

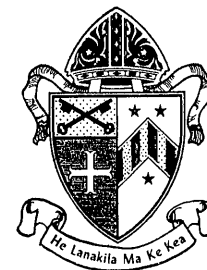

MINUTES OF THE SIXTIETH ANNUAL CONVOCATION OF THE MISSIONARY

DISTRICT OF HONOLULU

Monday, February 5, 1962

Holy Communion in St Andrew's Cathedral preceded the business meeting of the 60th Annual Convocation of the Missionary District of Honolulu. The Bishop, The Right Reverend Harry Sherbourne Kennedy, D D, was Celebrant, assisted by The Rev Canon Thomas D Hughes, The Rev Messrs Thomas K Kunichika, J Hollis Maxson, Fred G Minuth, and Timoteo Quintero. The Iolani School Choir, under the direction of Robert Molison sang for this service.

Breakfast was served in St Peter's Parish Hall, the women of St Peter's, St Mark's and St Alban's in charge.

The business meeting of Convocation was held in Tenney Hall. The Bishop presided as President, and called the meeting to order at 9:32 A M. The President appointed The Rev Canon Wai On Shim Secretary pro tempore.

Following the Invocation, The Rev Canon Wai On Shim called the roll of Clergy Delegates. The Rev Norman C Ault called the roll of Lay Delegates, and a quorum was declared present by the President.

It was moved by The Rev Robert Sheeran, seconded by The Rev Mr Wheeler that The Rev Canon Wai On Shim be nominated as Secretary of the 60th Annual Convocation, and that a white ballot be cast in his favor.

The Necrology and prayers for the departed were given by The Rev Thomas H F Masson.

Messages received and read were from: The Rt Rev S Harrington Littell, Fifth Bishop of Honolulu, Retired; The Rt Rev Lyman C Ogilby, Bishop of the Philippine Episcopal Church; The Rev Canon Evans D Scroggie and Mrs Scroggie, now residing at La Jolla, California; The Rt Rev Charles P Gilson, Suffragan Bishop of Honolulu in residence in Taiwan; The Rev Harry S Komuro, D D, Superintendent of the Hawaii Mission of The Methodist Church; and Mr W V Bolling, President of the Honolulu Council of Churches.

The Bishop's Annual Address was given, concluding with the following Objectives:

1. Full support of the "Journey in Faith" program for Lent.
2. Beginning in each congregation to work toward the goal of giving outside the parish an amount equal to what we spend on ourselves in current expenses.
3. Develop the program "Day of Dedication" in each congregation for Whitsuntide.
4. Wills: In each congregation, either the priest or one appointed by him, should remind parishioners by printed as well as spoken word, the importance of making a Will, and the desirability of remembering the Parish, Diocese, School or other Church endeavors in their bequests. This must be a year long program of education and promotion. (Attention was directed to the brochure "Living Stones.")

The following cable was read: "Heartiest congratulations your great age and greater achievements. Ohio sends Aloha." This was sent by The Rt Rev Nelson Burroughs, Bishop of Ohio.

Motion was made by The Rev Robert Sheeran that the Courtesy of the Floor be extended to the Presiding Bishop, The Most Rev Arthur Lichtenberger; The Most Reverend Isabelo de los Reyes, The Most Rev Michael H Yashiro, The Rt Rev Walter Henry Gray, The Rt Rev Robert Fisher Gibson, The Rt Rev Clarence R Haden, The Rt Rev William Robert Moody, and The Very Rev Paul Roberts.

The President introduced The Very Rev Paul Roberts (acting Dean of the Cathedral), and Mrs Roberts to delegates of Convocation; also Canon Heffner from Okinawa.

It was moved by The Rev Robert Sheeran that messages be sent to the following, and that the number be limited to include only these persons:

The Right Reverend Reginald Mallett, D D, Bishop of Northern Indiana

The Rt Rev and Mrs S Harrington Littell, Retired Bishop of Honolulu

The Rt Rev and Mrs Charles P Gilson, Suffragan Bishop of Honolulu

Chaplain George H Quarterman, Jr.

Motion was seconded and passed.

The honored guests brought warmest greetings from their dioceses. In addition to his greetings, Bishop Yashiro introduced 15 guests who had accompanied the Bishop from Japan.

At this time the Presiding Bishop was presented with a tapa trimmed miter, a "replica" of that worn by Bishop Staley. Mrs Lichtenberger, Mrs Gray, Mrs Moody and Mrs Yashiro were each presented with large and attractive monkeypod bowls.

Delegates from the various islands were introduced as follows: Hawaii, Maui, Kauai, Molokai, Oahu and Guam. Chaplain John C Fancis and Mrs Francis, Canon Howard Hane, The Rev Fred Minuth and Mrs Minuth, The Rev Thomas Kunichika, The Rev Hollis Maxson and Mrs Maxson were then introduced.

Next order of business concerned the Certificate of Commendation, which was read by the Presiding Bishop, and presented to Mr Arthur G Smith for his forty plus years of devoted service to the Church. Following this, Bishop Kennedy presented Mr Smith

with the Seal of the District. Mr Smith gratefully accepted these presentations, and mentioned that he had been trying to retire for ten years.

Archdeacon Crane was asked to come forward with a resolution from All Saints' Church, Kauai, that the mission be recognized as a parish.

The Ven Charles T Crane moved that the resolution be approved. Motion was seconded and passed. Certificate of Erection was granted, and members and delegates from Kauai were asked to come forward and were introduced by The Ven Mr Crane. Mrs Willey, widow of the late Archdeacon Willey, was introduced, and received a round of applause. The Bishop presented the District Seal to Archdeacon Crane and to the people of Kauai in recognition of their achievement.

It was moved by Mr Arthur G Smith that All Saints' (previously granted by the Bishop) be given parish status. Motion was seconded and approved.

The Rev Joseph Pummill was asked to come forward and present the application from St Mark's Church for parish status. A Certificate of Erection was recommended by the Bishop. It was moved by Mr Arthur Smith, seconded and passed that St Mark's Church be accepted as a parish.

The Rev William Grosh made the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the 1961 Reports of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu have been duplicated and sent to all Delegates; and

WHEREAS, the further presentation of these reports would be repetitious and excessively time consuming; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that all reports, with the exception of the Treasurer's Report, and the Board of Directors' Report, be accepted by title.

Resolution was seconded and passed.

The Rev Dr Paul M Wheeler made the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Rev C Fletcher Howe was Ordained to the Diaconate in 1911; and

WHEREAS, he and his wife Nelle, left home and family to serve the Lord in China for twenty years; and

WHEREAS, The Rev Mr and Mrs Howe continued their devoted service to our Lord on the mainland and in Hawaii until their retirement, so called, in 1947; and

WHEREAS, The Rev Mr Howe continues, to this day, giving his wisdom and strength at St Clement's Parish, Honolulu and in this Missionary Diocese as Historian of the Diocese, Chairman of the Committee on Art and Architecture, and Registrar of the Diocese; and

WHEREAS, Nelle Howe, sister of Theodore Ludlow, late Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Newark (Retired), devoted Christian, loving and faithful wife, mother, grandmother and great-grandmother, has been President of the Oahu Clerica and a friend and counselor to clergy and wives; and

WHEREAS, The Rev Mr Howe has received the Bishop's Distinguished Service Cross in recognition of his spirit and service; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that on this Fiftieth Anniversary of C Fletcher Howe's Ordination to Sacred Orders, this Centennial Convocation offers thanks to God for the ministry of Fletcher and Nelle Howe and express our aloha to them; and be it further

RESOLVED, that we convey our congratulations by a standing ovation at this time; and be it further

RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be given to The Rev Mr and Mrs Howe. Approval was given by standing ovation and a round of applause.

Following is a resolution by The Rev Norman R Alter with the amendment that the resolution be read at the Annual Convocation Banquet to be held at Hilton Dome, on the evening of February 5th. This was approved by standing ovation and thunderous applause. Mr Arthur Smith asked that the resolution be entered in the annual journal unexpurgated, and this was approved by further applause.

#### RESOLUTION

As a part of the records of this, the One Hundredth Anniversary of the founding of our Church in Hawaii, our Bishop, The Right Reverend Harry Sherbourne Kennedy, has expressed the appreciation of himself and the members of our Church for the accomplishments of his predecessors. With characteristic modesty he has minimized the results of his own efforts since his consecration as our Bishop in 1944.

The official publication of the Hawaiian Church Chronicle for this Sixtieth Convocation contains a few of the highlights of Bishop Kennedy's ministry in Hawaii, and it is not necessary at this time to repeat or enlarge upon that record, incomplete though it is. However, we the delegates here assembled, speaking for ourselves and the members of our Church, believe the Journal of this Convocation should contain some record of the loving regard in which we hold our Bishop.

Ever since his Consecration in January, 1944 he has unselfishly devoted his entire time, thought and effort to the development, not only of the material, but even more so, of the spiritual welfare of our Church and its members. He came to Hawaii when the Church was experiencing a very difficult period of adjustment, with many serious problems, but he came as a Missionary Bishop to a Missionary District, and through his gifts of organization, his devotion to his task, and his firm faith in God's power and guidance, he accomplished results, not only in Hawaii, but also in the Islands of the Pacific, for which our Church at large may well be proud.

Bishop Kennedy and his devoted wife, Katharine, have given of themselves increasingly, and often at considerable personal sacrifice, to our Missionary District, and they have also made a remarkable contribution to the welfare of Hawaii - and no man or woman is more beloved by the community at large than are Bishop and Mrs Kennedy.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that we, the members of this Sixtieth Convocation of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii, on behalf of ourselves and all the Clergy and members of this Church, hereby express to our Bishop, The Right Reverend Harry S Kennedy and Katharine, his wife, our sincere affection, and our deep appreciation of and gratitude for their help, guidance, and devoted efforts for the welfare of this Church; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this statement and resolution be entered in the Journal of this Convocation and a copy given to Bishop and Mrs Kennedy.

WHEREAS, she has been a loyal member of Christ's Church, both in her devotion and in her generosity; and

WHEREAS, All Saints' Church, to which she has given such faithful service, has this day been granted parochial status; and

WHEREAS, she is today attending this Centennial Convocation of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that this Centennial Convocation extend its appreciation to Mrs Willey for her long-standing service to the Church in these Islands by a rising ovation; and be it further

RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be presented to Mrs Willey.

This resolution was approved by standing ovation and hearty applause, following which the Bishop presented Mrs Willey with the District Seal.

The Rev E Lani Hanchett made the following motions:

That the minutes of the 60th Annual Convocation be prepared and submitted to the Ecclesiastical Authority for approval.

That an expression of appreciation be extended to Mrs Raymond K Hoefener for her assistance as Secretary of the Convocation and for the many hours she has given the Diocesan Office prior to Convocation.

That an expression of appreciation be extended to the Cathedral Staff for all they have done to assist with Convocation; and to the Rector and Vestry of St Peter's Church for the use of the Parish Hall for the Convocation breakfast.

That the Convocation express appreciation to the guests of the 60th Annual Convocation and Centennial Celebration.

Motion was seconded and approved.

The Rev Roger Melrose was introduced. The Rev Mr Melrose had expected to introduce Mrs Fernando J George, a Cuban refugee, however Mrs George was ill and unable to attend this meeting. Mr Melrose spoke of the many problems facing these refugees in the Miami area, and that their problems are our problems. He commended the Bishop, the congregations and the vestries for making it possible by providing the

means enabling these displaced persons to become settled. Three Cuban families have been sponsored by St Mark's Church. Some thirty Dutch Indonesian families are now settled in the Honolulu area at this time, nine of whom have been sponsored by our churches.

Mr Hugh Shearer was asked to come to the speaker's stand. Mr Shearer stated that the Nominating Committee met on January 22nd, 1962, and following are nominations for members of the Board of Directors:

There being no nominations from the floor, it was moved that nominations be closed, and that these names be ratified. Motion was seconded and passed.

Mr Shearer then moved that the Bishop be authorized to appoint the delegate to the Synod of the Pacific. Motion was seconded and approved.

Next item of business concerned fixing the date of 1963 Convocation. Two dates were possible - February 10 or February 17. It was moved, seconded and passed that next Convocation be held on February 10, 1963.

Mr Henry Budd gave a brief explanation of the Treasurer's Report which had been distributed to delegates prior to the meeting. He spoke of the Episcopal Centennial Advance Program campaign. Original goal was \$375,000. This met with great success and a total of \$708,710 was pledged. As of January 1st a total of \$253,000 has been received, and since then approximately \$30,000 has been received. During the year considerable construction work has been done at Mokuleia; \$25,000 allocated to The Church Divinity School of the Pacific, and \$60,000 for Emmanuel Church. During the year 1961, \$94,000 was received from National Council, and \$74,000 raised locally for church expenses and clergy salaries. Credit was paid to the women of the church for their contributions and for help in the Gift Shop. The Board of Directors approved the Finance Committee's percentage method concerning assessments, however work outside the diocese has sharply declined this past year. Mr Budd expressed his appreciation to Mr Arthur Smith and Mr Herman von Holt for their help and advice.

Mr Budd moved that the Diocesan Budget be adopted as presented, motion was seconded and passed.

Mr Herman von Holt asked for permission to speak concerning the Bishop's Objectives, and specifically that portion concerning Wills, of how these matters can be set up so that persons can obtain income during one's lifetime, with tax forgiveness, and yet assure the Church income when such income is no longer needed. He stated that some parishes are receiving 90% returns on monies and or invested stocks and such which had been bequeathed to churches. In short - if one leaves some money to a particular church, parish or mission - do it in a will, but give it NOW.

Sister Evelyn was asked to speak concerning St Andrew's Priory. Sister Evelyn prefaced her very brief report by stating that the Priory would continue to provide wives for the clergy, pillars for the Church, and members of Bishop's Committees. She then stated emphatically that more class rooms are needed which would cost about \$100,000. They now have some \$13,000 to \$14,000, with another thousand needed by

September. For further facts and figures, attention was directed to her report. She concluded with the comment that the Priory owes no man nor bank.

Mr James M Taylor, headmaster of the Hawaii Preparatory Academy, mentioned that one of the symptoms of strength of that institution was the fact that they had survived the Parker Ranch 125th anniversary. The building program is going into motion with plans underway to operate on one campus in the shortest possible time. The school now has 170 boarding students and 45 day students, but this enrollment cannot be increased for several years. Architectural drawings were exhibited and explained (very briefly), and delegates were invited to inspect these more closely following the meeting.

The Rev Burton MacLean, headmaster of Iolani School was introduced. Present enrollment is 1,030; there are 99 persons in the school family, working under the direction of The Rev David P Coon. They have redone the curriculum honors program by arranging freshmen college courses, thereby getting sophomore placement in colleges. Nearly 100% of Iolani graduates go on to college. Iolani now has a 10 year building program worked out by the Board of Governors, with steps taken for a new gymnasium, swimming pool and track. \$610,000 has been subscribed for the present program. The ground breaking ceremony will take place on February 6th. The Rev Mr MacLean expressed grateful thanks to the Board of Governors, faculty and staff.

The Rev Claude F Du Teil was asked for comments concerning plans for the balance of the Centennial Year. The Rev Mr Du Teil said that detailed accounts of coming events would be written up in the Chronicle. In August Dr Mollegan will lecture on each of the Islands. Conferences will be held this spring for Lay workers; in October the former Archbishop of Canterbury, Lord Fisher of Lambeth and Bishop Bently will be with us; and in early December, Bishop Bayne will lead a series of meditations.

Mrs Victor Thompson, granddaughter of the first Anglican Bishop of Honolulu, and Canon Heffner were presented with Diocesan seals.

Mrs Thomas Aaron, Mr Art Caswell, Bishop Littell, and Bishop Gilson also received seals.

Noon Day prayers were offered by The Rev Covy E Blackmon.

The official photograph of Convocation was taken.

Attention was directed to the Golden Alms Basin from National Church, to be used for the United Thank Offering ingathering, and to the new Diocesan Alms Basin just recently acquired. The copy of the original deed from King Kamehameha IV to the Cathedral was on display for Convocation guests.

An official clergy picture was made immediately following the business meeting.

Announcement was made of luncheon at Davies Hall to follow immediately, and of the Convocation Banquet at 6:30 in Hilton Dome.

Following the benediction, the meeting adjourned at 12:30 PM, February 5, 1962.

The Board met five times during the year for the transaction of the business affairs of the Diocese. In addition to their formal meetings, members of the Board met and counselled with the Bishop and other officers relative to the conduct of the Church's financial and legal affairs. Highlights of the year's activities were the following:

1. Approval of the revised Rules and Regulations of the Church's Trust Endowment Fund.
2. Approval of the sale of a residence at 2005 Kakela Drive, Honolulu, which had been received by the Church under the Will of Edith M Philipps, deceased.
3. Authorized the construction of a recreation hall at Mokuleia, cost not to exceed \$31,500, amount to be allocated from the Episcopal Centennial Advance Program.
4. Approved construction of a residence at 102 Bates Street on the land left to the Church by Florence Lawrence.
5. Accepted the Bequest of stock, cash and miscellaneous jewelry valued in excess of \$114,000 from the Estate of Penrose C Morris, same to be added to the Episcopate Endowment Fund.
6. Approved the construction of a parish hall in Kailua for Emmanuel Church at a cost of approximately \$54,000, which amount is to be drawn from the Episcopal Centennial Advance Program.
7. Approved a request for a loan of \$10,000 to cover the balance due on the cost of construction and installation of the new organ at the Cathedral Church of St Andrew.
8. Approved the recommendation of the Finance Committee to appoint a Diocesan Director of the Division of Stewardship.
9. Approved the recommendation of the Finance Committee that the annual Whitsunday offering be allocated to the new National Church Headquarters building until our Diocesan quota of \$5,000 has been met.
10. Approved the recommendation of the Finance Committee that they review the present percentage being used to obtain the assessment amounts and recommend adjustments necessary to secure funds for the Department of Stewardship item in the budget.

In December 1961, the Church received a very generous donation of 90 shares of Hawaiian Electric Co common stock from Mrs Henry J Willey, to be added to the Endowment of All Saints' Church, Kapaa, Kauai under the name of "Willey Memorial Fund," with income reserved during the lifetime of the Donor.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

The Department takes pleasure in reporting the following achievements in 1961:

This Convocation will have two missions seeking parish status - All Saints' Church, Kapaa, Kauai, and St Mark's Church, Honolulu, making our total of parishes in Hawaii ten. This is a definite step forward in our goal of self-support.

The election of a Suffragan Bishop of Honolulu, to have residence in Taiwan, should open new opportunities for growth in that Missionary District, which became the Missionary District of Taiwan on January 1, 1961. It is still under the jurisdiction of the Bishop of Honolulu, acting for the Presiding Bishop.

The Reverend Patric Hutton and his family have joined the staff in Taiwan and the Reverend Peyton Craighill, after a year of study at General Theological Seminary, New York, has returned to teach in the Taiwan Theological Seminary, where our men studying for the ministry in the Pacific area will receive their training.

The Reverend William Jones and his family have joined the Okinawa staff, which will strengthen the work there.

St Timothy's, Calvary, St John's-by-the-Sea, St Mark's St Stephen's Churches have helped to rehabilitate nine refugee families - seven from Indonesia and two from Cuba. St Andrew's Priory expects the arrival of a family from Indonesia in the near future.

MOKULEIA CONFERENCE CENTER - A new recreation building. Main lodge completely remodeled - walls paneled - new kitchen equipment donated by the Pacific Chemical Company.

A new rectory was built on Bates Street as a dwelling for the Chaplain of St Andrew's Priory.

St Stephen's Church, Wahiawa, was consecrated on December 8th.

The Episcopal Centennial Advance Program, with a goal of \$375,000, and a pledged sum of \$708,500 over a three-year period, is a definite step forward in self-support.

A pledge of \$50,000 from this Missionary District to the Church Divinity School of the Pacific.

The Episcopal Gift Shop, which is sponsored by the Diocese to raise funds for advance work, has proven a wise and successful venture.

1961 marked the 75th Anniversary for St Peter's Church, the 50th for Epiphany, the 10th for Calvary, and 10th for the work on Okinawa.

A new parish hall was erected and dedicated for St John the Divine Church. A new rectory is under construction.

## IOLANI SCHOOL

### HEADMASTER'S ANNUAL REPORT January 1, 1961 - December 31, 1961

I am happy to report the following developments at Iolani during the past year.

#### THE POINT OF VIEW:

Our faculty is the measure of the stature of Iolani as a school. To the writer, it appears that ours is a faculty which continually asks more of itself. I should like in this report, to try to characterize this point of view.

This "asking more of ourselves" as a faculty suggests a renewed devotion to the things of the mind and of the spirit. Our concern is not so much to pile credit hour upon credit hour of quarter courses. Nor is it necessarily to add another two letters after our name. It is not of educational "works righteousness" that we speak.

This deepened concern for the things of the mind and the spirit as the part of our faculty has more to do with the reading of good books - with an ever enlarging imaginative curiosity and knowledge about the field of our personal intellectual interest. It has to do with the enjoyment of good music, poetry and art - with a deepened identification with high religion. It suggests an imaginative, honest and affectionate awareness of the young, each of whom has a unique identity which is always the same, yet forever changing.

This deepened concern for the things of the mind and spirit makes us impatient with mediocrity which dulls the fine edge of the mind, makes vulgar the spirit and distorts personal responsibility beyond recognition.

Nor does this chief concern of ours entertain the shallowness of intellectual arrogance nor the emptiness of religious snobbery. These are the cloaks of the charlatan and the bigot which a bit of humor quickly strips away.

Rather, in asking more of ourselves, our minds are drawn more to the pursuit of truth. As truth becomes more elusive, subtle and complex the longing for it burns more brightly within, giving us light enough to take the next step. And our spirits are drawn more by a sense of common equity and fair play, simple decency and a lively respect for one another. As we ask more of ourselves, we are made alive anew through the awesome awareness of the glory of our creation and the love that has made us members one of another.

What we are dedicated to, what we are committed to, what we are bound to do is, in sum, nothing other than to give our whole hearts and minds to the teaching life we chose for ourselves.

Iolani asks nothing more, nor nothing less of each one of us on the faculty and administrative staff.

#### ADMISSIONS AND ENROLLMENT FOR 1961-62

Of the even 550 boys who completed application for entrance, the school could choose only 225. There is a good and bad to this. It is good for the school to have such a large group from which to select candidates of ability and promise. It is bad because the school



cannot take every worthy candidate. Physical limitations simply prevent any appreciable expansion. None the less the enrollment crept up slightly from 1,000 in 1960-61 to 1,032 in 1961-62.

It should be noted that while Iolani is sensible to the pressure for admission to the school, it is felt that increasing the size does not automatically mean a greater qualitative value to the school. To the contrary, the school that grows too big may jeopardize the sense of personal identity that comes from close human relationships. As personal identity is jeopardized, so also is personal responsibility. Iolani places great store by the development of personal identity and responsibility in the life of her boys. The school dare not risk the loss of these priceless values by becoming so large as to endanger the development of responsible personality.

#### TUITION AND SCHOLARSHIPS:

The Board of Governors of Iolani School at its meeting of December 18, 1961, voted to establish the following scale for tuition for the year beginning September, 1962:

Kindergarten	\$450.00
Grades 1 - 3	\$550.00
Grades 4 - 6	\$650.00
Grades 7 -12	\$760.00

The chief problem before the Board in reaching this decision was to provide adequate salaries for our teachers and instructors. As of this writing our faculty are receiving salaries averaging 15 per cent lower than those of two other leading independent schools in Hawaii. The continuance of this situation would endanger the school's capacity to attract and hold fine personnel. Accordingly, the Board concluded that there was no other choice but to increase tuition.

The Board recognized that some families will feel a hardship with this tuition increase. For the past three years Iolani has been increasingly aware of its responsibilities to give assistance to boys and families who have financial need. In 1959 the school spent \$14,700.00 on scholarships; this current year the school is spending \$40,000.00. The number of boys receiving aid has increased from 55 in 1959 to 123 in 1961. It is anticipated that in 1962-63 nearly \$50,000.00 will be budgeted for scholarship aid in order to help our boys who are in need of such assistance. The school hopes that it will lose no boy because of the tuition increase.

Iolani has no significant general endowment income to help support its annual operations. Last year the amount received from this source amounted to \$612.00! In the long run this situation will have to be corrected, but for the foreseeable future Iolani has to depend on tuition income for 90 per cent of the cost of operations. The balance of 10 per cent comes from gifts and fees. It should be noted that the median tuition for boys' day schools in the United States is \$900.00. Iolani's new tuition scale remains considerably below this.

Iolani is committed to provide as fine a primary, elementary and college preparatory program as is possible and to prepare boys for dedicated and intelligent leadership. A first-rate faculty is absolutely essential to these goals. As a consequence, the school has no other choice but to face the cost of such a program in an expanding economy that has experienced rising costs since the end of World War II.

## CURRICULUM

### The Lower School

In the Lower School modified departmentalization which was begun in 1960-61 in the sixth grade was extended down through the fourth this year. The result has been gratifying since instructors are teaching subjects in the area of their greatest interest and competency, and our boys are the beneficiaries.

French, Chinese and Japanese are being offered in Grades 4 and 5. Next year these will be extended to the sixth. What began as an experiment in 1960-61, has become a proven part of the Lower School curriculum.

### The Upper School

This year the faculty to quote from the Headmaster's column in a recent issue of the Iolani Bulletin "introduced an Honors or accelerated program leading to Advanced Placement in mathematics, English and language and soon to be added, history and science. The Mathematics Department has introduced in the 7th through the 12th grade the new School Mathematics Study Group program which stresses the fundamental logic and principles of mathematics. Given the current explosion in scientific thinking the colleges are demanding better and deeper understanding in mathematics. Iolani is giving it.

With the vast competitive brain-working machines that have been let loose in the modern world of communication it becomes more incumbent on schools to pursue truth with diligence. The great allies in this search are the humanities. English and history and the classical studies, Greek and Latin. If we allow the minds of our boys to be continually scrubbed with cliches, half-truths, slogans and mind-conditioners that are typical of today's mass communications, their brains will be washed right out of their heads!

Through a carefully devised course of study the cultivation of the powers of appreciation, critical thinking, and discriminating judgment are being nurtured through the English and speech courses at Iolani. At the same time some awareness of the historical perspective is acquired by a carefully planned sequence of history offerings. For the boy whose cultural and intellectual curiosity runs even deeper, Iolani offers Latin in the fifth year (or through the Freshman college level).

Some educators ridicule the classics but it is perilous to do so, for it is clear that those peoples who have had the greatest sense of the past (of history) have in turn had the greatest confidence in their destiny. The classics are vital to our survival. Iolani wishes that it could afford to teach Greek as well as Latin.

In the meantime it is clear that our history is more than the past of the West. The history of the East is becoming increasingly significant to our people. This year Iolani put into its curriculum a full year's course for upper classmen in Asian History, and we are in the second year of offering two great languages of the East—Chinese and Japanese.

The tremendous expansion in scientific knowledge is staggering. The college preparatory schools have the task of helping their students acquire a selective knowledge of the basic methods, procedures and theories of the new science. To this end new curricula has been devised in physical science, biology, chemistry and physics. Advanced placement (first year college level course) will be introduced next year in the science department.

## "NEW" LIBRARY FOR THE UPPER SCHOOL

This past summer the old study hall was completely made over to house the "new" library for the Upper School. Formerly located in quarters in one of the school wings the old library could accommodate only forty boys at a time. In the meantime, the old study hall was a row on row chamber inviting not so much creative study as sound sleep.

After a careful study by a Faculty Committee and an appropriation of the Board of Governors it was made possible to create a new library - study room, which provided a greatly expanded and attractive space for the library and a study room made interesting by the presence of books and a varied seating arrangement. Library hours have been extended to 6:00 p.m. in the afternoon so that boys have an ample opportunity to enjoy its use. The results of these changes have been stimulating to the process of learning. These together with the acquisition of numerous new books in the Humanities (where we were weak) has helped to make the library the living intellectual center of Iolani.

## OUR GRADUATES

All 108 graduates in the class of 1961 were admitted to college. Seventy-five chose mainland universities and colleges, while the balance, save two, chose the University of Hawaii.

There appears to be a growing tendency to attend mainland colleges, which the school encourages in order to broaden the educational, social and cultural experiences of boys whose lives have been up to this point confined to island living.

## STUDENT LIFE

The establishment of three new school clubs, the Ahonui, Nahoia, and Holomua has begun to bring all our boys from kindergarten through twelfth grade into a closer relationship. The clubs, by having a healthy competition in accumulating points for academic, service and athletic accomplishments are stimulating a healthy sense of participation and competition. At the end of the year the winning club will be given a victory dinner and special award.

The inauguration of a Choir-Glee Club, a successful dramatic tradition (Mister Roberts and Inherit the Wind), the growth of the Band, the greatly increased participation in speech and debate activities, the lively activities of the International, Science, Photography and Audio-Visual Clubs all bespeak of an active and growing student participation in worthwhile activities.

The inauguration of the Intramural athletic program for the 10th and 11th grades has enhanced the athletic program of the school and given over two hundred of our boys an opportunity in sports never experienced before this.

Imua, the school newspaper, and Ka Moololo, the school annual, have matured in style and content. The Student Council and the class organizations have set higher standards of responsible participation in student affairs.

In sum, the activities of our boys outside of the classroom have been sure tokens of growth. At the same time the boys' response to the new program of studies has been gratifying. The intellectual atmosphere of the school has been strengthened as the "things of the mind" become increasingly significant in total program of the school.

## THE IOLANI BUILDING CAMPAIGN FOR THE NEW GYM AND POOL

The Headmaster would like to take this chance to thank the nearly 300 parents, alumni, and friends of the school who worked so wholeheartedly to make our Campaign such a resounding success. At the same time he extends, on behalf of the school, deep thanks to the nearly 1,400 contributors to the drive, large and small. As of this writing, \$609,694.55 has been subscribed and \$244,435.21 has been paid on pledges. This is an extraordinary record of "friendly persuasion" and cooperative enterprise for a good cause.

The results mean that we can begin to build now. As this is written, bids are out to General Contractors to be returned and opened on January 26 in the offices of our architect, Lemmon, Freeth, Haines and Jones. The contract will be awarded at a Board meeting on January 29th and ground will, it is hoped, be broken in early February.

The Campaign has been a clear testimony of the confidence placed in the school and the Campaign organization led by Mr Hung Wo Ching, by our parents, alumni, and friends (personal, corporate and eleemosynary) in the community. It is our hope that the school will continue to merit the trust and confidence of its many patrons.

The success of the year's work has come from the dedicated cooperation of our entire Iolani family - the Board of Governors, Parents, Boys, Faculty, and Staff and our Alumni, for which the Headmaster is profoundly thankful.

## REPORT OF ST ANDREW'S PRIORY - 1961

### ENROLLMENT

This current year we have made a point of limiting the enrollment inasmuch as the steadily increasing number of students without an adequate increase in classroom space had resulted in problems both academic and disciplinary. In most respects this decrease in the enrollment has proved advantageous. It has meant a considerable loss of income, however, as we still have to keep the same number of classes and of teachers.

### GRADUATES

On the sixth of June, 1961, fifty-six students were graduated. Of these fifty-five are continuing their education on an advanced level in college or business training schools. One of the 1961 graduates is presently employed locally.

## IMPROVEMENTS

The major improvements in this past year have been in the kitchen department where several thousand dollars worth of electrical equipment has been installed and several necessary changes to the structure of the area made. In addition to the amount indicated in the financial report as spent on improvements and new equipment another \$3,039.96 was spent from the school cafeteria account which is not reviewed in our annual financial report since it is audited by the federal government. The Priory cafeteria is subsidized by the government school lunch program. Improvements to Queen Emma Hall and to the business classroom as well as new tables and chairs for the latter should also be included among the important improvements of the year.

## RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Regular religious instruction and daily chapel services in the Cathedral for all the students continue as vital parts of the school curriculum. The school chaplaincy is now a significant part of the school program reaching out to all the students and staff members. During the year fifteen of the girls were baptized. Five of these were baptized during a regular school chapel service and the remainder were referred to their local parish churches. Forty-three girls were confirmed. Eleven were presented by the Chaplain, the Rev. Robert Sheeran, three were prepared by the Chaplain and presented in their own parish churches, and the remainder were prepared and presented by their own clergymen. There has been an increase of two percent in the number of confirmed girls in the school, but a decrease of six percent in the number of baptized. It should be kept in mind that there will be a considerable increase in both these groups by the close of school in June, but also a loss of many baptized and confirmed students by graduation and transfer. We know that we are "building the walls of Jerusalem" with living stones even though the fact cannot be reflected in school statistics.

## GENERAL REMARKS

The Speech program at the Priory has been expanded during the year resulting in increased contacts for the speech students in several areas. In competition with others Priory girls have won recognition in the Red Feather Speech Contest, and in the various Invitational Debating and Speech Contests. Several members of the speech classes cooperated with the Palama-Kalihi branch of the Library of Hawaii in going once a week to read to the children. This was reported as a very successful and much appreciated project. Story-telling to the classes in the lower school was another service project of the speech department students.

In September some 2000 new books, text books and others, that had accumulated over the years but which were not currently in use here, were sent to Apio, Samoa. We have been told that within twenty-four hours of their arrival the books had all been taken by representatives of the surrounding schools.

As part of our duty to educate the whole personality we continue to stress the importance of service in all areas of life. The Priory Choir sang for the Holy Communion service at Convocation, and part of the choir again sang at the Holy Communion service held by the Women of the Church in November. Smaller groups from the Choir have been singing upon request for other community occasions. The Companions of St Andrew, a group of juniors and seniors, decorated the Cathedral for the Thanksgiving services with fruit and vegetables donated from the entire student body. The food was later given to Shriners' Hospital in accordance with a long standing Priory tradition. Groups of high school girls assisted at the Cathedral Thanksgiving Market, and the younger girls assisted by spending their money generously.

Other groups and individuals in the school have contributed Care Packages, and worked for the Volunteer Service Bureau. Several girls give of their time as Junior Nurse Aides. Our students regularly prepare the CHRONICLE for mailing; and assist in similar preparation of other material from the Diocesan Office as the need arises. The Student Council sponsors a Welfare Fund from which definite quotas are allotted for the various community welfare enterprises.

In the area of sports, Priory swimming, tennis and volley ball teams have taken part in interscholastic tournaments in addition to the regular "Play Days" sponsored by the Girls' Athletic Association.

## BENEFACTORS

This fall the local Associates of the Transfiguration raised \$921.96 for the school library, which contributes to the whole school program but is a bit of a Cinderella step-child financially speaking. Several women's groups in Churches on the Mainland made contributions to our general program. We appreciate the latter especially for the contact in widening areas within the Church.

## NEEDS

We must have additional classrooms if we are to meet the needs of an ever increasing number of school age children in this state. The limiting of our enrollment this current year in order to provide for better teaching and fewer problems resulted in a loss of income totaling some \$24,000.00. We have the plans, approved by the proper civil authority, for the addition of a second story to Sellon Hall providing for six more classrooms at an estimated cost of about \$100,000.00. We have the plans, we have potential students, we have presently \$13,430.00 in the Building Fund with an expected addition of \$15,000.00 by September. What we do not have is the balance.

## TUITION AND TEACHERS' SALARIES

A substantial increase was made in teachers' salaries for this current school year with an equally substantial increase in tuition. However, last school year's deficit of about \$12,000.00 and this current year's loss of income due to limiting the enrollment leaves us in the same hand to mouth situation, with the hand not always quite making it.

## ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

To the Bishop and diocesan treasurer we extend our gratitude for the support and assistance rendered us during the year. We are continually grateful to the Cathedral Chapter and clergy staff for their generosity in permitting the daily use of the Cathedral for our Chapel services, and our frequent use of Tenney Auditorium. We also take this opportunity of thanking the Rector and Vestry of St Peter's parish for the many occasions upon which they have permitted us the use of their parish hall for school and P.T.F. functions.

## PROGRESS REPORT OF THE HAWAII PREPARATORY ACADEMY

The physical development of the Academy took long strides in the past year with the building of an addition to the Hall Dormitory to house 36 additional students and two Faculty apartments. The building is well planned and carefully integrated with the existing plant. The number of boarding students has risen from 60 in 1956 to 167 in 1961-62. The present intention is to hold the enrollment of boarders at this level until the whole school is on one campus. New classrooms, administrative facilities, and the Infirmary all must be settled on the new campus for our next increment. Only then can we add to our enrollment of boarding pupils.

The play fields are now in almost continuous use. The football field this year had 1,000 spectators watching the games from our new bleachers and from the rim of the bowl surrounding the field. For the first time in its history, the Academy has become a regular member of the Big Island Interscholastic Federation participating in every sport on a regular schedule with other schools in the league, playing football, track, cross-country running, basketball, baseball and tennis. And this year, for the first time, the Academy's varsity football team won the B.I.I.F. Championship for our area!

On the academic front progress continues. A fourth year of both Latin and French has been added to the curriculum along with the Calculus for advanced mathematics students. We continue to participate to a greater extent in the Advanced Placement program so that our students can undertake advanced work in college.

This year over 20% of the Academy seniors received Letters of Commendation for outstanding achievement on the National Merit Scholarship tests. Our National Merit Semi-Finalist for last year is now enrolled at the U. S. Air Force Academy where he is currently doing almost straight A work, and is on the Dean's list.

After four years of devoted service as Academy Chaplain, the Rev George Hayashi was re-assigned to work in Honolulu. We have been most grateful for his services and miss him tremendously. At the same time, while we were sorry to have Mr. Hayashi leave, we feel very fortunate in having the Rev Thomas Kunichika now in the post as Chaplain. He is doing an outstanding job.

The Academy Choir of 30 voices provides music for the Chapel services with a special Christmas program each year. They have sung at several churches on our island and also in two festivals sponsored by the State Department of Education. The boys are well-trained singers, adding much to the beauty and dignity of the services.

The service men had a Thanksgiving dinner at the House, and a Christmas party and tree decorating two days before Christmas.

In the group of service men staying at the Center, some are serving as layreaders, acolytes and teachers at the Cathedral.

The Diocesan House has many guests - missionaries and their families on their way to and from the Orient, clergy from other Islands and guests from the Mainland. The most interesting group staying at the House were the delegates from the Philippine Islands on their way to and from General Convention.

The Diocesan House has regular meetings of the Diocesan Altar Guild, Clericus, Diocesan Churchwomen, laymen's groups, and congregation meetings of the Philippine

Independent Church. There have been Girl Scout directors' meetings, interviews for the Hawaii Preparatory Academy at Kamuela, and a wedding reception.

The Philippine Independent Church has had breakfasts and several suppers. Regular luncheon meetings for the Board of Directors of the Diocese, the Cathedral Chapter, and the Executive Board of the Women of the Diocese are held in the Diocesan House.

We feel that we have had a busy and useful year.

#### THE EPISCOPAL CHURCHWOMEN OF HAWAII

The Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii, which is the Executive Board of the Women's work in the Church, represents 42 women's organizations in the Missionary District of Honolulu. The women have continued to give faithful and dedicated service to the Church. This devoted interest and service was not confined only to their immediate parishes or missions because the women have shared in diocesan affairs and in the mission of the Church in the nation and in the world.

Saint Christopher's Mission to the Navajo in Bluff, Utah, was the recipient of our National Supply Assignment for 1961. During the five Fridays in Lent, beginning with February 24, the women of the various parishes and missions in Honolulu gathered at Davies Hall to sew Layettes. The women on the neighbor islands also shared in this project by either sewing Layettes or by contributing money to help defray the expenses of the assignment. 972 pieces of clothing and 194 articles including safety-pins, lotion, powder, and soap were sent to the Saint Christopher's Mission.

A study program was presented during the Lenten Sewing Session. A series of talks on the missionary work being carried on in the lands of the Pacific - Taiwan, Indonesia, Alaska and Mexico - were given. Mrs. Johnson, formerly of Taiwan, now living in Honolulu spoke on Taiwan; Mrs. Michael Verhoeve, a national from Indonesia, now living in Honolulu, spoke on Indonesia; Miss Margaret Monteiro, a retired missionary, spoke on Alaska; Mrs. Harry S. Kennedy who prepared the program on Mexico presented the Reverend Kenneth Heim, who was a priest in Mexico for eleven years.

Meditations and prayers were prepared under the direction of the Devotion Chairman for the many women who maintained a continuous Chain of Prayer at the Parke Memorial Chapel during the Lenten Sewing.

During the Fridays in Lent the women of the various branches served a light lunch to the men and women of all denominations who attended the noonday service held at St Andrew's Cathedral under the auspices of the Honolulu Council of Churches.

Approximately 1000 women gratefully shared in the United Thank Offering, contributing \$5806.50 in 1961. With accrued interest added to our offering during the past two years plus our 1961 offering the total United Thank Offering for the triennium was \$17,552. (\$17,113 in 1958) How wonderful it was to have shared in the United Thank Offering of \$4,339,190.81 which was presented by the women of the Church at the Triennial Meeting in Detroit, Michigan in September 1961.

The District Altar Guild continues to do a remarkable job providing the altar linen needs for the parishes and missions. On the average of nine to sixteen women representing 10 branches met every week at the Diocesan House to sew. The chairman reports that she was pleased that so many of the women have sewed for their own missions and parishes. These women were given instructions and materials making it possible for them to complete their altar linens at home.

The Church Periodical Club support continues to grow. Most of the contributions are made by the women through the individual parishes and missions. \$75.00 was contributed by the Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii to the National Books' Fund.

The Island-wide meetings were continued this year for the purpose of Christian education and fellowship. Each meeting opened with the celebration of the Holy Communion at 10:00 o'clock followed by a speaker. In January at the meeting held at Saint Mary's Mission, Mr. Leonard Streit, Director of the Episcopal Centennial Advance Program, spoke on that program. In April Dr Elizabeth Carr, Assistant Professor of English and a member of the Advisory Board of the East West Center spoke on the program of the Center and the problems especially related to its students. The Church of the Holy Nativity women were the hostesses for this meeting. In May, Dr Paul Moore Wheeler, rector of Saint Clement's spoke on the Ministry of Healing at Saint Clement's Church. In October at Saint Peter's Church the five delegates to the Triennial Meeting held in Detroit, Michigan in September 1961, gave their report. In November at Holy Trinity Mission the vicar, the Reverend Reginald Rodriguez arranged for the Holy Communion service to be celebrated by the Reverend Timoteo Quintero in the manner of the Philippine Independent Church. The Reverend Fred Minuth, chaplain of Iolani School spoke on "Our Need for Adult Christian Education." On December 7th a Quiet Morning of meditations and prayer was held at the Church of the Holy Nativity, led by the Reverend John Morrett, rector.

The women have participated in the World Day of Prayer and World Community Day of the United Church Women. Several Episcopal women are officers in the United Church Board and are contributing greatly to this Eccumenical Mission of Christian women.

Throughout 1961 the women have responded to the needs of the community either working together as Branches or as individuals. They have served the various hospitals, State Institutions and Armed Services Y M C A. Five turkeys were contributed by the Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii for the Thanksgiving dinner given at the Armed Services Y M C A by the various churches in our community. The women have also assisted in the many National and local community fund drives. A total of \$6499.41 was given by the various branches and individual women to the "Specials" for 1961 which included: The Bishop's Discretionary Fund \$3294.41; Seminary Student Fund \$1165.00; Emmanuel Mission \$1235.00; Camp Equipment for Island of Hawaii \$805.00.

The Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii through the Dollars for Delegates Drive, contributions by various Branches, Churches and individuals, was able to send five delegates to represent the Missionary District of Honolulu at the Triennial Meeting held in Detroit, Michigan from September 17th, 1961 to September 29, 1961. The delegates felt it was a great honor and privilege to represent the women of Hawaii and are deeply grateful for this rewarding experience. They will continue to share with the women of the Church the knowledge and inspiration they gained at this wonderful Triennial Meeting.

The inspiration and guidance of our Bishop, the patience and cooperation of the members of the clergy, the faithfulness of the Board members and the willing participation of the Branches have made the year 1961 a truly good one for the Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii.

#### THE DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

##### 1961 Report

In 1961 the Chairman and members of the Christian Education Department worked in the following areas:

1. Family prayer cards were prepared and printed for use during Lent.
2. The use of C S M O (mite box) study and offering materials was encouraged during Lent.
3. In the Spring a training curriculum for Lay Reader training was developed and training schools were held simultaneously at St Andrew's, Calvary, and St Stephen's Churches for men from all congregations on Oahu. This resulted in the licensing of approximately 30 additional Lay Readers by the Bishop.
4. Two Sunday School personnel training sessions were held. The first was in July for Clergy, Sunday School Superintendents, and other Christian Education leaders, at which

the emphasis was upon methods of training and helping teachers. The second was in October which was a session on helps for teachers, to which all teachers were invited.

5. The sponsorship and promotion of the Birthday Thank Offering was taken over by the Department for use within the Diocese since this is no longer to be sponsored on the national level. Plans were made to continue the designing and printing of our own B T O materials.

6. In October the Department sponsored the annual Clergy Conference at which the Clergy engaged themselves in a four day study of the course "Journey in Faith". This was in preparation for the general use of the course in all congregations during Lent of 1962 as a part of our Centennial Celebration, and as ground work for the Diocesan-wide Lay Conference scheduled in May of 1962.

7. The Department Chairman and various members have worked at some length with the Centennial Celebration Committee in preparation for major events in 1962, this Department having charge of arrangements for the Spring (May) Lay Conference, and the Fall (August-September) Lecture Series and Clergy Conference. The above Conferences will be among the major tasks of the Department in 1962.

#### THE DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH

##### 1961 Report

The Department of Youth during 1961 had as its members, the Rev Dr Paul Wheeler, chairman; The Rev E Lani Hanchett, advisor to the Episcopal Young Churchmen (EYC); The Rev Reginald Rodriguez, advisor to the Junior Episcopal Churchmen of Hawaii (JECOH); and The Rev Robert Sheeran, Camps. In September of 1961, Winston Ching was added to the staff as assistant advisor to the E Y C.

The JECOH's enjoyed a good summer camping program at the Church Conference Center at Mokuleia during two weeks of August. Their advisor was in charge. They also met during Convocation 1961 at a Banquet at the Reef Hotel on February 4. The Rt Rev Anson Phelps Stokes, Bishop of Massachusetts was the guest speaker.

The Summer Camping Program was under the direction of the Rev Robert Sheeran. Six one week camps for children 8-11 years of age were held during June and July with many of the youngsters remaining for more than a week. A well rounded program of Christian Education, Crafts, Recreation, and good food made the camp most enjoyable for all participating. Volunteer clergy and lay help provided adequate adult supervision. The director is pleased to report that the camp sustained itself financially through tuition fees.

The Episcopal Young Churchmen enjoyed a very active program during 1961. The Diocesan organization consists of a State Council and an Oahu Council.

The officers for the State Council were: Michael Park, president; Thelma Nishimoto, vice president; Daisy Lee, secretary. The officers for the Oahu Council were: Patrick Chai, president; Diana Lynn, vice-president; Rebecca Kam, secretary; Brian Lederer, treasurer.

The E Y C Program for the year consisted of the following:

(1) The annual Youth Convocation Banquet and Conference with the Rt Rev Anson Phelps Stokes, Jr, as guest speaker at the Banquet. The Conference Leader was Mrs Ben Levy, director of the Mental Health Association of Hawaii.

(2) The Bishop's Ball in the Spring at the Iolani School Student Center honoring our Bishop.

(3) The Summer Conference in June at the Mokuleia Conference Center used as its theme a study of the various Christian denominations. This was led by the Rev Kenneth T Cosby.

(4) The annual Summer inter-church volleyball tournament was held at the St Andrew's Priory courts. The championship game was played at the Bishop's home in August at the islandwide picnic. St John's by the Sea, Kahaʻulu defeated Holy Nativity for the title.

(5) The final activity was an August Dance at the Church of the Holy Nativity, Aina Haina.

Winston Ching was sent as delegate from Hawaii to the Youth Meetings in Detroit in September. He gave a good account of himself. He has also contributed much to the Diocesan Youth program and is largely responsible for 1961 having been a good year of work with our young people.

The Diocesan E Y C organization is being changed this year to a single council with one president. The Oahu Council will be eliminated and the new Hawaii State Council president made responsible for the overall Diocesan program. The Department feels that this will provide a more efficient operation.

The various activities have all been well attended and supported and our young people from the various churches have come to know one another much better as a result of the Diocesan program.

#### REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

The purpose of the Church is to receive and proclaim the Gospel of Salvation through Jesus Christ. The Good News of God's love for mankind can be proclaimed by words or in deeds of service. Indeed, both are essential. Christian Social Relations is the modern name for our proclamation of the Good News in deeds of service. "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us", and so must the Word through us become flesh, incarnate, in service to all of our fellowmen.

A Moslem once said, "If anything would persuade me to become a Christian it would be the fact that only Christians went to work among the lepers." We hope that many will

be thus persuaded, but we serve in order to please God, not to persuade men. We do not sell our service, and we serve men who have no claim on us other than our own claim that Christ died for them.

We hope that the following Division Reports will indicate that in some small way your Diocesan Department of Christian Social Relations has been able to assist in our common task of proclaiming the Gospel:

#### WORLD RELIEF AND RESETTLEMENT OF REFUGEES The Rev Roger M Melrose

The primary emphasis in world relief has been the resettlement of refugees from Indonesia now living in Holland and from Cuba now living in the U S A. These two groups have been classified for special congressional legislation beyond the normal quota system for immigration. Since the program was launched in the Diocese of Honolulu in mid-1960 a total of 27 Dutch-Indonesians and four Cuban adults and children have been sponsored by Episcopal congregations on Oahu. The following churches have sponsored families: Calvary, St Stephen's, Holy Nativity, St Timothy's (two families), St Christopher's, St Mark's, St John's-by-the-Sea, and Epiphany. Several other churches are awaiting the arrival of their families.

Diocesan appropriations for the Department of Christian Social Relations are available to help churches with the financial needs of resettlement.

The annual clothing drive to Taiwan has been postponed because of custom problems upon receipt of clothes in Taiwan. In the meantime various congregations are sending clothes and layettes to the far east in projects sponsored by the individual congregations.

The annual Thanksgiving Day offering for the Presiding Bishop's World Relief Fund made \$1,570.81 available from this Diocese. The Halloween S O S (Share Our Surplus) made \$127.63 available from the children's work within the churches. Many additional churches give through UNICEF in their Halloween programs.

#### HEALTH AND WELFARE The Rev Iver J Torgerson, Jr

We have continued to maintain our church's ministry to our people in hospitals and institutions. At least one priest is assigned to visit in all hospitals and institutions at least once a week for Holy Communion, counseling, and prayer for healing. Many hospitals maintain records that let us know of our people who are patients, but we would appreciate information about our people in hospitals and institutions so that we can minister to them more efficiently. We especially want to know about those from neighboring Islands and the mainland who cannot possibly be ministered by their own priests.

Your Division Chairman is on the Institutional Chaplaincy Committee of the Honolulu Council of Churches and helps to coordinate the protestant ministry to all people in our hospitals and institutions. The Rev Norman Ault acts as a volunteer chaplain at the Koolau Boy's Home and Kawailoa Girls School, and he is assisted by Lay Readers from Emmanuel Church, Kailua, and members of the Cathedral Brotherhood of St Andrew have been working at the Oahu Prison.

Centers for the education of retarded children are housed at St Christopher's, Kailua and St Clement's, Honolulu; and St Clement's has a Sunday School for retarded children as well.

Alcoholic Anonymous Groups meet at Calvary, Kaneohe, St Christopher's, Kailua, and at Holy Nativity, Aina Haina. Al-Anon Groups, for the families of alcoholics, meet at St Clement's and St Christopher's.

Many of our churches open their facilities to the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, service clubs, and many other community groups and activities, and we encourage this type of service in Christian Social Relations.

#### CHRISTIAN CITIZENSHIP The Rev Reginald D Rodriguez

During 1961 inquiries and investigations were made into the attempt to introduce legalized gambling into the State of Hawaii. Clergy were kept informed as to the various attempts to introduce legislation to this effect. A resolution was introduced to the 59th Convocation of the Church condemning these actions of the gambling forces and urging our clergy and laity to use their influence as Christians and citizens in this matter.

Legislators were contacted as to pending appropriations to the field of education, and especially to the education of the mentally retarded.

Our clergy and laity were informed of the issues involved in federal aid to education and our church's position for aid to public schools but against aid to private schools. All were urged to write to our congressmen expressing their views on this vital issue.

I want to thank our Division Chairmen for all that they have done to further the work of Christian Social Relations in our diocese and world. Our Bishop has been most cooperative and helpful in this work that he has given us to do, and we are continually grateful for his guidance and counsel.

Finally, we express gratitude to all of you, the Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii, the Laymen's League, and individual clergy and laity for all that you have done to express our faith in unselfish service. There is a great deal more that can, and should, be done in the area of Christian Social Relations, and we welcome your criticism, suggestions, and help in accomplishing our common task.

Weekly services at St Andrew's Cathedral are broadcast over radio station KORL.

The Department will be glad to assist any churches or organizations in publicity or promotional problems.

ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT

The Board of Directors  
The Protestant Episcopal Church  
in the Hawaiian Islands

We have examined the balance sheet of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands, as of December 31, 1961. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The accounts and records of the Church do not reflect the financial position and results of operations of parishes, missions or institutions which conduct the activities of The Protestant Episcopal Church throughout the State of Hawaii. However, certain trusts of these departments are held by the Church, and accordingly have been taken into account in the accompanying financial statements.

Inasmuch as title to all real property, except the real property of Iolani School, Hawaii Preparatory Academy and St. Clement's Church, is vested in The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands, this property is accounted for in the records of the Church. However, the carrying value of the real property is not infrequently an estimated amount, not readily subject to accurate determination, intended to represent expenditures made not only by the Church but also by missions, parishes and other persons, or, more recently, an amount which represents only those expenditures made from proceeds of loans from Church funds or lending institutions which do not include certain other expenditures made through the treasurer's office or directly by churches and parishes.

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and supporting schedules (Schedules I and II) have been prepared in accordance with established accounting practices of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.
