



This was the Cross used for the 59th General Convention of the Episcopal Church when it met in Honolulu in September 1955. The Hawaiian Words, "He Lanakila Ma Ke Ke'a", symbolize the cross and crown, and mean "Victory through the Cross". This motto was adopted by the first Anglican Bishop for the Church in Hawaii, the Rt. Rev. Thomas N. Staley.

HISTORICALLY...

Christianity first came to Hawaii in the Services of the Church of England. This included the burial office for William Whatman, seaman, during Captain James Cook's voyage of European discovery (Napo'o po'o, Hawaii, 28 January 1779).

The first mission from the Church of England arrived in Hawaii on 11 October 1862, with the coming of Bishop Thomas Nettleship Staley, with two clergy and families. The Anglicans arrived some 42 years after the American Protestant missionaries from New England, and 35 years after the Roman Catholics.

In requesting a mission of the Church of England, King Kamehameha IV (also called Iolani,) and his wife Queen Emma, sought for Hawaii both a middle way between Puritanism and Roman Catholicism, and also closer ties with the then world's greatest power, England. Thus, the Episcopal Church has the distinction of being in Hawaii by invitation.

Hawaii has the honor of being the site of the first overseas mission of nuns of the Church of England, following the revival of the life of the religious with the Oxford Movement: St. Cross School, Lahaina, Maui (1864); then St. Andrew's Priory School, Honolulu (Ascension Day, 1867), founded by the Reverend Mother Priscilla Lydia Sellon of the Society of the Most Holy Trinity, together with Queen Emma, a lay associate of that Order.

Political changes dictated the transfer of the Anglican Church in Hawaii to the jurisdiction of the Episcopal Church in the United States in 1902. The Rt. Rev. Henry Bond Restarick (1902-1920) succeeded The Rt. Rev. Alfred Willis, who, after 31 years in Hawaii, served some 18 years as Anglican Bishop in Tonga. To Bishop Willis, the Church in Hawaii owes its mission to the Chinese and the survival and prospering of Iolani School.

Hawaii's second longest episcopate is that of The Rt. Rev. Harry Sherbourne Kennedy (1944-1969), under whom the number of active clergy rose from 19 to 68, and 18 new congregations were established. As Military Bishop in the Pacific, Bishop Kennedy made Honolulu the focal point for oversight and assistance to Anglicans not only in the Allied Armed Forces, but also in Taiwan, Okinawa, Korea, the Philippine Republic, Japan, Guam, and the Trust Territories of the Pacific, as well as American Samoa and England's Christmas and Fanning Island.

An honor was conferred upon the Church when it was asked to host the 58th General Convention in September 1955. This was the first Convention to be held in an Overseas Mission Field, and also the largest to gather in Honolulu.

The Rt. Rev. E. Lani Hanchett (1970-1975), Bishop Kennedy's successor, was the Anglican Church's first priest and bishop of Hawaiian ancestry. (His father before him had been America's first doctor of medicine of Hawaiian heritage.) Bishop Hanchett was elected at the Primary Convention, 24 October 1969. For the first time in the Island's history, clergy and delegates elected their own bishop -- a native son!

Bishop Hanchett's episcopate was short, ended by cancer at age 55 on 11 August 1975.

A Special Convention was called, and on Saturday, 1 May 1976 (Hawaii's "Lei Day"), elected The Rt. Rev. Edmond L. Browning as bishop.

Bishop Browning's association with the Diocese took place earlier: In July of 1959, he was appointed by the Presiding Bishop as missionary to Okinawa, through the invitation of Bishop Kennedy.

The election of Bishop Browning as the 8th Anglican Bishop of Hawaii, and his enthronement three months later on 1 August 1976 in the Cathedral Church of St. Andrew's, ended the see's long vacancy.

BISHOP'S ADDRESS

NINTH ANNUAL CONVENTION of the DIOCESE OF HAWAII

As BISHOP BY THE WILL OF GOD, TO THE CHURCH OF GOD
WHICH IS GATHERED IN THIS PLACE AS THE NINTH ANNUAL CONVENTION
OF THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF HAWAII, GRACE TO YOU AND PEACE
FROM GOD OUR FATHER AND THE LORD JESUS CHRIST. WELCOME TO
EACH AND EVERY ONE OF YOU!

THERE ARE MANY WHO, HAVING WORKED WEEKS IN PREPARATION FOR OUR CONVENTION, DESERVE RECOGNITION AND TO WHOM I WOULD LIKE TO GIVE THANKS AT THE BEGINNING OF THIS ADDRESS. FIRST, OUR VERY SPECIAL GRATITUDE TO OUR HOST CONGREGATIONS OF THIS ISLAND AND PARTICULARLY FR. ED BONSEY AND THE MEMBERS OF HOLY APOSTLES' -- ALL WEEKEND WE WILL SEE EVIDENCE OF THEIR WORK. NEXT, MAY I EXPRESS OUR THANKS TO FR. FRANK CHUN, FR. DONN BROWN, FR. CURT ZIMMERMAN AND THE CONVENTION COMMITTEE FOR THEIR LABORS IN OUR BEHALF. AND FINALLY WOULD YOU JOIN ME IN SAYING THANK YOU TO OUR DIOCESAN OFFICE FAMILY--ALICE MAMIYA, RUBY NAKAMURA, AND NANCY MINUTH--IF THEY LOOK HAGGARD, I CAN TELL YOU WHY!

LAST YEAR'S ADDRESS GAVE ATTENTION TO SIGNIFICANT PERSONNEL CHANGES AND I WOULD CONTINUE THAT PRACTICE THIS EVENING.

SINCE LAST NOVEMBER THE FOLLOWING ASSIGNMENTS HAVE BEEN MADE:
THE REV. DR. JERRY REYNOLDS TO EMMANUEL, ENCHANTED LAKE; THE REV. BILL COLLINS TO ST. BARNABAS', EWA BEACH; THE REV. DEL WESTLING TO WAIKIKI CHAPEL; THE REV. JOE PUMMILL TO ST. JOHN'S AND ST. PAUL'S, KAUAI; AND THE APPOINTMENT OF THE REV. BRIAN GRIEVES AS DIRECTOR OF CAMPS AND CONFERENCES. IN ADDITION TO THE BEGINNING OF THESE NEW MINISTRIES, THREE HAVE BEEN ORDAINED TO THE DIACONATE: THE REVS. LYNETTE GOLDERMAN, ROBERT ROWLEY, AND ROBERT WALDEN. LYNETTE IS ASSIGNED TO ST. PETER'S; BOB ROWLEY TO THE PRIORY; AND BOB WALDEN TO HOLY NATIVITY. LAST MONTH I HAD THE PRIVILEGE OF WELCOMING INTO OUR DIOCESAN FAMILY THE REV. RICHARD KIM AND HIS FAMILY -- DICK WAS INSTITUTED RECTOR OF THE CHURCH OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD.

HAVING GAINED, WE HAVE ALSO LOST -- IN FACT, IN MY OPINION TWO VERY IMPORTANT AND VITAL FAMILIES OF THIS DIOCESE -- THE REV. BARRETT LINDSEY AND HIS FAMILY TO THE DIOCESE OF OREGON, AND THE REV. EUGENE HARSHMAN AND HIS FAMILY TO THE DIOCESE OF COLORADO. BOTH OF THESE PRIESTS ARE TRULY "MEN OF GOD" AND THEY AND THEIR FAMILIES WILL BE SORELY MISSED.

I HAVE A SPECIAL WORD OF THANKS TO THE REV. GEORGE HARTUNG WHO FOR THE PAST TWO YEARS HAS SERVED ST. CHRISTOPHER'S WITH LOVE, PASTORAL SENSITIVITY, AND A SACRIFICING SPIRIT. HE AND ANGIE ARE SUPER PEOPLE, IN MY BOOK. CLAUDE DU TEIL HAS RESUMED HIS

DUTIES AS RECTOR OF ST. CHRISTOPHER'S -- ONE ACT OF PRAISE I MAKE -- FOR CLAUDE'S RETURN AND ALL THAT MEANS -- FOR THE GIFTS OF THE HARTUNGS, AND FOR THE SENSITIVE, CARING AND WILLING FELLOWSHIP AT ST. C'S.

AND NOW FOR A VERY IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT AND A VERY DEEP EX-PRESSION OF LOVE AND APPRECIATION: FORTY-EIGHT YEARS AGO, BE-FORE MANY OF US ASSEMBLED HERE HAD REACHED THE AGE OF DISCRE-TION, A MAN AMONG US EMBARKED ON A MINISTRY THAT WAS TO TAKE HIM THROUGHOUT THE WORLD AND WAS EVENTUALLY TO BRING HIM TO THIS DIOCESE. THAT MAN IS FINALLY GOING TO COMMENCE A WELL DESERVED REST, FOR ON JANUARY 1, 1978 HENRY BUDD WILL RETIRE. HIS MINISTRY BEGAN AT THE NATIONAL OFFICES OF OUR CHURCH IN NEW YORK AND THEN AS A LAY MISSIONARY FIRST IN CHINA, THEN IN Japan and finally here in Hawaii for $21\,$ years. I am one lost FOR WORDS WHEN TRYING TO EXPRESS THANKS TO ONE WHO HAS GIVEN SO MUCH OF HIMSELF IN SERVICE TO HIS CHURCH -- A SERVICE WHICH HAS BEEN MARKED BY DEDICATION, LOVE FOR HIS LORD, AND A DEEP DESIRE TO GIVE AS MUCH AND MORE OF WHATEVER WAS ASKED--YOU HAVE TO HELP ME SHOW OUR THANKS! BECAUSE WE DON'T WANT TO LET A VALUABLE RESOURCE GET AWAY COMPLETELY, I HAVE ASKED HENRY TO BE AVAILABLE FOR CONSULTANT HELP TO ME IN THE NEXT FEW YEARS AS I KNOW HE HAS AN HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE WHICH NO ONE ELSE HAS. I ALSO WOULD ASK TO NOMINATE HIM TO YOU AS OUR TREASURER FOR 1978, WHICH HE HAS AGREED TO SERVE IN A VOLUNTEER CAPACITY IF ELECTED.

II. THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS -- THIS TIME WITH YOU IS A VERY PRECIOUS TIME FOR ME -- IT'S AN OPPORTUNITY TO GIVE THANKS AS WELL AS TO PAUSE FOR REFLECTION ON THE PAST YEAR, AND THAT IS EXTREMELY IMPORTANT IN THE LIFE OF A FAMILY! EQUALLY IMPORTANT IS LOOKING TO THE FUTURE AND TRYING TO DETERMINE WHAT BOTH THE SUCCESSES AND FAILURES OF THE PAST TELL US -- IN DIRECTING US INTO THE FUTURE!

MAY I SAY THAT THIS PAST YEAR HAS BEEN A GOOD YEAR -- I HAVE FELT GOOD ABOUT IT AND I SENSE THAT YOU HAVE FELT GOOD ABOUT IT! IT'S BEEN A YEAR DISTINGUISHED BY A HIGH DEGREE OF COOPERATION; THE USE OF A COLLABORATIVE STYLE TO SOLVE PROBLEMS AND MEET CHALLENGES; A DEMONSTRATED WILLINGNESS TO EXPERIMENT AND MOVE IN NEW DIRECTIONS, ALL SUPPORTED BY A HIGH LEVEL OF TRUST THROUGHOUT MOST OF THE DIOCESE! I GUESS I COULD BEST SUM IT UP IN THIS WAY -- THE PRINCIPLES OF BEING "PARTNERS-IN-MISSION" IS AT WORK IN THE DIOCESE OF HAWAII. FOR THIS I COULD NOT BE MORE GRATEFUL AND TO THIS AIM OF SHARING LIFE TOGETHER--OF SENSING AN INTERRELATEDNESS AMONG ALL LEVELS--OF LEARNING INTERDEPENDENCE AMONGST ALL I WOULD HAVE US MOVE.

LAST WEEK WE HAD A VISIT FROM BISHOP JACK WYATT, BISHOP OF SPOKANE, ABOUT WHICH I WILL TELL YOU MORE LATER -- DURING THE COURSE OF HIS VISIT BISHOP WYATT SAID THAT THE CHURCH IN HER WORK HAS THREE FOCUSSES -- MAINTENENCE, MINISTRY, AND MISSION. I FOUND THIS APPROACH APPEALING AND I WOULD LIKE TO USE IT IN THE CONTINUANCE OF MY ADDRESS ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH -- MAINTENANCE, MINISTRY, AND MISSION.

III. MAINTENANCE

SOMETIMES I KNOW THERE ARE THOSE WHO BELIEVE THAT WE SPEND
TOO MUCH TIME AND EFFORT ON MAINTENANCE AND ADMINISTRATION -IT IS AN AREA THAT HAS TO BE CAREFULLY BALANCED WITH MINISTRY
AND MISSION, BUT FOR CERTAIN IF IT IS NOT EFFECTIVE AND OPEN
IN STYLE, THE PERFORMANCE IN MINISTRY AND MISSION WILL BE
GREATLY HINDERED.

LAST YEAR I SAID TO YOU IN MY ADDRESS THAT I BELIEVED IN A SHARED MINISTRY -- I STATED THAT TO THOSE WHOM YOU CHOOSE AS MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, I WOULD SHARE THE DECISIONS RELATED TO MAINTENANCE -- TO PROPERTY MANAGEMENT, FISCAL AFFAIRS, REAL ESTATE MATTERS, PROGRAM EVALUATION AND OTHER IMPORTANT MATTERS.

This year's Board worked exceptionally well and assumed this shared leadership with integrity and with a deep concern for every aspect of the life of this Diocese. Let me share one area in which they have worked that I believe witness as to what I have just said about them and also points to the direction in which our Diocese is moving, especially in the area of interdependence. The Program Committee of the Board, under the cochairmanship of Margaret Cameron and Ed Bonsey and the Finance Committee chaired by Rudy Duncan, put hours into initial preparation of the Budget. In addition, the entire Board spent 2-1/2 days working on the Budget for 1973. During this process there was revealed the need for clearer job descriptions of all Dio-

CESAN PERSONNEL, OF ANNUAL EVALUATIONS OF THE STAFF, OF THE NEED FOR A MORE ADEQUATE SYSTEM OF EVALUATION OF ALL PROGRAMS, FOR THE NEED OF A BETTER DEFINED STRATEGY FOR OUR MISSION CONGREGATIONS — THEY WRESTLED WITH A BEGINNING TOWARDS ZERO BASE BUDGETING, GOING THROUGH THE PRIORITIZING OF EVERY PART OF OUR DIOCESAN BUDGET. THEY BELIEVE — I BELIEVE — THAT NOT ONLY HAS A GOOD JOB BEEN DONE, BUT IT IS A CHALLENGE TO THIS DIOCESE— THE 15% INCREASE ON THE ASSESSMENTS IS A BEGINNING — ONLY A BEGINNING, FREEING US TO CARRY OUT THE WORK OF THIS DIOCESE.

To illustrate my point of shared leadership -- of interdependence, the Board of Directors was not content to pass this Budget down from on high. They wanted to share it with you, the delegates, and to hear what you had to say. You were heard, as I believe will be indicated both in future remarks in this address and in the presentation of the Budget. I would simply say that what might have appeared as stumbling blocks have become opportunities for creative ministry and mission.

GROWING OUT OF MY CONCERNS AND OBSERVATIONS OF THIS PAST YEAR, OF MY WORK WITH THE BOARD, AND IN LISTENING TO YOUR CONCERNS COMING OUT OF THE AREA MEETINGS, I AM PLANNING ON CREATING TWO NEW BOARD COMMITTEES IN THE NEW YEAR (AND IN PART THIS IS RELATED TO THE RESOLUTION REGARDING THE SIZE OF THE BOARD): FIRST, I WANT TO CREATE A "MISSION STRATEGY COMMITTEE" WHICH I WILL CHARGE TO BE RESPONSIBLE TO ASSIST MISSION CONGREGATIONS WITH THEIR GOALS, TO SET CRITERIA UPON WHICH MISSION SUBSIDIES WILL

BE GRANTED, TO REPORT BACK TO THE 1978 CONVENTION EACH CONGREGATION'S PLAN FOR REDUCTION OF SUBSIDY, AND TO REVIEW POSSIBILITIES FOR NEW OUTREACHES; SECONDLY, I AM CREATING WITHIN THE BOARD A CAMPS COMMITTEE -- THIS DIOCESAN PROGRAM WHICH HAS AN ANNUAL BUDGET IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD OF \$172,000 NEEDS, IN MY ESTIMATION THE POSITION WITHIN THE BOARD FOR BOTH ITS SUPPORT AND ITS RELATIONSHIP OF ACCOUNTABILITY.

THE FINAL ITEM WITHIN THE AREA OF MAINTENANCE ADMINISTRATION IS TO INFORM THIS CONVENTION THAT IS IS MY INTENTION, WITHIN THE NEXT MONTH, TO CREATE THE POSITION OF AN ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT AND FINANCIAL OFFICER AND TO NAME SOMEONE TO THAT POSITION BEGINNING JANUARY 1. THE AREA WHICH THIS PERSON WILL SERVE IS FIRST IN THE PREPARATION OF THE BUDGET AND ITS ADMINIS-TRATION; AND SECONDLY, ASSISTING THE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE IN WORKING WITH CONGREGATIONS WITH THEIR STEWARDSHIP PROGRAMS; AND THE IMPLEMENTATION OF A PLANNED GIVING PROGRAM THROUGH WILLS AND DEFERRED GIFTS. WITH THE ASSISTANCE OF RUDY DUNCAN AND THE FINANCE COMMITTEE AND CHARLIE CRANE AND THE STEWARDSHIP COM-MITTEE, I HAVE DETERMINED THAT THE DEVELOPMENT OF FINANCIAL RESOURCES IS AS CRUCIAL A CHALLENGE AS WE HAVE FACING US! TO MEET THIS CHALLENGE, THIS POSITION IS BEING CREATED. IN ORDER TO MAKE THIS POSSIBLE I AM ASKING THAT THE FUNDS PRESENTLY IN THE BUDGET ALLOCATED FOR THE SALARY OF THE TREASURER BE ALLO-CATED FOR THIS POSITION. PARENTHETICALLY, I SHOULD SAY THAT I AM GIVING NANCY MINUTH THE TITLE OF ASSISTANT TO THE TREASURER WHICH MORE ADEQUATELY DESCRIBES THE GOOD WORK SHE DOES.

IV. MINISTRY: MAINTENANCE, MINISTRY -- THERE ARE SEVERAL THOUGHTS I WOULD SHARE WITH YOU IN THE AREA OF MINISTRY AND THE FIRST WILL BE A GOOD TRANSITION, I THINK BETWEEN MAIN-TENANCE AND MINISTRY -- THE DEVELOPMENT OF A SET OF PERSONNEL POLICIES FOR THE CLERGY AND CONGREGATIONS OF THIS DIOCESE. OUR COMMISSION ON MINISTRY FOR THE PAST NINE MONTHS HAS BEEN WORKING ON A SET OF PERSONNEL POLICIES WHICH (HOPEFULLY) WILL BE IN THE HANDS OF EVERY VESTRY AND BISHOP'S COMMITTEE BY THE FIRST OF THE NEW YEAR. IT IS NOW COMPLETED AND WILL BE GIVEN TO THE NEW BOARD OF DIRECTORS FOR THEIR DISPOSITION. I PER-SONALLY THINK IT'S A SUPERB PIECE OF WORK WHICH WILL CLEARLY DEFINE THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN A CLERGY PERSON AND HIS/HER CONGREGATION -- IT PROVIDES MANY SUPPORTIVE WAYS IN WHICH THE RELATIONSHIP CAN BE CREATIVE AND GROWING. IT'S MY SINCERE HOPE THAT THE LEADERSHIP OF EVERY CONGREGATION WILL SEEK TO MAKE THE PERSONNEL POLICIES A FUNCTIONAL REALITY.

THE ONE AREA NOT COVERED IN THE PERSONNEL POLICIES IS A SALARY SCALE TO BE USED IN ALL CONGREGATIONS. THE COMMISSION ON MINISTRY HAS REQUESTED THAT THIS BE FORMULATED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS. DEAR FRIENDS, THIS AN AREA NEEDING A LOT OF STUDY AND WILL BE GIVEN EARLY ATTENTION BY THE NEW BOARD. THERE ARE SEVERAL DISCREPANCIES IN OUR PRESENT SYSTEM: FOR EXAMPLE, THE PRESENT DIOCESAN SALARY SCALE HAS NOT BEEN REVIEWED IN THREE YEARS; IT IS FOLLOWED BY SOME PARISHES, BUT IN ACTUALITY IS ONLY MANDATORY FOR MISSION CLERGY; IN FACT, THERE ARE SOME PARISH CLERGY WHO ARE BEING PAID LESS THAN THOSE MISSION CLERGY

WHOSE SALARIES ARE GUARANTEED BY THE DIOCESE; AND THERE ARE SOME CLERGY WHO, BECAUSE THEY LIVE IN RECTORIES, ARE NOT RECEIVING THE SAME ADVANTAGE WITH THE CHURCH PENSION FUND AS THOSE WHO ARE RECEIVING HOUSING ALLOWANCES. I WILL ASK THE NEW BOARD TO REVIEW THESE MATTERS, AND BRING TO THE 1978 CONVENTION RECOMMENDATIONS TO CORRECT THESE INEQUITIES.

I WOULD SPEAK TO ANOTHER AREA OF MINISTRY WHICH I BELIEVE NEEDS THE ATTENTION OF THIS DIOCESE IN THE 1978 AND THAT IS THE CHURCH'S MINISTRY TO THE COLLEGE CAMPUSES. THERE HAS BEEN A GREAT DEAL OF INTEREST DEVELOPED IN THIS AREA OF OUR DIOCESAN RESPONSIBILITY BY THE GOOD WORK OF OUR COLLEGE CAMPUS MINISTRY COMMITTEE DURING THE PAST YEAR -- THEY HAVE RIGHTLY CALLED FOR AN EPISCOPAL CHURCH PRESENCE ON THE MANOA CAMPUS, WHICH HAS NOT HAD A CHAPLAIN SINCE 1970. YOU ARE PROBABLY AWARE THAT FOR THE PAST SEVERAL YEARS OUR DIOCESE HAS SEEN ITS PARTICIPATION IN CAMPUS MINISTRY TO BE SHARING IN THE OUTREACH TO THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES, PARTICULARLY IN THE PERSON OF BILL GROSH, WITH A PART TIME CONTRIBUTION TO THE ECUMENICAL THRUST AT MANOA IN THE PERSON OF JOE PUMMILL UNTIL HE DEPARTED FOR KAUAI THIS PAST MAY.

I am asking Bill Grosh to work with Me in Rewriting his Job description so that in 1973 he will be giving half of his time to the Manoa campus in a ministry as set forth by the College Campus Committee, and half time to Leeward College. I am not suggesting that this be a permanent assignment -- in fact, I

HAVE SPECIFICALLY SAID IT'S ONLY FOR 1978. THIS WILL GIVE US TIME HOPEFULLY TO HAVE THE COLLEGE CAMPUS COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER: FIRST, A STATE-WIDE STRATEGY HOPEFULLY IN AN ECUMENICAL STANCE; SECONDLY, TO EVALUATE THE GOALS OF OUR DIOCESAN MINISTRY TO BOTH THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES AND TO MANOA SO AS TO ASCERTAIN THE SUPPORT NEEDED AS WELL AS THE DIRECTION IN WHICH WE WANT TO GO DURING THE YEARS AHEAD. IT IS MY HOPE THAT BY THIS TIME NEXT YEAR WE CAN HAVE DEFINITE ANSWERS TO THESE QUESTIONS.

VERY IMPORTANT TO OUR MINISTRY AND THE MANNER IN WHICH IT IS CARRIED FORTH HAS TO DO WITH THE WAY WE LOOK AT OURSELVES, THE GOALS WE CAN HAVE FOR THE DIOCESE AND OUR CONGREGATIONS, AND THE WAY IN WHICH WE OURSELVES AND OUR DIOCESAN STRUCTURE SUPPORT EACH OTHER. YOUR BISHOP AND BOARD OF DIRECTORS BELIEVE THAT AT THIS JUNCTURE IN OUR PILGRIMAGE WE HAVE THE NEED TO CALL THE DIOCESE TO "TWO DAYS IN MAY" WHEN WE MAY CONSULT WITH EACH OTHER AND ESTABLISH GOALS FOR OUR LIFE AS A CHURCH. LAST WEEK BISHOP WYATT OF SPOKANE SERVED AS A CONSULTANT TO A GROUP OF US WHO ARE CHARGED WITH THE RESPONSIBILITY OF DESIGNING THIS PLANNING CONFERENCE FOR MAY 5 AND 6 OF NEXT YEAR. DETAILED IN-FORMATION WILL BE MAILED TO ALL CLERGY AND VESTRIES BY THE FIRST OF DECEMBER AS TO PLACE, PARTICIPANTS, AND PROGRAM. IS HOPED THAT THIS CONFERENCE WILL HELP CONGREGATIONS TO NOT ONLY DEVELOP THEIR OWN GOALS, BUT ALSO TEST THEM IN RELATIONSHIP TO ONE ANOTHER, TO ASSIST THE DIOCESAN LEADERSHIP IN FOCUSING ON OUR SEVERAL PRIORITIES, TO ASCERTAIN THE EFFECTIVENESS OF

PROGRAMMATIC EFFORTS OF THE DIOCESE IN MEETING THE GOALS BOTH OF THE CONGREGATIONS AND THE DIOCESE, AND TO CREAT AMONG THE PROGRAMMATIC UNITS A UNIFORM PRESENTATION WHEREAS TO ELIMINATE COMPETITION SO AS TO OFFER RELEVANT AND SUPPORTIVE ASSISTANCE, AND FINALLY TO CREATE A GREATER SENSE OF INTERDEPENDENCE AND PARTNERSHIP.

V. MISSION -- I come to the third of the "Ms" -- Mission, outreach -- the apostolic imperative -- to be sent forth. Up until this point I have been sharing with you some rather practical ways in which during the past year we have been moving in partnership and how hopefully through some decisions about the future, this momentum will continue. Now I would like to move into the area of challenge about the future because I believe that it holds for us some tremendous possibilities.

I WOULD FIRST CHALLENGE THIS DIOCESE AND EVERY CONGREGATION WITHIN IT TO CONSIDER PRIMARY EVANGELISM AS ONE OF ITS HIGHEST PRIORITIES. WHAT DO I MEAN BY PRIMARY EVANGELISM?—— I MEAN REACHING OUT TO THE UNCHURCHED WITH A SHARING OF THE NEW LIFE. I BELIEVE THAT THERE IS A NEWNESS OF SPIRIT EMERGING WHICH IS SAYING IN ESSENCE THAT IT IS NOT ENOUGH TO KNOW ABOUT CHRIST, WE MUST KNOW HIM. AND IN KNOWING HIM, SPONTANEOUS EXPANSION OF THE CHURCH SHOULD BE AN OBVIOUS FRUIT. I SENSE THIS NEWNESS OF SPIRIT EMERGING OUT OF NEW PROGRAMS IN THE DIOCESE, SUCH AS CURSILLO AND MARRIAGE ENCOUNTER—— A RENEWAL IN THE SPIRIT WHICH I BELIEVE HAS ITS TEST IN WHAT DEGREE IT IS SHARED AND OTHERS ARE BROUGHT INTO THE FELLOWSHIP. IF MY FIGURES ARE

CORRECT, 175,000 PEOPLE IN THE STATE OF HAWAII ARE CLAIMED BY NO CHURCH OR TEMPLE. THAT IS 20% OF OUR POPULATION AND THAT IS TO SAY NOTHING ABOUT THE LAPSED AND DROP-OUTS. SINCE LAST NOVEMBER I HAVE HAD THE PRIVILEGE OF CONFIRMING 306 PERSONS THAT IS COMPARED TO THE LAST FIVE-YEAR FIGURES: 1976, 250; 1975, 194; 1974, 267; 1973, 312; AND 1972, 402.

CLEARLY, OUR TASK IN THE NEXT YEAR IS TO SPEAK TO THOSE WHO HAVE NOT HEARD, OR THOSE WHO HAVE FORGOTTEN, OR WHO HAVE MISSED THE GOOD NEWS OF CHRIST JESUS.

Now I would turn your attention to two matters which were addressed during the last House of Bishops' meeting. First, I would call the members of this Diocese to continue what I have appreciated within this family for the past year — the deep sense of respect for each other's conscience regarding the ordination of women. With a pastoral sense of concern both for the freedom of conscience as well as for the unity of the Church, the House of Bishops spoke in its pastoral letter "that one is not a disloyal Episcopalian if he or she abstains from supporting the decision or continues to be convinced it was an error."

I THINK THAT IT IS EXTREMELY IMPORTANT FOR YOU TO KNOW THAT THE HOUSE IN ITS CONCERN FOR THE FREEDOM OF CONSCIENCE WAS NOT IN ANY WAY TRYING TO DIMINISH THE DECISION MADE AT MINNEAPOLIS. AS YOUR BISHOP I WILL FOLLOW AND SUPPORT THE DECISION OF

GENERAL CONVENTION -- THAT IS TO SAY, THAT THE DECISION TO CONSIDER THE APPROPRIATENESS OF ONE'S VOCATION TO THE PRIESTHOOD WILL BE CONSIDERED BY ME WHETHER THE CANDIDATE IS MALE OR FEMALE, BASED ON HIS OR HER SPIRITUAL AND MORAL MATURITY, INTELLECTUAL CAPABILITY, AND OVERALL PERSONAL QUALITIES. REGARDING SCREENING, PROCEDURES, EDUCATION, PLACEMENT, AND LOGISTICAL, SUPPORT EVERY CANDIDATE WILL RECEIVE THE SAME CARE, GUIDANCE, AND TREATMENT.

SECONDLY, I CALL THIS DIOCESE -- THE CONGREGATIONS WITHIN IT -- TO A STUDY DURING 1978 IN THE AREA OF HUMAN SEXUALITY, INCLUDING HOMOSEXUALITY. THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS' PASTORAL STATED THAT THIS "CHURCH CONFINES ITS NUPTIAL BLESSING TO THE UNION OF MALE AND FEMALE---AND THAT WE BISHOPS AGREE TO DENY ORDINATION TO AN ADVOCATING AND/OR PRACTICING HOMOSEXUAL PERSON." AS YOUR BISHOP I SUPPORT BOTH OF THESE STATEMENTS.

NOW THAT I HAVE SAID THIS, I HOPE YOU WILL SEE THAT I HAVE NO HIDDEN AGENDA -- BUT I DO NOT BELIEVE THAT WE CAN STOP WITH THESE STATEMENTS. WE NEED TO STUDY THIS WHOLE AREA TO HELP RID OURSELVES AND OUR SOCIETY FROM THE PREJUDICES AND FEARS WHICH PRODUCE OPPRESSION AND SUBJECT A GOOD NUMBER OF OUR SOCIETY TO THE TRAGEDY OF HUMILIATION, PERSECUTION, AND VIOLENCE. IF BEHAVIORAL SCIENCE IS CORRECT, SEXUALITY IS AN IMPART OF ALL AREAS OF LIFE, AND ALL RELATIONSHIPS. AS MAN QUESTIONS, THE CHURCH MUST NOT ABDICATE ITS POSITION AS A CHANNEL OF GOD'S TRUTH, TO THE ADOLESCENT MAGAZINES AND NOVELS

THAT PANDER TO MAN'S FANTASIES WHILE IGNORING HIS DESPERATE NEED TO UNDERSTAND HIMSELF, THOSE ABOUT HIM, AND THE DEEPER AREAS OF HUMAN RELATIONSHIP.

In our Apostolic commission we have a responsibility to reach OUT TO THOSE SUBJECTED BY THE FEARS OF SOCIETY TO POSITIONS OF THE "OUTCAST" TO BRING THEM WITHIN THE LOVING, ACCEPTING AND PASTORAL CARE OF THE FELLOWSHIP. MAY I SAY FURTHER THAT IT IS NOT ONLY IN THE AREA OF HOMOSEXUALITY THAT THIS STUDY WILL CONCERN ITSELF -- BUT IN TRYING TO UNDERSTAND SEX AS THE GIFT GOD INTENDED IT TO BE IN HUMAN FULFILLMENT. I ASK YOU TO JOIN ME IN PREPARING OURSELVES TO BE THE KIND OF FELLOWSHIP TO WHICH WE ARE CALLED. MOVING FROM THIS CALL TO THE NEXT --I CANNOT HELP BUT THINK THAT WITH EASE WE IDENTIFY "MORALITY" WITH SEXUAL BEHAVIOR ALONE AS THOUGH THE ONLY MORAL SINS ARE SEXUAL AND SUCH ISSUES AS SOCIAL JUSTICE, HUNGER, RACISM, ENERGY CONSUMPTION ARE SOMEHOW NOT "MORAL ISSUES." AS JOHN COBURN SAYS, "OUR INVOLVEMENT IN CORPORATE, SOCIAL MORALITIES AND IMMORALITIES IS SURELY AS MUCH A PART OF OUR FALLEN HUMAN NATURE AS OUR SEXUAL ONES." DEAR FRIENDS, ONE OF THE REAL MORAL ISSUES FACING OUR GLOBAL COMMUNITY IS THE CRISIS OF WORLD HUNGER AND STARVATION. IT HAS BEEN ESTIMATED THAT ONE PERSON DIES OF STARVATION EVERY MINUTE OF EVERY DAY AND THAT TRANSLATES INTO THE FACT THAT IN THE MINUTES SINCE OUR WORSHIP STARTED THIS EVENING. PEOPLE HAVE DIED. "INASMUCH AS YOU HAVE DONE IT UNTO THE LEAST OF MY BROTHERS." I HAVE APPOINTED A Diocesan Task Force on World Hunger -- Chaired by Fr. Burger

AND ASSISTED BY BEVERLY AND PETER VAN HORNE -- TO GUIDE US IN HAWAII IN BECOMING MORE AWARE OF THIS CRISIS AND HOW WE AS CONGREGATIONS AND INDIVIDUAL CHRISTIANS CAN MORE EFFECTIVELY RESPOND. A RESOURCE GUIDE IS BEING PREPARED FOR US BY THIS TASK FORCE FROM A BUDGET SUPPORTED BY ST. JOHN'S AND HOLY INNOCENTS' OF MAUI. I CALL ON YOU TO SUPPORT THIS EFFORT AND BE PREPARED TO JOIN TOGETHER IN PERSONAL, FAMILY, AND PARISH EFFORTS TO FEED THE HUNGRY OF THE WORLD.

FINALLY, I SHARE WITH OUR PRESIDING BISHOP IN ISSUING A CALL FOR THIS DIOCESE TO JOIN WITH HIM IN A VENTURE IN MISSION -- IN SEEKING TO MARSHAL THE HUMAN AND FINANCIAL RESOURCES OF THE PEO-PLE OF THIS CHURCH IN ORDER TO BRING THE JOY AND HEALING GRACE OF CHRIST TO THE HURTS AND HUNGERS OF THE WORLD. THE KEY WORD FOR ME IN THIS CAPITAL FUNDS CAMPAIGN IS TRANSFORMATION -- TRANS-FORMATION FOR BOTH THOSE WHO RECEIVE AND FOR US WHO ARE CALLED TO GIVE. WE HAVE TO SEE IN THE PRESIDING BISHOP A VISION WHICH INCLUDES NOT ONLY A SUBSTANTIAL EFFORT TO PROVIDE FINANCIAL RESOURCES FOR THE RENEWAL OF MISSION AND MINISTRY, BUT ALSO A SUPREME EFFORT TO RAISE THE CONSCIOUS COMMITMENT TO MISSION OF EVERY BAPTIZED CHRISTIAN OF THIS CHURCH. MY CALL IS THAT WE JOIN THE PRESIDING BISHOP IN THIS EFFORT, PLANNING WITHIN OUR OWN DIOCESE AS TO HOW WE ENTER THIS CAMPAIGN, CONSIDERING NOT ONLY OUR LOCAL NEEDS, BUT THOSE OF THE WIDE WORLD COMMUNION. I SUGGEST THAT VENTURE IN MISSION WILL PROVIDE US WITH A MEANS AND STRATEGY THAT WILL REDUCE HITHERTO VAGUE AND GENERAL AIMS TO SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES AND TANGIVLE STEPS FOR ACHIEVING THE KINDS OF GOALS WE WOULD DESIRE NOW AND FOR THE FUTURE.

VI. <u>CONCLUSION</u> "IN ALL THAT WE DO AT THIS CONVENTION, MAY IT BE TO THE GLORY OF GOD, TO THE SERVICE TO HIS CREATION, AND FOR UNITY OF HIS CHURCH.

"UNITY, DEAR FRIENDS, COMES NOT FROM SHALLOW PEOPLE THINKING ALIKE, BUT FROM FREE PEOPLE ACTING TOGETHER.

"MAY OUR ACTING TOGETHER TO HIS GLORY BE OUR RESPONSE TO HIS CHOICE OF US."

REPORT of the COMMITTEE ON RESPONSE TO THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS November 5, 1977

Bishop, it is my privilege to present to you, and to this convention, the report of the Committee on Response to the Bishop's Address, which committee was comprised of Joanne Conley, Alice Ann Bell, Ann Wilson, Ken Harding, Fr. Tom Yoshida and myself.

On a Big Island scale of the Kohala Task Force at the dismal extreme and the Kilauea volcano at the spectacular extreme, your address - Your Graciousness - ended up in Hilo.

But please do not construe this as meaning that the committee thinks your address was all wet - or even soggy, for that matter.

In fact, quite to the contrary. To continue the analogy, we find ourselves at a time in the Church's life when some are frightened by what appears to be a flood of woes that they feel threaten to capsize the Church. Woes like the new prayerbook. Woes like women in the sanctuary.

To those fearful of such an imagined flood of woes, your address - Your Excellency - can only be described as a sort of verbal Noah's Ark.

Instead of worrying, fretting, and complaining about the ecclesiastical weather, you have called us to embark on a voyage of faith, courage, and action, and not to be intimidated by the troubled seas of change upon which we sail.

And while some of us feared that the Noah's Ark you constructed for us this year would be fully 300 cubits in length, by 50 cubits in width, by 30 cubits in height - our fears were unfounded. Your verbal Noah's Ark was only 37 minutes and 15 seconds in length - a decided improvement over last year's effort. And for that the committee commends you.

We would also like to commend the fine, sensitive pastoral touch in the opening part of your address: the welcoming of new clergy, the announcement of new positions, the tribute paid to clergy who have left the Diocese in the past year, and in particular, your excellent tribute to Henry Budd.

Your reflection on the past year accurately describes, we feel, the positive response of the people of this Diocese to your open, collaborative, and trusting style of leadership. It's what we said we wanted in a Bishop, and you have delivered. And the results have been nothing but positive.

In terms of maintenance and administration, your proposals for job descriptions for all Diocesan personnel, annual evaluations of all staff, and adequate system of evaluation for all programs, demonstrate to us that you are responding directly and affirmatively to many of the issues and concerns raised at the area meetings prior to this convention.

We laud your decision to create two new committees of the Board of Directors to deal with "mission strategy" and Camps, and your decision to create the position of an administrative assistant and financial officer.

In sum, we feel that the administrative part of your address was concise and clear. It gave many of us a better grasp and feel for the kind of administrative structure you are assembling. However, we do hope that the necessary present emphasis on structure, maintenance, and administration will not be at the expense of programs and ministry.

In regard to the ministry section of your address, the committee feels that the development of personnel policies, the study of our clergy salary scale, and Church Pension Fund inequities are all important steps in the right direction.

Concerning the campus ministry in particular, we appreciated the delicate nature of this subject, and the fact that there are several divergent points of view on just what our strategy should be. However, there was some feeling that you may have "jumped the gun" on this one, since there were a couple of resolutions on the subject to be presented the day after your address. But at the same time, we were gratified by the careful thought you have obviously given to the direction this important ministry should take in the future.

As for the "Two Days in May" planning conference, all we can say is "super"! And your use of the word "programmatic" in that part of your address was pretty super, too! Where'd you learn that word — at Sewanee? You folks from the South sure do talk funny sometimes!

Now on to mission. You defined our mission as "primary evangelism": "reaching out to the unchurched with a sharing of the new life." We agree that renewal programs such as Cursillo and marriage encounter are excellent and effective ways of beginning the evangelism process, but there is also a need for specific training of our people in how to be "primary evangelists". We hope this will have a high priority, also.

At the same time, let us be humbly mindful that as we reach out to the unchurched with a sharing of the new life, we just might learn a thing or two from the unchurched about what God is doing in His world.

While we concur with you in placing the highest priority on evangelism as our primary mission, we also hope that the Diocese will not fall into the trap of playing the numbers game. If, in fact, 20% of our population is unchurched, we should remember that there are about 101 different denominations and sects out there vying for that 20% of the population, and we're lauching forth with a paltry \$2,900 budgeted for what you have described as our primary mission.

As indicated by the spontaneous outburst of applause, many persons deeply appreciated your strong and forthright stand in support of the Church's action in General Convention authorizing the ordination of women, and calling all Dioceses to do a thorough, caring, and sensitive study of the subject of human sexuality. We applaud your taking forthright and compassionate stands on controversial issues.

We also feel you were right on target in cautioning us against equating morality with sexual behavior alone. Social injustice, hunger, racism, energy consumption, family disintegration, and women's role in society are moral issues the Church should be addressing itself to if it is to be faithful to the full Gospel message.

Yet, if there are any weak planks in your verbal Noah's Ark, they are in this portion of your address. It would appear from your remarks that the only broader moral and social issue the Diocese will address in the coming year is the issue of world hunger.

We know that your own social conscience is much broader than just this one important issue, and we do look to you to enlarge our vision of the Church's mission and ministry to a broken and suffering world.

Finally, we appreciated your strong statement of support of the Presiding Bishop's "Venture in Mission" program. However, just what this "Venture in Mission" program is, and its implications for our Diocese in particular, needs to be communicated to the person in the pew as soon as possible, lest VIM be seen as just another high-powered, whiz-bang, fund raising program out of New York City.

Now, to sum everything up. As I said before, on a Big Island scale of the Kohala Task Force at the dismal end, and the Kilauea volcano at the spectacular end, your address ended up smack—dab in the middle of Hilo — which, as I'm sure we all agree, is not such a bad place to be.

Like Hilo, it was perhaps just slightly soft and soggy in some areas, and maybe a <u>little cloudy</u> in other areas. But there was also a lot of sunshine - a <u>lot of sunshine - a lot of sunshine that we know came straight from your head and your heart.</u>

In closing, Bishop, we thank you from our hearts for loving us, and letting us love you. And we want you to know that we're awfully glad and awfully proud that you are the Noah at the helm of our Ark.

PROCEEDINGS of the 9th Convention

Friday, November 4, 1977

WORSHIP The Winth Diocesan Convention of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii opened at 7:55 p.m., in the Keaukaha Room, WaiaKea Resort Village, Hilo Hawaii.

"An Order of Worship for the Evening" (Proposed Book of Common Prayer, pp. 108-114 was led by the Rev. Fred G. Minuth, Headmaster of St. Andrew's Priory School, Honolulu.

The Rt. Rev. Edmond Lee Browning, Diocesan, delivered his annual address. (see section entitled, "Bishop's Address")

CALL TO Convention was called to order at 8:40 p.m. Bishop Browning presided. The Rev. Franklin S.H. Chun was appointed Secretary Pro Tem.

ORDER

The Rev. Canon Curtis R. Zimmerman, registrar, reported a quorum present with 45 clergy (out of 73), and 156 lay delegates (of 180).

Convention was thereby declared open and ready for business.

CONVENTION The Rev. Lynette M. Golderman, Acting Chairman of the Committee on Nominations and Elections presented the slate for the election of a Convention Secretary. A unanimous ballot was cast by Convention for the Rev. Franklin S.H. Chun.

The Rev. Donn H. Brown was appointed by Father Chun, as Assistant Secretary to Convention.

A "Committee to Respond to the Bishop's Address" was appointed by Bishop Browning — The Rev. Charles S. Burger was to act as chairman. (see prior section, "Report of the Committee").

Mr. John A. Lockwood, Chancellor, stated that cumulative voting would not be permitted because it had not been requested 48 hours prior to Convention, as stated by Hawaii state law.

Bishop Browning explained that although these were his appointments **APPOINTMENTS** he would want Convention to have a part in their selection as well. Hence, if a delegate did not concur with the appointment, then no mark on that particular portion of the ballot should be made. If a delegate affirmed the appointment, then the ballot should be marked.

Bishop Browning offered the following, as to the manner of elections: There will be a majority on the first ballot with regards to all officers and the Board of Directors; Plurality, thereafter.

For the Standing Committee, Ecclesiastical Court, and Ecclesiastical Court of Appeals, there should be a majority unless a motion to the contrary

Delegates were reminded that 6 clergy and 18 lay persons were to be elected to the Board. Delegates could vote for less than the required number. Should there be more votes cast for a particular portion on the ballot, only that portion of the ballot would be disqualified.

The Tellers would be supervised by the Nominating Committee -- those who were not running for office.

ANNOUNCEMENTS The Rev. David M. Paisley was recognized as the artist of the carpet mosaic, "Christ", hanging behind the dais.

The meeting concluded for the evening at 10:30 p.m., with prayers from Bishop Browning.

Mr. Henry F. Budd presented the following:

REPORT

"I would like to report that our Diocesan investment portfolio

Short term investments 17,000 Mainland Bonds 1,449,921 Mortgage loans 297,594 Mainland preferred stocks 60,750 Convertible bonds 128,296 Common stocks 1,158,163

This is a total book cost of \$3,111,724.

"The last recapitulation by the Hawaiian Trust Company showed a market value of \$3,093,360. Estimated annual income is \$220,185, which is the equivalent of a 7.12% return on market value and 7.08% on book cost. Fred Overstreet will give more detail on the operation of the Fund.

"Since 1976, when mission arrears to the Diocese were written off, parishes and missions have done a remarkable job of keeping current with their obligations to the Diocesan Office.

"All assessments were paid in full for the year 1976. As of October 1st, 12 churches have paid the full amount due to date; five of these having paid the assessment for the full year. We have voluntary assessments from Kwajalein and the Iolani School Students Association.

"I hesitate to predict a deficit or a surplus for 1977. We have all felt the sting of rising operating costs and the Diocese is no exception. We have made every effort to keep the churches and congregations informed of what is happening throughout the Diocese, and this has been expensive, but a good investment.

"As you can see from the bulk of paper distributed, this has been a very busy year for the Finance and Program Committees, and we should be grateful for the many hours in putting together a Budget for 1978.

"My deep thanks to Nancy Minuth for the wonderful job she has done for us. I am very grateful."

BUDGET 1978

The Rev. Rudolph Duncan, Chairman, Finance Committee of the Board of Directors, presented the following:

He felt that budgeting had two major functions -- 1) it is a tool to control income, and more importantly, expenditures; and 2) it is a tool for planning for the future, and for the planning to become reality.

The Program and Finance Committees, he pointed out, have involved many people in preparing the budget. Seven area meetings were held during the year to explain the budget and to receive input. All were profitable. As a result of the meetings, the Board of Directors did make changes, and the result is now before Convention, to amend, discuss, and approve.

Fr. Duncan called the following persons, involved with the Budget preparation, to come forward and help answer and clarify questions asked from the floor -- Ed Bonsey, Henry Budd, Tom Cahill, Margaret Cameron, Jean Lee, Fred Overstreet, Nat Potter.

The Budget was moved for adoption by the Rev. Mr. Duncan, and seconded.

Bishop Browning opened the floor for discussion, and for questions of clarification.

- Mr. Overstreet then gave a report on the invested income of the Diocese: There are over 30 funds in the Episcopal Endowment Fund, as invested by Hawaiian Trust. Of the 30, four contribute directly to the operating budget. The concern of the Finance Committee is that none of the income from the funds is re-invested. It is all being used for operating expenses. In inflationary times, the income does dwindle.
- Q. (The Rev. Jan. C. Rudinoff, vicar from St. Michael's, Kauai) Is the philosophy of the investments to maximize income?

A. Affirmative

The Very Rev. Herbert N. Conley, dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral, was concerned that the Episcopal Endowment, originally set aside for use in order that we might become a Diocese, was now being used for the operating budget. Dean Conley was afraid that this was a misappropriation of funds. He wanted the Finance Committee to investigate such, within the year.

Mr. Overstreet pointed out that we do operate on approximately 1/3 the amount. And he further pointed out that we are using money left us by our "forbears". Through our assessments we are providing 2/3's of our budget, and getting 1/3 from the trust funds invested.

The Rev. Dr. Paul M. Wheeler, rector from St. Clement's, Oahu, asked that perhaps the Chancellor could comment on the legality of using the Endowment Fund in such a manner. He said that the legality did not concern him so much since the budget is adopted with the concurrence of the individual to whose support that fund is supposed to go. Thus, one could easily interpret it as a gift returned. However, Dr. Wheeler was primarily concerned about the ethics and morality of the practice, as pointed out by Dean Conley.

The Rev. Dr. Claude F. Du Teil, rector from St. Christopher's, Oahu, pointed out that at General Convention, several years ago, the necessity of having an Episcopate Endowment Fund to become a self-supporting diocese was done away with. He did, however, agree with Dean Conley's basic point.

Mr. Steve Carter, from St. Luke's, Oahu, hoped that the investments with Hawaiian Trust Company were in line with church principles.

Mr. Overstreet pointed out that at the 1976 General Convention, a Committee on Social Responsibility was formed. It named 5 companies (in which we now have investments) which were being questioned nationally: Continental Oil, Dow Chemical, Exxon, General Motors, and International Business Machines. The Committee on Social Responsibility did not mandate the selling of any investments, but rather to remain within, and support certain propositions which would be presented later.

Open discussion on the revised budget (having been revised following the area meetings) was now done.

- Q. The Rev. Charles T. Crane, rector from Church of the Holy Nativity, Oahu, wondered about the amount, in payment for professorial duties at Leeward Community College, which the Rev. William R. Grosh placed back into the budget. What will happen to that amount, since Fr. Grosh will be spending half of his time at the Manoa campus?
- A. Fr. Grosh replied that he would not be curtailing his teaching at Leeward Collecge. In addition, he will be able to spend half of his time at Manoa. The details, however, have not yet been worked out.
- (The Rev. Canon Curtis R. Zimmerman, from St. Andrew's Cathedral) Does Convention vote separately on assessments as well as the budget, or does adoption of the budget automatically include adoption of the 15% increase in assessments?
- A. Fr. Duncan responded that adoption of the budget automatically included adoption of the 15% increase in assessments.
- Q. (Mr. Carl Wilson, from St. Stephen's, Oahu) Does the subsidy to a parish then become included in the gross income of that parish for assessment purposes?
 - A. No, it is not included.
- Q. (Mr. Wilson) If a special fund, such as a memorial fund, designated for a specific purpose, is outside the operating income of a parish, is there a difference between the total income and the operating income?
 - "That is correct."
- Mr. Wilson then suggested that perhaps a request should be made to the Board of Directors when reducing the amount of operating income on the annual report.
- Fr. Rudinoff questioned the philosophy of investing income for maximized profit. He felt that the Church should do something other than what

corporations are doing, especially in the way money is invested.

The Rev. John Y.F. Liu, rector from St. Elizabeth's, Oahu, asked Fr. Rudinoff for an alternative to the present policy of investing for maximized

Fr. Rudinoff replied that there were various alternatives -- invest in riskier items; invest in small businesses; invest at a lower rate of interest -- i.e., in order to transform society. Helping people is what we ought to be doing with our money.

The Rev. Dr. Gerald G. Gifford, chaplain from Iolani School, reminded Convention that if we want to continue to employ Hawaiian Trust to do our investing, and we are particular as to what investments we want (being conscious of social issues), then "we have to do our homework", and constantly familiarize ourselves with all the companies with which we have investments, so as to instruct Hawaiian Trust. Or, if we decide not to employ Hawaiian Trust any longer, "we shall then have to do even more homework."

The Rev. Guy H. Piltz, vicar from St. James, "Big Island", told the story of his experience in raising chickens to illustrate that we should not pressure the Board of Directors, Bishop, etc., to "produce" so much. "Require a little less, he said, and they will last longer."

Dean Conley pointed out the alternatives: Either we cut back on the work, should we cut down on income from investments; or else we give more through assessments (as in tithing).

Dr. Du Teil felt that although we may agree with Fr. Rudinoff's philosophy, we cannot lay such a burden on the Committee. Much can be talked about, but cannot be realized.

Fr. Grosh said that there was a delicate balance between endowed income and assessments. "The more you stack away for survival, the less people have a tendency to give. To kill a parish, endow it fully!"

Fr. Liu felt that pressure should be put on each person, as well as the Board of Directors, to produce the most money with which to work. St. Elizabeth's will probably have a deficit budget this year, but it will still give \$2,000 for mission use.

Q. (Mrs. Hazel Mahoe, from Holy Innocents', Maui) Why, if the National Quota figure has increased by 33%, are parishes being increased

by only 15%?

A. Mr. Lockwood explained that two years ago, the quota was \$40,000. Last year it had dropped, but this year it had to be increased by that much more. Since our income was up, the assessment for the diocese went up, since assessments to the National Church are based in the same manner as diocesan assessments.

Mr. Stephen Fitzgerald, from St. Mark's, Oahu, felt that there were some abiguities in the budget. Some committees and programs were "taking the party line", he felt, rather than engaging in discussions and conferences beforehand.

The Rev. W. Edwin Bonsey, rector from Holy Apostles', "Big Island", pointed out that although one area meeting might produce recommendations in the budget, all area meetings' suggestions were taken into account by the Board of Directors. Changes were made on the basis of all such recommendations.

Fr. Grosh replied that as far as the Committee on Human Sexuality was concerned, there was no "party line". His Committee is composed of all kinds of people with all kinds of opinions. They had just had a weekend conference, from which they planned their program, and decided to work first with the clergy.

Dr. Wheeler, a member of that Committee said that the study had been mandated by General Convention, and that a report will be made at the 1979 meeting.

Q. (Mr. Michael Mitchell, from Holy Cross, Oahu) Will there be an adjustment in the budget as a result of the creation of the Financial Officer's position, as mentioned in the Bishop's Address?

A. (Fr. Duncan) The Treasurer's salary would be used to pay for the salary of the Financial Officer.

Mr. Larry Grant, from Holy Nativity, Oahu, was concerned that money for Cursillos and Marriage Encounters had been cut from the budget.

Mrs. Margaret Cameron, from Good Shepherd, Maui, pointed out that there was not sufficient time to do a thorough job of budgeting. Moreover, a 2-year budget was really needed in order to gather all information and evaluate programs. Information on some programs had been received too late in order to be placed into the budget. Furthermore, it was hoped that Cursillos would be self-supporting.

Mr. Overstreet pointed out that the smount for Evangelism was in response to an appeal from the floor, and that there was no outlined program for Evangelism submitted for this year.

Mr. Robert Brooks, from St. Jude's, "Big Island", reported that his church received a <u>no</u> interest loan to build the church. Also the bishop had given a generator for the church's use. The members are all very thankful especially for the loan.

The Rev. Homer S. Vanture, from St. George's, Oahu, spoke in his capacity as Chairman on the Committee on Evangelism. He reported that of the \$5,000 given the Committee, \$1,000 was given to the Committee on Prayer and Devotional Life for their Cursillo work. However the Committee on Prayer and Devotional Life did not receive the \$1,000, which meant that the Committee on Evangelism did not spend all its \$5,000 amount. A freeze had been put on spending at end of the year, and thus the Committee was left with a surplus. "Marriage Encounter" (part of the Evangelism program) is totally self-supporting.

Fr. Duncan reported that he had checked with the Rev. Vincent O'Neill who is in charge of Cursillos, and that Fr. O'Neill did not think more funds were needed.

Mr. Michael Town, from St. John's, Maui, wanted to see investments in companies which do not deal in tobacco, pollution, armaments, etc. He preferred investing in companies that would yield the same income compatible with standards set by the Committee on Social Responsibility, and also would like such a report at the next Convention.

Bishop Browning pointed out that the Executive Council had passed resolutions stating that they would prefer to keep investments in some companies, so that churches can influence the companies as regards the stockholders. He stated that the Diocese will make the effort to get the standards of criteria from the National Church.

Miss Bea Ware, from St. Philip's, Oahu, thanked the Board of Directors for publishing the list of the stocks. She spoke in gratitude to the Bishop, and Treasurer for this year's budget procedure and presentation. For the first time since 1938, she remarked, she had had the Church's various finances and funds explained to her satisfaction and pleasure.

Mr. Ken Harding, from St. Michael's, Kauai, wanted a breakdown of the income from each of the investments for each church. He wanted an annual report, too, from each of the companies with whom we had investments.

- Q. (Mr. Keith Adamson, from Holy Nativity, Oahu) Is there any flexibility in the budget once it is passed? For operational purposes, would there be some flexibility between programs after the budget is passed?
- A. (Mrs. Cameron) Yes, there is flexibility between programs. (Fr. Bonsey) The Board of Directors is the Convention in recess, and does have the power to make adjustments in the budget.

Q. (The Rev. Charles S. Burger, rector from Holy Innocents', Maui)

What about the Diocesan subsidy to Good Shepherd?

A. Mr. John Wilmington, from Good Shepherd, Maui, gave the background of the Philippine Independent Church minister on Maui. Good Shepherd had subsidized the P.I.C. salary. Now, Good Shepherd and the P.I.C. congregation are united, and the subsidy is presently used to pay the Rev. Justo R. Andres' salary. They hope to eliminate the \$11,000 subsidy within 3-5 years.

Fr. Bonsey said that of the total \$23,000 for Fr. Andres' salary,

only \$11,000 is not covered by Good Shepherd.

Mrs. Bev Beardsley, from St. Stephen's, Oahu, was concerned that the Committee on Evangelism and the Committee on Prayer and Devotional Life "had been cut", and yet there was no standard of mission that was written, to be sent to the Committees.

Bishop Browning replied that the Planning Conference in May would

speak to just such problems.

Canon Zimmerman asked that the Program Committee make an evaluation (during the coming year) of the Committees' objectives so that when next year's budget is derived, Convention can then look at what the Committee's goals are, what they have accomplished, and then decide whether they need more allocation or less.

Fr. Crane commended the Board of Directors for all the area meetings, and for the hard work.

He called for the question.

((discussion))


The Rt. Rev. Edmond L. Browning called upon the Rev. Dr. Elsbery W. Reynolds (chm., Committee on Resolutions) to present a resolution to change the agenda's Order of Business.

Dr. Reynolds moved that the resolution be accepted. The motion was seconded.

The rationale behind this resolution were these:

- 1. To seat the St. Luke's delegation, which had been a mission for 75 years, as a parish;
- 2. Three resolutions pertained to the Board of Directors. Prior to the election of the Board, these resolutions ought to be considered, since the resolutions were concerned with the restructuring of the Board;
- 3. Permitting the consideration of the 1978 budget, first on the agenda, Saturday morning.

ST. LUKE'S MISSION TO PARISH STATUS

St. Luke's Episcopal Church

- WHEREAS, St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Honolulu, was founded in 1903 by the Rt. Reverend Henry Bond Restarick, Bishop of Honolulu, as a mission to the Korean immigrants of Monolulu, and
- WHEREAS, St. Luke's Church has seen 74 years of Christian mission and ministry in Honolulu, and
- WHEREAS, the notable efforts of Christ-centered laity such as Mr. Sang Ha Park, Mr. P. Y. Cho, and Mrs. Bong Soon Chung; and clergy such as Fr. Noah K. Cho, T.S.F., and Fr. Paul H. Kim laid a strong foundation for the future of this ministry, and
- WHEREAS, the Episcopal Church's Episcopal Asian American Strategies Taskforce (EAST) program has done much in the last three years to renew the life of this congregation and helped to develop a bi-lingual ministry to newly-arrived Korean immigrants, and
- WHEREAS, the present and projected financial status of St. Luke's Church will enable it to sustain and also expand its present ministries program and support a fully-stipended Rector, and
- WHEREAS, the Bishop's Committee of St. Luke's Church on September 28, 1977, voted unanimously to seek Parish status, and
- WHEREAS, the congregation of St. Luke's Church meeting on October 2, 1977 voted unanimously to apply for Parish status, and
- WHEREAS, the congregation does accede to the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and to those of the Diocese of Hawaii, and promises obedience to the Canons, and conformity to the doctrine, discipline and worship of the Episcopal Church, therefore
- BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bishop and the Diocese of Hawaii, sitting in session November 4, 5, 6, 1977, in Hilo, Hawaii, be requested to issue a Certificate of Erection of St. Luke's Church into a Parish of the Diocese of Hawaii.

RESOLUTION "B"

((discussion))

The Rt. Rev. Edmond L. Browning, bishop, called upon the Rev. George Lee, vicar from St. Luke's, Oahu, to present the resolution. Fr. Lee asked the Bishop's Warden, Henry Sung, to read the resolution.

Mr. Sung moved that the resolution be accepted; It was seconded by Fr. Lee.

Hazel Lee, a member of St. Luke's since 1923, and now a member of the Bishop's Committee, and also the vice-president of the women's group commented on the history of St. Luke's. She spoke movingly of the mission's struggles and (now) successful efforts to become a parish.

Fr. Lee reflected upon the situation, and summed it up by saying that St. Luke's "formerly a missionary mission had now become a missionary parish."

CARRIED, UNANIMOUSLY, BY STANDING OVATION:

Resolution "B" passed, as originally presented.

Bishop Browning extended his congratulations to St. Luke's Parish, and also to its large delegation, present, at Convention.

SUPPORT OF CHRISTIANS IN AFRICA....

RESOLVED that we support the faithful witness of our Christian brothers and sisters in southern Africa by: condemning racism including the blatant examples of human injustice in the apartheid policies of South Africa, Namibia, and Zimbabwe; and

RESOLVED that we support the faithful witness of our Christian brothers and sisters in Uganda by condemning the regime of torture, mayhem, and murder, including the murder of a Bishop of the Anglican Church; and

RESOLVED that we send a copy of this resolution to the President of the United States, our Senators and Representatives, the Presiding Bishop, and to the General Convention, and also the Archbishop of Capetown and the Archbishop of Uganda; and

RESOLVED that we refer this resolution to our ad hoc Committee on Human Rights with the request that they bring to the attention of the Diocese this year what specifically we can do to implement our concern that has been raised by this resolution.

RESOLUTION 1

((discussion))

The Rev. Brian J. Grieves (ad hoc Chm., Committee on Human Rights) read the resolution, and on behalf of the 31 co-signers from the Church of the Holy Nativity moved the adoption of the resolution; It was seconded.

amendment:

Mr. Christopher Magee from St. Mary's, Oahu, moved the amendment to the resolution on behalf of the Vestry of St. Mary's Church. The amendment was seconded.

Mr. Magee said that the Vestry's position was reflected in a statement by the Jamaican Prime Minister (New York Times, June 10, 1977) who denounced President Amin as a cause for shame for all mankind, and accused the third world of hypocrisy and condemning racist tyranny in white-ruled South African while ignoring Amin. The condemnation should extend to other areas besides South Africa.

Mr. Peter Taylor, from St. John's, Kauai, spoke in favor of the resolution, but could not accept the wording of it. No one, he felt, really knew what was taking place in Africa. No one could prove that the Bishop of the Anglican Church was murdered. Mr. Taylor proposed an amendment to the amendment to read:

"Resolved that we support the faithful witness of our Christian brothers and sisters in Africa."

Mr. Magee on behalf of St. Mary's would not accept the amendment to the amendment.

However, the amendment to the amendment was seconded; and discussion began on it.

The Rev. Robert D. Rowley, Jr., Dean of St. of Andrew's Priory School, Oahu, spoke against the amendment to the amendment. He spoke from experiences of a close friend, Charles B. Obaikol, a fellow deacon from the Church in Uganda. Charles has been told by the government of Uganda and also by the executive Council of the Episcopal Church, that as a Christian minister he cannot return to Uganda. In addition, Fr. Rowley has learned from missionary friends, from instructors in the Uganda seminary, and from Charles that there is murder, mayhem, and torture of Christians in Uganda. Fr. Rowley asked that we not remove references to countries on which we have evidence that torture of Christians goes on. He also asked that prayers be offered for those who risk their lives by gathering (as we gather today) and celebrating the Eucharist on Sunday.

Mr. Magee spoke against the amendment to the amendment. He referred to Mr. Taylor's remark of insufficient proof of the Archbishop's murder, by citing several references. Mr. Magee felt that there was sufficient proof of the murder.

Fr. Grieves said that he was opposed to the amendment to the amendment.

Mr. Taylor again spoke to say that he felt that the amendment adequately covered what had been said.

DEFEATED: The Amendment to the Amendment was lost.

Fr. Grieves said that neither the original resolution nor the amendment were his. However, speaking for the Holy Nativity submitters of the resolution, he said that they could not support the amendment from St. Mary's Vestry, because they did not want their resolution to become so vague and general that it would lose its meaning. He, however, is personally in favor of the amendment.

amendment to amendment:

Ms. Paula B. Rudinoff, from St. Michael and All Angels', Kauai, spoke in favor of the amendment from St. Mary's Vestry. However, she felt that the resolution concerned two different issues: In South Africa, a white society is oppressing a black majority; In Uganda, on the other hand, one black person is oppressing a whole nation. The resolution should be separated somehow — one paragraph speaking on South Africa, and another on Uganda. This would make the resolution clearer and more effective:

"Resolved that we support the faithful witness of our Christian brothers and sisters in southern Africa by: condemning racism including the blatant examples of human injustice in the apartheid policies of South Africa, Namibia, and Zimbabwe; and

"Resolved that we support the faithful witness of our Christian brothers and sisters in Uganda by condemning the regime of torture, mayhem, and murder, including the murder of a Bishop of the Anglican Church."

Mr. Magee on behalf of St. Mary's would not accept the amendment to the amendment.

However, the amendment to the amendment was seconded; and discussion began on it.

The Rev. Charles T. Crane, rector from Holy Nativity, Oahu, stated he has felt badly that he did not sign the original document. To mention the injustices in South Africa without mentioning the injustices in Rhodesia

was to decry only one side of the story. However, since then, South Africa's actions reinforce the notion of what is taking place, and makes him further lament his not signing the resolution with his flock, in the beginning. Fr. Crane supports wholeheartedly having two separate resolutions. He spoke strongly in favor of two separate resolutions or two separate resolves.

The Rt. Rev. Edmond L. Browning, bishop, reminded Fr. Crane that the amendment to the amendment already contained two separate resolves.

Dr. Moheb Ghali, from St. Mary's, stated that he felt the amendment to the amendment was out of order, because the presenter of the resolution from Holy Nativity had accepted the amendment. Thus, he felt there should be no discussion of it, or vote upon it as it had been accepted as part of the resolution.

Bishop Browning stated that the amendment to the amendment was not yet accepted.

Dr. Ghali referred to Fr. Grieves' statement which said that he was in favor of the amendment.

The Bishop said that Fr. Grieves was, at that moment, not speaking for the submitters of the resolution.

Dr. Ghali then asked the presenters of the resolution if they would accept the amendment.

Dr. Ghali was ruled out of order, the Bishop reminding him that Convention was presently dealing with the amendment to the amendment.

PASSED: The Amendment to the Amendment was approved.

PASSED: The Amendment was approved.

The Rev. Dr. Claude F. Du Teil, rector from St. Christopher's, Oahu, asked the proposers of the resolution what they would do with it. Will it merely "sit" as a matter of record, or will it be sent to those concerned?

Fr. Grieves stated that he hoped the resolution would strengthen our resolve to look more firmly at the problem as it exists in South Africa and Uganda. Secondly, he hoped that it would strengthen our resolve to look beyond those areas to the larger world. And thirdly, that it will strengthen our resolve to look within our own Diocese. Ethnic problems do exist within this Diocese. Divisiveness and economic differences keep us apart. It is only on these that he asked that the resolution be passed.

Bishop Browning felt that a consciousness was certainly being raised among our Diocese, and this was what Fr. Grieves was addressing himself towards.

(additional) a mendment:

Dr. Du Teil offered a suggestion, and then presented it as an additional amendment:

"Resolved that we send a copy of this resolution to the President of the United States, and refer it to our ad hoc Committee on Human Rights with the request that they bring to the attention of the Diocese this year what specifically we can do to implement our concern that has been raised by this resolution."

It was seconded, and opened for discussion.

Mrs. Richard Bond (Jan) inquired on the portion of the resolution which stated "We understand that we share in the divisiveness throughout the world today...."

Bishop Browning asked her to wait on her question. She was ruled out of order, as we were now discussing Dr. Du Teil's amendment.

The Rev. Dr. Gerald G. Gifford, chaplain of Iolani School, Oahu, said he felt that the resolve should include our Senators and the House of Representatives.

Dr. Du Teil accepted that addition.

The Rev. Franklin S.H. Chun, Secretary of Convention, added that the resolution should be sent to the Presiding Bishop, and to the General Convention, as well.

This was accepted by Dr. Du Teil.

Fr. Grieves asked whether the Archbishop of Capetown and also the Archbishop of Uganda could be added. They were.

PASSED: The additional amendment was approved.

Dr. Raymond Nunn, from St. Clement's, Oahu, stated that he had a problem with the wording of the resolution — "We support the faithful witness of our brothers and sisters in Southern Africa." Some of the significant supporters of racism, he pointed out, are the Christians in South Africa. They are not our brothers and sisters, but they are still Christians. He could not offer a better amendment to the resolution, but still felt that it was a problem.

Mrs. Bond questioned the sentence which stated that we share in the divisiveness. Do we all really share in the divisiveness of the world, today?

Fr. Grieves answered that we do, because of the Church's investments. Also, as delegates, we are all responsible and involved.

The Rev. Covy E. Blackmon, vicar from St. Philip's, Oahu, begged Convention to consider the consequences of the resolution. In our attempt to help the people of Africa, we could condemn them to death. He felt that reprisals might be taken against the people whom we are trying to help.

Fr. Crane felt that our own racism has been questioned as well. We admitted St. Luke's (which has a great Japanese, Korean, and Chinese heritage) as a Parish, the previous night. And yet, we have elected a Board without one director of Japaneses, Chinese, nor Filipino ancestry.

Dr. Du Teil reminded Fr. Grieves that investments and stocks are an entirely different matter. The selling of investments needs to be thought through, very carefully.

RESOLUTION 2

((discussion))

The Rev. Charles T. Crane (chm., Committee on Stewardship), presented the resolution. He moved the adoption; and it was seconded.

Dr. Moheb Ghali, from St. Mary's, Oahu, mentioned that the \$5,500 was in addition to the \$3,500 which we had approved earlier this morning for stewardship, and that it will be spent on the consultant Ashley Hale.

Fr. Crane said that he, the Bishop, and also the Stewardship Committee felt that no one else had the experience in fund raising and the knowledge of our Diocese as Hale. A contract has already been negotiated with him for the coming year — the total stewardship package passed this morning. Now \$5,500 is being put before Convention to consider. "If a campaign is to be conducted, we must know where that money is coming from, we must have reasonable goals, and we must have the capacity to anticipate that we can do that which we hope to do. We need to have some evaluation, some assessment of leadership, and that all costs money...."

Discussion was interrupted for Noon Day prayers.

Dr. Thomas G. Cahill, from St. Timothy's, Oahu, asked how \$5,500 was determined, and for what other purpose will those funds be used.

Fr. Crane answered that the funds are exclusively fees for Hale as consultant.

Dr. Cahill stated that he was "torn on this motion." He did see a need for the program. However, much of the Needs Assessments has been done within the past year by several churches. Hence, many of the goals, objectives, and information was already accumulated less than a year ago. Dr. Cahill questioned the wisdom of spending an additional \$5,500 now, to repeat essentially the same thing.

Dr. John Ferguson, from St. Christopher's, Oahu, felt that there was a duplication of tasks. In the Diocesan Budget, 1978, the Diocesan Planning Conference in May would seem to cover that which the resolution would cover.

The Very Rev. Herbert N. Conley, dean from St. Andrew's Cathedral, Oahu, proposed an amendment to the resolution. In the fifth paragraph, delete "...should the findings of the survey be in the affirmative...." He felt that what we are deciding is not whether we can, but whether we will. Father Crane accepted the deletion.

The Rev. Dr. Claude F. DuTeil, rector from St. Christopher's, Oahu, asked whether the \$5,500 was being spent to find out if need to ask "Venture in Mission" for funds.

Fr. Crane answered, "No." Hale's job was to determine "how much we can raise, who can provide leadership, and how and when this is to be done." This does not include the fees for the actual campaign.

Dr. DuTeil remarked, "So we are talking about a double-barreled campaign -- one for the Diocese and one for Venture in Mission."

Fr. Crane replied, "No." Venture in Mission will include fund raising for the national, for the local, and in some cases parochial.

To which Dr. DuTeil replied, "Then it's triple-barreled."

The Rt. Rev. Edmond L. Browning, bishop, interjected, "It's really quadruple-barreled, with the National and International."

The Rev. Dr. Paul M. Wheeler, rector from St. Clement's, Oahu, asked for a response to Dr. Ferguson's question: "Is there a duplication between Stewardship and the Planning Conference?"

Fr. Crane answered, "No conflict or very little." In planning, we will discuss programs, planning, structure (organizational structure, not building). This is talking about capital needs, part of which may come up at the Planning Conference.

Dr. Ferguson felt that there were two different aspects of the Planning Conference (as referred to in the Diocesan Budget 1978). \$3,000 is for the Planning Conference, and \$5,500 is to do something under this present resolution. He suggested that we amend one of these mandates, perhaps delete \$3,000 from one and add \$2,000 to the other.

Fr. Crane felt that one fund could not be taken from and placed into another. The Planning Conference Committee will be bringing The Rt. Rev. Jack Wyatt from Spokane, Washington, and also subsidizing delegates who are unable to pay their way to the Conference. On the other hand, Venture in Mission is asking for fees to pay the consultant.

The Rev. William R. Grosh, chaplain at Leeward Community College, saw the issue as to whether we would enter into "Venture in Mission." The issue is, "Will we retain a professional fund raiser to help us?" He felt that the Diocese needed professional help. In his opinion, we should hire Hale.

The Rev. W. Edwin Bonsey, rector from Holy Apostles, Island of Hawaii, remarked that the interrelationship between Venture in Mission and the Planning Conference is being considered. The Planning Conference will focus on the task that needs to be done, while Fr. Crane's survey will focus on what tools we will need for that task, and where we need to go to obtain them.

Debate was closed by a voice vote. The amendment was passed.

POWERS AND TERM OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

BE IT RESOLVED that Article IV of the Charter of Incorporation of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii be amended in its entirety to read:

"The Corporate powers, business, and property of said corporation shall be exercised, conducted, and controlled by a Board of Directors which shall consist of the Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor, or Suffragan Bishop for the time being exercising Episcopal office in the Hawaiian Islands, who shall be the President and a Director ex officio, and not less than seven other Directors, whose number and term shall be fixed and who shall be elected by the Convention of the Church, organized and voting in accordance with the Canon Rules, Regulations and Discipline of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, which Convention while so organized and voting, shall constitute the membership of the Corporation.

RESOLUTION 4

TERMS OF OFFICE, MANNER OF ELECTING THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

BE IT RESOLVED, that Article I of the By-Laws of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii be amended in its entirety to read:

The Board of Directors shall consist of twenty-four members, in addition to the President, of whom, six shall be clerical members (presbyter or deacon) and eighteen shall be lay members. Each elected Director shall be, at the time of election, a communicant and if a clerical member (presbyter or deacon) shall be canonically resident in the Diocese of Hawaii. Two clerical members and six lay members shall be elected to serve 3-year terms or until their successors are elected by every convention except as initially required to achieve staggered terms.

The manner of electing Directors shall be by ballot. A majority vote shall be required for election on the first ballot. In the event an insufficient number of Directors are elected in either order on the first ballot, such additional Directors shall be elected on a second ballot by the plurality rule.

Vacancies on the Board will be filled by annual Convention. If subsequent to the election the Board of Directors does not include a Director from each county, an additional Director, either clergy or lay, shall be elected for a one year term from each of the said counties not otherwise represented.

A majority of the Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. No elected Director shall serve concurrently on the Standing Committee.

No Director who has served a full 3-year term shall be eligible for reelection until the annual Convention next following the Convention at which said term expires.

RESOLUTION 4

((discussion))

The resolution was presented by Mr. Robert A. Merriam, chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons. He moved the adoption, and it was seconded.

Dr. Thomas G. Cahill, from St. Timothy's, Oahu, spoke in favor of the resolution, but with some reservations. He felt that 24 members might make the Board unwieldy, and also, that the added expense of transporting so many Board members to the meeting on Oahu might be too costly. Should the resolution be adopted, he suggested that the Board review the changes in membership as presented in the resolution, after a year's trial.

Mr. Hugh Shearer, from St. Andrew's Cathedral, Oahu, asked for a definition of the term, "clerical" members — did it mean "an ordained priest"? He was more familiar with the terms "clergy" and "lay". Mr. John A. Lockwood, Chancellor, replied that the term was derived from existing By-Laws.

It was felt that the term "presbyter" might be more accurate.

Mr. Shearer spoke in favor of the resolution, but felt that with staggered terms, the number of Board Members being elected at each Convention would be reduced, and that with a reduced number of nominees, the use of cumulative voting would be less valuable.

The Rev. Charles T. Crane, rector from Holy Nativity, Oahu, asked about the election of County delegates to the Board. In answer to his question: County delegates to the Board must be voted upon at Convention.

The Rev. Peter E. Van Horne, rector from St. John's, Maui, urged that clergy members on the Board should be canonically resident. It was pointed out that this was so stated in the existing By-Laws.

The Rev. Curtis R. Zimmerman, from St. Andrew's Cathedral, Oahu, stated that "clerical" meant bishops, priests, and deacons. He moved an amendment to read: (line 4 of the resolution):

"...and if a clerical member (presbyter or deacon) shall be canonically resident in the Diocese of Hawaii."

It was seconded.

The Rev. Dr. Claude F. DuTeil, rector from St. Christopher's, Oahu, felt that the term clerical member should also be defined in line 2, to read

"...six shall be clerical members (presbyter or deacon) and eighteen shall be lay members."

This was also accepted. The amendment was passed.

CARRIED: Resolution 4 passed, as amended.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Finance Committee draw up a plan for financial management education and budgetary evaluation for the organizations which are being subsidized, and report to the 1978 Convention on its implementation and the results obtained.

RESOLUTION 7

A RESIDENT PRIEST FOR GRACE CHURCH, MOLOKAI

WHEREAS Grace Episcopal Church, Hoolehua, Molokai has been an organized mission of the Diocese of Hawaii since 1954, an outgrowth of the church's earlier work on Molokai beginning in the 1930's with the founding of Shingle Memorial Hospital and its Holy Cross Chapel in Hoolehua, and St. Paul's Mission in Maunaloa; and

WHEREAS Grace Church has been without a resident Vicar since January 1969, making Molokai the only major inhabited Hawaiian Island where the Episcopal Church is established which does not have a full-time Episcopal priest in residence; and

WHEREAS the absence of full-time clergy leadership since 1969 has resulted in an inevitable decline in Church membership and progrms, and a consequent erosion of morale; and

WHEREAS the leadership of part-time Vicar Charles G. Kamohoalii Hopkins, Jr. and the implementation in 1977 of a four-clergy team ministry as an interim measure (in response to the congregation's needs assessment and goal-setting action in 1976 reiterating its plea for a resident priest) has resulted in rekindled interest, involvement, and the re-establishment of long-neglected programs and services; and

WHEREAS Molokai's depressed and changing economy, with its consequent social and political impact within a population base comprised of ethnic groups common to all Hawaii, represents an excellent opportunity for the Episcopal Church, with its diversity of membership and ministry, to further its outreach and service to the Molokai Community; and

WHEREAS the members of Grace Church remain convinced that their mission and community fully warrant and require the services of a resident priest; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the Diocese of Hawaii prayerfully address its full resources to this opportunity for mission and ministry, and give the highest priority to placing - at the earliest possible date - a full-time resident priest at Grace Church, Hoolehua, Molokai.

Frances Manuel, from Grace Church, Molokai, thanked the churches on Maui for their support. He now asked Convention's help in obtaining a resident priest for Molokai; and he hoped that by January of 1979, that there would be a resident priest.

THE PRIESTING OF WOMEN

WHEREAS, our Presiding Bishop, The Rt. Rev. John M. Allin, has offered to resign if the Church cannot accept his opposition to the ordination of women priests; and

WHEREAS, Bishop Allin has stated before the September 1977 meeting of the House of Bishops that he does not believe "That women can be priests any more than they can become fathers or husbands"; and

WHEREAS, there are large numbers of Episcopalians who concur in Bishop Allin's views about the priesting of women and are deeply troubled by the recent priesting of women in the United States; and

- 2) Urges the Bishop of Hawaii, The Rt. Rev. Edmond L. Browning, not to encourage the priesting of women in the Diocese of Hawaii.
- 3) Directs the Secretary of Convention to send a copy of this Resolution to The Rt. Rev. John M. Allin.

The Rev. Dr. Elsbery W. Reynolds (Chm., Committee on Resolutions) moved the adoption of the resolution; It was seconded.

The Rev. George Lee, on behalf of the Commission on Ministry, responded that this resolution reopened discussion which was already resolved by the General Convention meeting in Minneapolis last year. Presiding Bishop, The Rt. Rev. John M. Allin's position on ordination of women is not one of opposition, but is one of conscience in that he cannot participate in such ordination. The Commission's feeling is that this resolution is not helpful. Personally, Fr. Lee said that he would vote against the resolution.

Mr. Christopher Magee, from St. Mary's, Oahu, stated that in spite of what is done at a General Convention, issues can be reopened. He urged support of the resolution.

Dr. Moheb Ghali, from St. Mary's, also spoke in favor of the resolution. He felt it an obligation and our responsibility to give the Presiding Bishop, support. Anyone who felt uneasy about the subject should voice his opinion as an indication of support. "You are not a disloyal member of the Church, if you are not convinced of the validity of the ordination of women." Furthermore, this resolution is not a threat on any particular individual, nor was it intended to apply retroactively. It merely urges the Bishop to take into consideration the feelings of those who are uneasy about the ordination of women.

The Rev. Dr. Paul M. Wheeler (Chm. Committee on Ecumenism), rector from St. Clement's, Oahu, stated that the ordination of women has not done damage to the ecumenical relation for reunion with the Roman Catholic Church. In fact, there is a movement within the Roman Church for the ordination of women.

The Rev. Guy H. Piltz, vicar from St. James', Island of Hawaii, thanked Dr. Ghali for his remarks. Fr. Piltz would not be able to encougage the Bishop to violate his conscience any more than he would expect the Bishop to encourage him to violate his.

Mr. Robert Speer, from Holy Apostles', Island of Hawaii, did not feel anything constructive would come from passing or not passing this resolution.

He moved that the resolution be tabled; It was seconded.

TABLED: A voice vote being too close, a standing vote was then taken -- 91 in favor of tabling; 77 against.

Resolution 8 was tabled, as originally presented.

RESOLUTION 9

USE OF THE 1928 B.C.P. BEYOND 1979

WHEREAS an Amendment to Article X of the Constitution was proposed at The General Convention of 1976, which will make the Proposed Book of Common Prayer The Book of Common Prayer; and

WHEREAS, this Amendment will be acted upon finally at The General Convention of 1979; and

WHEREAS, there have recently arisen a number of divisive issues threatening the unity of our Church and the prospects of unity with other Churches; and

WHEREAS, it is the duty of the Church to assuage differences amongst us; and

WHEREAS, there are those among us who love the 1928 Book of Common Prayer for its familiarity and the beauty of its prose and poetry; and

WHEREAS, the 1928 Book of Common Prayer has many points of similarity to prayer books used in other branches of the Anglican Communion; and

WHEREAS, no ecclesiastical harm can come from the use of the 1928 Book of Common Prayer, sometimes or always, by congregations which desire such usage: therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the delegation from the Diocese of Hawaii to the 1979 Convention should be urged to vote against the aforementioned Amendment to Article X, unless the Amendment is modified by the following additional paragraph or words to similar effect:

"However, any congregation which desires, sometimes or always, to use the 1928 Book of Common Prayer, may do so."

Mrs. Betty Caskey, member of the Diocesan Committee on Liturgy, presented a report ((see pages, following)) in response to Resolution 9.

Mr. Christopher Magee, from St. Mary's, Oahu, stated that he was not against the use of the new prayer book. He felt that people glory in the familiar — the 1928 Prayer Book enriches our spiritual lives. He urged approval of the resolution.

Dr. Moheb Ghali, from St. Mary's, wanted no one left with the thought that St. Mary's did not study the Proposed Book. Those who favor the 1928 Prayer Book should be allowed to continue the use of it. He believed that allowing both to co-exist, would allow for unity within the Church.

Mr. Frederick Overstreet, from St. Timothy's, Oahu, also urged the accomodation within the Church for those who want to continue using the 1928 Prayer Book.

FAILED: Resolution was defeated, as originally presented.

REPORT FROM THE DIOCESAN LITURGICAL COMMISSION

TO THE NINTH DIOCESAN CONVENTION

At the request of the Resolutions Committee, the Diocesan Liturgical Commission, meeting on October 29, 1977, prepared the following response to Resolution Nine:

- 1. The Liturgical Commission readily acknowledges that the revision process of the Book of Common Prayer has been hard for many in the Episcopal Church to understand and accept. Our own Commission is composed of persons who have initially responded both positively and negatively to the work of revision. It is our experience, however, that where extensive information and instruction have been given on the history and development of our Christian worship, Episcopalians have come to appreciate the Proposed Book of Common Prayer as a valuable addition to our Anglican heritage -- it even allows us to do those things we have been doing for years without proper authority: The imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday; the distribution of palms on Palm Sunday; and the corporate recitation of the Prayer of Humble Access and Post-Communion Prayer of Thanksgiving, which the rubrics of the 1928 Book of Common Prayer require to be said by the priest alone.
- It is the unanimous opinion of the Liturgical Commission that it is both unwise and divisive to allow by General Convention action the continued use of the 1928 Book of Common Prayer after it has been superseeded by proper authority. Even a cursory review of history clearly shows that almost every revision of the Book of Common Prayer both in England and America has taken place in the midst of great controversy. Archbishop Thomas Cranmer reported in his diary that when the first Book of Common Prayer was used, "the dissatisfied were not content to protest, they turned to violence. A priest in Devonshire was surrounded by his congregation carrying pitchforks and scythes and compelled under threat of personal danger to substitute the Latin Mass." Even those who remember the days of revision leading to adoption of the present 1928 Book of Common Prayer, attest to opposition at least as vehement as that which we have recently been experiencing. This has been the response to that which Anglicans have proudly and boldly proclaimed as "our incomparable liturgy." To have two prayer books authorized for use in our Church will only further divide our people. There is no question that the Elizabethan language contained in many Anglican prayer books issued in the past is magnificent prose and poetry. We must always remember, however, that our worship of Almighty God is rooted in the reality of the present, not solely in the remembered beauty and history of the past. Our Proposed Book of Common Prayer recovers much

Those involved in liturgical revision were sensitive to the needs of many persons to worship in traditional language; therefore, both traditional and modern English rites have been included in the proposed book.

of the early tradition of Christian worship and in many ways is patterned after the current editions of prayer books in use throughout the Anglican Communion.

- 3. When the <u>Proposed Book of Common Prayer</u> was published for use during the 1976-1979 trienium, our bishop requested that the book be the "customary" within the diocese--that is that although every congregation was not required to use any specific services, it has been expected that each congregation would study the new book in some detail, and know much of the rationale behind many of the proposed changes. Where this has been done -- almost without exception -- the response to the proposed book has been positive and joyful. It has been an occasion to rediscover our past and more clearly uncover and discover that which we are called to do in our corporate worship life.
- 4. Finally, whatever recommendations we submit to our Deputies to General Convention should not be coming forth only one third of the way through the trienium. It is our unanimous belief that such recommendations be made at the Diocesan Convention immediately preceding the 1979 General Convention.

Therefore, the Diocesan Liturgical Commission recommends that Resolution Nine be defeated.

RESOLUTION 11

RETIRED BISHOPS AS VOTING MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS

WHEREAS an amendment to Section 2 of Article I of the Constitution was proposed at the General Convention of 1976 and is to be finally acted upon at the General Convention of 1979, to insert the words "and has not retired." so that the amendment would deny retired bishops votes in the House of Bishops; and

WHEREAS this exclusion of retired bishops is discriminatory, since no similar exclusion of retired Presbyters or Lay Persons from voting in the House of Deputies is proposed; and

WHEREAS it has not been shown that the knowledge, wisdom, judgement or guidance of the Holy Spirit diminish or cease at the retirement of a bishop so that the exclusion of retired bishops is justifiable; and

WHEREAS it is our belief that the experience, judgement and knowledge of retired bishops constitute valuable assets to the Church; Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Episcopal Church in Hawaii delcares its opposition to the proposed amendment to Section 2 of Article I of the Constitution;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this delcaration be made known to the other parts of the Church by sending copies of this Resolution to the Presiding Bishop, the Executive Secretary of the General Convention and to each of the Dioceses of the Episcopal Church;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the delegation to the 1979 General Convention from the Diocese of Hawaii be urged to abide by this Resolution in voting on the proposed amendment to the Constitution.

The Rev. Curtis R. Zimmerman, canon of St. Andrew's Cathedral, Oahu, pointed out that our own Constitution and Canons do not allow a retired bishop, seat or vote in our own Convention.

The Rt. Rev. Edmond L. Browning, bishop, remarked that when this issue came up in the House of Bishops, it was noted that within all other branches of the Anglican Communion, no retired bishops are given a seat, or a vote.

Dr. Moheb Ghali, from St. Mary's, Oahu, felt that it would preserve the dignity of the retired bishops, if they were allowed to vote.

The Rev. David K. Kennedy, rector from St. Timothy's, Oahu, wryly stated that he knew of one retired bishop (referring to his father, The Rt. Rev. Harry S. Kennedy), who felt strongly against the resolution. Retired bishops are not accountable for any consequences stemming from their votes.

RESOLUTION 14

A STUDY OF THE SOCIAL SECURITY SYSTEM AS IT APPLIES TO CLERGY

Whereas most of the clergy have elected to participate in the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (Social Security and participate as self-employed individuals contributing 1½ times the amount that regular employees contribute, and,

Whereas both the ceiling on taxable income for Social Security purposes and the rates of taxation have increased over the years and under pending legislation will increase dramatically by 1981, and,

Whereas, in the near future clergy under Social Security will be spending about a tenth of their income on Social Security taxes, alone, e.g., the Social Security tax on an income of \$15,000 in 1981 will be \$1473.75*, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Bishop appoint, upon nomination by the Chancellor, a committee consisting of Tax Specialists, Attorneys, securities consultants, and representative clergy to study the Social Security Act as it applies to Clergy in all of its ramifications, and be it further

RESOLVED that this committee report its findings, which shall include clarification of the law, the possibilities for changing the status of clergy coverage, if desirable, means of funding clergy participation, if feasible, and advice to new clergy entering the ministry as they determine whether or not to participate in the Social Security System, and alternatives open to clergy now covered by Social Security.

In preface, the Rev. Charles T. Crane, rector from Holy Nativity, Oahu, said that within a few years, the clergy will be faced with paying \$1500 per year in Social Security taxes. He asked that a Committee be appointed to study the matter. He moved the adoption of the resolution; and it was seconded.

The Rev. Charles G.K. Hopkins, Jr., (Hawaiian Ministry Advisory Committee) vicar from St. Matthew's, Oahu, called upon Hazel K.N. Mahoe (also a member of the Committee), from Holy Innocents', Maui, to present the resolution.

She moved the resolution, and it was seconded.

Michael Town, from Holy Innocents, Maui, spoke in favor of the resolution. He endorsed it as a first step in the process of reconciliation between involved Hawaiian Christians and the rest of the Christian body. He further endorsed legitimate legal means to resolve the Kahoolawe situation.

Christopher Magee, from St. Mary's, Oahu, spoke against the resolution. He felt that it was not in the best interests of our country since there was no alternative proposed, for a Naval bombing site. He also felt that the military not having such a site, might leave the Islands, which would then have a severe economic effect on the Islands.

The Rev. Dr. Claude F. DuTeil, rector from St. Christopher's, Oahu, expressed concern for the statement in the original resolution that the Hawaiian Ministry Advisory Committee represent the Church. He suggested that the paragraph be amended to read:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaiian Ministry Advisory Committee be urged to meet with the Protect Kahoolawe Ohana...."

The Hawaiian Ministry Advisory Committee accepted this, from Dr. Duteil.

Ellwood Fern, Jr., from St. Mary's, Oahu, spoke against the resolution. Because of the question as to whether the Ohana was Christian oriented or not, he felt that the resolution should not come under the Episcopal Church in Hawaii.

The Rev. George Lee, vicar from St. Luke's, Oahu, spoke in favor of the amendment, and wished to amend Dr. DuTeil's statement, to read:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaiian Ministry Advisory Committee meet with the Protect Kahoolawe Ohana and present specific recommendations to the Board of Directors of the Diocese on appropriate ways for the Church to participate in a resolution of the Kahoolawe ussue."

The amendment was accepted by the Committee.

Fr. Lee stated that what he is suggesting is that the Hawaiian Ministry Advisory Committee work with the Board of Directors so that specific steps can be defined.

The resolution as amended was voted upon.

I. THAT Section 2 of Article I. of the Constitution be amended as hereinafter provided, and the the same be made known to the several Dioceses and Missionary Dioceses and to the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, in accordance with Article XI., in order that the same may be adopted at the next succeeding regular meeting of the General Convention:

THAT Section 2 of Article I of the Constitution be amended by adding at the beginning: "Every Bishop of this Church shall have a seat and voice in the House of Bishops.";and after "every Suffragan Bishop" insert: "every Assistant Bishop." Also, eliminate: "by reason of advanced age or bodily infirmity, or who". After "has resigned his jurisdiction" insert: "and has not retired.", so that the Section 2 of Article of the Constitution will now read:

Sec. 2. Every Bishop of this Church shall have seat and voice in the House of Bishops. Each Bishop of this Church having jurisdiction, every Bishop Coadjutor, every Suffragan Bishop, every Assistant Bishop, and every Bishop who, under an election to an office created by the General Convention, or for reasons of mission strategy determined by action of the General Convention or the House of Bishops, has resigned his jurisdiction, and has not retired, shall have a seat and a vote in the House of Bishops. A majority of all Bishops entitled to vote, exclusive of Bishops who have resigned their jurisdiction or positions, shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

II. THAT Section 4 of Article I. of the Constitution be amended as hereinafter provided, and the same be made known to the several Dioceses and Missionary Dioceses and to the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, in accordance with Article XI., in order that the same may be adopted at the next succeeding regular meeting of the General Convention:

THAT Section 4 of Article I. of the Constitution be amended by eliminating the words "having domicile in the Diocese" and insert the words "in good standing in the Diocese but not necessarily domiciled in the Diocese."; so that Section 4 of Article I., as amended, will read:

Sec. 4. The Church in each Diocese which has been admitted to union with the General Convention shall be entitled to representation in the House of Deputies by not more than four Presbyters, canonically resident in the Diocese, and not more than four Lay Persons, communicants of this Church, in good standing in the Diocese but not necessarily domiciled in the Diocese; but the General Convention by Canon may reduce the representation to not fewer than two Deputies in each order. Each Diocese shall prescribe the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen.

III. THAT the Second Paragraph of Article VIII be amended as hereinafter provided, and the same be made known to the several Dioceses and Missionary Dioceses and to the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, in accordance with Article XI., in order that the same may be adopted at the next succeeding regular meeting of the General Convention:

THAT the second paragraph ("declaration") be amended by striking the word "Protestant" after the words "Worship of the"; and by striking "in the United States of America." after "Church"; so that the second paragraph as amended, will read:

"I do believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the Word of God, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; and I do solemnly engage to conform to the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of the Episcopal Church."

Notes to the Balance Sheet

1. Significant Accounting Policies

Accounts And Records -

The accompanying balance sheet reflects the consolidation of the assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Diocese of The Episcopal Church in Hawaii which comprises the central administrative body for the various departments within the Church's organization in Hawaii. The accounts and records of the Church do not reflect the financial position and results of operations of parishes, missions or institutions (departments) which conduct the activities of The Episcopal Church throughout the State of Hawaii. Land and buildings and certain trusts of these departments are held by the Church and accordingly have been taken into account in the accompanying balance sheet.

The accounts of the Church are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting in order to help ensure observance of restrictions and designations placed by donors and others on the use of the resources available to The Episcopal Church in Hawaii. In the accompanying balance sheet, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups.

Description Of Fund Groups -

General Fund:

This fund accounts for resources available for designated and general operations of the Church.

Investment Fund:

This fund accounts for contributions for which the donor has stipulated that the principal is to be invested in the Church investment pool or held in trust. The income is restricted for purposes designated by the donor.

Real Estate Fund:

This fund accounts for all known land, buildings and other properties of the Church.

Notes to the Balance Sheet

Agreements Of Sale Receivable -

Agreements of sale receivable on properties sold are recorded in the Fund for which the proceeds will be utilized. Excess proceeds on such receivables reflected in the Real Estate Fund are subject to transfer upon approval by the Board of Directors, at which time they become available for designated and general operations of the Church.

Trust Investments -

The Church through its agent, Hawaiian Trust Co., Limited, maintains an investment pool on behalf of itself, parishes and missions.

Trust investments in marketable securities are carried at market quotations. Indicated market values were obtained from quotations close to or at year end. Trust investments in loans, mortgages and agreements of sale are carried at principal amount.

Income, which is distributed quarterly, is recorded when received. Realized and unrealized gains or losses from investments are treated as additions to or deductions from principal and accordingly have no effect on income available for distribution.

Special Investments -

Special investments are carried at cost, if purchased, or market quotations on the date of receipt of gifts. These investments are held in trust for special designations. Income realized is paid directly to the designee or donor, in the case of life interest.

Land, Buildings And Other Properties -

Title to all real property (other than real property of St. Clement's Church) is vested in The Episcopal Church in Hawaii; accordingly, such property is accounted for in the records of the Church. The carrying values on certain of the properties are based upon amounts which represent either estimates of expenditures made by the Church, missions or parishes, or assigned values on properties donated by other persons.

In common with the practice of many similar nonprofit organizations, the Church does not provide for depreciation on buildings and other properties.

The Camp and Conference Center at Mokuleia continues its fourfold program of service to diocesan church groups, public and private schools, non-profit organizations, and summer campers. The Committee of Camps and Conferences believes that this live-in facility provides a unique contribution to the life of our diocese. By being a resident camp, it provides people with an experience of Christian community that enhances the understanding of our common life together as laid out by our Lord in the New Testament.

This year we bade farewell to the Reverend Frank Gray, who faithfully served two years as Director of Camps and Conferences. We wish he and his wife Lois God's blessings as they begin a new ministry in Southern California.

The heroine award for camping this year goes to Mrs. Diana Lockwood, who served as interim Director during the summer months. With short notice, Diana stepped into this position and won the admiration of many as she displayed her qualifications and skills in camping with great energy and efficiency. Amongst other accomplishments, Diana led Camp Mokuleia to successful accreditation by the American Camping Association. This was a mammoth and successful effort. Additionally, Diana wrote a grant proposal that was accepted by the Federal Government under Title VI. This will enable Mokuleia to hire three persons to run an expanded Outdoor Education program for the next twelve months with an emphasis towards persons with special needs. All this was accomplished while still running the summer program, which is the most demanding program of the year. I know all will want to join with me in applauding and thanking Diana for her superb efforts.

I wish also to thank the following clergy for their presence in camp this summer: Bishop Browning, Gene Harshman, George Hartung, George Lee, Homer Vanture, and Paul Wheeler. The presence of clergy provides the focal point of our summer program. Mahalo to them all.

Various volunteer groups, among them groups from St. Peter's, HEY, St. Elizabeth's, and the Navigators, conducted workdays at the camp this year, and we are always grateful for this assistance.

SUBJECT: A REPORT ON THE COMMITTEE ON COLLEGE MINISTRIES

This is a new Diocesan Committee as of 1st year made up of John Anthony, Dan Boylan, Patricia Browning, Gary Chong, Malcolm Chun, the Rev. Dr. John Crean, Jr., Dr. Moheb Ghali, the Rev. William Grosh, the Rev. George Hartung, Christine Urago, Marvin Veregge and myself. We have very animated meetings and meet at least once a month. For me it's a growing experience.

Most of our attention during this year has been directed to the University of Hawaii, Manoa Campus. What has the ministry been at Manoa? What is Campus Ministry today? What might it be at Manoa in the future? We conducted a survey by mail of Episcopal students, whose names we had, asking questions about a full time Campus Minister, possible facility, and needs they had. In April a report was turned over to the Program Committee of the Board of Directors of the Diocese on the current status, evaluation of status and recommendations on the Campus Ministry at Manoa. Included in this report was a response to Resolution G, presented to 1976 Convention by Dr. Moheb Ghali, recommendations as to the re-opening of "Canterbury House". The study was primarily the work of Dr. Moheb Ghali and the Rev. Dr. John Crean, Jr. revised slightly and endorsed by the Committee. At the time of the report, a Roman Catholic Campus Minister was interested in renting the old Canterbury facilities and sharing it with the Episcopal Church so that we could work together out of one facility. His proposal died.

As part time Campus Minister at Manoa (6 hours a week Campus Ministry, the rest of the time as assist at St. Clement's Church) I was working as part of a "team ministry" made up of the full time Campus Ministers of the Methodist, United Church of Christ, Lutheran and Roman Catholic Churches. The team was really beginning to develop this last year. We met together once a week for sharing, planning and praying as a 'community in Christ' with a common ministry. Our joint activities included, Thursday Worship according to a Rite of one of the Churches at 7:45 am, Thursday Circle (inquiry and discussion) 3:30 to 5:00 pm at the Campus Center and also at the Center on Wednesday a Common Worship from 11:30 to noon. My ministry also included counseling of faculty and students both on Campus and at St. Clement's. Finances dropped at St. Clement's and that ministry was terminated. The Campus Ministry could have been full time accept for the fact that finances there were not enough to hold the stomach together. As of the end of the Spring Semester 1977 I left for another ministry.

Not only was there a "team" from the Campus Ministers mentioned above, there is also a Commission with representatives from each Church which makes up the University Christian Ministry Commission (Roman Catholic as unofficial participants and very active). Our representation consists of the Rev. Dr. John Crean, Jr., Gary Chong (replacing his brother) and Dr. Shirley Weeks (replacing Dr. Stan West). This commission along with the Campus Ministers are trying to bring about a more ecumenical approach to Campus Ministry, contributing talent, skill and faith, and sharing in any area possible. (Hopefully it will lead to shared facilities and budget in the future - my comment.)

Attached you will see a report from our Campus Minister at Leeward Community College.

We will be directing attention now to Community Colleges on all islands and possible approaches to ministry. Thank you.

My campus ministry activities continue to be concentrated in the community college setting, particularly at Leeward Community College, with some activities at other campuses and in the community.

The following activities are in fulfillment of the goals and objectives upon which the Program Committee and Board of Directors funded this ministry for 1977.

This is mostly a pastoral, prophetic, and teaching ministry directed to students, faculty, staff, and administrators on campus to encourage and support Christian values personally and socially.

-Pastoral ministry: Counseling students and others on personal, religious, educational, and social issues.

-Prophetic ministry: Social and educational issues, women's rights, faculty salary and working conditions, student's rights, etc. mostly in the Social Sciences Division and legislative committees and with legislators. Number of Committee on Medical Services for Minors of the Health and

Community Services Council.

-Teaching ministry: Teaching six hours in Spring semester, three in summer, and six in Fall, Human Sexuality and Community (Human) Services Practicum; Two seminars, forty people, on Life/Work Planning in Spring Semester on Oahu and one at St. Michael's and All Angels, Lihue, Kauai; various class and group sessions as guest lecturer and resource person on religious, psychological, and sexual, marriage, and family life subjects. (I coordinated Life/Work Planning seminars on Oahu, Kauai, and Hawaii sponsored by the Hawaii Council of Churches, University Christian Ministry (Manoa), Hilo Campus Ministry, and Episcopal/Ecumenical Campus Ministry.)

-Finished work and received M.A. in Education from New York University (Health Education Specialty in Human Sexuality, Marriage and Family Life Education); Received certification as Sex Educator from American Association of Sex Educators, Counselors and Therapists and seeking

certification as a Sex Therapist from same organization.

-Conferences and workshops: Attended, with Fr. Joseph Pummill, meeting of Eighth Province Committee on Ministry in Higher Education in San Francisco in January; Annual Meeting of American Association of Sex Educators, Counselors and Therapists in April, San Fran.; First Episcopal Marriage Encounter in June.

-Continued consultation on statewide strategy for campus ministry with United Christian Ministry (Manoa), Hilo Campus Ministry, Bishop, other denominational executives and persons, and the Rev. Stanley Kain,

Hawaii Council of Churches.

-Consulted and arranged meetings with campus ministers and Episcopal Campus Ministry Committee with the Rev. William Shinto, Western Regional Staff,

United Ministries in Higher Education.

-Church contacts: Meetings with Leeward clergy; Celebrating Eucharist, preaching, and worshipping at St. George's, St. Philip's, St. John's-by-the-Sea, St. Barnabas, St. Michael's and All Angels'; program planning consultant at St. Michael's and St. James', Kamuela; consultant for Rector Calling Committee, Epiphany; Human Sexuality and Campus Ministry diocesan committees. Member Standing Committee of Diocese.

Fall plans:

- -Continue generally as above pastoral, prophetic, teaching, and priestly ministries including Life/Work Planning seminars on as many islands as possible.
- -Work with Diocesan Campus Ministry Committee: Neeting in late September with UH Manoa Episcopal faculty, students, and staff to propose, and ascertain needs and interests for, Episcopal ministry on the Manoa campus.
- -Work out goals and objectives for Episcopal and ecumenical campus ministry for 1978 and next three to five years including evaluation.
- -Work with Human Sexuality Committee: Continue work on development of adult education program for clergy and laity on Human Sexuality, including Homosexuality. Educational programs to begin on all islands not later than January 1978.
- -Begin work on plans for diocesan and parish education on Human Sexuality for children and youth, as well as adults.

THE DIOCESAN ECUMENICAL COMMISSION

The Ecumenical Commission spent the year 1976 studying documents on ecumenism in preparation for action on the parish level. The documents studied were the Venice Statement on Authority in the Church, the Windsor Statement on the Eucharist, the Canterbury Statement on Ministry, and the Consultation on Church Union "In Quest of a Church of Christ Uniting". To compliment these studies, members received Ecumenical Trends, published by the Graymoor Ecumenical Institute, and the Ecumenical Bulletin, published by the Episcopal Executive Council.

Delegates received in their packets the proposed Diocesan budget for 1978. The portion dealing with the Ecumenical Commission gave a detailed account of its relation to the Standing Commission on Ecumenical Relations (SCER) and the Episcopal Diocesan Ecumenical Officers (EDEO).

Once the National Church SCER issues the study guides for ecumenism on the parish level, we will conduct both clergy and lay conferences for the implementation of study and action of Episcopal churches with other Christian churches on a neighborhood basis.

The result of the Diocesan parish ecumenical activity profile, reported to EDEO at the annual meeting in March, was based on the response of 18 of the 32 priests asked to return the questionnaire. The response indicated a low involvement with churches other than the Windward Coalition, average involvement with the Hawaii Council of Churches, and average participation in ecumenical Thanksgiving Day, Good Friday, and Week of Prayer for Christian Unity services. The term 'ecumenical' refers to a relationship between Christian churches. A relationship with a non-Christian group is called 'inter-faith'.

The particular study assigned to Hawaii in preparing the SCER and EDEO study guides for 1978-79 was the Bergamo Statement, "In Quest of a Church Uniting: A Statement of Emerging Theological Consesus", adopted at Bergamo, Dayton, Ohio, in 1976. The document deals with Membership, Confession of Faith, Worship, and Ministry. The section on Ministry has been completed and sent to EDEO.

It must be understood that the Diocese cannot study ecumenism in isolation from the National Church. The Ecumenical Officer maintains a viable relationship with both EDEO and SCER by participating in the annual conference. It is here that the guidelines and procedures for the Episcopal Church are determined, and the directions mandated by General Convention are achieved.

Paul Moore Wheeler Ecumenical Officer The major purpose of the Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii (ECW) is to represent the women of all parishes in providing a wider Christian witness to the Church, the community, and the world, than they could provide individually on the parish level.

The 1976-77 year began with the Annual Meeting on November 5th. Bishop Browning served as celebrant and preacher at the opening Eucharist and United Thank Offering Ingathering. Following the business meeting Fr. Imo Tiapula from American Samoa spoke.

This past year the Board has begun monthly meetings by sharing scripture passages relating to the "theme" for the month. This and improved communication, via the ECW newsletter, has given added vitality to our group.

In December I traveled to Hawaii to join the other women from all churches on the Big Isle in attending St. Jude's annual Christmas tea. In September I represented Hawaii at the 8th Province ECW meeting in Davies, California.

Besides regular monthly board meetings we have stressed island-wide program meetings for education, inspiration and fellowship. Emmanuel ladies hostessed our Advent meeting with Bishop Browning celebrating Eucharist in their beautiful new Church. Afterwards, at the home of Mrs. Chandler Rowe, we were entertained with a Christmas program and served a delicious luncheon.

In February we met at the Brownings' home and were privileged to hear the Rt. Rev. Colin Winter, exiled Bishop of Damaraland in South West Africa. He celebrated Eucharist and shared from his experiences in Africa and told of his hopes for its future. Our Lenten program featured the Rev. Barry Oakley from Stubbington, England. His topic was "Here and There - Hawaii and England." (This was printed and distributed to all the clergy.)

Our Annual meeting with neighbor island Vice-presidents was held at the Brownings' home in May.

At the November board meeting we heard reports from our Triennial delegates. The new UTO film "A Hymn of Grateful Praise" was shown in January. And in June we traveled to the beach front home of Ulu Duncan for a combination business and fun-day meeting.

"Our dollars go where we cannot go." The ECW of Hawaii has contributed \$19,836.74 towards mission outreach around the world. The spring and fall UTO Ingatherings totaled \$8,274.20. Under the direction of the chairmen of Christian Social Relations, Church Periodical Club, Altar Guild, and United Thank Offering the women have been made aware of and responded to opportunities for service with both their time and gifts. Giving to the ECW Specials totaled \$9,209.00. These funds were allocated to:

- 1) Bishop's Discretionary Fund
- 2) Car for PIC Ministry on the Island of Hawaii
- 3) Development of Alcoholism Education Program
- 4) Guam Relief from Typhoon Damage

The ECW has contributed to a broad spectrum of concerns this year. Funds come primarily from ECW assessments. Additional funds have been provided by the CPC and Altar Guild through gifts, offerings, and special fund raising events such as the CPC book sale and luncheon. Allocations included the Armed Services YMCA, Palama Interchurch Council, St. Jude's Ranch for children, Episcopal Church Camp property upkeep and religious education materials, religious education materials for St. Andrew's Priory School Library,

travel for Fr. Imo Tiapula, Bishop Colin Winter, P.B.'s Fund for World Relief-Hunger, books for seminarians, 8th Province and National CPC, Japanese Prayer Books and Hymnals, National Altar Guild Fund.

Our Altar Guild ladies this past January co-chaired with Fr. Zimmerman a Corporate Communion and workshop for Altar Guild members. The ECW Board prepared and served a "sacrificial supper" on Sunday nights for the Bishop's Advent Series. Our ladies support the Feed the Elderly Program, the sale of UNICEF cards, and provide food staples to be distributed through the Care and Share Emergency Program.

With five Board resignations this year we have had constant turn-over, yet have continued in faithful service to our Lord and His Church. I am always grateful for the privilege of working with so many dedicated persons.

COMMITTEE REPORT

EVANCET TSM

The first meeting of this new committee was held in December 1976. Our First task was to discover our purpose. It was decided that some kind of definition of evangelism needed to be worked out; that it needed to be one that overcame the usual negative reaction to the word by Episcopalians. Several formal statements were read and discussed, but we decided any real definition must come from the people of the Diocese. We concurred that the whole life of The Church can be called "evangelism" but that a more narrow and precise definition was needed to pinpoint our work. Otherwise, everyone's work becomes no one's responsibility. We isolated three principle groups that we can serve. First, the unchurched; second, church-goers whose faith is not relevant to their daily lives; and third, the "turned-on" persons in our churches who are eager to begin witnessing to others if only someone will teach them how. Our conclusion was that, while our goal really is to reach the unchurched, we must give initial priority to the other two groups in order to have people able to witness to the unchurched. Therefore our initial efforts have been in the area of renewal programs.

A survey was conducted of all parishes, missions and schools of the Diocese to try and determine their understanding of Evangelism. The results of the survey were disappointing since less than 30% responded. This has led us to a new approach which we hope to start before years end. Committee Teams will visit each parish, mission or school and sit down with them to discuss evangelism and discover how we can best assist them. There are many renewal programs, but none can be effective if they don't meet the needs of the group. We hope, also, to discover some local resources for our use which have previously been unrecognized or unused.

A workshop, Evangelism in our Parish was pilot tested at St. George's and has also been done at St. Stephen's. Both parishes encourage other churches to consider this program and it can be conducted by the committee. Claude DuTeil has presented his Short Course in several churches and continues to be available for any group or church desiring that experience.

Two major renewal programs have been introduced into the Diocese this year. They are Anglican Cursillos and Marriage Encounter, Episcopal Expression. Prayer and Devotional Life Committee has assumed responsibility for Cursillo and it is covered in their report. Evangelism has given active physical and financial support to ensure its success however. Marriage Encounter was initiated in July. Two week-ends have been held, one on July 29-31 and one on September 2-4. A total of 64 couples were "encountered" on those week-ends. One more week-end will be held on October 28-30 for 30 more couples. Additional week-ends are planned in January and June of next year. An area board has been established with Larry and Joy Houghton being the Lay Executive Couple and Fr. and Nancy Vanture being the Clergy Executive Couple. The fruits of this program are already being realized in many parishes and missions in the Diocese. We hope to provide this program for the Neighbor Islands in the future, but that will take a strong local community to be successful. Our goals for the coming year are shown in our budget request.

1977 REPORT OF THE HAWAII EAST COMMITTEE

The highlight of the Hawaii EAST Committee for 1977 has been its change in status. Previously the Hawaii EAST was merely a special project of the National Church, but in 1977 the Committee became a regular program unit of the Diocese of Hawaii.

As a program of the Diocese, Hawaii EAST has worked to enable congregations which are basically ethnic in origin and history (Japanese, Chinese, Korean, Filipino and the Pacific Peoples) to become more effective with their own resources (people, facilities, money, etc.) and to be engaged in mission and ministry.

During 1977 the program was to begin strategy to develop models of local congregation and community development to re-educate clergy and laity on roles in which shared ministry is the prevailing style of the local congregation.

Some of the action which took place during 1977 were:

- 1. Integration of the Filipino congregations on Maui (Good Shepherd) and Hawaii (Holy Apostles' Parish).
- 2. St. Paul's (Oahu) has begun joint Christian education programs with the Cathedral and St. Peter's Church. St. Paul's also co-sponsored the 75th anniversary banquet of the Philippine Independent Church with the Cathedral.
- 3. Planning has begun for a "partners in mission" program between the St. Andrew's Seminary, Manila, and the churches on Kauai. Kauai also has had an active year with community development and outreach projects through its Kilauea Community Outreach Program.
- 4. St. Luke's continues its bi-lingual ministry with the part-time services of Father Vincent O'Neill and Father John Park. In 1977 St. Luke's was able to integrate its pre-school and church programs so that they can pay a full stipend to its vicar next year.
- 5. Good Samaritan has started Japanese services for the Issel's of the congregation. They have purchased special large print prayer books and hymnals for this group. Services have also been provided for visiting Seikokai members from Japan and also for the Shin-Issel's (businessmen, students, etc.) from Japan. Father James Nakamura conducts the services for the Issel services at both the Good Samaritan and St. John's, Eleele.
- 6. Grace Church, Molokai, has started training for community planning and development.

I have enjoyed working with the small, action-oriented Hawaii EAST Committee this year. Our membership is from all islands and all Asian and Pacific ethnic groups. It is especially gratifying to see how the program has helped to bring new life in His Spirit to our small ethnic churches.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON HAMAIIAN MINISTRY

Report to 1977 Diocesan Convention

INTRODUCTION

The Advisory Committee on Hawaiian Ministry was created by Bishop Browning in 1976 "to serve as a forum" through which the Diocese of Hawaii might become more aware of the concerns of the Hawaiian community and find opportunities to share the work begun by Fathers Aiona and Hopkins, who have ministered within that community for some years.

During 1977, we have come to know something of the mind and spirit of the Hawaiian communities (they are many). And to recognize some of the factors which underlie the current "Hawaiian Movement" and to appreciate some of the values which it affirms. We offer one example of what we have seen and heard in the words of one of our members:

"I would prefer to use our own word ho'oia. It means to affirm, to validate, to confirm the truth of the thing . . . the values and historical precepts that are still relevant. . . . Recently in Keaukaha, I watched homesteaders make yet another brave attempt at raising the larger questions affecting their futures. They are learning how to become more effective advocates for homesteading concerns. . . . I sat with a group . . . concerned with building a first-rate Hawaiian Studies Program at Hilo College. . . Native Hawaiians are indeed making an affirmation on the things that count to them. . . . On Oahu, we feel the painful dilemma of the Waihee taro farmer . . . hawkers of cheaply-made, shoddy imitations of Hawaiian artifacts as well as pornography crowd once-beautiful Waikiki. . . . The Protestant Ethic, aided and abetted by an economic system . . . floundering with . . . having to admit that unemployment is a necessity for national ewonomic well-being, now chokes on itself. . . . Our host culture has been generous to a fault. . . . It's your [i.e., the non-Hawaiians'] turn to let an insular people . . . determine their own destinies. It's your turn to trust us to lead the way toward a more enduring salvation for all men. It may be your only hope." -Gard Kealoha

The above statement is at once revolutionary and religious. Alternatives to existing values and social structures are affirmed as necessary if salvation is to be hoped for. Such a point of view has been described by a great Christian scholar of this century in these words:

"...Creation goes on as God's creation has always done...The creative act that sets free new potentialities of mankind is properly called revolution."

-Eugen Rosenstock-Huessy Out of Revolution

How to comprehend the "Hawaiian revolution" and its religious significance has been the task of this committee during 1977. We have only begun to do so, and what success we have had has come to us largely through the process described by the word ho'oia. The observations which conclude this introduction represent our first efforts at affirming, confirming the truth of aspects of the movement among native Hawaiians which this Church should be noticing if it is to be "informed, educated, sensitized" (Bishp Browning).

- 1. The Hawaiian Movement, like all ethnic revolutions, has its shibboleths. Non-Hawaiians who attempt to associate themselves with it may well find barriers of reserve and suspicion raised against them and be made to feel like strangers. This should not discourage members of this Church who wish to offer support and encouragement to the Hawaiian people; rather we should realize that this is exactly how some of them are made to feel when attending some of our churches. Patience, humility, and genuine concern are necessary ingredients for acceptance.
- 2. The Hawaiian Movement is suspicious of institutions which tity cannot clearly identify as supportive. As is the case with individuals, institutions must show good faith. While the ministries of the Bishop and of some few clergy and laity have been welcomed by Hawaiians, it remains true that the Episcopal Church, in its institutional character, has lost much of its once-strong identification with the Hawaiian, and is not seen as an ally of the Hawaiian Movement.

- 3. The Hawaiian cultural renascence poses a challenge to all non-Hawaiians. To show respect for the culture, to be willing to learn about it and participate in it, are seen as actions which affirm the Hawaiian people themselves. We encourage Episcopal churches to make careful, thoughful use of Hawaiian cultural features: in decoration, in hymnody, in language(e.g., reading of the Gospel at the Eucharist); and we urge the churches to avoid all superficiality and imitation in these matters. Our attitude toward the culture is one real test of our caring about the people who claim that culture as their own.
- 4. Our attitude toward Hawaiian values provides a second test. Hawaiians feel strongly that a number of their values not only reflect Christian teaching, but are truly necessary for a healthy society. They know and share the problems of ecology and environment, of rootlessness, of decision-making; their concepts of aloha aina (respect and reverence for the land), of ohana (the family or communal group which gives us a real sense of belonging), and of holoponopono (setting things right) are powerful tools for solving such problems, and should find a place in the value system of all Hawaii's It is not extreme to say that values such as these lie at the heart of the Hawaiian revolution. They are the Hawaiian's offering to all of his non-Hawaiian brothers and sisters, and he offers them out of a deep conviction (mana o'i'o) that they spring from the mana'o (mind) of the Lord. To affirm (ho'oia) these values is his mission, and he invites a response of affirmation from all of us. Thus the Hawaiian revolution reveals its religious character; and thus the Episcopal Church in Hawaii may claim a part in that revolution. Our mission and ministry, individual and corporate, must affirm the Hawaiian people by affirming their values: values which are not "racist" but human: and not merely human, but very close to the heart (of the Gospel. "Ina he pepeiao ko ke kanaka e lohe ai, e ho'olohe mai ia."

1977 Report on Ministry to the HAWAIIAN COMMUNITY

After several months of developing its own sense of Hawaiian awareness, considering ways of informing and sensitizing the Diocese to the needs and concerns of Native Hawaiians, and exploring avenues for expanding the base of diocesan involvement in these needs and concerns, the Advisory Committee on Hawaiian Ministry arrived at a set of projected goals and objectives. The attainment of these goals and objectives to a lesser degree has been the task of the Canon Missioner to the Hawaiian Community in years past and again in 1977.

PAROCHIAL ASSIGNMENTS

Concerning the St. Matthew's, Waimanalo, and Grace Church, Molokai, the primary endeavor is congregational development for services to its members and the community. St. Matthew's continues its participation in Ashley Hale's Congregational Development Program, the results of which should be forthcoming in the early months of 1978. Grace Church is effecting goals and objectives set in May, 1976. To this end, a four-clergy team ministry was instituted in January to provide services on four Sundays of each month, a Christian education program, pastoral calling, and administrative leadership. The result has been a reawakening of interest and involvement -- increase in attendance at services (more than twice the 1976 average), increase in pledging units and amounts pledged, more participation in activities, a working administration, and improvements to buildings and grounds.

INFORMING THE CHURCH

An offer was made to institutions in the Diocese to share information on Hawaiian values, concerns and needs, by way of speakers and audio-visual aids. The result was occasional speaking engagements at church services and classes at Iolani School and St. Andrews' Priory.

Contact was made with the Executive Councils' National Committee on Indian Work and the Committee on Indian Work in the Province of the Pacific, seeking recognition and assistance within the scope of the Episcopal Church's work with Native Americans. More important than correspondence was a meeting with four Native American Indians at the Synod meeting in Sacramento in September. At this meeting, good rapport was established with these leaders in Indian Work which paves the way for recognition and further sharing and collaboration.

HAWAIIAN COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Because they are so interrelated, it is difficult to separate Hawaiian Community involvement from parochial work. For example, the Hawaiian Home Lands situation is still a priority concern which affects both missions and is one in which members of both congretations, especially Grace Church, rally around for problem-solving.

The rallying point is Hawaiian Organizations whose purposes are to deal with issues concerning Hawaiian Home Lands and relative native Hawaiian rights. Therefore, the Canon Missioner is involved in the activities of several Hawaiian organizations, some of which are the Community Clients Council of the Legal Aid Society of Hawaii, Council of Hawaiian Organizations, Alu Like, Inc., Protect Kahoolawe 'Ohana, Hawaiian Coalition of Native Claims, and Hawaiian Homestead Associations on Oahu and Molokai. This association has called for participation in a number of endeavors, of which the following is a partial list:

- 1. Intervention of the Council of Hawaiian Organizations in the potentially explosive Waiahole Valley situation, dealing with the affected parties and assisting the Governor in resolving the issue.
- 2. Efforts to appeal personally to the President of the United States on behalf of the Protect Kahoolawe 'Ohana, urging him to halt the bombing of the Island.
- 3. Lobbying in the 1977 state Legislative Session, either to advocate for or against legislation affecting Native Hawaiians; and, sponsoring a Legislative Planning Session to prepare for the 1978 session.
- 4. Urging the Governor to cancel the public auction of Hawaiian Home Lands on the Island of Hawaii and delay signing of an amendment to the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands until changes reflecting the wishes of the Hawaiian Community are added to the amendment.

These and other activities are further illustrated by attached newspaper articles.

Lastly, community involvement also includes functioning liturgically and pastorally to individuals and groups of Hawaiians who are not members of the two missions. These functions include counseling, ministering in crisis situations, burials, baptisms, weddings, and special commemoration services.

At the 1976 General Convention of the Episcopal Church in Minneapolis, "The two Houses recommended that the Church, in general, engage in serious study and dialogue in the area of human sexuality (including homosexuality) as it pertains to various aspects of life, particularly living styles, employment, housing, and education." (From Summary of General Convention Actions 1976.)

The state of the s In response to the above recommendation Bishop Browning appointed our Diocesan Committee on Human Sexuality. A conscious effort was made to appoint a committee with a wide variety of points of view on this controversial subject; so the committee is comprised of males, females, clergy, laity, younger and older adults with interest and/ or expertise and a wide range of opinion, conservative and liberal, on the subject.

The Bishop mandated the committee to design and carry out an educational program for the diocese to begin not later than January 1978. The committee has been meeting monthly since March 1977 and has agreed, with the approval of the Bishop, that our first efforts shall be <u>adult</u>-education with clergy and laity of the diocese on the subject of Human Sexuality, including sexual orientation.

The committee, with the help of the Bishop, is still in the process of working out goals and objectives and selecting or producing materials for the educational programs on all islands. A survey of the clergy recently conducted by the committee reveals an interest of clergy in learning more about Biblical, theological, psychological, and sociological aspects of human sexuality in general and homosexuality in particular.

Land Land Company of the State Company The committee is aware of the importance of ascertaining the needs and interests of the laity in these areas, but we began with the clergy because we believe that most of the education of the laity will be done through the clergy in their pastoral, teaching, and preaching roles.

- 2 COPYRIGHT FACILITATION. Many congregations are illegally reproducing copyrighted material for use in worship--primarily music. A sub-committee is seeking to identify the extent of the problem and investigate ways of facilitating broad approval for reproduction of materials, in hope that a diocesan approval network may be established to secure low-cost copyright approval from publishers.
- 3. LAY READER TRAINING AND LICENSING. Licensing programs and procedures used in other dioceses are being reviewed with the objective of preparing recommendations for the Bishop on the selection and training requirements necessary for issuing and renewal of licenses.
- 4. SERVICE OF THE LAY MINISTRIES OF WORSHIP. Study the history and function of the ministries of acolytes, lay readers, lay lectors (unlicensed), ushers, altar guild members, musicians, etc. will be done with the aim to provide guidance to congregations.

- 5. MUSIC WORKSHOPS FOR SMALL CONGREGATIONS. At the request of many congregations, musicians on the Commission will hold workshops on each island aimed to help the "music person" serving in a small congregation with very limited resources or training. Special attention is to be given to the major services of the PBCP.
- 6. FOLLOWUP WORK ON PLANNING FOR THE USE OF WORSHIP SPACE. It is hoped that another visit by Fr. Carskadden and Mr. Iverson may be made to further explore enhancing the worship space of our churches and making it more functional. It would be expected that those churches desiring consultation would provide a portion of the funding.
- 7. TRANSPORTATION TO ANNUAL MEETING OF CHAIRMEN OF DIOCESAN LITURGICAL COMMISSIONS. Liturgical Commission Chairmen have been meeting annually to share resources, and study together. Much valuable material is gleaned which is exceedingly helpful.
- 8. COMMITTEE TRAVEL. Periodic travel expenses for the outer island members of the commission.
- 9. USE OF ETHNIC MATERIAL IN CORPORATE WORSHIP. Study ways to incorporate material from the various ethnic groups in Hawaii, but so that it will not be either "tokenism" or trite.

COMMISSION ON THE MINISTRY

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1977 TO THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN HAWAII

Four clergy and four lay persons are appointed annually by the Bishop to this Commission as an advisory body to him on matters relating primarily to the ordained ministry. The COM meets monthly for 1-1/2 to 2 hours in Honolulu.

Following the induction of Bishop Browning in August, 1976, the COM suspended the interim decision not to interview prospective postulants and to postpone any recommendations for ordination. The COM has returned to its active role as required by the Canons of the Church.

Interviewing and recommending to the Bishop those seeking ordination is a special part of our work. We enjoyed this process with John Filler to the priesthood, Lynette Golderman, Robert Rowley, and Robert Walden to the diaconate. There are currently no persons in seminary, canonically resident in Hawaii, preparing for the ministry.

The paper "Qualifications and Procedures for Postulants for Holy Orders..." issued in 1976 has been rewritten according to the 1976 changes in the National Canons and reissued to all clergy of the diocese in August 1977.

Since February 1977, the COM energies have been directed to writing a personnel policy for the clergy. The need for this came from an expressed desire by the clergy for a "clergy support system" and from the impetus by the Rt. Rev. David Richards, the one who directed the diocese to undertake an elaborate election process for our new bishop. The Board of Directors of this diocese responded affirmatively to the COM's request to draft a personnel policy.

The second (or was it the third) draft of that proposed policy was forwarded to all clergy, wardons, and to the Board of Directors asking for a written response by August 13 so the COM could write the next draft. Since only 10% responded by the deadline, Bishop Browning and Team A plus a COM member have met in island and area meetings to provide feedback on the proposed policy. We received plenty of it when we did this. The plan now is to agree on a draft, send it to the Board of Directors and see what happens when it hits the fan!

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1977 TO THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN HAWAII

What does it mean for a diocesan secondary school to come of age? In the world of the family, this means the allowance stops and one of age pays all the bills incurred. Seabury has reached that point, as the Diocesan Program Committee has recommended that no further subsidy or grant be given to the operating needs of the school. After thirteen years of operation, Seabury is in the black in its operating budget of over a half-million dollars. certainly a characteristic of one who is "of age."

To come of age also would mean a new status of independence. In the family that means the person is free to make all his own decisions without the oversight of the parents. At Seabury that means drafting a charter of incorporation and by-laws defining the nature of that independence, with no sense of leaving the family. This is now being done by the Chancellor and Seabury's Board of Trustees. The state of the s

Coming of age for Seabury means that its founding headmaster ought to find out if the school can run without him. leaving for good, the headmaster will take a year's sabbatical for study and travel, leaving the school to the direction of one of its most able and experienced faculty, Fred Rawe.

Since early years are so "now" oriented, coming of age provides the impetus for making long-range future plans. By January the Long Range Planning Committee will present to the Board of Trustees of Seabury for its study the fruit of a six-month long appraisal of the school and some pattern for its future.

This coming of age will provide the opportunity to say thank you to a generous diocese for a \$50,000 grant from the Centennial Capital Funds Campaign in 1962 to open Seabury, the leadership of all three bishops, operating funds from the diocesan budget for support for thirteen years, support of the congregations and clergy on Maui, and the grace of Almighty God.

The purpose of the committee is to educate, motivate, organize as possible, and provide information on Stewardship of Time, Talent, and Treasure throughout the Diocese.

The committee is divided into five sub-divisions:

- Survey. Completed in 1977, the survey gives the committee an overview of what is going on in the Diocese; parish by parish, mission by mission. Done on an interview basis, it also gives each member of the committee an insight into the operation of each church within the Diocese. A collation is in process and will help us determine subsequent directions.
- 2) Communications. A communications task force will help us to communicate our findings to the Diocese and to help establish a stewardship network. A stewardship workshop on Oahu held on September 13th attracted over twenty participants from eight different parishes or missions.
- Resources. We are developing a bank of Stewardship plans from various dioceses around the Church with the view of the possibility of developing our own Diocesan plan. One of the Committee's functions is to make available talent and materials to the various churches as they are desired.
- 4) Wills, bequests, convenanted giving. This sub-committee is concerned with the long range development of large gifts and bequests which will help the Church on a long-range basis.
- Capital needs and Venture in Mission. Still to be formed, this independent committee will take on its own life and work independently over the next three years as Venture in Mission becomes a reality. A separate leadership team needs to be developed for this committee.

The Committee has worked in conjunction with Ashley Hale throughout the past year and proposes to continue this consultative relationship. Ashley's experience and knowledge are invaluable as we plan for the future. He conducted the September 13th workshop and will be doing a seminar on Gifts and Bequests in 1978. Also, we hope that he will be our early consultant for Venture in Mission, through funding from that Capital Fund Drive.
