVICE PROJECTS

Our aim, as it is expressed in the school prayer, is to educate the girls for "use-ful service". To this end we make every effort to help them relate the formal instruction they receive to life situations. One important way in which this is done is to encourage them to assume responsibility in Church, school and civic service projects. The following are some of the service activities in which our students participated.

The University of Hawaii Teachers' College has sent students here for their Observation-Participation work.

BENEFACTORS

We acknowledge with gratitude the grant of \$30,000 from the Builders for Christ Fund made possible by Bishop Bentley and the Overseas Department of the National Council. This substantial addition to our building fund has made it possible to go ahead with our plans for the erection of a new classroom unit.

During the year 1956 the Parent-Teacher Fellowship under the able leadership of Leon M. Straus, Jr. raised a total of \$8,229.92 for the Building Fund by their luau in May and the candy sale in November.

The local chapter of the Associates of the Transfiguration has continued to give scholarship aid to two students.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

Religious education is the heart of the Priory curriculum. Canon Norman C. Ault was appointed school chaplain at the beginning of this school year, and in one semester has made the chaplaincy a vital part of the whole school set-up.

Of the 499 girls enrolled in the school this year, 310, or 62% have been baptized; 172, or 34% have been confirmed. There has been no substantial change in these proportions in recent years, but it is our opinion that there is room for improvement. From the point of view of the school, we feel the lack of an adequate youth program in our parishes and missions frustrates our efforts to establish these girls more firmly in the life of the Church, during the years they are under the influence of the school. The majority of them are first-generation Christians who need group support to substitute for family tradition in their Christian practice.

GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT

The Guidance Department, a ship launched upon uncharted seas about a year ago, seems to have reached calm waters by a rather surprising route. Originally offered as an individual counseling service for which there is always a need, the Guidance Department has found itself doing big business in the field of extra-curricular activities. During the first month of the department's existence, it was necessary to schedule students for interviews as the girls were hesitant about asking for help. By June, 1956, every girl in grades 9-12 had been interviewed, some of them several times. Now at the end of the first semester of the new school year, it is no longer necessary to call students in, as the program has succeeded to the point where the girls have accepted it as offered. Both the Chaplain, Canon Norman C. Ault, and the Guidance Counselor, Miss Barbara H. Ching, have continual requests for interviews.

This confidence of the girls in the guidance services has taken the department deeper and deeper into the activities program. Apparently the area of social activities, once considered to be the responsibility of parents, is being pushed into the hands of the school. The Guidance Department has now undertaken to re-organize the whole activities program. Surprisingly enough, the girls are happier and more satisfied; it would seem that youth itself is aware that it thrives best under discipline willingly accepted.

CAFETERIA

Through participation in the Government School Lunch Program the cafeteria is able to serve a well balanced lunch, including milk, for the cost of twenty-five cents. On August 1st Mrs. Margaret Hirao became manager of the cafeteria. She received her training for this work here in Honolulu, and has had several years' experience in the past in the cafeteria of a large local high school.

IMPROVEMENTS

During the summer the old frame buildings housing four classrooms were torn down, preparatory to erecting a new unit on that site. However, city building code regulations prevented the use of that area for a building of the size we need. Instead the new building is being erected on the site of our former tennis courts, on the mountain side of the main building. Ground was broken on November 21st and work has progressed steadily since. Ben Hayashi, Ltd. is the contractor; Ernest A. Hara is the architect. Lift-slab method of construction is being used. The plan is to finish only the second floor at this time. Construction work is expected to be finished in the spring of 1957. The building will be a two-story unit with four classrooms on the second floor, and two laboratories and adjoining lecture room on the first floor. The total cost of the building will be \$100,000.00

We are continuing to replace the outmoded and worn out school furniture with modern equipment. Thanks to the Parent-Teacher Fellowship the teachers in the elementary school have attractive, modern steel desks, guaranteed not to snag nylon hose.

CURRENT NEEDS

At this time the major need is for funds to clear the debt we are incurring by our building program. It is our plan to raise the greater part of this money by an increase in tuition effective for the school year 1957-58. This, however, makes it necessary to postpone any increase in the salary scale of our faculty members. Since this scale is now too far below the rates current in the Territory it is important that consideration be given to it and plans made to remedy this in the not too distant future.

It seems advisable that we put back into our school grades one and two. With the new building a reality, even though the laboratories will not be completed, it should be possible to have the first grade once again at the Priory in the coming school year.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

Once again we thank the Rector, vestry and congregation of St. Peter's Church for their willingness to let the Priory use their parish hall for our music classes and for assembly purposes throughout the school year. We want to take this opportunity also to thank the Cathedral clergy and their office staff for their kind consideration and patience with the school as it makes such constant use of the Cathedral facilities. To our Bishop, the Diocesan office workers, and our fellow laborers at the Priory we wish to extend our sincere appreciation for the inspiration, support and encouragement that cheers our days and lightens our labors.

REPORT OF THE HAWAII EPISCOPAL ACADEMY Kamuela, Hawaii, T. H.

GENERAL STATEMENT

In my third report to the Convocation I am happy to be able to continue to say that the demand and need for the Academy continue to be highly evident. This is shown in the steady flow of inquiries and applications and in the wonderful financial support which is coming to us from friends of the school. In fact, it looks now as though we shall realize our dream of a fine new and adequate campus and proper buildings. We can report no further detailed information at this time on our expansion but should be able to give a most interesting report by the next Convocation. Information of this exciting progress will probably be released well before that time.

THE ADMISSIONS PROGRAM

This year our boarding school enrollment is triple that of two years ago. We began the year filled to capacity; and though two or three students have had to be dropped, we shall be replacing them this month. We maintained a waiting list all summer. We already have as many bonafide applications for admissions for next year as we had students in the entire school a year ago. And this is true well before the start of the usual admissions program. It is interesting to remember in retrospect that our first inquiries two years ago came in slowly beginning just at Convocation time! Inquiries for the coming year were beginning over a year ago.

RECTOR'S REPORT - IOLANI SCHOOL

The present rector remembers from his year as Chaplain of Caius College, an argument that has continued at Cambridge University for seven hundred years. The subject of disagreement is the question as to whether the university was first established by a group of distinguished teachers who drew students to them, or whether a group of young and ambitious scholars banded together and hired a group of teachers for their instruction.

Whatever the true answer is, there is no question but that the real value of a school is to be measured by the excellence of its teaching staff and the alert interest of the pupils.

THE FACULTY

The recruitment of teachers is a difficult matter, especially if one desires to have mainland teachers, as has been Iolani's practice. My responsibilities as a National Councilman of the Episcopal Church have been of great assistance in this respect. Nevertheless, many of the contractual arrangements are reached only after a period of correspondence. We have been singularly fortunate. We have some very distinguished persons in our faculty, who would not often be found teaching at the secondary level. We have a very large number of teachers with Master's degrees.

Nevertheless, our turnover of teachers is too great. The reasons making for these changes are many, but our inadequate salary scale is the biggest factor.

I have assured our teachers that the Board will study carefully our entire salary structure. I feel I must make plain to them our expected new scale no later than February 1, 1957.

THE BOYS

There are 900 boys at Iolani School, who are to be found in grades in these numbers:

Many of them are very bright boys. The average IQ of boys coming into the seventh grade is 114. Through very careful screening we are finding only boys who have a serious ambition to continue on to college.

We are averaging a better racial balance. The school being a Christian school, we have absolutely no interest in favoring one race over another, but ideally we would like to see our student body as characteristic of the Island population as is reasonable. One of the most productive forces, helping to insure the fine racial relationships for which Hawaii has won such an honorable name, is surely to be found in the rising generation growing in happy association that makes them oblivious to the prejudices.

THE BUILDING PROGRAM

Plans have been drawn for the kindergarten-first grade building, to be the first unit of the new Elementary School. The bids came higher than architect or finance committee had expected, but it seems that we have no alternative but to go ahead. Many individual members of the Board feel that the time has now come for Iolani to make its second step towards the completion of our building program. We hope to announce soon plans for raising a really significant sum of money.

In November Iolani School will be ninety-five years old. Many Island schools with nothing like our length of history have prospered. Despite our close identification with the history of the Islands, from monarchy to republic to territorial annexation, Iolani has been a long time in finding her stride. One has the feeling that since 1932 there has been a marked acceleration in the school's inner and outer growth. Today we have an enthusiastic body of alumni, great wealth in friends, and a fine body of students. This is the best insurance that a school can have. We hope that the following five years will witness the energetic solution of many of our problems, so that when our centenary year does come the accomplishments of the school will be plain for all to see. We earnestly ask the full help of all those who treasure the name of Iolani towards the realization of our goals.

DIOCESAN HOUSE -- ARMY-NAVY SERVICE CENTER

1956 in the Diocesan House has been a busy one. There has been a complete turnover of service personnel, and more and more men have been using the facilities of the Diocesan House. The first men back from Korea are now out of the Service, at school and on jobs, and it was very rewarding at Christmastime to receive letters from many parts of the Mainland. They told about their schools and plans, and in nearly every instance, said how much influence the Diocesan House had had on their lives here on Oahu.

The House is crowded every weekend, and approximately 1500 young men stayed here during the year; from one night to 20-day leaves and many weekends.

During the month of December, both St. Clement's Church and Iolani School sent a large supply of canned goods to be used by the service men. They were certainly appreciated as the House was full during the holidays. Most of the men staying in the House cooked their meals there, thanks to the above presents. The Hostess and her family gave a Christmas dinner on Christmas Eve to the men staying in the House, and used some of the supplies for salad and vegetables.

We have had an unusually large crowd of visitors staying at our guest room, due to several changes in the clerical setup; clergy and their families going on furlough; waiting for homes to be finished; camp counselors wanting to stay after camp ended. We had people from Korea, Hong Kong and Formosa and clergy coming from Japan for other duties. We also had a large number of visitors from the other islands.

More organizations have been using the Diocesan House for meetings, and we have approximately i breakfast, 2 dinners and numerous lunches scheduled each month.

The Diocesan House participated in the Thanksgiving Market as it was used for the preparation and packing of the candy, and the bake sale was held at the House.

Although the Young Adult Group has disbanded and we miss it, we are still able to call on men staying in the House when there is work to be done. We have not had any weddings but one as a result of meetings of the group, but we have again a Sunday School teacher, a choir singer, a prospective clergyman and quite a few interested churchgoers to different services of the Cathedral, and feel that the Diocesan House and Army-Navy Service Center helped in the work done around Emma Square.

CLUETT HOUSE REPORT

We have had an average of twenty-eight girls in Cluett House during the past year. Most of the girls are from other islands and many have never lived away from home before. Yet we do not have a serious problem of homesickness among our girls. After a week or ten days they seem to consider themselves to be truly at home, and are proud to be residents of Cluett House. We try to maintain the Christian family atmosphere, and having three young Priory girls this year adds the younger sister element.

In March we replaced our old termite-riddled dining room furniture with formica-topped tables and upholstered chairs, both with wrought iron legs.

The building behind the house was in very bad condition. It was a matter of several months of negotiation with the city before a permit was finally obtained to allow the removal of part of the old building and repairs and remodelling of the remainder. We now have nice quarters for our dietician, a good store room, and a laundry room with two sets of tubs and an automatic washer.

While the carpenters and plumbers were here, we had another badly needed bathroom installed by partitioning off part of the back porch.

The roof of the main house was then done over with asbestos shingles which made a great improvement in the appearance of the whole house as well as stopping the leaks in the roof. Some work was also done on the gutters on the southeast side of the house.

Then the electricians told us that our wiring was not only archaic, but inadequate for the load it was carrying. Safety required new wiring from the post and newfuse boxes. The work was authorized and completed in November.

We had received two gifts of money during the year which we used toward the purchase of four new aluminum porch chairs.

There were only about five good beds in the house, although all the mattresses were good. Since the cots were uncomfortable, they were replaced in March by box springs.

The bills for all these improvements are paid.

We want to thank the friends who are sending us magazines. We are receiving some new ones, but do not know who sent them since the publishers sentus the name of the group and the church, but failed to tell us the city.

After all the building was done, our yard was a mess! Mr. Gaza was persuaded to take over. He has a lawn coming along very nicely where the old building was removed; he has transplanted and re-arranged most of the shrubs and plants. It now looks as though it is cared for by one who loves to make things beautiful.

We will be glad to have anyone who is interested visit Cluett House at any time.

We extend our grateful appreciation to Bishop Kennedy and the Rev. Canon Savanack for the spiritual and material help given us during 1956.

REPORT OF CANTERBURY HOUSE THE EPISCOPAL STUDENT CENTER UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII

The Canterbury House, or "C" House as the students call it, is trying to give our University of Hawaii young people a four-fold program of "Worship - Service - Fellowship and Study".

Worship for the students is taken care of during week days by having Morning Prayer every Monday and Thursday from 12:30 to 12:55 p.m. The first Monday and Thursday of each month as well as every Saints Day, we hold Holy Communion Services. These are celebrated by the Chaplain or some one of our clergymen. Usually the Morning Prayer services are conducted by the students themselves, with the Chaplain present. The members are always reminded to go to their own churches every Sunday for at least one service.

Our Fellowship program stresses mainly Fellowship with GOD and with each other in our worship services. We have many and varied get-togethers during the school year. There are two camps, yearly, which are held at Mokuleia. The first camp we had some 52 students and four chaperones. The next camp will be "The Semester Break Camp" to be held January 31st, February 1st and 2nd of this year. There was a very enjoyable Halloween party given at St. Clement's Parish Hall. December 28th the students had a dance, which was also held at St. Clement's Parish Hall. Once a month Canterbury House has a general meeting following a dinner. These are always held at "C" House and are very well attended. This Christmas we had some 50 students in our Caroling Choir. The group practiced for about eight weeks prior to Christmas. Fifteen institutions and homes were sung to. Everyone enjoyed their singing.

In our study program we have talks prepared by students and presented at each of the Morning Prayer services. These talks are on the Church or Scripture, and are prepared at least a week prior to the date of delivery. The Chaplain gives two or more sermonettes at the Holy Communion services each month. Our Camps always have study sessions from 1 to 2 hours, followed by question and answer periods. These are usually very interesting and the questions are well thought out.

In our Service program the students are learning that if you help others you are helping yourself. The students cut and trim the lawn and the shrubs and keep the buildings clean. They work at odd jobs in order to make money to carry on, they pay for all their electricity, water and telephone services. Our students individually, and also as Canterbury members, participate in all areas of campus life.

The members of "C" House have closed in the side and end of the Pavillion, thus making it a much better place to hold services and meetings. The material used for this was Sisal logs.

We have about 70 very active members. We have an enrollment of 95 students. However, there are literally hundreds more of our young people attending the University of Hawaii whom we hope to enroll in the activities of Canterbury House.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Department of Christian Education has been organized by divisions that correspond to the divisions of the National Council's Department of Christian Education. It has seemed advisable to follow this plan of organization in order to expeditiously carry out the suggestions and plans of the National Department. Each division has been under the direction of a chairman and it has been the chairman's responsibility to plan and execute the work in his or her division.

CURRICULUM DIVISION Chairman: Sister Evelyn Ancilla, C. T. Assistant: The Rev. G. G. Gifford, II

The Curriculum Division feels responsible for making recommendations and evaluations to all of the churches in the Missionary District on all available Sunday School teaching materials. To this end, a file of curriculum materials has been assembled in the Diocesan office in order that clergy and Sunday School superintendents may examine them and decide what is best for their Parish or Mission. A record of the courses by grade of each Parish and Mission was assembled at the beginning of the 1956-57 school year so that the Division has a Sunday School "profile" of the Missionary District.

The Division made a brief survey of the churches using the Seabury Series materials in 1955-56 and the result of these findings was sent to the National Department. To the best of our knowledge, thirteen of our Parishes and Missions are using all or some of the Seabury materials in the school year 1956-57 and eight Parishes and Missions are using all or some of the Episcopal Fellowship Series. In addition, there is a wide range of other denominational material in use throughout the Missionary District. An evaluation of the Seabury and Episcopal Fellowship Series will be made at the end of the current school year. \$175.00 was budgeted for this purpose.

LEADERSHIP TRAINING DIVISION Chairman: The Rev. Paul M. Wheeler

The function of this division is to provide leadership training in all areas of church life, and also to give specific training to Sunday School leaders and teachers.

We were privileged to have the chairman and several of the clergy attend Group Life Laboratories on the Mainland last summer. The experiences at the labs have been shared with many of the Parishes and Missions of the District. This fall, Sunday School teacher training courses were lead by The Rev. G. G. Gifford, II, for the following churches: Holy Trinity, St. Matthew's, Calvary, Holy Nativity, Epiphany, St. Mark's, Good Samaritan and St. Stephen's.

In order to help Sunday School teachers and observers, lesson planning blanks and observer sheets, along with a four-stage planning guide, were printed and distributed to as many Parishes and Missions requesting them.

PROJECT DIVISION Chairman: The Rev. Robert Sheeran

The Rally Day Offering, the Birthday Thank Offering, the Church School Mission (Mite Box) Offering and other special educational projects are the concern of this division. The Rally Day Offering is used to supplement our visual education fund. Suggestions for these offerings and projects have been sent to all Sunday School Superintendents by the chairman.

ADULT EDUCATION DIVISION Chairman: The Very Rev. James S. Cox

The primary concern of this division has been to plan for a lending library and to make recommendations concerning the discussion courses that have been developed by the National Department.

Under the title of "Short Course", "Basic Course", "Inquirers Class" or just plain "Confirmation Class", the clergy of the District have been carrying out the work of Christian Education with their respective adult education programs. We encourage this effort to set forth the fundamentals of Christianity infresh and meaningful ways. The programs of the Keymen and of the Woman's Auxiliary also carry out the Church's program of Christian Education.

VACATION CHURCH SCHOOL DIVISION Chairman: The Rev. Chester Minton

This division has assembled a file of some of the recommended Vacation Church School materials and these are available to Parishes and Missions planning Vacation Church Schools. Several Vacation Church Schools were conducted during this past summer. The Division urges the Parishes and Missions to consider the excellent advantages and opportunities for special teaching that is available in Vacation Church Schools. One of the Vacation Church Schools had a Mothers' Bible Study Group as a part of the program which was popular with the mothers who brought their children to the school each morning.

VISUAL AID DIVISION Chairman: Sister Lois Mary, C. T.

A new policy for the lending of film strips, slides and other materials was developed this year and a new visual aids catalog was assembled and distributed to the Parishes and Missions of the District. The visual materials listed in the catalog are marked as to the age groups for which they will be most effective. \$150.00 was budgeted to this division to expand the visual aid library.

The Chairman was given a membership in the Visual Education Fellowship of the National Council of Churches for the year.

PREPARATORY SCHOOL DIVISION Chairman: The Rev. Burton Linscott

This division was established to provide information concerning our preparatory and day schools in the District and also of our Episcopal schools on the mainland. Questions concerning these schools may be directed to the chairman of this division. Under the auspices of St. Andrew's Cathedral, in cooperation with the Department of Christian Education, a Christian Education Service was held at the Cathedral on September 9, 1956, at which the clergy and faculty of our preparatory and day schools and friends were present. The Reverend Dr. Shunji F. Nishi was the preacher. We most heartily encourage the work of this division.

BUDGET AND BULLETIN

The budget for Christian Education for 1956 was \$500.00. The department has attempted to communicate with the clergy, Sunday School superintendents and teachers by means of "The Bulletin" and the "Tips to Teachers" column in the "Hawaiian Church Chronicle".

A family worship chart for Lent was printed and distributed to the Parishes and Missions of the District.

The chairman of the department wishes to express his appreciation to the Bishop, Miss Katherine Morton, The Reverend Canon Paul R. Savanack, the Archdeacons, the Division Chairman, the clergy and teachers, Mrs. George E. Goss and Mr. John Harding for the counsel and cooperation they have given to this department in the year 1956.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICE

Christian Social Service work by the various Episcopal Churches in the Islands goes on quietly but effectively. Some of it is all year-round service, while others are seasonal projects. Following are some of the more outstanding services rendered by the churches.

- 1. Many of our clergy are taking active part in various communities by serving on the boards, councils, committees, etc., such as Scout Councils, Hospital Boards, Committee on Alcoholism, Community Chests, etc. A clergyman is an acting chaplain for a Squadron Civil Air Patrol.
- 2. Many Episcopal Laymen and women are also actively engaged in community groups which specialize in social service work as volunteers. One of the churches reports of a layman who is effectively reducing the number of juvenile delinquency in the community since he started a school for the parents of the delinquent children.
- 3. Our Church buildings are used by various community groups such as the Scouts, 4-H clubs, Hi-Y clubs, Public Health, Junior Police Officers, Rainbow

- 4. Many churches report that at Thanksgiving and Christmas they contributed food and clothing to needy families. Books and magazines were also distributed to hospitals by some churches. Clothing was sent to Korea by some churches.
- 5. A Mission continued its annual contribution to an Old People's Home. Another Mission contributed fruits, vegetables and canned goods to a Home for the Aged. Its choir cheered the inmates with singing.
- 6. Clergy are making regular calls to hospitals and to the Leper Settlement, Kalaupapa, Molokai. On Oahu the clergy are assigned to hospitals for regular visitation and ministration.
- 7. For the Oahu clergy, the Department made a report on the alcohol situation by surveying the work being done for the alcoholics. After this preliminary survey, the Director of the Hawaii Committee on Alcoholism was invited to give an informative and helpful talk on what the Committee is doing for the alcoholics and how the clergy might cooperate in the work.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PROMOTION AND PUBLICITY

The local newspapers have continued, during 1956, to show a fine spirit of cooperation in publicizing activities of the Episcopal Church. The new chairman, who was appointed late in July, is fortunate in inheriting this fine relationship. The Department is fortunate, also, in having Miss Katherine Morton continue the fine work she does on the Hawaiian Church Chronicle. This magazine is one of the key points of contact with members of the Church and friends for the dissemination of relevant news.

A significant "new-comer" in the field of publications in this part of the world is Spectrum, published by the Cathedral Church of St. Andrew's. The nature of this new periodical is indicated by its sub-title: A Journal of Ideas for the Concerned Reader. Spectrum presents articles on a variety of problems which are, or should be, of great concern to the Christian. The articles are thoughtfully written by well qualified members of the community.

Almost all of our Parishes and Missions now have weekly or monthly bulletins or newsletters mailed to members. The careful writing of these bulletins can do much to remind those who are not in the pews each Sunday that the Church needs them, and that they need the Church.

National Church magazines have been consistent in giving good coverage to events of note in Hawaii and in the Far East portions of the Bishop's jurisdiction.

During the fall of 1956, a team made up of Bishop Kennedy, Canon Paul Savanack, The Rev. Paul M. Wheeler, Mr. Henry F. Budd, Mrs. Lawrence Ozaki, and Mrs. George Goss visited the neighbor islands. These visits did much to promote and publicize the Church.

An attractive pamphlet has been published showing location and time of services for churches on allislands. This pamphlet has been mailed to the various churches, but is distributed primarily in hotels and at other public places to inform visitors to the Islands.

An effort on the part of the Honolulu Advertiser to publish hours of services and sermon topics at all churches was discontinued late in the year because of lack of space, and because of lack of reader interest. An effort on the part of the Department to coordinate weekly news releases, highlighting significant events in the Church, was not successful. The Department is working on plans for obtaining the desired end by methods which, we hope, will be more practicable.

Relatively speaking, the Episcopal Church has good, and improving, public relations on the individual church level, and on the Diocesan level. We hope that the Parishes and Missions will make more effective use of their Department of Promotion and Publicity by using its help regularly, and by sending timely and "in time" items of news interest.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP

The task of the Stewardship Committee is that of the education of the clergy and laity in the basic Christian teachings of the philosophy in supporting the church work through the intelligent use of their time, talents and monies. This means tithing. Your committee recognizes the various interpretations existing in the church today as to what constitutes real Christian church support. Of these approaches, there exist in our Island, churches financially supported by the traditional every member canvass signed pledges for one year, proportionate giving, the modern tithe, straight tithing, and the ever-present no method at all.

The committee, taking its cue from the Convocation Address of our Bishop the past several years, is committed to the modern tithe - 5% to the church and 5% to charities. To accomplish this in all our churches will necessitate a carefully-planned program of education. The year 1956 has been spent outlining such an educational program.

The Chairman in the fall of 1956, with a Diocesan team, presented to the clergy and laity of the Islands, other than Oahu, such a program. Certain clergy on Oahu have asked the Chairman to present the educational program to their Vestries and/or Parish groups. He will be doing this the first half of 1957.

In conclusion, it is obvious from reports coming in that Stewardship education gets results, when actively engaged in as a total Parish approach to church support. (The Chairman will be glad to present the Educational Program to other Oahu churches, if called upon.)

The present program is a year's, 12-month plan. It is the hope of the committee, in the future, to present to our people an Educational Program of how to obtain the Stewardship of time and talents in our Church life.

THE BISHOP'S ROLL CALL

Episcopalians of the Hawaiian Islands came out in force in answer to Bishop Kennedy's Convocation challenge for us to all attend church on May 20, Whitsunday. Actual count of persons present, who signed enrollment cards, totaled 8,760. Every church reported persons present who did not sign cards as well as small children in the primary departments. It is safe to estimate that 10,000 persons were in churches of the Islands May 20th.

The 1956 Journal of Convocation reports for the Islands 15,329 baptized members and 9,914 communicants. In the Roll Call tabulation there was evidently a misunderstanding about tabulating baptized persons. Some churches listed all baptized people who are also confirmed, while others only baptized adults, not confirmed; so, therefore, the baptized tabulation is not accurate.

It would be interesting to know how many people were in church on Whitsunday 1955 as a comparison to 1956. In talking to several of the clergy, they estimated their congregations were doubled by the publicity effort to get our people out for a Stand and Be Counted Sunday.

What the follow-up has been we do not know for that depends upon the individual church and clergy. It is our hope that the impetus given by our all-out drive will be maintained by a sustained plan to keep the 1956 enrollees in the church life. The committee would appreciate further reports from the clergy as to their follow-up programs.

On behalf of the committee and Bishop Kennedy, our thanks to all the clergy and congregations for their support.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDING BISHOP'S COMMITTEE ON LAYMEN'S WORK THE LAYMEN'S LEAGUE IN HAWAII

The year 1956 was an anti-climax to the activities of General Convention the preceding year, the Laymen's League meeting many of the Parish and Mission problems of raising funds and building. As a result, our own Laymen activities were somewhat limited.

The annual Corporate Communion held at St. Andrew's Cathedral on George Washington's birthday, followed by breakfast at the Armed Forces YMCA, was well attended. Guest speaker was our own Bishop Kennedy, who gave an inspiring talk.

Mr. K. L. Ching was our representative to the three-day Laymen's Training Course held in Healdsburg, California, in May 1956. Upon his return we scheduled our own Training Course for Keymen at Mokuleia September 22 and 23. This was attended by twenty-seven, including two representatives from Maui. The Conference was a great success; in fact, those present labeled it as the most satisfying one they had yet attended.

Our money-raising ventures in 1956 were rather disappointing. The Laymen's League sponsored two nights of "Song of Norway" staged by the Civic Light Opera Association, and in addition to selling tickets we dispensed soft drinks during the entire run of eight nights. A few people worked very hard at this and our total profit was only about \$200.00.

At our Laymen's Conference held in September it was decided that, since our activities toward raising money for Mokuleia have not been the financial success we anticipated, and in many cases conflicted with similar activities in the Parish or Mission, we would ask all men of the Church to make an annual offering to be applied in its entirety to the Mokuleia indebtedness. As a result of this appeal we are

not asking the men to sell tickets or sponsor anything throughout the year. Instead each man is asked to give \$5.00 or more each year. In this way we know the entire indebtedness can be eliminated quickly and painlessly. Our first appeal was made on Advent Sunday, December 2, and we have received \$400.00 to date. We are asking all men who have not already contributed to do so on February 22 at our annual Corporate Communion.

My thanks go to all the men who have represented our Parishes and Missions in the Laymen's League for their assistance in so many ways. It is with their help and continued interest that we can continue our work and carry on the program of the Church.

YOUTH SERVICE, APRIL 29, 1956

This service observed national "Youth Sunday" in the church with the offering going to the youth project "A Boys' Town for Rio de Janeiro." The sermon was given by Arthur Isoshima, Oahu Y.P.F. president.

SUMMER CONFERENCE FOR HIGH SCHOOL

The conference was cancelled due to insufficient registrations caused by the early work season at the canner ies.

SUMMER CAMPS AT MOKULEIA AND MAUI, June 17 - July 27

Our Church camps at Mokuleia and Maui were operated at full capacity for three sessions from ages 8 years through 14 years. We are indebted to the excellent leadership of the mainland counselors from the Diocese of Los Angeles and our own clergy and lay people.

YOUTH RALLY, September 23, 1956

St. Peter's Church, Honolulu, was the location of a Youth Service, when the principles of an adequate Youth Program were presented to the young people.

In conclusion, may I say that if Mr. Challinor had been able to present this report, it would have been in more detail and given a rightful recognition to the individuals who gave the leadership in the various projects mentioned.

The Department is happy to report the acquisition of a number of new properties and many improvements in older properties throughout the Islands.

St. John's-by-the-Sea, Kahaluu, Oahu, having liquidated debts of several years standing, was consecrated on October 21, 1956.

New church buildings were dedicated for St. George's, Pearl Harbor, St. Timothy's, Aiea, St. John's, Taipei, Taiwan (Formosa), and the Chapel and Parish Hall for Calvary, Kaneohe.

Many gifts were acknowledged at the time of the dedication of St. George's; the font, Rear Admiral and Mrs. Schuyler N. Pyne; baptismal shell, Ann and Betsy Drew; lectern, Dr. E. S. Redfeld, Jr; piscina sink, Cmdr. and Mrs. Ian M. Laird; lectern Bible, Mr. and Mrs. Billy Creamer, Major and Mrs. Theodore Neher, Captain and Mrs. Marshall White; clergy bench, Mrs. Joseph E. Powell; Chancel Prayer Books, Ensign and Mrs. Willis Carpenter; Church flag, the Rev. and Mrs. Robert Sheeran; United States flag, Women of Old Christ Church, Philadelphia; pews, Mr. and Mrs. John Atwood and Chaplain and Mrs. Kenneth D. Perkins; pew fund: Col. and Mrs. Robert A. Black and St. Andrew's Church, Belmont Hills, Pennsylvania; roof cross, Comdr. and Mrs. Richard S. Garvey; altar rail, Comdr. and Mrs. John Sharpe and others; hymnals, Comdr. and Mrs. Carl W. Capwell, St. George's Church, Bismark, North Dakota, and St. John's Choir, Bethesda, Maryland.

Valuable land was given to Calvary Church, Kaneohe, by the S. N. and Mary Castle Foundation through Mr. Harold K. L. Castle of the Castle Ranch Company.

Parish Halls have been obtained by Grace Church, Molokai, and St. Matthew's Church, Waimanalo.

The Bishop has a new residence and new rectories are occupied by the Dean of the Cathedral, and the Vicars of St. George's Church and Calvary Church.

Iolani School has a new kindergarten building and St. Andrew's Priory is soon to have a new classroom building and science laboratory.

Parishes and Missions continue to report an increasing number of baptisms and confirmations and nearly every Mission has agreed to assume a greater portion of the Vicar's stipend during 1957.

REPORT OF THE HONOLULU BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

To the Rt. Rev. Harry S. Kennedy and Delegates to the 55th Annual Convocation:

Nine regular meetings of the Executive Board were held during the year 1956. Short, informative programs designed to awaken in each of us a sense of her own personal responsibility for the work of the whole church and to broaden our knowledge of the five fields of service have become an important part of these meetings. The exchange of ideas by representatives of the branches has been beneficial to all. We are grateful for the inspirational guidance of Bishop Kennedy and several members of the clergy at our meetings.

It was with regret that we accepted the resignations of Mrs. Burton Linscott, Christian Education Secretary; Miss Dorothy Cooper, Social Relations Secretary; and Mrs. Richard Bond, Second Vice President.

Special events sponsored during the year included a luncheon and fashion show, instigated and presented by Betty Higgins of the Betty Higgins Dress Shop, for the benefit of the Hawaii Episcopal Academy. The success of this event was due to the enthusiastic response of all of our women. Mrs. Willard Buscher and Mrs. Gordon Halstead are to be commended for the fine and efficient manner in which they handled publicity and the sale of tickets. An amount slightly over \$1,000.00 was realized from this project.

The Rev. Paul Wheeler led a Leadership Training Conference for the women on October 19 and 20 at the Mokuleia Conference Center. Close to 40 key women, including two from Kauai, attended the conference. It is a certainty that they all returned to their respective homes with a closer feeling of fellowship, increased knowledge in the technics of leadership and most assuredly two or three pounds heavier from the wonderful meals served by the women of St. Stephen's, Wahiawa.

The District Altar Guild continues to provide the altar needs of the Missions upon request, and to give instruction and assistance to the Parishes and Missions when needed.

The excellent cooperation of the women throughout the Islands enabled the Supply Department to send 713 articles of infant wear to the Ute Indians of St. Elizabeth's Mission and the Mission of the Holy Spirit, White Rock, Utah. The women on Oahu gathered together five Fridays during Lent. During the sewing session, Mrs. Eric Wakefield reviewed a book entitled "The Trail Ahead". This book was recommended by National Council as a guide toward increasing our knowledge of the American Indians and to learn about their fundamental needs. Once again, a two-hour "chain of prayer" was held in Parke Memorial Chapel as an adjunct to the Lenten Program. During the year, branch devotional chairmen have met for guidance in presenting devotional programs that will deepen the spiritual life of the women.

The women of the Episcopal Church continue to provide hospitality every third Sunday at the Armed Forces "Y". We shared in providing a Thanksgiving dinner for members of the Armed Forces who visited the "Y" on that day. We have participated in the program of the United Church Women. Mrs. Henry Caldwell is 2nd Vice President of this ecumenical council and keeps us well informed of all its projects.

Eighteen branches placed 483 subscriptions through the Church Periodical Club Secretary during the year. Nineteen gift subscriptions were given to members of the clergy through this fund and \$45.00 was sent to the National C.P.C. Fund. A grant of \$200.00 was given by the Samuel N. and Mary Castle Foundation to further C.P.C. work in this district.

As we think of all that the United Thank Offering has done for the Missionary District of Honolulu, \$124,000.00 in outright gifts during the past ten years, and we multiply this figure many, many times and realize what it is doing all over the world, and then we think of the millions of women who make this free-will offering of thankfulness, it is not hard to understand why the United Thank Offering is one of the most important projects of the Women's Auxiliary. Total contributions for this Diocese during 1956 amounted to \$6,115.11. When we compare this amount with \$13,708.33 our total contribution for three years presented at the last Triennial - we are thankful for the ever-increasing number of women who are becoming mindful of God's daily blessings and expressing their thanks through the use of the "Blue Box".

Once again, voluntary contributions made it possible to send a Christmas check to Okinawa. "Specials" for 1956 included the Bishop's Discretionary Fund, Hawaii Episcopal Academy, Seminary Training Fund and Camp Pecusa, Maui. \$5,907.50 was pledged by the branches as well as individuals toward these worthy projects.

Visiting the branches of the Woman's Auxiliary is always a great joy. Last April the President had the pleasure of being with the women on Kauai for their United Thank Offering Spring Ingathering. Many of the branches on Oahu have been visited by members of the Board. During the months of September and October Mrs. Lawrence Ozaki and I had the privilege of accompanying Bishop Kennedy, the Rev. Canon Paul R. Savanack, Rev. Paul Wheeler and Mr. Henry F. Budd on a speaking tour of all the islands. Mrs. Harry S. Kennedy, Honorary Member of the Board, visited the women on Molokai as well as many of the branches on Oahu. Three members of the Executive Board visited the newly formed Church of the Transfiguration at Waianae and met with their auxiliary. With great pleasure we welcome them into the Diocesan family.

Worship is the heart of all we do and it is our fervent prayer that with God's help we will become better members of "His Witnessing Community".
