MINUTES OF THE SIXTY-FOURTH ANNUAL CONVOCATION
OF THE MISSIONARY DIOCESE OF HONOLULU

Saturday, February 12, 1966

Holy Communion was celebrated at 8:00 A M in St Andrew's Cathedral, Bishop Kennedy as Celebrant. Following the service, breakfast was served in St Peter's Parish Hall.

Registrar, the Rev Norman Ault, reported a quorum present, and the Bishop declared the Convocation open at 9:30 A M. Necrology of Bishops of the Church and of Honolulu clergy family was read.

The Rev Norman Ault nominated the Rev Kenneth D Perkins as secretary of the Convocation and the Rev Joseph H Pummill as assistant secretary of the Convocation. Both nominations were unanimously approved.

The Rev Joseph H Pummill moved that the courtesy of the floor be extended to the Most Rev John E Hines, D D, Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church in America, and Mrs Hines. Motion seconded and passed unanimously.

Bishop Kennedy's annual address followed.

Assistant Secretary moved that greetings be sent to the Rt Rev S Harrington Littell, D D, S T D, Retired Bishop of Honolulu. Motion approved. Assistant Secretary then moved that Convocation Annual Reports be limited to Treasurer's report, Board of Directors, Committee on the Total Ministry, and Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence in the Body of Christ. Motion seconded and approved.

The Rev Mr Pummill moved that the date of the 65th Annual Convocation be set for February 2 - 5, 1967. Motion was seconded and passed.

Next item of business was the roll call by islands; clergy, delegates, and visitors of each island rising in a body for recognition by the Convocation.

The Rev Mr Minuth moved that a vote be cast in favor of these nominations. The motion was seconded and approved.

The Rev Mr Minuth further moved that the delegate to the 47th Synod, to be held in Portland, Oregon, May 2 - 4, 1966, be appointed by the Bishop. Motion was seconded and passed.

The Diocesan Treasurer's Report by Mr Henry F Budd was given.

Mr Budd then moved that the proposed 1966 budget be approved as presented. Motion was seconded and passed.

At this time the Presiding Bishop and Mrs Hines were introduced. Bishop Hines addressed the Convocation briefly, and then presented to Arthur G Smith, Chancellor of the Diocese, a Citation in Appreciation of more than 50 years of Service to the Church.

Mr Herman V van Holt made the report for the Board of Directors. See report of the Board of Directors.

His report was approved as presented.

The Rev W Edwin Bonsey, Jr, was asked to speak on the Diocesan Council and the General Committee on the Total Ministry. See report of Diocesan Council.

Mr Bonsey then moved the adoption of the Diocesan Objectives. Motion was seconded and passed.

The Ven Charles T Crane reported on Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence in the Body of Christ. See report of that committee.

The Ven Paul M Wheeler, Archdeacon of Oahu, reported that arrangements have been made to hold services at Hawaii Kai, using a religious center given by the developers for the shared use of several denominations, thus avoiding expensive duplication of churches and other related buildings.

The Convocation stood for the reading by the Rev Richard A Kirchoffer, Jr, of these resolutions:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Reverend C Fletcher Howe, a faithful priest in Christ's Church for more than a half century, entered into Life Eternal on November 17, 1965, at the age of 86 years, and

WHEREAS, during his ministry - in China, on the Island of Maui, and in Honolulu - he has left marks of Love, Courage and Spiritual Guidance that can never be erased, and

WHEREAS, for eighteen years he served this Diocese as its Historiographer, and the Parish of St Clement's as its Associate Rector,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the members of the Vestry of St Clement's Parish here assembled at the Rectory on January 20, 1966, express deep and grateful appreciation for his dedicated and devoted service, and loving tribute to his memory, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Resolution be presented to the Sixty-Fourth Annual Convocation of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu, and that a copy be sent to his widow, Nellie.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, "among all the changes and chances of this mortal life," Magdalene F Nakamura did suddenly enter into Life Eternal on August 11, 1965; and

WHEREAS, she did throughout her life on earth faithfully serve her Lord and Church, well-known for the excellency with which she fulfilled her vocations as a registered nurse, as a leader and teacher of children in the music and faith of the Church, as a wife and mother, and as a missionary co-worker with her husband throughout his ordained ministry in Hawaii and on the mainland; and

WHEREAS, her untimely death was a grievous personal loss to her family and all who knew her, and the loss of a faithful servant and co-worker to the whole Church Militant:

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Sixty-Fourth Annual Convocation of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu, convening on the 12th day of February, 1966, solemnly recognize her demise and gratefully acknowledge her service;

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the Church Militant here assembled commend Magdalene F Nakamura to the Church Expectant and Triumphant in the care and keeping of God Almighty by the mercies of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ until we may be reunited with her in Life Everlasting;

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this resolution be given to her husband, the Rev James S Nakamura, and to other family members, friends and persons designated by him:

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of this Convocation be instructed to record this resolution in the annals of said Convocation.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Juelle Jones Willey, entered the larger life on November 16, 1965, and

WHEREAS, Mrs Willey was the widow of Henry Alphaeus Willey, Archdeacon of Kauai from 1925 - 1949 and the first Vicar of All Saints' Church as well as the founder of St John's Mission and Christ Memorial Church on the island of Kauai, and

WHEREAS, Mrs Willey was a faithful member of the Church throughout her lifetime, serving as a chorister, organist, teacher, and supporter of her husband, and

WHEREAS, Mrs Willey was awarded the Diocesan Seal by the Bishop in 1962, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Sixty-fourth Convocation of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu express the sympathy of the Diocese to Mrs Willey's survivors and the gratitude of the Diocese for her faithful service, and be it further

RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to Mrs Willey's sister, Lucille Jones Partin, and that this resolution be printed in the Journal of this Convocation.

All resolutions passed unanimously.

The Rev Mr Bonsey presented this Resolution:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the following resolution was adopted by the Synod of the Province of the Pacific (Eighth Province) in 1962:

"Whereas, raising sufficient income to meet the yearly operating budget of C. D. S. P. is a chief opportunity and responsibility of the Province,

And Whereas, the Theological Education Sunday offering has not kept pace with rapidly increasing costs of operation, which are calculated at 15% per year,

And Whereas, the faculty salaries must of necessity be increased to make them comparable with those paid in other theological schools:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Forty-Third Synod of the Province of the Pacific recommend to the several jurisdictions that they, through their conventions, urge each parish and mission to supplement its TES offering by a budget item sufficient to achieve a goal of not less than \$1.00 per communicant per year."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands, recognizing the need for the continuance of an adequate Theological Seminary in th Province of the Pacific (Eighth Province), for the providing of well-trained clergy for all its congregations, urges each parish and mission to supplement its TES offering by a budget item sufficient to achieve a goal of not less than \$1.00 per communicant per year.

From the floor, four members of St Mark's Parish suggested that the final paragraph be amended to read "in the Province of the Pacific (Eighth Province) and throughout the Church, for the providing of well-trained clergy. . ."

The resolution was passed as amended.

The Rev Canon James G Long presented this Resolution:

RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH in the Hawaiian Islands expressed its

concern over the high rate of illegitimate birth in our communities, as well as the high birth rate among the indigent, and the burden this places on our community, and the great pain and suffering for many individuals who are affected by this situation,

FURTHER RESOLVED that we recognize that in our present society, with its rapidly rising population rate, there is a critical need for a more effective program of teaching in the field of responsible family planning,

FURTHER RESOLVED that we reaffirm our belief in the 1958 statements of the Lambeth Conference, on sexuality and family planning as follows:

On sexuality: "The Biblical revelation does not limit the function of sexuality and the family to the reproductive purpose. Equally deep-rooted in Genesis is the reflection of a second factor--the need of man and woman for each other, to complement and fulfill each other, and to establish a durable partnership against the loneliness and rigour of life. This relationship of man and woman--of husband and wife--is rooted in God's creative purpose equally with the procreative function of sexuality."

On Family Planning: "Some form of planning, particularly in those areas of rapidly growing population, is an urgent necessity. By family planning is meant an extension of the responsible use of science into the realms of procreation within the permissible range of Christian ethics, in the immediate interest of the family and the more remote but no less real interest of society at large."

FURTHER RESOLVED that we give our endorsement to the proposals of the Oahu Task Force on Community Mental Health Services for the establishment of a suitable "family planning" program in this community; provided that any such program take into consideration the religious convictions of those to be served by the proposed "family planning" clinics.

The Rev Claude F Du Teil, rector of St Christopher's Parish, presented an amendment deleting the first paragraph and revising the second paragraph to begin "THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH in the Hawaiian Islands recognizes that in our present society"

Resolution passed as amended.

Canon Long presented the following resolution.

RESOLUTION

THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS reaffirms its belief in the natural dignity and value of every man of whatever color or race, as created in the image of God and redeemed by Him.

BE IT RESOLVED that we condemn discrimination of any kind on grounds of race or color and urge that members of all races shall be allowed: A fair and just share in the government of their state and country; a fair and just share in the control, development and reward of the natural resources of their state and country, including the highest levels of attainment; the right to associate freely in worship, in education, in industry, in recreation, in housing, and in all other departments of the common life; and we recognize that the Church must bear witness to these truths in its own life.

BE IT RESOLVED that we call upon all Episcopalians to support national and local efforts to achieve equity and justice in racial relations, to give of their time and money to support this ministry of reconciliation; and specifically to pray regularly for unity and brotherhood among all men; to participate actively in the work of Church and

secular organizations seeking these goals, and for each parish and mission to support financially the Church and Race Fund, administered by the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we call upon all Episcopalians who are members of organizations which discriminate on the basis of race to examine their consciences with regard to their membership in such organizations.

The following amendments were presented from the floor.

1. Insert "in housing" after "in recreation" in paragraph 1. also:

FURTHER RESOLVED that parishes, missions, and the Diocesan Board of Directors be urged to investigate their investment portfolios, to determine if any holdings are in companies that practice racial discrimination in their employment procedures; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that no funds of any parish or mission or of the Diocese shall knowingly be invested in firms that practice racial discrimination in their employment procedures.

2. Insertion of the words "in housing" following the words "in recreation" in paragraph 2.

3. Insertion of the words "peaceful and lawful" following the words "national and" in paragraph 3.

Amendments were voted on individually with these results: Amendment 1 - defeated, Amendment 2 - passed, Amendment 3 - defeated. The resolution was then passed as amended to insert the words "in housing" in paragraph 2.

RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS reaffirms its belief in the following statement of the Lambeth Conference:

"War as a method of settling international disputes is incompatible with the teaching and example of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Resolution 25, 1930; Resolution 9, 1948; Resolution 106, 1958) and that "nothing less than the abolition of war itself should be the goal of the nations, their leaders and all citizens." (Resolution 106, 1958)

WE ALSO REMIND all Christians of their duty to seek peace wherever there are enmity or broken relationships between men and nations; to give where there is need and to forgive where there has been hurt; and to pray for their enemies.

WE RECOGNIZE that there are occasions when nations are obliged to resort to war as the lesser of two evils, but the Church is ever called at all times to the positive work of reconciliation between men and nations.

WE, THEREFORE, DECLARE that we recognize our tragic involvement in Viet Nam as necessary, but regrettable, and give our loyal support to our nation's efforts to contain Marxist imperialism in the Far East and to achieve lasting peace.

WE ALSO URGE continued and continual effort by our government to achieve as quickly as possible lasting peace in the troubled area by means of the conference table, the United Nations, and the good offices of the various powers.

The Rev Victor H Krulak, Jr, assistant at St Peter's Parish, presented an amendment suggesting paragraph 5 be reworded to read "WE, THEREFORE, DECLARE that we recognize our involvement in the tragic war in Viet Nam as necessary and give our loyal support"

Resolution passed as amended.

Canon Long presented this Resolution:

THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS, recognizing that sound penology, justice, effective prisoner custody and rehabilitation, and simple fairness require:

1. The professional, educational, psychiatric, and social and voluntary services most fully available on Oahu;
2. The nearness of counsellors and courts, witnesses and police, in the capital;
3. The ready accessibility of family, friends, and of future employers, possible largely on Oahu;

RECOMMENDS an Oahu site for the new state prison.

AND BECAUSE of the crucial importance and long-term commitment of any decision as to prison placement and structure, further recommends that studies leading to A COMPREHENSIVE CORRECTIONAL PROGRAM AND REHABILITATION MASTER PLAN for all Hawaii precede any final decision as to prison site or structure.

AND MOREOVER directs that copies of this resolution be forwarded to public and private agencies and persons concerned.

The Resolution approved as presented.

Mr Herman V von Holt read the following resolution which had unanimously been adopted by the Board of Directors of the Church corporation at its meeting held on January 31, 1966.

"WHEREAS, the original charter of this Corporation was granted on November 6, 1862 under the name of "Synod of the Hawaiian Reformed Catholic Church," and

"WHEREAS, on November 7, 1873 the name of this Corporation was changed to "The Trustees of the Anglican Church in Hawaii," and

"WHEREAS, on December 19, 1901 the name of this Corporation was further changed to its present title "The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands," and

"WHEREAS, the Territory of Hawaii was duly admitted as the Fiftieth State of the Union and is now known as the State of Hawaii."

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands, that said Board recommend to the coming Convocation of said Episcopal Church that the name of this Corporation be further changed to The Episcopal Church in Hawaii."

Mr Herman V von Holt offered the following resolution which was duly seconded and unanimously carried:

RESOLVED, that the Charter of Incorporation of THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS be and the same is hereby amended in the following respects:

(a) by adding thereto a title to read as follows:

"CHARTER OF INCORPORATION
OF
THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN HAWAII",

(b) by redesignating ARTICLES I, II, III, IV, V, VI and VII thereof as ARTICLES II, III, IV, V, VI, VII and VIII, respectively; and

(c) by adding thereto a new article to be designated ARTICLE I and to read as follows:

"ARTICLE I
"The name of the corporation shall be -
THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN HAWAII."

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the proper officers of the corporation be and they are hereby authorized and directed to prepare, execute and file all such certificates and documents and do all such acts and things as may be necessary or proper to carry into effect the foregoing resolution.

The Ven Paul Moore Wheeler, D D, presented the following Resolution supporting the \$5 million fund drive for Hawaii Loa College:

RESOLUTION

THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS, recognizing its close involvement in Hawaii Loa College and its plans to open in the Fall of 1967;

AND FURTHER acknowledging its obligation to support the college in its program of Christian education in a four-year liberal arts college;

HEREBY EXPRESSES its endorsement of the current capital funds program to provide buildings for the college.

AND URGES support of the campaign by all parishes and missions in the Missionary District of Honolulu.

Resolution passed as presented.

Following are motions made by the Rev E Lani Hanchett.

(1) That the minutes of the 64th Annual Convocation be prepared and submitted to the Ecclesiastical Authority for approval.

(2) That an expression of appreciation be extended to Mrs Ralph E (Frances) Adams for her voluntary assistance as Secretary of the Convocation and for the many hours she has given in the Diocesan Office prior to Convocation.

(3) That an expression of appreciation be extended to the Clergy and Cathedral Chapter of St Andrew's Cathedral for all that they have done to assist with Convocation, and to the Rector and Vestry of St Peter's for the use of the Parish Hall for the Convocation Breakfast.

(4) That the 64th Convocation express appreciation to our guests of the Annual Convocation for the inspiration given to this occasion.

Motions seconded and passed.

Bishop Kennedy introduced Mr Hugh Shearer, Vice Chancellor of the Diocese. Dr Wheeler made announcements about the Sunday Convocation Service. The Rev Howard Kishpaugh urged that in the future Resolutions be made available early enough for sufficient study in depth by clergy and delegates prior to Convocation. The Rev Thomas Yoshida happily announced the birth of a son to the Ven and Mrs Charles T Crane of Kauai.

All present stood for the reading of the Necrology by the Rev Iver J Torgerson, Jr, followed by Noonday prayers, led by Mr Torgerson.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:30 PM with the Blessing by the Presiding Bishop.

CONVOCATION ORIENTATION AND WORKSHOPS
Friday Evening, February 11; 7:30-9:30 p. m.
Tenney Hall, St Andrew's Cathedral

The purpose of the Orientation and Workshops is to present the Diocesan Objectives and Resolutions to be voted on in Convocation and to allow discussion and exchange of ideas between delegates so that they may understand the underlying purposes of the above documents and engage themselves in (a) more meaningful voting in the Convocation session and (b) more useful efforts in the life and work of their own Parishes and Missions toward the fulfillment of whatever goals may be called for by the voting body of the Convocation.

The evening will begin with a half-hour orientation and then move to four (4) separate Workshops. Each Parish and Mission is asked to assign at least one of its lay delegates (Women's delegates may be used) to each of the Workshops. Attendance of the Clergy will be optional.

The four workshops will be:

1. The Whole Scope of MRI. An emphasis on being the real Church and how our Okinawa companion relationship can help lead us into it. The Ven Charles Crane and The Rev Edwin Bonsey in charge.
2. Re-learning the mission of the Church. What is the basic task and assignment of the Church, and how is it being rediscovered today? The Rev Canon Eugene Connell and the Dept. of Christian Education in charge.
3. Stewardship--far more than money. Recognizing all of our resources and orienting ourselves for their greater usefulness. The Ven Paul Wheeler and the Dept. of Stewardship in charge.
4. Christian Social Relations in a changing World and a changing Church. A review of how the Church is seeking to measure up to new challenges in new ways. The Rev Canon James Long and the Dept. of Christian Social Relations in charge.

DIOCESAN OBJECTIVES FOR GREATER ENGAGEMENT
IN THE MISSION OF THE CHURCH

1. A renewed understanding of the basic mission of the Church in the world;
2. The restructuring of our programs, where necessary, to fulfill our mission today;
3. The gathering of our best resources to meet the job.

In short, our objectives call for Mission, Restructuring, and Implementation, which we believe are at the heart of Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence in the Body of Christ.

In order to fulfill the above objectives of the Diocese, The Bishop and Council recommend the following:

(1) Understanding our mission: To continue studying and seeking the specific tasks of our calling to serve (1) as individuals and as the corporate family of God (2) in the Church and in the World beyond the Church. Resources: The 1966 Church Mission Study materials, MRI materials, Salty Christians, God's Frozen People, Where in the World, The Comfortable Pew, The Episcopalian Magazine, Laity Bulletin, Church in Metropolis, Far and Near, etc.

(2) Restructuring will mean: (a) Seeing where we are: A serious examination of the aims of our programs and an analysis of our stewardship as individuals and as the corporate body. We will deem to determine what our priorities are and how much they meet the

demands of our call to mission. Possible questions: Are our programs designed to give people work to do, or to accomplish essential tasks? Do our budgets allow for, or anticipate, 50-50 giving by the congregation? What percentages are spent on "overhead" items, what percentages on our mission? Is tithing the accepted standard of the congregation? (b) Making necessary changes: In so far as there is a difference between our understanding of our mission and the point where we actually stand in performing it we will need to seek immediate and long range changes so as to meet our call to mission with more effectiveness. Possible questions: Do our prayers and parish concerns reach sufficiently beyond ourselves? What simple, or far-reaching, changes in program and/or budget would release time, energy, and finances of the clergy and laity for mission? Could some of our Parish organizations be re-structured, or combined with others, for more effective operation? Are the laity being allowed and encouraged to be responsible members of the priesthood of all believers?

(3) Implementation will mean: (a) Getting at the job at home: To begin, or to continue co-operative conversations together with neighboring congregations, with private and public agencies at work in the neighborhood or community to explore the human needs in the community and to make plans to minister to them jointly, using all of the resources available to the several agencies represented. Suggested agencies: "Red Feather" agencies, Community Associations, Social Workers, Public Health Nurses, Mental Health Clinics, Schools (Principals and counsellors), Hawaii Housing Authority, Hawaiian Homes Commission, U. E. , Y's, Red Cross (military bases), O. E. O. , Juvenile Court, Police (Crime Prevention), etc. (b) Getting at the job in the world: Full participation in our companion relationship with Okinawa and the Philippine Independent Church in Hawaii (or in Parish project already established). Learn about life on Okinawa, about the work of the Church there, enter into some kind of correspondence with someone there, pray for the people of Okinawa, find and receive what they have to offer to strengthen us, send to them something of value to them. Resources: Okinawan people and societies in Hawaii, civilians and military personnel who have been on Okinawa, printed materials from Airlines, libraries, Diocese, etc.

THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL

The Diocesan Council concentrated on two areas in 1965: The establishment of a companion relationship with the Episcopal Church in Okinawa as the beginning of our acceptance of MRI, and a re-structuring of the program of the 1966 Convocation in order to encourage greater delegate participation.

In late May a team of three persons, Mr and Mrs Thomas Brodhead, and the Ven Charles Crane, visited the Church of Okinawa, offering to them an invitation to establish a companion relationship with us in Hawaii. On their return the same team of three have visited congregations throughout the Diocese telling of their visit and its results. Since May the Council has struggled with possible plans for fostering the companion relationship so that it might become a means for mutual growth and benefit for the Church in Hawaii as well as in Okinawa.

Plans for the 1966 Convocation have resulted in a reduction in the number of reports, speakers, etc., allowing for greater discussion in session. The request that all resolutions be distributed a month before the session, and plans for an orientation and workshop sessions are in hopes that the delegates will come to the sessions with a clearer understanding of the questions and the duties that lie before us, and perform a greater role in the decision making of the convocation in regard to those questions and duties.

The Council's major concerns for 1966 are reflected in the proposed objectives for that year which are attached.

MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITY AND INTERDEPENDENCE
IN THE BODY OF CHRIST

MRI, if it is to mean anything, must involve the whole life of the Church, must enter every phase of our Parish and Diocesan activities, and must be the standard against which we measure everything that we do. Thus, a committee report cannot capture any more than a small part of the effort that the Episcopalians of this diocese have made and must continue to make to respond to their Lord's calling.

OKINAWA COMPANIONSHIP

The principal MRI event of the year took place in Greenwich, Conn., where the Executive Council approved a companion relationship between the churches in Hawaii and the churches in Okinawa. While this companionship is only a small part of the total MRI picture, it occupied most of the committee's time and efforts.

A team of the committee visited Okinawa in May to meet the people of the Church there, to become acquainted with the assets and the needs of that part of the Anglican world, and to prepare the way toward the establishment of a bond of love and concern between the people of Hawaii and the people of Okinawa.

During the latter part of the year, the committee have presented the MRI story and introduced the Okinawa companionship to a number of different audiences in Hawaii. A gathering of over 300 Oahu vestrymen attended the Okinawa night sponsored by the Bishop on October 25th at Iolani School, and this meeting created great interest and enthusiasm. Similar presentations have been made to groups on Oahu, and by convocation time will have been made on Hawaii, Maui, and Kauai.

Of primary importance is the educational program prepared by Canon Connell, which we asked each parish and mission to use during Advent or Epiphany. Some have done this, while others are waiting to use the materials in Lent. Whenever it is done, education must take place among the children and adults if our companionship is to be effective and if we are to progress in our understanding and our living in accordance with the ideals of MRI.

In 1966, we hope that the orientation which has been made available will be translated into a working companionship, with giving and receiving on both sides of the partnership. Plans are underway for one of our priests to spend his furlough in Okinawa. It would fulfill our fondest hopes if this could be made an exchange, with an Okinawan priest coming to Hawaii for a time. Many parishes and missions have indicated their interest by contributing to the newly established Bishop's Discretionary Fund for Okinawa. Many more are awaiting the opportunity to be involved in person-to-person activities and specific projects.

PROBLEMS

For MRI and for our companionship with Okinawa to be effective, there must be real mutuality. Involvement of the Japanese speaking clergy and laity on Okinawa is essential, but this is difficult in view of our language differences. Fortunately, we have many laymen in Hawaii who know Japanese, and we can anticipate their participation.

There must be the realization in every parish and mission that this is not a "missionary giving" program, not something that can be dismissed by the writing of a check, but a program which can be effective only if the way in which we have been doing things is turned inside out. There must occur in the churches and their members the change that comes only when we become committed to the mission of Jesus Christ throughout the world, we reform ourselves into new images and patterns of action, and we then engage in some sort of implementation.

MISSION, REFORM, IMPLEMENTATION

If there is a keynote for the future, it must be found in these three words in the order in which they occur. It will be the task of the committee in the future to lead the diocese as best it can to a new understanding of mission, to the reforms which will free the funds and enkindle the enthusiasms that can go forth to revitalize the Church here in Hawaii as well as in Okinawa. When we understand what we are here for, when we make the internal changes that we have to make for the love of God, then we will be free to go to work and implement our love with programs and projects that will enable the people of God to witness more effectively, to live more joyfully, and to offer themselves to the world more lovingly.

The Board met four times during the year for the transaction of the business affairs of the Diocese. In addition to their formal meetings, members of the Board met and counselled with the Bishop and other officers relative to the conduct of the Church's financial and legal affairs. Highlights of the year's activities included the following:

1. Upon recommendation, made various allocations in the Episcopal Centennial Advance Fund.
2. Approved final plans for construction of a new Diocesan Center.
3. Transferred over to the Aloha Council, Boy Scouts of America, our interest in the Hecht property at Opaeha.
4. Authorized the proper officers of the Church Corporation to sign an Agreement of Sale with the U. S. General Services Administration for purchase of 6-1/2 acres of land at Iroquois Point.
5. Authorized purchase of a new vicarage for St Mark's Church.
6. Authorized construction of a new residence for a canon of the Cathedral.
7. Authorized demolition of the old vicarage at St Luke's Mission and the construction of a new combination school building and vicarage.
8. Authorized repair and rehabilitation of our mission and camp facilities at Kamuela, Hawaii.
9. Authorized sale of 10,000 square feet of land adjoining the Rectory at Church of the Good Shepherd, Wailuku, Maui.
10. In addition to many other gifts for Seabury Hall from friends of the Church, the Board accepted with gratitude a beautiful new chapel as a gift of Mrs C Montague Cooke, Jr, of Honolulu, to be known as St Paul's Chapel.
11. Authorized construction of a new vicarage for Holy Innocents Mission, Lahaina.
12. Made a grant of \$20,000.00 for Hawaii Loa College with the hope to grant an additional \$30,000.00 over a period of several years.
13. Authorized purchase of a condominium apartment at 625 Iolani Avenue.
14. Authorized construction of a lanai on St Luke's Parish Hall.
15. Appointed a committee to study the proposed Religious Center at Hawaii Kai.

16. Upon recommendation, made allocations of receipts from Estates left for the work of the Diocese.
 17. Voted to submit the proposed budget for 1966 to Convocation with recommendation for approval.

MISSIONS CHURCH EXTENSION - 1965

The Department is happy to report the following achievements for the year 1965.

In the light of MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITY AND INTERDEPENDENCE IN THE BODY OF CHRIST, Hawaii and Okinawa have entered into a companionship. The Ven Charles T Crane, Archdeacon of Kauai, and Rector of All Saints' Church, Kapaa, heads the Diocesan Committee for MRI. A full report will be given at this Convocation, as to what has been done and what we hope to accomplish in this relationship.

The Bishop visited Kwajalein, where he confirmed three who were prepared by our Lay Reader, Mr Karl Koehler. The Reverend John P Engelcke, Chaplain at Canterbury House, at the University of Hawaii, made two additional trips there and helped organize the mission, which has taken the name of The Episcopal Mission of the Ascension of the Marshall Islands, in the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu. We have four devout Lay Readers who are ministering to our congregation.

The Bishop also visited American Samoa, where two Lay Readers are holding regular Sunday services for our people. We hope to build a chapel and have a priest in residence as soon as possible.

While in Saigon the Bishop confirmed five in St Christopher's Chapel.

St George's Church, Chi Chi Jima, in the Bonin Islands, has a priest in residence. The Reverend Isaac Gonzales presented 18 to the Bishop for Confirmation when he visited there this past year. Unfortunately a typhoon destroyed the Quonset hut chapel, so the Navy has promised to build a chapel of a more permanent structure. We hope this can be accomplished soon.

St George's Church, Pearl Harbor, and St Stephen's Church, Wahiawa, became parishes at our last Convocation, bringing our total of parishes to twelve.

The Bishop had dedications for the Waikiki Chapel on February 7th; St Michael's and All Angels, Lihue, Kauai, on November 21st and Sellon Hall, St Andrew's Priory, on

December 6th. On December 5th he consecrated St Paul's Chapel, Seabury Hall, Makawao, Maui, the gift of Mrs C Montague Cooke, Jr of Honolulu.

On January 24th he blessed the beautiful window at Holy Nativity Church, the gift of Mr and Mrs Edward Harrison in thanksgiving for their three children. The lovely bronze statues above the entrance of St Andrew's Cathedral, of St Peter and St Andrew, the work of Mrs Rosalee Persons, were blessed on February 27th by the Bishop. They are the first two of the twelve Apostles to be made for the niches above the door.

In September the Diocesan Offices were moved to the former Cluett Apartments, which have been converted into offices. A second floor was added to the building, where a one two-bedroom apartment and two one-bedroom apartments are now occupied. The former offices have been turned over to St Andrew's Priory for classrooms.

Good Shepherd Church, Wailuku, Maui, sponsored bringing another priest from the Philippine Independent Church to take charge of this work on Maui.

A Greek Orthodox Chaplain is now stationed on Oahu and conducts services for his people at St Andrew's Cathedral. Two Greek Orthodox Bishops visited Hawaii to minister to their people.

Weekly services are being held at the Sheraton-Maui Hotel by the Vicar of Holy Innocents Church.

An Ecumenical project sponsored by the Methodist, Congregational, Presbyterian and Episcopal Church is the starting of the Hawaii Loa College. The President is a staunch Episcopalian. The Diocese has pledged \$50,000 for this project.

We have three companion churches that have proven very helpful for our work:

St Peter's Church is helping St John's-by-the-Sea, Kahaluu and Holy Cross at Ma-laekahana, Oahu.

St Clement's Church is helping Emmanuel Church, Enchanted Lake.

Holy Nativity Church is working with St Matthew's Church, Waimanalo.

THE DIOCESAN DEPARTMENT OF STEWARDSHIP

The department continues to emphasize one of the main diocesan objectives, Stewardship Education and Training. Members have conducted training sessions for churches on Oahu and Kauai.

In July, Mr Huntington Hanchett of the National Church was brought to Hawaii to conduct two Every Member Canvass Training Institutes. Two-thirds of our church responded to these weekend training sessions with the results that better canvasses were conducted than previously. The diocese is developing a hard core of well trained laymen.

The Rev John S Yarnan, Executive for Development of the Church Divinity School of the Pacific met in September with the Bishop and council. He presented a complete plan for Stewardship Education resulting in a greater percent of involvement of the laity's time, talent, and treasury. He will return in 1966 and, with the department, lead two Pilot sessions.

Aware of the fact that some churches had returned to a mailing canvass for the EMC contrary to diocesan policy, the department asked guidance from the Bishop and council. The decision made was that the department should continue to emphasize the EMC by systematic calling but be a clearing house for all other types of canvasses. This we will seek to do in 1966.

The department is here to help you and the church become better stewards. Your ideas and suggestions would be appreciated.

Your chairman wishes to thank the treasurer of the diocese, Henry Budd, who is a member of the department, for his untiring work in arranging the training sessions and as secretary. Mahalo to him.

THE DIOCESAN DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

This year the department has undergone some changes in personnel and responsibility. The Bishop and Council has put into the department the Division of Leadership. This means that there are six areas of concern for Christian Education; Leadership and Training, Summer Camps and Conferences, Retreats, Audio-visual, Youth, and Adult education which is a project of all of the division.

The department met on a monthly basis except during the summer months. During this time the various divisions shared with one another common concerns and projects. It was also the time to work on the general philosophy that would best support the efforts of the Diocese and the National Church and also meet the needs of the individual parishes and missions.

The following areas were worked on this year:

1. The promotion, ordering, and encouraged use of the Missionary Offering and Study material during Lent. This was followed by an ingathering and service at St Andrew's Cathedral on Whitsunday. Total amount that came to the Diocesan Office was \$2,732.20.
2. The development and distribution of a new Birthday Offering Card for Chi-Chi Jima. Our previous project area was the children's home on Miyako Island.
3. Cooperation with the Department of Stewardship is determining needs for further education in the area of Stewardship and the evaluating of several ideas.
4. A clergy conference on Counselling and Mental Health which was led by Dr Dean Brooks, Oregon State Hospital, Dr Robert Spencer, Kaneohe State Hospital, and Mr Walter Inouye, a psychiatric social worker.
5. Cooperation with the Council of Churches, Department of Christian Education. The chairman of this department sat on this Council Board. We also cooperated with the development and presentation of a conference that tried to discover new areas of concern for Christian Education. The Rev Hollis Maxson has also recently joined the Council's Department.
6. The development of MRI Christian Education Materials for the study of Okinawa. These were developed for use in Epiphany or Advent. The Ven Charles Crane assisted in this project.
7. The addition of several filmstrip and tape recordings to the Diocesan Library. The additions have been primarily in the area of teacher training materials and liturgical developments. A new catalog was also prepared and distributed.
8. Summer Teachers' Training programs were offered to the churches, and three were carried out during August.
9. The development and leadership of the Summer Camps program under the direction of the Rev Victor Krulak. The Rev Guy Piltz has been asked to again assume this division with the Rev Mr Krulak expected to take active duty with the U S Navy Chaplain Corps.
10. Certain needed renovations were made at Mokuleia Conference Center under the leadership of our Bishop. Further changes are expected in the near future and are now under study by the Department and the Diocesan.
11. Under the leadership of the Rev Hollis Maxson the Youth Division has been planning a conference. The unique aspect of this is that the Youth themselves have been responsible for its planning and have set their own goals and needs.
12. The Department is preparing for the workshops that are to be held during Convocation.

13. A layreaders' training course was offered over a span of four weeks during Advent. This included four sessions of the Prayer Book, the duties of a layreader and how to read the various services, the Bible, and extra pastoral duties. This was attended by about twenty layreaders.

14. Preparations are now under way for a seminar in June which will be led by three professors from the Church Divinity School of the Pacific. This is part of the ongoing program for advanced clergy education. There will also be several evening sessions for the laity. The major focus will be on theology as seen from the Old Testament, New Testament and the Liturgy.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

YOUTH DIVISION

During the current Convocation year the energies of the Youth Division have been directed toward pursuit of the Diocesan Objectives established in February, 1965. Foremost in the Division's plans and purposes has been the integrating of Youth work with the activities of other Diocesan agencies according to the guiding principal of Mutual Responsibility as possible with the Young Churchmen themselves and to bring their contributions to the attention of the Department and of the Bishop and Council, for it has been the operating thesis of the Division that within a system of Mutual Responsibility all of the people of God, regardless of age, should take their calling seriously and should have a voice in the affairs of the Body of Christ.

The Diocesan Objective which has been primary in this year's Youth work has been that of improving communications at all levels. The Division has achieved a large measure of success in the development and use of a District pattern for the Oahu Churches. Communication between the Oahu EYC leadership and the local churches has been greatly improved, but more important, the local churches themselves are now in closer contact than was formerly the case. Special credit is due the clergy and Youth of District Three (leeward Churches) for their co-operative efforts in Youth Work during this year, based on improved communications and shared concerns.

Development of leadership has been an important phase of this year's Youth Division activity. Some training in leadership skills and planning procedures has already been given and well-received, and more is now in the planning stage, at the request of the Oahu Council, EYC. The controlling concept in this training has been that of shared leadership, with the long-range purpose of building a continuing supply of trained young churchmen whose leadership capabilities will be useful both to the Church and the world. The Division is grateful to the Chairman, Department of Christian Education, and to the Director, Leadership Division, for valuable assistance given to this area of youth work.

Diocesan Youth Activities for the year have included the Convocation Banquet, at which the Bishop of Connecticut was guest of honor and speaker, the Bishop's Ball, and a Bowling tournament. The annual Summer EYC Conference has to be cancelled this year, due to the sudden appointment of the scheduled Conference leader to the Peace Corps. At this writing, a Youth Conference, two athletic tournaments, and one social affair are all scheduled for early 1966. Improved communications have made the task of planning such events a far more productive one of late, since the planners are now able to design activities from definite data supplied by the young churchmen themselves.

The chairman also wishes to acknowledge the fine support of parishes and missions to two national Church projects which have been of immediate concern to the department of CSR. A total of \$1,396.15 was contributed to the Church and race fund, administered by the Presiding Bishop, and \$2,135.14 was given to the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief in the Share-Our-Substance program. Both of these amounts were considerably more than the year before.

Among the highlights of the year's activities, which included monthly meetings of the department, were the following:

1. For the first time in many years the department presented a series of resolutions to Convocation pertaining to the special concerns of the department of CSR. Among these were resolutions: Supporting greater legislative appropriations for the treatment of the mentally ill; urging Federal legislation providing for the medical care of the elderly; concerning pornographic literature; supporting greater financial aid to our seminaries; asking revised immigration quotas, and supporting Federal aid for the transportation of students enrolled in private schools.

All of the resolutions were passed, but there was criticism that not enough opportunity had been allowed for discussion of the resolutions and that they were presented during the closing minutes of Convocation at a time of confusion and misunderstanding. Plans are for the resolutions hereafter to be circulated to delegates prior to the time of Convocation and referred to a Convocation committee on resolutions.

2. The department continued to provide leadership in the institutional chaplaincy program at the hospitals, through the coordination of the Rev E Lani Hanchett. In this program many hospitalized members of the Episcopal Church were able to receive the ministrations of the Church.

3. Members of the department went on record during the year favoring an Oahu location for the proposed new prison, a revision of the divorce laws (passed by the legislature, and for the development of a series of family planning clinics as a part of the public health program of the state.

4. It became more and more clear as the year progressed that it would be necessary to encourage parishes and missions to take the initiative in developing local Christian Social Relations programs, and to aid in this purpose a speakers' bureau was established to assist local Churches in this area. A number of fine resource people are available through the department to speak on a number of current subjects: civil rights, alcoholism, the aging, the urban Church, etc., and it is hoped that the parishes and missions will make use of them.

5. Members of the department participated in a number of ecumenical Christian action projects during the year, among them: A pastoral counselling service at Honolulu's Mayor Wright Housing and Kuhio Parks Terrace; a committee to establish a halfway house for released prisoners in Honolulu; the organization of a Committee on Alcoholism on the Island of Hawaii; committees on religion and medicine sponsored by St Andrew's Cathedral and the Hawaii Medical Society.

6. It was reported to the department that a family from Holland had been assisted by the Church to resettle in Honolulu, and a St Andrew's family has adopted a child from Hongkong.

7. A successful conference on Alcoholism and the Family was sponsored by the department in November, in cooperation with the Honolulu Council of Churches and the Hawaii Committee on Alcoholism. Sixty seven participants enrolled and attended the sessions under the leadership of two outstanding Mainland experts. Plans are now being formulated for a similar type of professional conference on the aging, to be held in the spring of 1967.

Other concerns of the department during the year included the problem of narcotics addiction in the schools and on the University of Hawaii campus, and the special problems of the Filipino community, although no special action was taken in either situation.

DEPARTMENT OF PROMOTION

It would be very helpful if parishes and missions would inform the Department about local activities that would have news value. We will be glad to assist churches in publicity or promotional work.

COMMITTEE ON URBANIZATION

Since this is a new Diocesan Committee, the immediate task was to seek out committee members who are knowledgeable about the rapid urbanization that is taking place in the islands. After a good deal of telephoning and correspondence, nine lay people of our church were chosen to serve on the committee with the Bishop and Dean. The chairman requested that all committee members do some background reading while he was away from the islands April 18th through July 31st. The material included the following:

"Church and Metropolis" by Perry Norton
"These Cities Glorious" by Lawrence H Janssen
"The Church on the Urban Frontier" by Paul G Musselman
"Church in Metropolis" a quarterly magazine published by
the Joint Urban Program of the Executive Council
of the Episcopal Church.

Four committee meetings were held in the fall. A good deal of time was spent on orientation and discussion. The committee is seeking to evaluate the situation, to uncover needs, select realistic goals and set limits within which to work. Two church leaders addressed the group: The Rev Seido Ogawa, Director of the Honolulu Council of Churches, and the Rev Lawrence Jones, Minister to the Metropolitan Mission, Congregational Church. The Bishop also briefed the committee on the ecumenical venture establishing a combined type of church in the Koko Head area. At the present time, committee members have been asked to study the urbanization program formalized by the Diocese of Maryland. It is hoped that some similar goals specifically designed for the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu can be set forth in 1966. It is felt that our committee should cooperate with the committees or organizations now functioning within other Christian denominations. The Bishop has requested guidance from The Rev Jack Woodward, Coordinator of the Joint Urban Program of the National Church. Hopefully, Mr Woodward will come to Honolulu in the late spring to assist in the development of our efforts.

REPORT OF ST ANDREW'S PRIORY

The year 1965 has been a banner year for the advancement of all endeavors at St Andrew's Priory. The Expansion Program is highly successful; management and operations have become more efficiently controlled; enrollment has continued to spiral upward; the financial condition is sound; and the quality of education has been maintained. The faculty for 1965-1966 is truly outstanding and the students have developed in leadership and stature both at the school and in the community. It is difficult to remain conservative in this Annual Report in the light of the extreme optimism and enthusiasm within the Administration, faculty, classified staff and the student body.

Highlights of the Priory Expansion Program

As anticipated at the beginning of the year, ground breaking ceremonies were held on Ascension Day, May 27, 1965 to start all major construction of the Expansion Program. After the regular Ascension Day service and traditional Founders' Day service at the coral cross, all in attendance proceeded to the site of the ground breaking ceremony where the Rt Rev Harry SKennedy celebrated the breaking of ground before a crowd of approximately 500 students and 100 adult guests of the Priory. Assisting in the ground breaking were Sister Evelyn Ancilla, Sister Superior; Mr Ben Hayashi, contractor, and Mr Hideo Kobayashi, architect. Refreshments were served by the Alumnae Association under the leadership of Mrs Mabel Evenson, President.

The first structure to be completed in the Expansion Program was Sellon Hall at a cost of \$132,682.26. This included a six classroom second floor addition and the complete renovation of the first floor. The building now houses the elementary school (grades 1 thru 6) on the first floor and the intermediate school (grades 7 and 8) on the second floor. The elementary school occupied the ground floor on the opening day of school, September 7, 1965. Due to delay in the receipt of fire windows for the second floor, occupancy by the intermediate school was delayed until December 1, 1965.

On St Nicholas' Day, December 6, 1965, a joint service was held to dedicate the second floor of Sellon Hall and to break ground for the Student Services Center to be built on Queen Emma Square adjacent to the Sisters' Residence. The ceremonies were held during a heavy rainstorm which limited attendance and hampered activities. Assisting Bishop Kennedy in the ceremonies were Sister Evelyn Ancilla, Sister Superior; the Rev Thomas Heimann, School Chaplain; Alan Hayashi, Contractor; and Hideo Kobayashi, Architect. Refreshments were served on the second floor of Sellon Hall with the students of the 7th and 8th grades acting as hostesses. Occupancy of the Student Services Center is anticipated in the summer of 1966.

Future planning for the Expansion Program consists of two additional phases. First, the main building is to be renovated to provide a student dining-room and a separate elementary school library. The second and final phase will be the construction of a gymnasium on the makai side of the Priory campus with showers and dressing rooms to be built in the vacated Diocesan offices.

Operations

In compliance with the Western Association of Schools and Colleges committee recommendations of 1964, many management improvement projects were undertaken. Noteworthy were the following major completions:

- a. An Organizational and Functional Manual of St Andrew's Priory was written and published.
- b. A Faculty instructional booklet was written and published.
- c. Job descriptions were written for all office and other classified staff personnel.
- d. A student hand-book was assembled and published by the Student Council under administrative supervision.

Enrollment

There was an increase in enrollment over the previous school year. We are very nearly at our peak load of 600 students which constitutes the optimum student body for the Priory. There is no intention of exceeding the optimum even though the Expansion Program will provide additional space for classrooms and facilities. The new buildings will allow the school to operate "comfortable" by the elimination of crowded conditions in the classrooms, cafeteria, extra-curricular activity areas and the Physical Education space.

Religious Education

Religious Education is not primarily just another subject to be studied and in which to receive a credit even though it does have the same academic standing as any other subject taught in the Priory. Rather the purpose is to develop a firm Christian character which will enable the girls to go forth to meet life strengthened by an understanding of the

faith as the Church has received it and to bear witness to that faith. The daily chapel services held in the Cathedral attended by the whole school and the celebration of the service of Holy Communion at noon for the confirmed girls and faculty on major holy days are basic in the life of the school. During the year seven girls were baptized and nine confirmed in their own church which is what we advocate in order that they may start with their roots firmly set. Sixty-four percent of the total enrollment are baptized and of these 41% into the Episcopal church. Twenty-six percent have been baptized. This represents a small increase over last year but not as much as we hope to report next year.

Graduates

On June 5th, 1965 sixty-nine girls were graduated and all went on to some form of higher education. They are now scattered in all sections of the United States and for the most part they agree that, after the Priory, college "isn't too bad."

Undergraduates

As in the past we have encouraged the girls to take an active part in church and civic affairs as well as in school activities. Certain events have become "traditions" such as decorating the altar in the Cathedral at Thanksgiving and then taking the fruit and vegetables to the Shriners' Hospital, the annual Welfare Drive to take care of contributions to various local organizations. The Choir is always willing to aid in a church service and is happy to be asked.

Stephanie Berger (grade 11) once more won the Hawaii High School Girls' Singles Tennis Championship. Marjorie Bush (grade 11) was selected to attend a Summer Science Seminar at the University of Hawaii. Sylvia Yee (grade 11) was elected Governor for Girls' State and was appointed by the American Legion Auxiliary as the Junior Citizen for the year. Loreen Lee (grade 10) was a semi-finalist in a United Nations examination. In the Living Church Essay Contest Joyce Kamei (grade 12) won first place and Diane Khim (grade 8) second place. In the American Legion Oratory Contest Evelyn Matsuyama was a semi-finalist. Marjorie Bush, Deborah Jones and Belinda Wong were semi-finalists in the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. Time will tell whether or not any of them are finalists. Jane Nakasome received a Letter of Commendation. In the National Scholastic photography contest Charlotte Yoneda (grade 9) placed second and June Ikinaga (grade 12) received honorable mention. These are only a few of the girls who made names for themselves during the year.

Acknowledgments

It is impossible to adequately convey to the Bishop, the diocesan treasurer and their secretaries our deep sense of gratitude for their continued interest and assistance for we are ever conscious of their support. Our appreciation also goes to the Dean and Chapter of St Andrew's Cathedral for their permission to use the Cathedral for our daily school services and also for the use of other Cathedral facilities from time to time. The Rector and Vestry of St Peter's Church are most generous in permitting us to use the Church and parish hall for various school affairs. To these and all our other good friends in the Diocese we say a very hearty "Thank you."

REPORT OF THE HAWAII PREPARATORY ACADEMY

The Hawaii Preparatory Academy completed its first complete academic year in June 1965, as a unified operation on one campus. All academic activity was confined to the new campus, though chapel services were maintained at St James' Church in Kamuela.

In June, 1965, a class of 47 seniors was graduated. Each member of the class was enrolled in the college or university of his choice in the fall; the vast majority enrolled at mainland schools.

The Cum Laude Society, which granted a charter to the Academy in December 1964, installed its chapter at the commencement ceremonies in June. Included among the charter members of the Academy's chapter were the Bishop, Chairman of the Board of Governors, Leslie W Wishard, the Headmaster and a number of the administration and faculty. Among the members of the class of 1965 who were honored by election to membership to the society for their distinguished records were Winthrop Lindsay Adams, William Conway Koch, Jr, Wayne Richardson, III, and Stanley Duncan Tabor of Honolulu; Robert Gordon Mitchel and Alvin Tetsuji Wakayama of Hawaii, and Steven Earl Spangler Smith of Kauai.

The fall academic term began with the opening of the John Edward Dyer Memorial Library. The new facility, housing the school's collection of books as well as a seminar room and a fully equipped language laboratory, has already proved itself an invaluable asset to the educational experience of the students.

Completed, also, for the return of the students in the fall was a fourth court of the Helen Johnson Rutgers Memorial Tennis Courts.

Enrollment for the 1965-66 year remains at 227 students, of which 58 are day scholars. Of the boarding students, the majority come from Oahu and the other principal islands of the state. Students are enrolled, however, from the West Coast, South America, The Pacific Trust Territories, Tahiti and Iraq.

An excellent faculty of 19 teachers teach a total of 73 courses, nine of which are college level. In addition to instructors, counselors work closely with students, and the chaplain attends to the school's religious life. The headmaster must, of course, and does retain close contact with each individual student.

At the beginning of the winter term, in January 1966, architect's plans and specifications for a gymnasium and chapel will be sent to contractors for bid. It is hoped that the construction of the two buildings of the fifth increment on the campus will proceed throughout the spring and summer and be completed sometime in the fall term.

Through the generosity of the Diocese and the congregation of St James' Mission, the school has used the church as its Chapel. The erection of the Davies Memorial Chapel on campus will terminate the inevitable inconveniences to the Vicar of St James' and his congregation in the church building. Moreover, a chapel on campus will bring the spiritual center of the school to the campus and thus alleviate the present difficulties of transportation to services.

To fill the vacancy created by Mr Wishard's resignation, the members of the corporation of the school announced the appointment of Mr Henry B Clark as chairman. Mr Clark has served on the board a number of years, and the loss felt at Mr Wishard's resignation has been much assuaged by the appointment of Mr Clark.

REPORT OF IOLANI SCHOOL

The Rev Burton A MacLean, headmaster of Iolani School, is in France on sabbatical leave. In his absence, as Acting Headmaster, I hereby submit this abbreviated annual report.

Eleven hundred and thirty-eight boys are currently enrolled, 390 in the Lower School, 748 in the Upper School. One hundred and five graduated in June '65 and all were accepted in college, one deciding finally on the U S Air Force.

This September 253 new boys entered Iolani chosen from 501 applicants. As reported last year, the intellectual quality of these applicants continues to rise. This is the first year that the Albert H Stone scholars have been enrolled in the school. This scholarship, instituted by the Board of Governors on the recommendation of the Headmaster, is a competitive examination scholarship for boys entering the ninth grade. Six boys are awarded these scholarships on the basis of financial need and high academic ability. As a result of last year's competitive examination, six Stone scholars have enrolled in Iolani along with five others who slightly fell below the qualifications of the six winners. This imaginative program already has an impact upon the character of the ninth grade. Projecting ahead three years when each grade, nine through twelve, will have these scholars, one can visualize the school playing a full democratic role in working with all aspects of our society.

Mr MacLean reported on the fund raising drive for the Development Program last year. The Lower School moved into its new plant on January 3, 1966. The new facilities are all that were hoped for and perhaps more. During the construction, the Lower School students met in the gymnasium which was partitioned into fifteen rooms. Having lived with the resulting noise for some five to six months, the Lower School students and faculty especially welcomed the new plant.

The Upper School ten room classroom building and the Library-Learning Center is under construction with a predicted completion date of August 1st this year.

As Acting Headmaster, on behalf of the Board of Governors and Mr MacLean, I wish to express my thanks to an excellent faculty and staff who have held the educational endeavor at such a high level despite incredible obstacles caused by extensive construction work. Student morale has been high, and the learning process has continued successfully. Past reports have commented on the excellence of the teachers, their personal commitment to the profession, their high qualifications as teachers, and their maturity. Circumstances this year certainly give proof to past reports.

ANNUAL REPORT OF SEABURY HALL

Seabury Hall began its second year in September 1965 adding the 11th grade to the existing 7-10th grades. The 12th grade will be added in September 1966 to complete the six grades in this college preparatory secondary school for resident girls sponsored by the Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands.

Enrollment is at 90 of whom 41 are day students. Of this latter group 20 are boys. There is a full time teaching staff of eight with three part time teachers. One resident housemother and a resident registered nurse are in the dormitory.

The original buildings on the estate given to the church by Katherine McGrew Cooper were a main building which is used now as a kitchen, dining room, library, faculty apartments, and administrative offices; a garage now used as classrooms, and a servants quarters now used as a faculty duplex. In 1965 we have added a headmasters house, swimming pool, tennis court, chapel, two classrooms and parking areas. The 60 girl dorm was built in 1964.

The college preparatory curriculum follows the standards of the National Association of Independent Schools which is rigorous and demanding. Our faculty are diligent in requiring daily performance by our students. Girls (and day boys) who are desirous of a college education are eligible for admission.

Our extra curricular activities are as follows: in the pool we teach Red Cross Life Saving (35 life savers in the school), team and beginning swimming, synchronized swimming, and diving; tennis is taught six days a week; horseback riding instruction is done four days per week; drama, newspaper, handbell teams, choir, modern dance, pistol shooting, charm classes, and general P. E. comprise our daily afternoon program. Several times per year we take groups through Haleakala Crater. Hiking and fresh water swimming on weekend afternoons are normative.

We understand and accept the challenge to provide a first class school with a good rigorous discipline and community life which reflect an honest search for truth in knowledge and in personal relationships under the sovereignty of Almighty God. For this we ask your prayers.

EPISCOPAL CHURCH WOMEN

The Women of the Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands have continued to serve the church both here and abroad during 1965. There were 285 present at the annual meeting, and over 100 at each of two island-wide meetings on Oahu. Bishop Kennedy reported on a spring trip to the Orient and Australia, and Bishop Ogilby told about the Episcopal Church in the Philippines.

On the five Fridays of Lent the women on Oahu met to sew for St Barnabas' Hospital, Osaka, Japan, for our own State Department of Social Services, for "the Wives' Closet", and for the Indians at Fort Defiance. We also gave money toward supplies of medicine and general expenses of a rest home in Puerto Rico. Average attendance was 40 with 17 churches participating. The study topic at these meetings was "The Countries of the Pacific." We were heartened to learn that St James, Kamuela, donated 12 layettes, and Good Shepherd, Wailuku, three.

The Altar Guild met weekly to sew and gave out 120 articles. On November 2 it sponsored a corporate communion at St Peter's which was well attended by women from many churches.

The treasurer reported disbursements of \$9,301.17 of which over \$6,000 went to the Bishop's four "specials" for the further growth of missions and Seabury Hall. We also sent \$5,903.52 as our United Thank Offering to begin new work around the world.

The executive board met eight times with an average attendance of 26. The resignation of Mrs Rufus Cannon as corresponding secretary was accepted in September and Mrs Clifford Young was elected in her place. A committee of Board members is studying the need and effectiveness of women's organizations in our churches, and hoping to find methods of motivating the entire congregation toward greater service. The study has already shown that fund-raising is on the wane and more time and energy are being given in service to hospitals, and other agencies in the community. Churches on Oahu are concerned with people in our state hospital and the Koolau Homes for Boys and Girls. There is a greater interest in our seminarians and in the closer fellowship with Okinawa now being developed as part of MRI. On all the islands our women are working in the Councils of United Church Women. It is a time of outreach. May we all accept the challenge to greater participation.

In June, 1965, diocesan laymen participated in the painting of the Mokuleia facility.

Episcopalians took their turn aiding the religious effort at the Armed Forces YMCA during August. The men of St Peter's provided Sunday morning transportation for men and women of the armed services to the churches of their choice and the Church provided a speaker each Sunday for a short talk at the "Java Club".

During September 9-11, the Reverend Edmund B Patridge, Associate Director of the General Division of Laymen's Work, visited Hawaii. We were privileged to talk with him and learn what others in nearly 90 dioceses are doing for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. The Rev Mr Patridge also gave us material and suggestions for study and action to implement the concept of MRI.

The Bishop's Quiet Half Day was held on October 3, at Epiphany Church. This is a series of inspirational talks by our Bishop, punctuated by prayer and meditation. There is also a light refreshment served. The event was well attended and anyone who was there can attest to the great value of this function.

The annual Bar-B-Que at Holy Nativity was not held this year, as its scheduled date conflicted with the Church Calendar.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF CANTERBURY HOUSE

In 1965 Canterbury House continued to be guided by the approach outlined in the previous annual reports - that is, being the Episcopal Church at the University of Hawaii (Manoa Campus) and East-West Center.

Work and progress in the five aspects of the Canterbury House program - liturgical, pastoral, social, service, intellectual - are briefly described as follows:

Liturgical. The Holy Communion is celebrated in the Canterbury House Chapel on school weekdays at 7:15 am. In 1965 there were 151 services. At the monthly corporate communions preceeding the monthly dinner and meeting, an average of 26 joined in the celebration.

The Holy Communion was the study topic for the semester-break camp in January. Bishop J A T Robinson's Liturgy Coming to Life was our study text.

Canterbury House is pleased to report one baptism and two confirmations in preparation.

Pastoral. Canterbury House continues to exercise a place in the pastoral and mission work of the total church. The chaplains provide Episcopal students with an additional pastor and a specialized counsellor who is nearby and available to the course of student life. The chaplains, as in years past, have served several non-Episcopalians.

NECROLOGY OF THE 64th ANNUAL CONVOCATION

The committee on Necrology and Memorials respectfully submits the names of those who were called to God's nearer presence since our last Convocation, who were faithful members of the Church, firm in the faith of our Lord Jesus Christ, and strong in the devotion of the Holy Catholic Church.

Social. The organized social program at Canterbury House continues to center about monthly gatherings held on second Thursdays. The celebration of Holy Communion, a dinner cooked and paid for by the students, a general meeting, and (often) a speaker comprise the evening program. Social activities depend chiefly upon student initiative. In the course of the previous year Canterburians and their friends enjoyed: a beach party at the Queen's Surf, ushering and attendance at "King Lear," a get-together during the summer at the Bishop's, a Christmas carol sing and get-together, a New Year's Party, an Iolani-Priory get-together just before school started, and intra-mural football.

Canterbury House is open daily from 6:30 am to 12:00 midnight and provides a place to meet, eat, study, play ping-pong, talk and relax. Some fifty students regularly and actively participate in the Canterbury House program.

Service. Canterburians twice helped in the clean-up and restoration of Lau's Store following the first and second Kahaluu floods.

Intellectual. The intellectual apostolate has in the main taken the form of discussion with students as questions on matters of faith and ethics arise and of assisting students as they prepare papers on religious topics. At the joint Methodist-Episcopal camp in January, Methodist Pastor David Harada led the study of Christian ethics and ethical decisions.

Speakers of note at Canterbury House have been: Dr John Michel, Director of the University's Counseling and Testing Center, on student problems and how to deal with them; Professor Resnick and Mr Kent Bridges, speaking on the Professor, the Teaching Assistant, and the Student; Mr Bill Bullough, USMC, showing slides and speaking of a marine's life in Viet Nam.

The Chaplain was pleased to be included as a speaker in the Ecumenical Assemblies sponsored by the Catholic Information Society; in the Ecumenical Study Group, sponsored by the Honolulu Council of Churches and Chaminade College; on the TV program Dialogue and on a TV program during Conservation Week with Fortunato Teho. The Chaplain was the speaker at the preparation meeting for Youth Sunday 1965.

Canterbury House is pleased and grateful to acknowledge the kind interest of many members and friends expressed in many gifts: Mr and Mrs T Brodhead (hymnals and prayer-books); the young churchmen of Kauai who were entertained at Canterbury and shown the University (wood carving of Christ); Mrs C M Cooke, Jr, the Cathedral Parish of St Andrew's, St Matthew's (magazines and other donations); Mr Norman King (a number of handsome potted plants); Mrs Oliver Evenson (rugs); Miss Marcia Chang (paint, shelving, curtains, and--especially--inspiration); Mrs William Fraser (crystal cruet); Mrs J Lang (vacuum cleaner, couch); Mr & Mrs Clifford White (chair); Mrs De Vis-Norton (Canterbury House banner); Mrs Dorothea Strombeck (secretarial services); and Mrs M Chun (syrup and goodies).

Thanks are due to Sister Evelyn Ancilla and the Rev Frs William Reeves and David Coon for their assistance given and wisdom shared. Special thanks are due to the Rev Mr Kaneshiro who gives so well and so freely of his time and experience to Canterbury House. One must mention in gratitude the work of Miss Wilma Chang, Senior Warden; Mr Delmar Kleckner, Junior Warden; and Miss Kathleen Soo, editor of our newspaper Impetus, and the continuing cooperation of the parishes and missions of the diocese upon whom Canterbury House necessarily depends.
