MINUTES OF THE SECOND ANNUAL CONVENTION
OF THE DIOCESE OF HAWAII

Saturday, October 3, 1970

Assembled in St. Andrew's Priory School gymnasium on the third day of October, 1970, the Second Annual Convention of the Diocese of Hawaii was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by the Bishop of Hawaii, the Rt. Rev. E. Lani Hanchett.

A quorum was declared present. The Bishop appointed the following tellers:

Mr. Fred Denison, Chairman Mrs. Glen Burdick
The Rev. H. Richard Myers The Rev. Malcolm E. Turnbull

The Bishop announced with regret that Mr. Hugh Shearer had resigned as Chancellor, and that he was nominating Mr. James Tabor as the replacement. The delegates voted unanimous approval. Whereupon, the Ven. Paul Wheeler offered the following resolution, which was also unanimously approved:

WHEREAS, Hugh Shearer has announced his retirement from active participation as the Chancellor of the Diocese, and

WHEREAS, he has served this Diocese for many years as the Assistant Chancellor, and a member of the Board of Directors, and

WHEREAS, his wise counsel has been beneficial to the Episcopal Church in Hawaii,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Annual Convention of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii express its deep gratitude to Hugh Shearer for his years of devoted and unselfish service, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of this Convention be instructed to record this resolution in the annals of said Convention.

The Bishop nominated Mr. Henry F. Budd to continue as Diocesan Treasurer. The delegates voted unanimous approval.

The Rev. Kenneth D. Perkins, nominated as Secretary of the Convention, and Mr. Arthur Martin as Assistant Secretary, were both duly elected.

The Bishop welcomed the new clergy and their wives and the new Director of Religious Education:

The Rev. Rudolph A. Duncan presented a petition from St. Mary's Mission, Honolulu, in quest of parish status. The Convention later took favorable action on the petition.

The report of the Study Committee on Representation was presented by its chairman, the Rev. Claude F. Du Teil, and was accepted by the Convention. The Committee was discharged with the thanks of the Bishop.

The report of the Study Committee on Diocesan Assessments was presented by its chairman, the Rev. W. Edwin Bonsey, and it was accepted.

The report of the Study Committee on Staggered Terms for members of the Board of Directors was presented by its chairman, Mr. Ernest Uno, and was accepted.

The report of the Study Committee on Resolution XXIII of the Primary Convention to abolish the distinction between parishes and missions was presented by its chairman, Mr. Albert Oki, and it was accepted.

The Bishop then read a list of appointments to Standing Committees, which are not subject to vote. The list appears elsewhere in the Journal of the Convention.

The chairman of the Resolutions Committee, the Rev. Charles H. Smith, presented the following resolutions:

1. Resolution regarding Diocesan Canon XIX to change the number of regional members serving on the Diocesan Council from six to seven, was passed.

2. Resolution to continue the former District Deaneries on

a provisional basis until the 1971 Diocesan Convention, was passed.

3. Resolution on the Hawaiian Church Chronicle led to considerable discussion, during which a move to table the resolution was defeated. A motion to delete the final paragraph of the resolution was passed, and the revised resolution was then approved.

(A recess was called from 10:50 a.m. to 11:05 a.m.)

4. A lengthy discussion ensued, regarding the submission of resolutions to the Resolutions Committee 48 hours prior to the Convention. A resolution calling for the submission of resolutions 60 days before a Convention was introduced, with the alternative provision for the approval of two-thirds of the assembled Convention to allow for bringing in a resolution covering a new subject. The resolution failed to pass.

5. A resolution requesting parish status for St. Mary's Mission, Honolulu, was passed unanimously.

6. 1) The resolution on apportionment as amended was passed with a vote by orders as follows:

Lay	99 for	31 against
Clergy	31 for	9 against

2) A resolution to effect a more equitable apportionment of delegates from parishes and missions was introduced, thoroughly discussed, and finally passed with a vote by orders as follows:

Lay	94 for	37 against
Clergy	29 for	12 against

The Bishop concurred in both votes.

7. A resolution calling upon the Church to provide counsel and refuge in times of stress was voted down due to the ambiguities of its wording.

8. The following resolution on the Authorship of Resolutions was carried:

When a resolution is presented to the Resolutions Committee, the person or persons submitting the resolution is instructed to include the name of the submitter or sponsor. If the name of the submitter or sponsor is not included in the submission to the Resolutions Committee, the resolution will not be accepted.

9. A resolution seeking to inform the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church as to the reaction of our Diocese to their recent resolution on "The Crisis in American Life," was lost when a vote was taken on tabling the resolution.

A vote of thanks was acclaimed for the women of Calvary Church, who prepared the breakfast, and the women of Holy Nativity, who gave the afternoon sherry hour.

A standing ovation was given to the new Chancellor for his good humor and cool manner in his first Convention.

Thanks were expressed to Alice Mamiya and her assistant, Ruby Nakamura, for helping with the Convention.

The Bishop gave his blessing and the Convention adjourned at 6:45 p.m.

RESOLUTIONS AS PRESENTED AT SECOND CONVENTION

RESOLUTION I

Action Taken: Passed

WHEREAS, Canon XIX, entitled Diocesan Council, provides for six regional members to assist in carrying out the responsibility for the development, prosecution, and review of the program and mission of the Diocese as directed by Convention and in the interim between Conventions, and

WHEREAS, the region of Honolulu has been divided into two separate regions, and

WHEREAS, that new region known as East Honolulu should be represented by an elected member, as are other regions,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the following sections of Canon XIX be amended to read as follows:

Section 1, line five, "...and seven regional members who shall be communicants and who shall be elected as described in Section 3."

Section 3, lines one, two, and three, "The seven regional members of the Council shall represent, respectively, the regions known generally as Hawaii, Maui, Kauai, Windward Oahu, Honolulu, East Honolulu, and Leeward Oahu."

RESOLUTION II

Action Taken: Passed

WHEREAS, District Deaneries were established by resolution of

Diocesan Council on April 12, 1970 on a provisional basis, pending formal action by the Convention of the Diocese of Hawaii, and

WHEREAS, District Deaneries as local program and policy-making bodies have only functioned for a period of six months or less, which is insufficient time for full utilization and evaluation of District Deaneries within the Diocese of Hawaii, and

WHEREAS, an additional period of time is required for further operation of the District Deaneries and for better evaluation of the Deaneries, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that District Deaneries as established by the Diocesan Council on April 12, 1970 shall continue to function on a provisional basis, pending formal action by the 1971 Convention of the Diocese of Hawaii, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Diocesan Council of the Diocese of Hawaii shall review the performances of the several provisional District Deaneries prior to taking formal action at the 1971 Convention of the Diocese of Hawaii.

RESOLUTION III

Action Taken: Passed

WHEREAS, the Hawaiian Church Chronicle is legally a subscription publication, qualifying for a special mailing rate thereby, and

WHEREAS, newspapers in general and church newspapers and even church newsletters not infrequently secure support for their expenses by offering advertising space for sale, and

WHEREAS, other dioceses, from whose quota payments we receive considerable budget subsidy and which (dioceses) have had to change to mimeograph form for their diocesan newspaper (still selling ads, to pay for even the mimeographed form) while we have taken on an eight-page, no-ad, beautifully done format, and

WHEREAS, we want the best newspaper we can have, subject to such limitations as our finances shall dictate, and

WHEREAS, the Bishop in his opening remarks at this Convention has reminded us that good stewardship requires thoughtful, impartial evaluation of programs as we go along, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bishop be, and hereby is, asked to appoint an impartial committee of three clergy and three lay persons, the lay persons not necessarily churchmen but, most importantly, persons with skill in journalism and newspaper publication, to evaluate the Hawaiian Church Chronicle as to its format, makeup,

and other technical newspaper matters, and to develop a feasibility study on the use of advertisements and other means of helping pay for the publication costs, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this impartial study and evaluation committee be, and hereby is, instructed to report to the Diocesan Council monthly on its findings in order that Council may develop ways to carry out the intent of this Convention resolution, Council being "Convention-in-recess" or "Convention-between-Conventions," so that we do not have to wait a full year before action can be taken.

RESOLUTION IV

Action Taken: Passed

WHEREAS, St. Mary's Episcopal Mission, Honolulu, Hawaii, of the Diocese of Hawaii, has been a mission in this Diocese since 1902, and

WHEREAS, St. Mary's Episcopal Mission has assumed all financial obligations for the years 1969 and 1970 including support of its Vicar, and

WHEREAS, the financial status of St. Mary's Mission is strong and healthy and will enable this mission as a Parish to support its Rector, and

WHEREAS, St. Mary's Mission is actively serving its congregation, its community, and its Diocese, and

WHEREAS, the congregation of St. Mary's Episcopal Church rejoices in being able to help our new Diocese in its efforts toward self-support, and

WHEREAS, the Bishop's Committee of St. Mary's Mission on March 8, 1970 voted to recommend to the congregation of St. Mary's that they apply for status as a Parish, and

WHEREAS, the congregation of St. Mary's Mission has overwhelmingly approved this course of action, and

WHEREAS, the congregation does accede to the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church in the United States and to those of the Diocese of Hawaii and promises obedience to the Canons, and conformity to the doctrine, discipline and worship of the Episcopal Church, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bishop and the Diocese of Hawaii be requested to issue a Certificate of Erection of St. Mary's Mission into a Parish of this Diocese at the Convention of the Diocese of Hawaii, sitting in session October 2, 3, and 4, 1970.

RESOLUTION V

Action Taken: Passed

WHEREAS, the present constitution designates that each parish shall have five lay delegates to Convention and each mission shall have three lay delegates, and

WHEREAS, the present apportionment bears no relation to congregation size and results in such gross misrepresentation that 2% of our people have more delegate strength in Convention than another 38% of our people, and

WHEREAS, the present apportionment of delegates is based solely on financial self-support and results in such gross financial misrepresentation that persons contributing only 4% of the funds to support diocesan programs have more delegate strength in Convention than persons giving 50% of the funds, and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of this Convention to apportion delegates more nearly proportionally on the basis of communicant numbers as well as financial self-support, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the third paragraph of Section 1, Article VII of the Constitution of the Diocese of Hawaii be amended to read as follows:

"Lay delegates chosen by the congregation of each parish and mission which shall not have forfeited its rights to representation. The number of delegates from each parish and mission shall be determined from its number of communicants in good standing (hereinafter referred to as communicants) in their congregation as reported in the parochial report next preceding Convention, according to the following schedule: Every congregation shall have two delegates as a basic representation in the lay order plus one for each 100 communicants and fraction thereof, no congregation having less than three such delegates. Lay delegates shall be communicants and shall have been stated worshippers of the congregation they represent for at least six months next preceding their election as delegates."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that such apportionment shall be effective at the close of the 1970 Convention.

RESOLUTION VI

Action Taken: Passed

RESOLVED, that paragraph 3, Section 1, Article VII, Constitution of the Diocese of Hawaii be, and hereby is, deleted, and the following substituted therefor:

"Lay delegates, to be elected according to the following schedule: Every congregation shall have two delegates as a basic representation in the lay order plus one for each 100 communicants and fraction thereof, no congregation having less than three such delegates."

RESOLUTION VII

Action Taken: Not Passed

WHEREAS, Christians hold that matters of conscience are between an individual person and his God, and

WHEREAS, man in times of crisis may need to seek refuge from the pressures that beset him, and

WHEREAS, such refuge has been a concept accepted and offered by many cultures throughout history, and

WHEREAS, the Christian Church has historically provided a place where an individual can seek counsel on matters of conscience away from the pressures of the times,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Episcopal Church in Hawaii reaffirm (1) the right and duty of all individuals to live and act according to the dictates of their conscience and (2) that the Church and clergy are called to provide such counsel and refuge as may be appropriate to any person's need.

RESOLUTION VIII

Action Taken: Not Passed

WHEREAS, the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church has recently adopted a resolution on "Crisis in American Life," which resolution has been given considerable circulation among our Church leaders, clerical and lay, and

WHEREAS, the impression is given to Church members and nonmembers, whether intentional or not, that this resolution expresses officially the position of the Episcopal Church regarding the various matters contained therein, and

WHEREAS, there is considerable concern on the part of an increasing number of Episcopalians that the Executive Council and the Presiding Bishop, on a number of occasions, take it upon themselves to speak and to act with an authority which they do not rightfully possess,

THEREFORE BE IT NOW RESOLVED, that we protest any and all attempts

by the present leadership of the Episcopal Church to usurp authority not expressly granted by General Convention, and we reject completely those portions of the above mentioned Executive Council resolution which relates to this country's foreign policy in Southeast Asia (Sections 2 and 3), and which solicit support for national student strikes (Section 6). We direct that this resolution will be presented by the deputies of the Diocese of Hawaii to the General Convention which meets in Houston, Texas in October of this year.

RESOLUTION IX

Action Taken: Not Passed

WHEREAS, the American society is currently severely torn by dissension, and

WHEREAS, the statement of the Presiding Bishop and statement of the Executive Council on "The Crisis in American Life" has been widely taken as support for the elements of dissension which contribute most radically to disorder, and

WHEREAS, we conceive that in these times the Church should be most concerned with its healing mission, and

BE IT NOW RESOLVED, that we deplore the timing and some of the content of the "Crisis in American Life," in particular those portions of the resolution of the Executive Council which related to this country's foreign policy in Southeast Asia (Sections 2 and 3) and which solicited support for national student strikes (Sections 6 and 8). We desire that this resolution be presented by the deputies of the Diocese of Hawaii to the General Convention which meets in Houston in October of this year, or that they support similar viewpoints as they may be presented to General Convention.

RESOLUTION X

Action Taken: Not Passed

RESOLVED, that the Executive Officer and any other agency of the Episcopal Church be, and hereby are, instructed to hold a "listen-in" or hearing, open to all, advertised a month in advance, with impartial study material being made available to the Deaneries before the "listen-in" prior to any attempt by the Executive Officer or any other agency of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii to go before any City or State planning agency regarding variances or matters affecting good planning, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors be, and hereby is, respectfully requested to hold such a "listen-in" before

moving to sell Church property when such sale will affect the mission or stewardship strategy of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii.

RESOLUTION XI

Action Taken: Passed

In accordance with Resolution XVII of the Primary Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Hawaii, the Rt. Rev. E. Lani Hanchett established a study commission to consider the feasibility and desirability of staggered terms for the offices of the Board of Directors. The study commission was under the chairmanship of Mr. Ernest Uno.

After giving the issue considerable study, the following recommendation is presented to the Convention of the Episcopal Church and Bishop Hanchett: This study committee recommends that the present system as described in the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii be retained.

RESOLUTION XII

Action Taken: Passed

By voice vote, those in attendance at the Workshop on Finance, chaired by the Rev. Edwin Bonsey, overwhelmingly approved the following recommendation: That the items in the Program Budget Presentation, page 2, identified as II, C-2 be restored to \$3,000.00; III, B, C, and D, be restored to their original amounts respectively:

B. Palama Interchurch Program	\$2,000.00
C. Waimanalo Preschool	2,300.00
D. KEY Project	2,500.00

This recommendation respectfully requests that the above items, totaling the sum of \$3,300.00 be approved.

(1) Accounts and Records

The accounts and records of the Church do not reflect the financial position and results of operations of parishes, missions or institutions which conduct the activities of The Episcopal Church throughout the State of Hawaii. However, certain trusts of these departments are held by the Church, and accordingly, have been taken into account in the accompanying balance sheet.

(2) Land and Buildings

Title to all real property (other than real property of St. Clement's Church) is vested in The Episcopal Church in Hawaii; accordingly, such property is accounted for in the records of the Church. The carrying value of the property is frequently an estimated amount not readily subject to accurate determination, intended to represent expenditures made not only by the Church but also by missions, parishes or other persons.
