THE BISHOP'S CHARGE

1. The New Liturgy:

Convocation

Initial period of three years. The Prayer Book continues to be the authorized book of worship. Responsible study should precede and accompany the trial use. The congregation, using the New Liturgy in a "live" situation of worship, must have authorized copies available for the people. The text and rubrics must be followed without deviation. A record should be kept indicating when it was used, and the form of the Liturgy celebrated. Give the laity an opportunity to express their comments, reactions and recommendations. These should be in writing, for in due time all reports will be submitted to our liturgical committee.

2. Evangelism:

Each member an Evangelist, witnessing to the good news. We need committed, concerned, converted Church members, who by their lives are effective evangelists. Evangelism begins with individuals. Have a year-round program and plan of reaching out. Do not neglect local programs for the glamor of doing something big outside.

3. Diocesan Status:

Teach our people to be sensitive to the necessity as well as the responsibilities of Diocesan Status - its cost in time, devotion, finances, adjustments, prayer and patience. Many will be called upon to work and share in this important endeavor.

4. Youth:

Some congregations have no youth programs. In a day when youth is in revolt against authority, when they are confused and harrassed, they have every right to expect the Church's concern for their plight. Do more for youth and do it better.

5. Presiding Bishop's Crisis Program:

This program will take on greater proportions as time moves forward. No congregation can hold itself outside the plans. We are linked and locked together in a common effort. Keep congregations informed; make plans for your own participation.

6. Clergy Salaries:

The Bishop will appoint a Committee on Clergy Salaries:

That a minimum base cash salary be established for all clergymen engaged in full time ministry.

That a housing plan be developed.

That a minimum figure for the cost of automobile operation be established.

That Vestries and Bishop's Committees be encouraged to review their clergy sal-

That congregations unable to pay these minimum standards participate in a Diocesan Review Program.

MINUTES OF THE SIXTY-SIXTH ANNUAL CONVOCATION OF THE MISSIONARY DIOCESE OF HONOLULU

Saturday, February 17, 1968

Holy Communion was celebrated at 8:00 a.m. in St Andrew's Cathedral, Bishop Kennedy as Celebrant. Following the service, breakfast was served in St Peter's Parish Hall.

Registrar, the Rev Norman Ault, reported a quorum present, and Bishop Kennedy declared the Convocation open for business at 9:30 a.m.

All present rose for reading of the Necrology of Bishops of the Church by the Rev Frederick Barnhill. Dr Barnhill then presented the following resolution.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Rt Rev Samuel Harrington Littell, V Bishop of Honolulu, departed this life on November 15, 1967, and

WHEREAS, as the V Bishop of Honolulu (1930-1942), he:

- shepherded the diocese through the difficulties of the great depression and the beginning years of the war in the Pacific,
- laid the foundations for today's distinguished Iolani School for Boys, providing it with new land and new life, and enlarged and renovated the Church's distinguished school for girls St Andrew's Priory,
- expanded St Mary's Mission and Children's Home, Moiliili, and provided a church for Holy Trinity, then a Japanese congregation,
- began work on Oahu among the Japanese of Palolo Valley (Good Samaritan) and Waialua (St Stephen's), and among the Hawaiians of Kahaluu (St John's-by-the-Sea).
- began work on the neighbor islands at Eleele, Kauai (St John's), and at Maunaloa, Molokai (St Paul's, forerunner of the present Grace Church, Hoolehua),
- founded and governed Molokai's long-time only hospital, the Robert W Shingle, Jr Memorial Hospital,
- evangelized in byways and hedges through the Church Army's work on the plantations of Hawaii and Kauai, particularly among Filipinos,
- began the Episcopal Church's college work at the University of Hawaii, founded the Layman's League in the diocese, established the St Barnabas' Guild for nurses, and formed the clergy in a clericus, and
 - restored the diocesan magazine the HAWAIIAN CHURCH CHRONICLE.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that this Sixty-sixth Convocation of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu express the sympathy of the Diocese to Bishop Littell's survivors and Diocese's deep and grateful appreciation for his life and work among us, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that certified copies of this resolution be given to his wife Evelyn Alma Taber Littell and to his son the Rev Edward M Littell, and that this resolution be printed in the Journal of this Convocation.

With the Convocation standing in acceptance of the resolution, Bishop Kennedy delivered a memorial prayer.

The Ven Paul Wheeler nominated the Rev Kenneth D Perkins as Secretary of the Convocation and the Rev Joseph H Pummill as Assistant Secretary of the Convocation. Approval was unanimous.

Bishop Kennedy, President of the Convocation, officially presented the Rt Rev E Lani Hanchett, Suffragan Bishop of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu, and Bishop Hanchett addressed the Convocation.

Archdeacon Wheeler moved that Convocation Annual Reports be limited to the Treasurer's Report and the Board of Directors' Report. The motion was seconded and passed. Dr Wheeler further moved that the date of the Sixty-seventh Convocation be February 14, 1969. Motion seconded and passed.

Bishop Hanchett conducted roll call by islands, representatives of each island rising for recognition, followed by introduction of clergy new to the Diocese:

Mr Henry F Budd, Diocesan Treasurer, presented the Treasurer's Report and the 1968 budget with a motion that the budget be approved as submitted. Motion carried.

Report of the Board of Directors was presented by Mr Herman V von Holt, Secretary, and confirmation of the report was moved, seconded, and passed. Questions from the floor about the investment surplus were answered by Mr von Holt and by the Rev Mr Pummill, a member of the Finance Committee.

Nominations subject to the approval of the Convocation were made by the President.

Acceptance of the committee's nominations was approved by the Convocation. Mr Crane presented a recommendation to increase membership of the Board of Directors. The recommendation was passed. At this point, the chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons asked that any suggestions about enlarging the membership of the Board of Directors be sent to him. Nominations from the floor followed. Mr Pummill nominated the Rev Mr Kirchhoffer; Dr Barnhill nominated Mrs Phoebe Chu; Dean Morrett nominated the Rev Thomas Yoshida, who declined; and Mr von Holt nominated Mr Charles Kippen. Nominations were closed. Election tellers distributed ballots and collected them after the voting. The slate nominated by the nominating committee was elected.

The Rev Howard Kishpaugh, chairman, Resolutions Committee, presided as these resolutions were presented.

The Ven Paul Wheeler presented the following resolutions.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the General Convention of 1967 has prepared amendments to the Constitution of The Episcopal Church which will remove the distinction between Dioceses and Missionary Districts for all jurisdictions within the territory of the United States if finally adopted at the General Convention in 1970, and

WHEREAS, the Bishop in his Charge to this Convocation has announced that he will appoint a Committee on Diocesan Status to study changes to the structure, the Constitution, Canons, Charter and By-laws of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii required to erect the Missionary District of Honolulu into a viable Diocese,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this 66th Convocation of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii calls upon the several councils, departments, parishes and missions of this Missionary District of Honolulu to assist and fully support the work of this Committee on Diocesan Status in its work to erect the Missionary District of Honolulu into a viable Diocese, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the churchmen and congregations of this Missionary District accept the challenge of a stringent reordering of parochial and Diocesan priorities so that sufficient funds may be made available to meet our financial responsibilities as a full Diocese.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu, challenged by the action of the 62nd General Convention, recognizes the urgency of assuming full Diocesan status, and

WHEREAS, a major requirement is the financial ability to provide for realistic mission clergy salaries, and

WHEREAS, the major source of financing for such a purpose is the parish and mission assessments, and

WHEREAS, the Finance Committee of the Diocese, by canon law, is authorized to review and change, as necessary to meet Diocesan needs, the assessments and quotas assigned to parishes and missions, and

WHEREAS, the Finance Committee, realizing the import of such action, asks for the endorsement of Convocation,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Convocation endorse the intent of the Finance Committee to study existing mission clergy salary structures and make such changes as are necessary to provide for a realistic and equitable mission clergy salary schedule, and to increase existing assessments and quotas to provide financing for such a program.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, January 11, 1969 will be the 25th anniversary of the consecration of the Rt Rev Harry S Kennedy, as the Bishop of the Missionary District of Honolulu, and

WHEREAS, this 66th Convocation of the said Missionary District wishes to express its affection and loyalty to him by recognizing his devotion to Christ and His Church.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the 67th Convocation meeting in Honolulu February 14, 1969 be designated the Bishop Kennedy 25th Consecration Anniversary Convocation and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the 67th Convocation Banquet be in honor of the Rt Rev and Mrs Harry S Kennedy.

Each resolution was approved as presented.

Mr Harlan Benner, St Andrew's Cathedral, explained withdrawal of a resolution on review of Diocesan assessments, as other motions covered the matter.

Bishop Hanchett presented this resolution.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the parishes and missions of our Diocese show a widediversity, and frequently a lack of agreement, in their understanding and interpretation of Christian stewardship, and

WHEREAS, we as Christians recognize our committment to Christ and His Church, and that this committment involves total accountability to God for all that we have and all that we do, and

WHEREAS, the Church today faces a challenge to strengthen its influence and assure its relevance in such matters as those related to Church change and renewal, urban and racial crises, ecumenical relations, social and political protest movements, and the state of world affairs - a challenge which is as serious as any in the Church's history, and which calls for new perspectives in stewardship,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Episcopal Church in Hawaii affirms the centrality of Christian <u>stewardship</u> principles in all aspects of our life, and calls upon all churchmen and all parishes and missions to examine their activities, programs, and total lives in light of our responsibilities as stewards of Christ, and particularly in relation to demands on our time and talents, as well as on the spending of money,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Episcopal Church in Hawaii affirms the endorsement by the 59th General Convention of the Episcopal Church of the tithe as a standard of giving,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all churchmen, clergy and laity alike, be urged to continuously seek to know and to carry out the work of the Church in whatever ways available to them, to examine the issues and problems before the Church, and to involve themselves in these issues and problems,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all parishes and missions of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii be urged to support, participate in, and contribute to a year - round Diocesan program of stewardship education.

Motion carried.

Mrs Richard Herkner, St Timothy's, presented this resolution.

RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED that this 66th Convocation of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii, following the 1967 Women's Triennium and the 62nd General Convention of the Episcopal Church in the United States which urged the establishment of adequate civil detoxification procedures, call upon the 1968 Legislature of the State of Hawaii for the passage of such legislation as shall allow public drunkenness to be treated as an illness rather than a criminal offence, and provide for the establishment of adequate centers throughout the State for the comprehensive treatment of alcoholics and for the provision of aftercare resources, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the several congregations of the Church in Hawaii call upon their members to contact their State Legislators urging support for the passage of such legislation.

Motion carried.

The Rev W Edwin Bonsey read the following resolution.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the 62nd General Convention gave its support to abortion-law reform that would embody as medical necessity for the termination of pregnancy the criteria of

- (1) serious threat to the physical health of the mother,
- (2) substantial possibility of the child being born badly deformed in body or mind,
- (3) pregnancy resulting from forcible rape or incest,

BE IT RESOLVED that this 66th Convocation of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii recognizes the actions of the General Convention, and commends to the parishes and missions of the Church in these islands a thorough study of the issue of abortion-law reform, a report of such study to be made by the Department of Christian Social Relations to the 67th Convocation.

Motion carried.

The Very Rev John J Morrett submitted this resolution.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church has called for a national and local response to the urban crisis in American life and for commitment of our resources to meet this crisis, and

WHEREAS our Diocesan Bishop has responded to this call by announcing the appointment of a special urban crisis study and action committee,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the 66th Convocation of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii accepts the call of the Presiding Bishop and affirms and supports the action of the Diocesan.

Mr William Dunford, St Christopher's Church, moved an amendment stating

"WHEREAS the Urban Crisis workshop of this Convocation recognizes and recommends the Palama Inter - Church Council proposal to sponsor a community organization of the Palama citizens to the attention of the aforementioned committee for further study and action."

There was no second to the amendment, and the resolution passed as submitted.

Mr Hugh Shearer moved for special order, which was approved, to consider the following two resolutions.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, The United States of America and other free world nations have presently committed over 500,000 military and civilian personnel to the defense of South Vietnam,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Episcopal Church in Hawaii

(1) reaffirms and redeclares its statement of the 64th Annual Convocation, which states:

"THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS reaffirms its belief in the following statement of the Lambeth Conference:

'War as a method of settling international disputes is incompatible with the teaching and example of our Lord Jesus Christ' (Resolution 25, 1930; Resolution 9, 1948; Resolution 106, 1958) and that 'nothing less than the abolition of war itself should be the goal of the nations, their leaders and all citizens.' (Resolution 106, 1958)

WE ALSO REMIND all Christians of their duty to seek peace wherever there are enmity or broken relationships between men and nations; to give where there is need

and to forgive where there has been hurt; and to pray for their enemies.

WE RECOGNIZE that there are occasions when nations are obliged to resort to war as the lesser of two evils, but the Church is ever called at all times to the positive work of reconciliation between men and nations.

WE, THEREFORE, DECLARE that we recognize our involvement in the tragic war in Vietnam as necessary and give our loyal support to our nation's efforts to contain Marxist imperialism in the Far East and to achieve lasting peace.

WE ALSO URGE continued and continual effort by our government to achieve as quickly as possible lasting peace in the troubled area by means of the conference table, the United Nations, and the good offices of the various powers."

- (2) affirms the 1967 General Convention's expression of "gratitude for the loyalty, devotion, and self-sacrifice of all who serve in Vietnam" for the cause of freedom.
- (3) abhors the selective murder of innocent South Vietnamese citizens and their leaders by the Communist forces in support of their terroristic activities.
- (4) offers both spiritual and material support and aid within its capabilities for those people made refugees by the war in Vietnam.

RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS:

(1) reaffirms its belief in the following statement of the Lambeth Conference which was included in the resolution of the 64th annual convocation in February 1966:

"War as a method of settling international disputes is incompatible with the teaching and example of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Resolution 25, 1930; Resolution 9, 1948; Resolution 106, 1958) and that "nothing less than the abolition of war itself should be the goal of the nations, their leaders and all citizens." (Resolution 106, 1958)

(2) affirms its adherence to the statement of the General Convention of 1967 on the War in Vietnam and to the resolution adopted thereunto.

Eleven persons asked to speak on the resolutions, and the Convocation voted to allow each two minutes' time to address the meeting. After hearing from Mr Richard Joiner, St Barnabas'; the Rev Dr Barnhill, Emmanuel; Archdeacon Winkler, Good Shepherd; Mr Ronald Viets, St Barnabas'; and Mr Maynard Standley, Emmanuel; the Convocation interrupted business for Noonday Prayers, led by the Rev Dr Barnhill, and the reading of the Necrology. Upon return to business and special order, the following members spoke; Chaplain Marsh, USA and St Andrew's Cathedral; the Rev Gerald Gifford, Iolani School; Mrs John Keppeler, St John's, Eleele; the Rev Edward P Townsend, St Andrew's Cathedral; Mr Richard Herkner, St Timothy's; and the Rev Howard Kishpaugh, St Stephen's.

Mr Shearer moved adoption of the "long" resolution. The motion was seconded. Mr Ted Clause, Holy Nativity, moved to table the resolution. This motion was seconded and defeated. Voting on the resolution and a re-count vote carried it as submitted.

Mr Shearer then moved adoption of the "short" resolution, which motion was

seconded and defeated

The Rev Dr Wheeler presented the following motions.

That the minutes of the 66th Convocation be prepared and submitted to the Ecclesiastical authority for approval

That an expression of appreciation be extended to Mrs Ralph Adams, Miss Eloise Lawrence, and Mrs Alice Mamiya for the many hours given to the Diocesan Office prior to Convocation.

That an expression of appreciation be extended to the clergy, staff and Cathedral Chapter for all they have done to assist with Convocation, and to St Andrew's Priory for the use of their buildings.

And to the parish of St Peter's for providing their parish hall for the Convocation breakfast.

That the 66th Convocation express appreciation to Bishop and Mrs Ivol I Curtis for the leadership and inspiration given to this occasion.

All motions passed as presented.

Mrs Robert Wilson, All Saints', moved the Convocation send greetings to Miss Katherine Morton. The motion passed by acclamation. The Rev Howard Kishpaugh moved the Convocation send greetings to Bishop Browning of Okinawa, which motion also passed by acclamation.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The following was received after the business of Convocation was completed.

THAT amendments to the Constitution, as set forth below, were proposed to the General Convention of 1967, and, by separate resolves thereof, were directed to be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority of every Diocese and Missionary District, and to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese and of the Convocation of every Missionary District and of the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention, or the Missionary Convocation, or the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, at its next meeting:

I. Various Articles— In Respect of Status of Missionary Districts

A. Article I.

1. THAT the second paragraph of Section 4 of Article I. be amended, to read as follows:

The Church in each Missionary Diocese beyond the territory of the United States of America, which shall have been established by the House of Bishops or by the Constitution, and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, shall each be entitled to representation in the House of Deputies equal to that of other Dioceses, subject to all the qualifications, and with all of the rights, of Deputies, except as otherwise provided in this Constitution. Each such Missionary Diocese, and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, shall prescribe the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen.

- 2. THAT. paragraph 4 of the said Section 2, be amended by substituting "Diocese" for "District" in line 10 thereof.
- 3. THAT Section 6 be repealed.

B. Article II.

1. THAT Section 1 of Article II. be amended to read as follows:

SECTION 1. In every Diocese the Bishop or the Bishop Coadjutor shall be chosen agreeably to rules prescribed by the Convention of that Diocese. Bishops of Missionary Dioceses shall be chosen in accordance with the Canons of the General Convention.

2. THAT Section 3 of Article II. be amended to read as follows:

SEC. 3. A Bishop shall confine the exercise of his office to his own Diocese or Missionary Diocese, unless he shall have

been requested to perform episcopal acts in another Diocese or Missionary Diocese by the Ecclesiastical Authority thereof, or unless he shall have been authorized by the House of Bishops, or by the Presiding Bishop by its direction, to act temporarily in case of need within any territory not yet organized into Dioceses or Missionary Dioceses of this Church.

3. THAT the last sentence of Section 4 of Article II. be amended as follows:

He shall be eligible as Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor of a Diocese, or as a Suffragan in another Diocese, or he may be elected by the House of Bishops as a Bishop of a Missionary Diocese.

4. THAT the last sentence of Section 7 of Article II. be amended as follows:

He shall be eligible as Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor or Suffragan Bishop of a Diocese, or he may be elected by the House of Bishops as a Bishop of a Missionary Diocese.

C. Article III.

THAT Article III. be amended to read as follows:

Bishops may be consecrated for foreign lands upon due application therefrom, with the approbation of a majority of the Bishops of this Church entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, certified to the Presiding Bishop; under such conditions as may be prescribed by Canons of the General Convention. Bishops so consecrated shall not be eligible to the office of Diocesan or of Bishop Coadjutor of any Diocese in the United States or be entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, nor shall they perform any act of the episcopal office in any Diocese or Missionary Diocese of this Church, unless requested so to do by the Ecclesiastical Authority thereof. If a Bishop so consecrated shall be subsequently duly elected as a Bishop of a Missionary Diocese of this Church he shall then enjoy all the rights and privileges given in the Canons to such Bishops.

D. Article V.

THAT Section 1 of Article V. be amended, to read as follows:

SECTION 1. A new Diocese may be formed, with the consent

of the General Convention and under such conditions as the General Convention shall prescribe by General Canon or Canons, (1) by the division of an existing Diocese; (2) by the junction of two or more Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses; or (3) by the erection into a Diocese of an unorganized area evangelized as provided in Article VI. The proceedings shall originate in a Convocation of the Clergy and Laity of the unorganized area called by the Bishop for that purpose; or, with the approval of the Bishop, in the Convention of the Diocese to be divided; or (when it is proposed to form a new Diocese by the junction of two or more Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses), by mutual agreement of the Conventions of the Dioceses concerned, with the approval of the Bishop of each Diocese. In case the Episcopate of a Diocese be vacant, no proceedings toward its division shall be taken until the vacancy is filled. When it shall appear to the satisfaction of the General Convention, by a certified copy of the proceedings and other documents and papers laid before it, that all the conditions for the formation of the new Diocese have been complied with and that it has acceded to the Constitution and Canons of this Church, such new Diocese shall thereupon be admitted to union with the General Convention.

2. THAT Sections 5 and 7 of Article V. be repealed, and the remaining Sections be re-numbered accordingly.

E. Article VI.

1. THAT Section 1 of Article VI. be repealed, and that a new Section 1 be enacted, reading as follows:

Section 1. The House of Bishops may establish a Mission in any area not included within the boundaries of any Diocese of this Church or of any Church in communion with this Church, and elect or appoint a Bishop therefor.

2. THAT the second paragraph of Section 2 of Article VI. be amended so that it shall begin as follows:

Any territorial jurisdiction or any part of the same, which may have been ceded by a Diocese under the foregoing provision, may be retroceded to the said Diocese . . .

3. THAT Section 3 of Article VI. be repealed, and a new Section 3 be adopted, reading as follows:

SEC. 3. The House of Bishops may, in accordance with the Canons, organize a Missionary Diocese beyond the territory of the United States and may constitute any such Missionary Diocese an Associated Diocese of this Church. Such Associated Dioceses shall not be entitled to representation in the House of Deputies of the General Convention; nor shall its Bishop or Bishops be entitled to vote in the House of Bishops thereof if he or they are at the same time members of the House of Bishops of an Associated Province or of a Church or Province in communion with this Church. The provisions of Article X. of this Constitution shall not extend to an Associated Diocese.

F. Article VII.

THAT Article VII. be amended to read as follows:

Dioceses, Associated Dioceses, and Missionary Dioceses may be united into Provinces in such manner, under such conditions, and with such powers, as shall be provided by Canon of the General Convention; *Provided*, *however*, that no Diocese, Associated Diocese, or Missionary Diocese shall be included in a Province without its own consent.

G. Article VIII.

THAT the third paragraph of Article VIII. be amended to read as follows:

Provided, however, that any person consecrated a Bishop of minister in any Associated Diocese of this Church or in any Diocese or Missionary Diocese of an autonomous Church or Province of a Church in communion with this Church may, instead of the foregoing declaration, make the promises of Conformity required by the Church in which he is to minister.

H. Article IX.

THAT the second clause of the second paragraph of Article IX. be amended to read as follows:

Presbyters and Deacons canonically resident in a Missionary Diocese shall be tried according to Canons adopted by the Bishop and Convocation thereof, with the approval of the House of Bishops:

I. Article X.

THAT the first two paragraphs of Article X. be amended to read as follows:

The Book of Common Prayer and Administration of the Sacraments and other Rites and Ceremonies of the Church. together with the Psalter or Psalms of David, the Form and Manner of Making, Ordaining, and Consecrating Bishops, Priests, and Deacons, the Form of Consecration of a Church or Chapel, the Office of Institution of Ministers, and Articles of Religion, as now established or hereafter amended by the authority of this Church, shall be in use in all the Dioceses and Missionary Dioceses, and in the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, of this Church, No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless the same shall be first proposed in one triennial meeting of the General Convention and by a resolve thereof be sent within six months to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese and of the Convocation of every Missionary Diocese and of the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention or Convocation of the Missionary Diocese or of the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, at its next meeting, and be adopted by the General Convention at its next succeeding triennial meeting by a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies and all the Missionary Dioceses, and of the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, voting by orders, each to have the vote provided for in Article I., Sec. 4.

But notwithstanding anything hereinabove contained, the General Convention may at any one meeting, by a majority of the whole number of the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, and all the Missionary Dioceses and the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, voting by orders as previously laid down in this Article. . . .

J. Article XI.

THAT the first paragraph of Article XI. be amended to read as follows:

No alteration or amendment of this Constitution shall be made unless the same shall be first proposed at one triennial meeting of the General Convention and by a resolve thereof be sent to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese and of the Convocation of every Missionary Diocese and of the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention or the Missionary Diocese Convocation or the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe at its next meeting, and be adopted by the General Convention at its next succeeding triennial meeting by a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses and of all the Missionary Dioceses and of the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, voting by orders. each having the vote provided for in Sec. 4 of Article I.

K. Status of Missionary Districts and Bishops thereof in the United States

THAT when the foregoing alterations and amendments become effective, each Missionary District in the territory of the United States shall become a Diocese accepted in union with the General Convention; the Missionary Bishop in charge of each such District shall become the Bishop of such Diocese, if he shall so elect; and such Diocese shall be subject, where applicable, to the Constitution and Canons to which such Missionary District was subject, until the same be altered by the Convention of the new Diocese.

II. Article I., Section 2— Concerning Certain Resigned Bishops

THAT the first sentence of Section 2 of Article I. be, and the same is hereby, amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 2. Each Bishop of this Church having jurisdiction, every Bishop Coadjutor, every Suffragan Bishop, and every Bishop who by reason of advanced age or bodily infirmity, or who, under an election to an office created by the General Convention, or for reasons of mission-strategy determined by action of the General Convention or the House of Bishops, has resigned his jurisdiction, shall have a seat and a vote in the House of Bishops.

III. Article I., Section 4— Lay Persons

1. THAT the first two paragraphs of Section 4 of Article I, be amended to read as follows:

SEC. 4. The Church in each Diocese which has been admitted to union with the General Convention shall be entitled

to representation in the House of Deputies by not more than four Presbyters, canonically resident in the Diocese, and not more than four Lay Persons, communicants of this Church, having domicile in the Diocese; but the General Convention by Canon may reduce the representation to not fewer than two Deputies in each order. Each Diocese shall prescribe the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen.

The Church in each Missionary District which shall have been established in accordance with the Constitution and Canons for the government of this Church, shall also be entitled to representation in the House of Deputies by not more than one Presbyter, canonically resident in the Missionary District, and not more than one Lay Person, communicant of this Church, having domicile in the Missionary District. Each Missionary District shall prescribe the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen. Deputies from such Missionary Districts, except as otherwise provided in the Constitution, shall be subject to all of the qualifications and with all of the rights of Deputies from Dioceses.

2. THAT the foregoing amendment, if adopted by the General Convention of 1970, become effective at once.

IV. Article I., Section 4— Parity in Votes by Orders

THAT the second sentence of the fourth paragraph of Section 4 of Article I. be amended so as to read as follows:

In all cases of a vote by orders, the two orders shall vote separately, each Diocese and Missionary District having one vote in the Clerical order and one vote in the Lay order; and the concurrence of the votes of the two orders shall be necessary to constitute a vote of the House.

V. Article I., Section 7 and Article XI.— Frequency of Meetings of the General Convention

1. THAT Section 7 of Article I. be amended so that the same shall read as follows:

SEC. 7. The General Convention shall meet not less than once in each three years, at a time and place appointed by a preceding Convention; but if there shall appear to the Presiding Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Church or of a successor canonical body having substantially the powers now vested in the Executive Council, sufficient cause for changing the place or date so appointed, he, with the advice and consent of such body, shall appoint another place or date, or both, for such meeting. Special meetings may be provided for by Canon.

- 2. THAT Article XI. of the Constitution be amended so as to change the word "triennial" in lines 3 and 11 thereof to "regular".
- 3. THAT the foregoing amendments to the Constitution take effect immediately upon their adoption.

THE DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

In the early months of the year the Department studied such questions as the Viet Nam War, Poverty, the State Prison Site, Etc. In February two guests met with the Department members to explain the Quaker viewpoint toward the war. In the same month Mr William Brueggeman was sent to a Poverty conference in San Francisco and made his report in March. In April a conference on alcoholics, which went to all of the major islands, was co-sponsored with the Hawaii Committee on Alcoholism. Fr James T Golder of San Francisco was brought to the Islands to be conference leader.

Consequent to reorganization the developing policies of the Department include the following: The Department shall function primarily as an action, rather than a study group. Such study and training as shall be necessary throughout the Diocese for intelligent action shall be done in conjunction with the Christian Education Department. In promoting actions the Department will work to function as a motivating and enabling group for broad based actions in the Diocese and Community rather than seeing itself solely as the doer of action. To this end the Department will cooperate closely with its counterparts in other denominations, with other Departments of the Diocese, and with committees, and other groups, formal or informal, Church-related or otherwise, in order to form a broader base for action and for the exchange of information and support, when the ends and purposes of such other groups coincide with its own. In pursuing such action the Department, being small, will not attempt to cover all major issues simultaneously but will choose specific priorities at given times and focus its energies and resources on those.

In the Fall of 1967 the Department chose two areas of social concern: Abortion Law Reform and Comprehensive Treatment for Alcoholics, upon which it has focused its work. Materials of a broad nature on these two areas were gathered and prepared for distribution to all congregations of the Diocese, together with resolutions to be presented to the 1968 Convocation. Panels composed of recognized experts in each of the above fields were formed for the Convocation Workshops on February 16th.

The Community Services Division of the Department has been busy with plans to help congregations to recruit and offer a small stipend to student workers in summer neighborhood service programs. The Division of World Relief has kept such things as the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, the Church and Race Offering, and the Church World Service Clothing Appeal before the Diocese, each at its own appointed time.

In all of its work the Department has the desire to maintain a close communication with the congregations of the Diocese and to be a means through which the congregations may be drawn together for corporate action, and the channel through which resources may be lent to the congregations for individual information and action.

REPORT OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCHWOMEN OF HAWAII

The Episcopal Church Women of Hawaii feel that there is a great need for change in the types of meetings that are being held on all levels of the women's activities. An ad hoc committee was appointed by the Executive Board to evaluate our meetings especially the Annual Meeting. After much study and discussion the committee felt that we must try to fulfill the women's needs both spiritually and educationally. How we can best serve our Lord in our everyday life is of great concern to the women.

The Newsletter, the only means of communication to the women of the diocese is issued monthly, except in July and August. The women are informed of the activities and coming events of the life of the Church.

The Triennal Meeting held in Seattle, Washington from September 17 to September 23, 1967 was another important event. The following delegates were elected to represent our diocese: Mrs James Hanano, Kohala Missions; Mrs Richard T Herkner, St Timothy's; Mrs Charles Loomis, St Barnabas; Mrs Clifford F Young, St Peter's; and Mrs T C Young (President), St Elizabeth's. The purpose of the 1967 Triennal Meeting was: "Mindful of the demands placed upon us as Christians in a world torn by hate, separateness and the struggles for new life and meaning, 1) What is "women's work?" 2) What are our goals and objectives? 3) What structures do we need?"

Under the direction of the Rev Claude Du Teil, the Executive Board presented a resolution on "Civil Detoxification Procedures" at the Triennial Meeting pertaining to the treatment of alcoholics. The resolution was passed and adopted by the Meeting. The same resolution will be presented to the 66th Convocation as a joint venture with the Christian Social Relations Department of the Diocese.

The Church women were asked by our Bishop Kennedy to implement the "Resolution on Family Life." The Christian Education and the Christian Social Relations chairmen worked together on the resolution and the results of their findings were sent to all presidents, representatives of the Church women in the diocese and to many interested persons.

On October 25, 1967 the General Convention and Triennial delegates gave a joint report to the diocese at St Mary's. I speak not only for myself but also for the other delegates to express our heartfelt thanks for sending us to Triennial and for the invaluable experiences gained from the various meetings we attended.

The women are aware of the mission of the Church and opportunities for service in their communities. They have participated in the "Bishop's Specials" which were:

1) Bishop's Discretionary Fund; 2) Conference Center on Hawaii; 3) Church School equipment for Guam; 4) Building Fund for St George's on Chi Chi Jima. They contributed almost \$6,000. The women are participating in the many ecumenical functions in their communities and at the same time accepting new organizational structures, goals and objectives. The appeal from Presiding Bishop John E Hines concerning the "Urban Crisis" has been partially answered by the women throughout the Church through the United Thank Offering.

The Executive Board accepted Mrs L P Miller's (Treasurer) resignation with regret. We thank her for her faithful and devoted service. Mrs Leonard Werner was appointed to fill that vacancy.

DIOCESAN DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

With the expansion of the Department after the last Convocation to twelve divisions (Schools, Camps and Conferences, Leadership, Episcopal Church Women, Keymen, Liturgy, Evangelism, University Work, College Work, Sunday Schools, Youth and Adult Education), this year has been largely devoted to expansion, restructuring, planning and training.

Youth Division

Prior to the appointment of the Rev Fred Minuth as Youth Director, the Chair-

man helped plan the OEYC Convocation in February. The special guest was the Rev Ian Mitchell who led the conference and helped the attending teenagers to learn his American Folk Mass which was presented at St Andrew's Cathedral. Under Mr Minuth's direction, the OEYC Council organized dances at Holy Nativity in June and at the Cathedral in December

Camps and Conferences

Under the leadership of the Rev R S O Chang, summer camping was planned and operated from July 2 through August 11. Counsellor Training prior to the July 2 opening was led by the Chairman, the Rev Mr Piltz and the Rev Mr Chang. With the enrollment down, the camp lost money this year. Because of the financial problems and a need for improvement in facilities and program, two study committees composed of clergy and laity were established following the camping program. Recommendations have been submitted to the Department and the Bishop on the program and the Mokuleia Center. It is hoped that a new approach on staffing and program will eliminate the financial problem and make it more attractive to campers. It is further hoped that funds may be found to rebuild portions of the Camp.

Clergy Education

Two clergy conferences were held this year. In March, the Rev Dr Carroll Simcox, Editor of the Living Church magazine, led a four day conference. A three day conference with Dr Fitz Allison was held in December. A clergy retreat in May was arranged by the Rev Richard Kirchhoffer and was led by Chaplain A Anderson. The priests and deacons who were new to the Islands were given a two-and-a-half day orientation conference in August. This was led by Bishop Kennedy and various Diocesan Department Chairmen.

Leadership Training

In January the Chairman went to the Eighth Province Meeting in San Francisco that dealt with the problems of coordinating training within the Province. The Chairman helped to train discussion leaders for the Episcopal Church Women in May. The Rev Mr Kirchhoffer, leadership division chairman, and Mrs Phebe Chu worked with the Planning Committee of the Cathedral in a five session training course. The Department cooperated with the Rev Mr Lee's Pacific Urban Program, the United Church of Christ, and Honolulu Council of Churches in a "Community Change Workshop" that was held in May. The Rev Mr Connell was one of the trainers. Two subsequent training efforts were held in October and November as a follow-up to the May Workshop. The Rev Messrs Connell, Piltz, Kirchhoffer, Lee, Dr Walter Strode and other community trainers assisted in these institutes.

Sunday Schools

Teachers' Training was conducted at St Peter's and Emmanuel on Oahu and also for the churches on Kauai. The film strip library was turned over to the Department of Communications though C E helped with the purchase of new film strips. The Birthday Thank Offering cards were printed and distributed to all of the churches in the Islands. Guam has been designated as the recipient of this offering.

Schools

Mr Peter Ogilby started a central information file on the Episcopal Schools in the Islands. He developed a questionnaire that was sent to all schools and then collated the returned information. This is the first step in a long range program that will allow all of the schools to work more closely together. Information was also distributed pertaining to National Episcopal Schools Week.

Liturgy

The Rev Burton Linscott assisted by several clergy arranged for three different

forms of the new trial liturgy for the December clergy conference. He also ordered and distributed the new liturgy and study guide. The Department circulated the recommendations of the Standing Liturgical Commission to all parish and mission clergy.

The Consecration of Bishop Hanchett was planned by the Department. This was done by the Chairman, the Rev Mr Engelcke, the Rev Mr Townsend, Mr John McCreary and Bishops Kennedy and Hanchett.

Adult Education

A Lenten Diocesan School was developed by the Chairman and the Rev John P Engelcke. Four courses were offered and led by the Rev Messrs Crane, Engelcke, Mr John McCreary and Monsignor Daniel Dever. This was well received by over 150 laymen. Another school is planned for this March.

Key Laymen

The Chairman acted as an advisor to this Division and to the Diocesan Key Layman, Mr John Kim.

Episcopal Church Women

This division's report appears separately. The Chairman acted as an advisor to Mrs Juliet Young, President of the ECW and the Board.

Chairman's Other Activities

The Chairman also represented the Diocese in the early studies for an Ecumenical Lay Academy, a Diologue on Education sponsored by the Honolulu Council of Churches and in two speaking engagements with the Maryknoll Sisters and Maryknoll High School.

The Chairman met regularly with the Bishop and Council as a member.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Following election at the 1967 Convocation, the Directors met on March 6, 1967 and elected the following officers:

The Board met four times during the year for the transaction of the business affairs of the Diocese.

Upon the retirement of Miss Morton, the Rt Rev E Lani Hanchett was elected Assistant Secretary and Assistant Treasurer.

In addition to their formal meetings, members of the Board met and counselled with the Bishop and other officers of the Church relative to the conduct of the Church's financial and legal affairs.

Highlights of the year's activities included the following actions:

- 1. Authorized the allocation of \$2,500 for additional construction at St Barnabas'
- 2. Approved the sale of St Timothy's rectory to the State of Hawaii.
- 3. Approved the plans for the restoration of Holy Innocents' Mission and the borrowing of \$14,500 for this project.
- 4. Authorized the allocation of \$3,550 for the rehabilitation of our Church Camp at Kamuela.
- 5. Approved the purchase of a vicarage for St Mary's Mission and a bank loan of \$42,500 to cover the cost of same.
- 6. Authorized the purchase of 7,886 square feet of land adjacent to Holy Trinity Mission and a bank loan of \$31,500 to cover cost of same.
- 7. Allocated the sum of \$978 to cover the cost of reroofing our dormitory at Mokuleia
- 8. Authorized an annual pension of \$1,338 for Miss Katherine M Morton. This is in addition to her Social Security pension and an annual grant from the National Church.
- 9. Approved the purchase of a rectory for St Timothy's Church.
- 10. Authorized the appointment of an Executive Committee of the Board.
- 11. Approved the purchase of the fee of two parcels of land on Papai Street.
- 12. Authorized a bank loan of \$25,000 for repairs and renovations at St Andrew's
- 13. Authorized the purchase of approximately 10,000 square feet of land adjacent to the Church of the Holy Nativity.

DEPARTMENT OF MISSION STRATEGY AND EXTENSION

Specifically, the Department is responsible for analyzing the existing missionary work and projecting areas where the church should be. This could mean recommending consolidating existing missions, closing them, moving them to better locations for service and working ecumenically with other denominations.

The Department is organized into divisions that adequately cover the jurisdiction assigned to it. The divisions and their chairmen are: Urban Strategy, The Very Rev John Morrett; Pacific Urban Program, The Rev George Lee; Island Strategy, The Archdeacons; Ecumenical Relations, The Chairman; MRI, The Rev Charles Crane; Military, The Rev Kenneth Perkins; and Tourists, The Rev Stanley Adams.

Activities of the Department in 1967 were studies in depth by laymen of the Urban Strategy division of the Moililli Community in relation to St Mary's Church and the Leeward area in relation to the existing churches to their present communities and the several new planned communities. Plans are being formulated for a "Metabagdad" Conference to be held in May of 1968. Studies were made of the salaries of the mission clergy with recommendations for appropriate action to the Bishop and Council and the Committee on Finance.

In carrying out the intent of the resolution adopted at last year's Convocation regarding the establishment of new work, the Department is working through the Division of Co-operative Planning of the Hawaii Council of Churches and the denominational heads. Our present area of concern is Mililani Town, a new planned community.

Mission strategy must be flexible. The Community of Urban Crisis, new devel-

opments of high rise condominiums and wholly planned new towns demand of the church a structure that can move rapidly and wisely into new situations that will give the church missionary opportunities to witness through new types of ministry.

THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNICATIONS

The Department is made up of the following committees:

Early in the year the Department, after several meetings, adopted the following statement of purpose: "We believe that inter-parish and intra-diocesan communication of news, ideas and information can be materially improved.

We believe that the purpose of the Communications Department is to recommend to the Bishop and Council ways and means which may improve communications at these levels.

To these ends we propose:

- 1. Establishment of lines of communication.
- 2. Ways and means of implementing such lines.
- 3. Revision and Revitalization of the Diocesan Monthly Publication."

To implement this purpose, the following has been proposed:

- 1. Appointment of a communications person in each parish or mission whose duty shall be to collect and pass on to the Diocesan Communications Department such parish news as might be of Diocesan-wide interest.
- 2. Appointment of a person in each Diocesan Department responsible for collecting and forwarding information to the Communications Department.
- 3. Ask all parishes and missions to send weekly newsletters to Hawaiian Church Chronicle editor.
- 4. To establish contact with Radio and TV media through Public Relations Officer.
- 5. To establish in Diocesan Office, a schedule of parish and diocesan events to prevent conflict and overlapping.
- 6. To furnish to the parishes and missions, for local publication, such special information as is related to diocesan-wide activities.
- 7. To promote subscriptions to "The Episcopalian" and furnish this and other national Church publications with news about the diocese.
- 8. To appoint a semi-official Diocesan photographer to cover events of special diocesan interest.

The Stewardship Committee, while a part of the Department of Communications, functions somewhat independently because of the nature of its work. As of January 1, 1968, the Rev David Kennedy assumed chairmanship of this committee. Members are Frederick Overstreet, Fred Smith, Elroy Chinn, Quon Ming Dang, and Don Johnsen.

During August 1967, the committee invited representatives from all of our Oahu churches to a meeting at Bishop Kennedy's home to discuss problems and share experiences with Every Member Canvasses. It has prepared for distribution to all parishes and missions for use in local newsletters or leaflets short paragraphs on stewardship.

DIOCESAN KEYMAN'S REPORT

The diocesan keymen's group had an active and fruitful year during 1967.

We started the year with two major activities in February. At the request of Bishop Kennedy, keymen agreed to provide supper to delegates and guests to Convocation.

Father and son Washington's Birthday Corporate Communion and breakfast was sponsored by the group on February 22nd with Bishop Kennedy and other clergy officiating. Keynote speaker was Dr Chandler W Rowe, President of Hawaii Loa College.

On September 30, 1967 the laymen's annual banquet was held at the Youth Center of the Church of the Holy Nativity with 350 men and women in attendance.

A delegation of eighteen Oahu keymen with Archdeacon Paul Wheeler attended a laymen's sponsored conference at Camp PECUSA and met with the men of Maui on November 4th and 5th. The highlights of the conference were:

- 1. Tour of Seabury Hall in Makawao.
- 2. Visitation to St John's Church in Kula.
- 3. Evening Conference at Camp PECUSA.
- 4. Attend rededication service of restored Holy Innocents' Church in Lahaina.
- 5. Held workshop and evening prayer service at Church of the Good Shepherd in Wailuku.

The Bishop's annual Quiet Half-day for men was held at 5:00 p.m. on December 3rd at St Clement's Church. The Rev Dr C F Allison of Virginia Theological Seminary addressed the men.

In 1967 we've held meetings every other month with fairly good attendance of key men to plan and carry out programs for the year. We've also tried a system of calling an executive committee meeting prior to our general meeting, to iron out details for presentation to the group.

THE PACIFIC URBAN PROGRAM OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH

The major milestones in the first complete calendar year were:

Diocesan Planning Committee completes study and recommends diocesan departmental re-structuring to Bishop Kennedy.

Windward Episcopal Churchwomen Workshop on Community Problems which initiated the developement of the Windward Citizens Planning Conference. This is a citizen organization representing communities from Makapuu to Sunset Beach with objective of furthering good social and physical developement. It is funded by local citizens, organizations and business.

Kahaluu Episcopal, Catholic, and Methodist parishes begin planning for a youth service program. Major funding for the three-year program requested of Episcopal Church School Missionary Offering. \$20,000 grant received in December, with other funds from Methodist and Catholic Church, and local foundations. The Rev Richard Kirchhoffer, St John's-by-the-Sea, is chairman of the Board. Staff begins work Jan., 1968

Community Change Workshop for 44 church and secular community workers held at Mokuleia. Training staff from Mainland led by Mr Leon Modeste who is now director of Presiding Bishop's 9 million dollar urban crisis program.

Project '67 started in June. Involved 30 young people in church-sponsored community programs in Palama, Makiki, Moiliili, Kapahulu, and Kahaluu.

Dialogue bagan with Catholics and Buddhists on establishing an Inter-faith Urban Union for training and experimental ministries, at Seabury Hall Missions Conference.

In December the program links up with Model Cities planning with objective of eliminating blight in Waianae-Nanakuli and Kalihi-Palama.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF CANTERBURY HOUSE

The importance of college work in the life and mission of the diocese may be seen from the following facts:

Clergy Candidates. A significant number of vocations to the priesthood are from the college-age group; and, as a diocese seems generally to profit best from local vocations rather than from imports, Canterbury has an important developing and testing role to play at the very core of diocesan life.

Pastoral need. Persons in the college-age segment have more problems to solve and pressures to endure than do persons in almost any other segment of the population. For the period from 17 through 24 years of age is one of rapid transition without the perspective of personal experience and maturity to help. Among the numerous and important personal problems to be solved and tasks to be accomplished during these years are: developing a sense of the independent and self-reliant self, 'accomplishing one's basic studies, achieving adequate sexual adjustment, choosing and rendering military service, establishing one's self in one's work, founding afamily, and becoming an adult Christian. This age group has imperative pastoral needs; and the Church, a heavy responsibility to this population segment.

Population size. The college-age population of Oahu (17-24 year olds) is a most important segment, both quantitatively and qualitatively. The college-age group totals about 80,000, or about 1 in 8, or 12.7% of a total Oahu population of 638,877 (estimate of January 1967). Local colleges enroll 20,000 (UH 17,500; community colleges 2,800; Chaminade 700), or about 3% of Oahu's population. In comparison, those over 65 years of age form only 4% of Oahu's population, and this near equality of population groups is hardly matched by equal program emphasis.

If the Episcopal population percentage of 2.6% (as determined by the Executive Council's research and survey team) holds for the college population, there are at

least 520 Episcopalians enrolled in local colleges.

Qualitatively speaking, the college community is in many ways a potential leader-ship community, and the Church must pay it careful mind, if she is to develop and retain committed churchmen in the community's leadership levels. Moreover, an increasingly better educated society necessitates Christians of good education whose committment is high-level and articulate.

Certain changes in the society have altered radically the college environment and made obsolete many college work programs and policies. Among these changes are:

Sputnik. Today's collegean of 18 was 8 or so at Sputnik and has had tenor so years of enriched, post-sputnik education. He is significantly different in educational attainment and attitude from his pre-sputnik predecessors. Does our present approach in college work consider this?

<u>Viet-Nam.</u> The pressure of the war is felt particularly by males, for whom good marks and continued college enrollment insure a delayed draft call, if not an education. New Selective Service regulations require definitely more rigorous study programs and accomplishments. A new seriousness of effort is noticable among draft-age males. And here we may also ask if the Church is meeting the needs of the local service population of college age, as well as recognizing these new conditions?

Increased professionalism. This pressure is felt by all in the need to excell, so as to get jobs which, with increased automation, may ultimately be less plentiful; and in the need and willingness to master greater amounts of more detailed information, resulting from the knowledge explosion. Does this mean, as seems obvious, that less time is available for the usual college-work activities?

Skyrocketing costs. The increase in the cost of living and of education will continue so far as one can see. This means (1) less reliance in college work on student financial support and, perhaps, (2) the increasing necessity of Church financial help, possibly scholarship aid or other assistance, to the student needy.

Population pressure. Increased need for space to service increased numbers comes at the precise time increased space is more costly. Moreover, the pressure on the University for classroom space may further limit space for non-academic or extra-curricular activities and make even more imperative adequate church-owned college work facilities. Moreover, the increasing frustration born of closed classes and sections in even required courses, thus prolonging a college career, has new pastoral and financial ramifications.

In addition to the foregoing, the further necessity for reconsideration and augmentation of the diocesan college work program is indicated by the following:

The Canterbury program budget is only 1/10th that of the Baptists; about 1/5th that of the United Church of Christ; and about 1/3rd that of the Methodists.

For a major program - or at least a program in the same league with the Methodists, Baptists, and the United Church of Christ, staff augmentation is essential, with budgetary provision - at first - for at least a secretary (student, part-time) and some paid maintenance and up-keep (student, part-time).

Space and building comparisons indicate that Canterbury is alone among other college-work facilities in being of wooden, single-wall construction. Her facilities are the smallest of the University religious student centers.

As student income will never be a major college-work source and as the Executive Council cannot be expected to meet our needs, local funding of Canterbury is a necessity.

The Bishophas authorized an Ad Hoc Commission of students, laymen and clergy to consider future plans, progress, plant, financing, organization, and development of work with the college-age segment of the population of the diocese.

A Committee of inquiry and review is operative at the University considering steps toward a co-operative approach to the campus by the various religious student centers. Presently Newman Club uses Canterbury's chapel.

Progress and planning proceed towards establishing an ecumenical Religious-Cultural Institute which, as one aim, will facilitate the re-orientation of the Church's college work away from the social and the lounge and towards increased understanding of and committment to the religious dimension essential to adult Christian life.

MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITY AND INTERDEPENDENCE IN THE BODY OF CHRIST

1967 was marked by the continuation by most Parishes and Missions of the companionships and projects which they initiated in 1966, and which were reported in the Journal of the Sixty-fifth Convocation, last year.

In addition, a major undertaking was completed in Okinawa and a number of exchanges were utilized to bring the people of Hawaii and Okinawa into a deeper degree of companionship and love.

The building of the new St James Chapel on Miyako island should stand as a monument to MRI. The story is a thrilling one of what Mutual Responsibility is. The cost of the chapel was approximately \$9,000. By doing considerable amounts of the work themselves, the congregation was able to reduce this amount by \$2,000. Through their own sacrifices and dedication they were able to raise \$4,000 on Miyako for the project, leaving a deficit of \$3,000. This amount was accepted by our committee and the Diocesan Council as a project for Hawaii. St Andrew's Cathedral has already raised \$1,000 for this project, and Holy Nativity is designating their 1968 Easter Offering. St John's Church, Eleele, St Paul's Church, Kekaha, St Peter's, Epiphany, and Grace Church, on Molokai, have made up the balance. The Waikiki Chapel raised \$600.00 for pews. This project is a true example of all of us doing what we can jointly to accomplish a project.

During the Summer, two young people of the Diocese and one of our Priests went to Okinawa to work among their people, while one of their Priests came to Hawaii on an exchange to share his wisdom and devotion with us.

Joel Kennedy and Wilma Chang joined a work camp composed of Japanese and Okinawan students who helped finish St James' Chapel and another preaching station on the island of Miyako, and also assisted with other maintenance projects on Okinawa, itself. The Rev George Hayashi spent eight weeks in the Ryukyus preaching at each mission and getting to know the people of the Church there. The Rev Paul Nakamura came to Hawaii and met people on all islands and preached on eight different Sundays at different parish and mission churches. To all who got to know him, the Rev Mr Nakamura was a true ambassador for Christ.

The summer of exchanges was climaxed by the visitation of the Okinawa delegation to General Convention in September. The eleven delegates toured the churches on Oahu and were feted at a dinner at St Mary's Church, as well as a luncheon at St Clement's. While in Honolulu they spoke to a meeting of the Women of Holy Nativity.

The attainment of their status as a Missionary District of the Episcopal Church and the election of the Rev Edmond L Browning as the first Bishop of Okinawa was an event for which we are most grateful, and is in part another fruit of our MRI Companionship.

MRI is far more than overseas projects and happy visits. It is the call for rebirth and restructuring of the whole Anglican Communion, our individual Dioceses, and our parishes and missions. We have all gained much in inspiration and insight from our Okinawa Companionship. But this ends in September of this year.

Now, in the Spirit of MRI we must begin to look seriously at our own Diocese. The challenges before us, many of which are being presented at this Convocation, will demand that our resources, our prayers, and our labors for Christ be focused on becoming more responsible, ourselves, in the payment of vicars' salaries, in the increasing of Diocesan Assessments, and in restructuring ourselves so that we will be ready when Diocesan Status is upon us in 1970.

Some indications of support for intra-diocesan MRI have already manifested themselves. Several parishes have programs to assist with building debts of smaller missions in the Diocese, and this is as it should be.

Increasingly, we will have to be more self-supporting, more responsible, and more studied in how we spend our money, how we organize our mission, and how we proclaim Christ's Word to our islands. This is the challenge of MRI in the year ahead -- and in 1969 -- and in the years to come.

ANNUAL REPORT OF SEABURY HALL

In 1961 this diocese launched its Episcopal Centennial Advance Program (ECAP) anticipating raising funds for many needs in the diocese. The original brochure spoke about setting aside \$25,000 for "a girls' school on Maui." That capital funds campaign has come and gone. Moneys have been received and allocated. There is now a school for girls on Maui called Seabury Hall - named after the first American bishop, Rt Rev Samuel Seabury of Connecticut, as a part of this diocesan structure. As we conclude the 1967 fiscal year, half way through the 1967-68 academic year and fourth year of the school, it has been necessary to raise in capital needs to start the school adequately, an amount in excess of one half million dollars - twenty times what ECAP designated as a necessary start. We are very grateful to our many friends who have made this growth possible. In no way has the diocese abondoned the school after the initial ECAP allocation.

What has been done with one half million dollars? Now on the ten acre campus are a sixty girl dormitory, two hundred seat chapel, a doubles sized tennis court, a filtered, heated, recreation swimming pool, residences for ten faculty and staff families, seven classrooms plus two science labs plus an art studio, a completely renovated kitchen to feed six hundred meals per day, acquisition of a fleet of five cars, a library of six thousand volumes less the library building in which to house them, two acres of playing fields, and landscaping of ten acres of the campus. All this has been done in those four years since the property of Katharine McGrew Cooper was deeded to the church. That's not bad for a start considering it happened on an outer island!

A school, as a church, is people. It is the people of Seabury Hall who make the school one of godly and sound learning. Some of the girls we first knew as pre-adolescent twelve year olds are now lovely young ladies of fifteen and sixteen. These teen years are awesome but glorious ones. Our first brood of students have flown the coop to colleges across the nation. The first graduation class of fourteen have proved the quality of education we offer by demonstrating success in their advanced learning situations. The second class is a bit larger - twenty - and thoroughly enjoying their senior year as big wheels. They are making their applications to institutions of higher learning with the advantage of full accreditation by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges.

We find the demand for residential facilities for girls in grades seven through twelve is greater than our dormitory allows. Thus we now seek to expand the dormitory facilities as quickly as funds can be received. Current plans call for a two story, twenty girl dorm with faculty residences attached. We still need about \$60,000 with one third of this amount on hand. This project is related to the collateral need for a student lounge facility adjacent to the original dorm unit.

Because we are small, economy of funds and energy dictate that we concentrate on doing a few jobs well and that we refrain from too much academic diversity. Thus we offer in all six grades the five major subjects of English, history, science, math and French. Because we are a girls' school our art and music work is complimentary to the college prep course. Since we are a church school, we study appropriate subjects at all grades and live a liturgical life as befits people who call themselves Christians.

We will depend heavily upon the people of Maui to help where needed. Local residents who serve as library assistants, athletic coaches and speakers augment our academic life and give skills not available to us otherwise. Our athletic program runs from pistol shooting to synchronized swimming and horseback riding. Our choir and dramatic productions give the audiences goose bumps. Our annual and newspaper give you a real picture of the school. Our student tutors give a zest for learning to local grade school students. Our girls give parties like seasoned social directors. The Makawao climate gives us mountain air, energy, and valley vistas that Mark Twain wrote about eighty-five years ago. Once you have visited the campus, you will never forget its beauty.

Because we are Christians we believe God wants us to do well in that which we undertake. I think we are being obedient to His will for us. We offer ourselves, our teaching talents and our hopes and aspirations for a houseful of great youngsters to God asking that he use us all as his servants. We ask you for your continued prayers. We welcome your personal visits, and we need your resources as God's people to sustain us.

REPORT OF ST ANDREW'S PRIORY

Centennial Year

The year of 1967 marked the centennial of the school's founding on Ascension Day, May 30th, 1867, by Mother Sellon, the foundress of the Society of the Most Holy Trinity whose members in present times are resident at Ascot Priory, Ascot Berkshire, England. The high point of the year was the celebration of the event on Ascension Day (May 4th) by a festival evensong in St Andrew's Cathedral on the eve followed by a reception in Davies Hall - an ecumenical occasion - in keeping with the trend of our times. Religious from local Roman Catholic educational circles were present in great numbers. On the morning of Ascension Day a Sung Eucharist in the Cathedral was our "sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving" for the Priory's century of providing for the girls of Hawaii "educational excellence and equality, practicality and the very best of Christian culture" that Queen Emma, the school's royal patroness, desired. After this there was a procession of students, faculty, honored guests and clergy to the Coral Cross festively decorated with flowers where a commemoration of the founding Sisters and all who served the Priory in the past was held. There were refreshments for all and much activity by photographers, professional and amateur. Among the honored guests were Mother Edith of Ascot Priory and her young companion, Sister Pamela; our own Superior, Mother Esther; Sister Olivia, the first Transfiguration superior at the Priory; Sister Grace, a former Priory teacher; and Dom Anthony Damron of the Anglican order of Benedictines (St Gregory's Priory, Three Rivers, Michigan); as well as many former faculty members, friends, some coming from the Mainland for the occasion; and of course numbers of former students.

On May 30th the Centennial Luau was held on the Priory campus, sponsored by both the Alumnae Association and the Parent-Teacher Fellowship.

Centennial Souvenir Books have been published to record the events of the year

and also the pertinent facts in the one hundred years of the history of St Andrew's Priory school for Girls.

Priory Expansion Program

The St Andrew's Priory Expansion Program was drawing to a successful conclusion at the end of 1967. The gymnasium/auditorium, last of five major construction projects, was completed and occupied in September, 1967. A dedication ceremony with the Rt Rev Harry S Kennedy officiating, was held on Tuesday afternoon October 3, 1967. Included in the construction was the renovating of offices for use by the Physical Education Department and one classroom. The gymnasium is a very welcome addition to the Priory campus, with its spacious facilities appreciated and enjoyed by all students in grades 1 through 12. The new multi-purpose floor is ideal, enabling the school to schedule all types of gatherings, activities and there-by obtain maximum utilization of the building.

All construction costs have been paid in full to date. Total cash received as of December, 1967 was \$458,237.71. Total pledged was \$502,389.98. Construction costs and other expenses amounted to \$446,640.36.

Still to be constructed is a utility, storage and carport structure to replace obsolete, wornout buildings demolished in the fall of 1967.

Priory Pension Plan

In 1967 the Priory took a huge step forward in the area of employee relations by establishing a Pension Plan for all employees on full time duty who elect to participate. The plan provides for retirement benefits for all employees, including faculty, office staff, cafeteria staff, maintenance staff.

The plan was written by Johnson & Higgins, Employee Benefit Plan Consultants, approved by the Priory Council, and went into effect September 1, 1967. The Hawaiian Trust Co is administering the funds under the guidance and direction of a Pension Plan Committee.

Enrollment

There was a slight increase in enrollment during the latter part of the year reflected in grades 9 - 12, but a slight decrease in grades 1 - 8. The increase fortunately occurred in the high school level where it can be absorbed more readily without overcrowding of classrooms. It continues to be our intention to keep the enrollment close to the 600 mark for the provision of a high quality education, academic, physical, social and religious for each student. On December 31, 1967 the enrollment was 621 students. Faculty and staff totaled 61.

Graduates of 1967

Of the 60 girls we graduated in June, 55 are attending universities and colleges here in Hawaii and in fourteen states. Three are presently working and two are traveling. Karen Nikaido, a member of this class and Student Government President during her senior year, received the first place award in the "Living Church" essay contest, presented to her by the editor of the magazine, The Rev Carroll Simcox during his visit to Hawaii last spring. She also received the Soroptomist Citizenship award for the state, and received a substantial Scholarship grant from Rice University which she is now attending. Another member of this class, Lorraine Hee, was one of three girls in the Priory to win a photography award in the Hawaii Regional Scholastic Art Exhibit.

Maile Allen wrote the script and directed the Queen Emma Centennial Pageant. In recognition of her service to the community she received the Distinguished Youth Service Award ring for dedicated interest in Hawaiian culture, sponsored by the Honolulu High School Association, the Rural Oahu Student Government Association, and Liberty House. She was also the recipient of a copy of a resolution adopted by the House of Representatives of the State Legislature commending her for her work among youth. Helen Lui, an outstanding member of the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council exhibited unusual leadership ability as the State President of the Council. Loreen Lee, Evelyn Matsuyama, and Marilyn Yabuta, participants in the Junior Miss Contest each received an award for accomplishment in some specific category. We shall follow with interest the careers of these girls in the years ahead.

Since we continue to attempt to provide "the very best in Christian culture" in accordance with the basic reason for the school's foundation, daily worship in the chapel services held in the Cathedral and instruction in the Christian faith are part of the curriculum of each student. We regret that lack of time due to the demands of the present academic needs, and the extra-campus, and co-curricular activities on the campus prevents frequent informal contacts especially with the girls from the families having no active religious affiliation.

Extra-Campus Activities

Because there is the danger of becoming in-grown in an atmosphere of academic pursuits and the meeting of college entrance requirements great stress is put on outside activities that encourage good citizenship attitudes and the broadening of interests. The Priory choir sang for Convocation; at the Evensong on the Eve of Ascension Day in the Cathedral; at the festival Eucharist on Ascension Day; at the St Andrew's Day Evensong; the festival of Lessons and Carols; and at the luncheon given for Bishop Hanchett on the day of his Consecration. All this meant many hours of hard practice of music of a superior quality. Hui Hauoli, the Hawaiian Club, entertained at a dinner given at St Mary's Church for the Okinawan delegates to General Convention. The Companions of St Andrew decorated the Cathedral for Thanksgiving with fruit and vegetables donated from the student body and later given to Shriners' Hospital. The Tennis team placed second in the State Tournament. On March 5th a representative group of Priory students was present for the service commemorating the centennial of the Laying of the Corner Stone of the Cathedral. The Priory float won second place in the Aloha Week Parade in the division of schools and religious organizations. This was another activity that took many long hours of dedicated work on the part of students and faculty. Bunnie Konno and Charlotte Yoneda of the class of '68 received placques for the best editorial and editorial cartoon respectively in the state SCOOP (high school journalistic association) Conference. Valerie Yap and Charlotte Yoneda both of the present Senior Class and Lorraine Hee '67 were among the Gold Key Winners in the photography section of the Hawaii Regional Scholastic Art Exhibit. Bunnie Konno placed third among approximately 700 11th graders in the United Nations Essay Contest. Susan Ibara '68 and Bunnie Konno '68 are elected members of the Oahu Interschool Pacific and Asian Affairs Council. Charlene Kubo, president of the Priory Student Government is also vice-president of the Honolulu High School Association. Claudette Fong '68 is a member of the Liberty House Hi-Board. Seniors Sharon Spencer and Jasmine Won were student representatives at the Mayor's Urban Renewal Conference. Bunnie Konno and Mary Fingerhut received Letters of Commendation in the National Merit Scholarship Examination, missing being Merit Scholars by only two points each!

Other activities involving large groups of Priory students from time to time during the year were; the University of Hawaii Model United Nations; PAAC Seminars, Conferences and Workshops; Hawaii Spelling Bee; St Francis Hospital Work-Experience Day; Teen Age Assembly of America; in the various community services sponsored by

the Volunteer Service Bureau; Junior Stockholders Club; Girls' State; Hawaii State Leadership Institute; Inter-school speech and athletic activities; St Andrew's Cathedral Market; baby-sitting during Convocation; preparing The Hawaiian Church Chronicle for mailing.

Use of School Facilities

The campus or classrooms were used for the following: Convocation Laymen's Supper, February 1967; for the Lenten School, for Church school classes by the Cathedral and St Peter's; during the summer by the Singer Sewing Machine Company for a sewing school.

Benefactors

The student body has not only had the benefit of those who subscribed to the Expansion Program, but also profited greatly once again for their assistance to the Associates of the Transfiguration in their sale of "The World's Finest Chocolate". The net proceeds were \$9,418.00, of which \$2,944.21 went to provide scholarships, grants and awards to the deserving and the balance to support the many activities and services of the students for which neither the student funds nor the Operating Budget can provide.

ANNUAL REPORT OF IOLANI SCHOOL

On September 6, 1966 Iolani commenced its 104th year with a record enrollment of 1,181 boys, 405 in the Lower School and 776 in the Upper School.

A total of 161 boys were granted scholarship aid in the amount of \$76,433. Iolani graduated 130 boys in the Class of 1967; 88 enrolled in 56 different mainland universities, two graduates entered the USNaval Academy, 37 entered the University of Hawaii, one joined "Up With People", two joined the military. Thirty boys accepted college scholarships totaling \$40,300.

Eleven members of the Class of 1967 received Letters of Commendation from the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, and two, Stephen Chang and Kenneth Terry were semi-finalists, and Kenneth Terry was a finalist and scholarship winner.

The Iolani boys had a fine year in athletics in 1966-67. Iolani produced an ILH championship team in bowling. Football produced two All Stars; John Parker and Richard Lolotai. The golf team produced the State Individual Champion, Steve Dankof. Rowing again dominated. Swimming saw Bob Cooper and Ken Terry as the ILH and State champions with Terry selected as All American in the breast stroke. Iolani swimmers had an All American medley relay team of Bob Cooper, Mike Jackson, Ken Terry and Jim Buckley. In tennis Iolani took the State Championship for the third year in a row. Peter Isaak won the singles ILH and State champion while Kent Sunderland and Alton Takabayashi teamed for the doubles championship.

The 440 State and ILH championships in track were won by Greg Hayashi and Stan Sadowski respectively.

In Water Polo, Iolani won the State and ILH championship, along with the Kamehameha Invitational. Three boys, Bob Cooper, Dave Carlson and Kenneth Terry were named All Americans.

In Wrestling, Mark Sasaki, Wesley Oh and Miles Miyamoto were ILH champions.

In another area of endeavor our parents, faculty and students, under the general chairmanship of George Sakoda, put on a magnificent Carnival in April, 1967. In two days they grossed a record of \$75,043.32, and netted for the school's Building Fund, \$36,274.74, the highest amount ever received from a Carnival.

Iolani dedicated the new Library-Learning Center, ten new Upper School class-room wing, and the new Lower School at a special service of dedication on Saturday, May 13, 1967.

For the 1967-68 year the school operated on a budget of \$1,448,485.00 with total assets as of June 30, 1967 (the end of the fiscal year) of \$4,309,365.00 in plant equipment, endowment and operating fund balance.

REPORT OF ST JOHN'S CHURCH SCHOOL, GUAM

From the planning stage to the present day, St John's School is witness to the tenacity and spirit of accomplishment among the members of the Church and interested parents from the island community. The School opened in 1962, and during the first year, the buildings were destroyed by a typhoon. Temporary tent classrooms were blown away a few months later by a second typhoon. These experiences did not daunt the determination of our people to have a school! At the request of Bishop Kennedy, the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church granted the school a \$30,000 grant. With this and supplementary funds raised on Guam, the first permanent typhoon-proof building was erected for the Kindergarten through the Sixth Grade. Additional funds were solicited locally and the following year saw the second permanent building go up for Junior High classes and a small library. The funds for operating the school and for capital improvements were derived solely from tuitions and from community donations. The School was now operating and offering an exceptional program from Kindergarten through the Ninth Grade.

In July 1966, the Rev Jordan B Peck, Jr arrived as Vicar of the Church and Headmaster of the school. His wife, Dr Maryly Van Leer Peck assumed responsibilities as Academic Director of the school. In their first year many improvements were made in the academic program, classrooms and grounds. The Library tripled its books to approximately 3,000 through taking full advantage of grants under the ESEA Title II program entitling private and parochial schools to obtain books from Federal Funds; teaching aids and equipment - almost non-existent - were added to the school stock; enrollment increased to 251 students; faculty increased and now there are eleven full-time and four part-time teachers with US College degrees and teaching certificates. In June 1967, the Rev Thomas R Heimann, formerly the Chaplain at St Andrew's Priory, Honolulu for four years, became the Assistant Headmaster and School Chaplain. Daily chapel services are now held and Religious Education is being offered for the first time to the Junior High school.

This year the worn out, typhoon-damaged classroom furniture was replaced, insulated ceilings and extra lighting were added to all classrooms, and some playground development was accomplished through the generous United Thank Offering grant and other gifts. The pledged commitment from the Episcopal Church Women of Hawaii has been designated for playground equipment. School clocks were put in all classrooms and the exterior of two buildings were painted. Due to the overwhelming demand from the community, a second section of the Seventh grade was created which necessitated

the hiring of another faculty member.

Increased space is required so that classes may be added at some grade levels, and the junior high school program made more flexible. In order to provide this extra space and to increase the severely crowded library space, it is hoped to build a Library building coordinated with an administration section, nursing station, and storage facilities between the two main class buildings. This new building will free the present administrative and library space for at least three classrooms.

Recent bulldozing below the cliffline has created a shelf of useful land for construction. Housing is critical on Guam, and it has been proposed that faculty and staff apartment units be built on this shelf.

The pains of beginning are being overcome, and a measure of successful operation is certainly evident. The loss of accreditation of the Guam Public Schools last year has been probationally regained through another association, but is still perilous. The Roman Catholic parochial schools remain overcrowded. Being the hub of the USTrust Territory area, there is constant pressure on the schools of Guam for basic needed space. The goal of St John's is to offer a challenging academic program for the above average student, incorporating with it our philosophy of moral and spiritual growth. Planned objectives include site improvements, playing fields and courts, showers and restrooms. To continue to provide the present fine quality of education to both military and local communities, additional funds are an ever-present necessity. These funds are obtained by active solicitation of the local businesses which have generously supported the school. Funds to create an endowment, which will insure greater stability in operation and eventually provide for larger needs of the school are vitally needed. These must come from sources other than those on this island. In order to continue this needed and good contribution to Guam's community, monetary assistance is actively being sought for endowments and specific needs.
