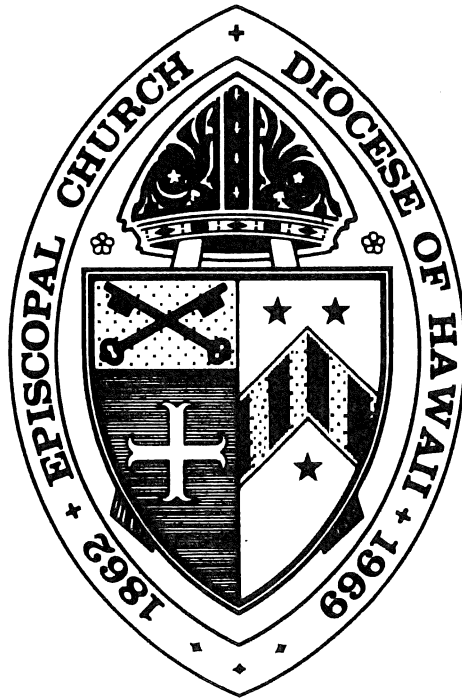

The Eighteenth Annual Meeting of the Convention of the Diocese of Hawaii opened at 7:00 p.m. at St. Andrew's Cathedral Church, Honolulu, Hawaii, with the Rev. Donald P. Hart, Bishop-elect leading the Evening Prayer Service.

Mr. Richard Hagemeyer, Chairperson of the Finance Department, presented Resolution #6, Clergy Minimum Compensation Schedule for 1987 and moved for its adoption.

PRIVILEGE**

Mr. Thomas Van Culin, President of the Standing Committee and a member of the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church reported that the Executive Council had designated IHS to be a Jubilee Center, the first in the Diocese of Hawaii. The Rev. Claude DuTeil was given a round of applause.

The Reverend W. Edwin Bonsey submitted a report from the Congregational Development Department on Resolution #9. After lengthy discussion, the Resolution failed.

Resolution #6 after lengthy debate on this Resolution The Reverend Nurdning moved and it was seconded to amend the motion that the 1987 Clergy Minimum Compensation Schedule us as the cash figures the 1986 figures and the 1987 housing figures. Amendment failed.

A second amendment submitted by Dr. Moheb Ghali to substitute the words "each stipend and allowances" for the words "compensation schedule" was moved, seconded and carried.

**CONSIDERATION OF
RESOLUTIONS**

The Rev. Richard Theime presented the following Resolution #10:

"That for every allocation in the Diocesan Budget, the Diocesan Council, the Finance Department, and/or their departments or committees, create realistic opportunities for the appropriate concerned persons to present their justifications for suggested expenditures directly and in person and at appropriate times while the budget is being prepared." The resolution was passed.

Resolution #1 - 100th Anniversary Celebration of the Nippon Sei Ko Kai. Be it Resolved, that we, the 1986 Diocesan Convention of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii, extend our aloha, greetings and congratulations to the Most Reverend Christopher I. Kikawada, Primate, and the Nippon Sei Ko Kai on the occasion of its 100th Anniversary celebration of its founding. It is to take place on May 16, 1987, at Osaka, Japan. The resolution was moved seconded and passed.

Resolution #2 - Sanctity of Life. BE IT RESOLVED, that the implementation of the resolution passed by the 17th Annual Diocesan Convention (1985), calling for an indepth study of the issues of the abortion, be given the highest priority in the coming year under the leadership of our new bishop and the appointed Commission.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that the findings of this diocesan Commission be submitted to the Executive Council by June 1987, as requested by the 68th General Convention; Resolution #A-85.

Be it Further Resolved that the findings of the diocesan Commission be communicated to our congregations for further discussion, and that a report be submitted to the Diocesan Convention in November, 1987. The resolution was moved, seconded and passed.

Resolution #3 - Stewardship. Whereas, the 68th General Convention of the Episcopal Church in 1985 adopted a resolution that urges every diocese and parish in this church to "give as much to others as we spend on ourselves"; now, therefore, be it

Resolved that this 1986 annual Convention of the Diocese of Hawaii hereby adopts as diocesan policy the recommendation of the 68th General Convention, and that this diocese, in its operating and capital budgets, work towards the achievement of giving as much to others as we spend on ourselves; and be it further

Resolved, that this 1986 Convention of the Diocese of Hawaii urge every parish and mission in this diocese, in the formulation of their own annual operating budgets and capital fund drives, work toward giving as much to others as they spend on themselves. The resolution was moved, seconded and passed.

Resolution #5 - Stewardship. Whereas, the 67th General Convention of the Episcopal Church in 1982 resolved that "the tithe be affirmed as the minimum standard of giving for Episcopalians"; and further resolved that "we deputies and bishops do hereby pledge ourselves to tithe, or to work towards tithing, as a minimum standard of our own giving and of our witness in the world"; and further resolved that "we do call all of the church to join us in accepting this biblical tithe as the minimum standard of Christian giving." Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that this 1986 Annual Convention of the Diocese of Hawaii concurs with this action of the 1982 General Convention, and hereby establishes that the tithe be affirmed as the minimum standard of giving for Episcopalians in the Diocese of Hawaii; and be it further

Resolved, that all delegates to this convention do hereby pledge themselves to tithe, or to work towards tithing as a minimum standard of our own giving and of our witness in the world; and be it further

Resolved, that we call all members of this Diocese to join us in accepting the biblical tithe as the minimum standard of Christian giving. The resolution was moved, seconded and passed.

Resolution #4 - Time of Diocesan Convention. Be it Resolved, that the Convention Planning Committee investigate the possibility of another time for the Diocesan Convention, either than around Veteran's Day, preferably in October of each year. The Resolution was moved, seconded and passed.

Resolution #8 - Advisory Commission on (AIDS) Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome.

Be it Resolved that the Episcopal Diocese of Hawaii form an Advisory Committee or Commission on A.I.D.S. (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) so as to keep our member congregations, schools, and other church-related institutions up to date on information and education relating to this disease.

Resolution #8 was moved, seconded and carried with the following amendment "Episcopal Diocese of Hawaii form" to "Bishop appoint".

Resolution #7 - Ministry to and with the Elderly. Be it Resolved, that this Convention affirms and supports the work of the Diocesan Board of Ministry on Aging (BOMA) in facilitating and coordinating ministry to and with the elderly; and

Be it further Resolved that all parishes/missions be encouraged to observe "Age in Action Sunday" to coincide with the first Sunday in May or the 3rd Sunday in October - State Legislature approved respect your Elders Day (Kapuna Aloha Month) or some other convenient Sunday; and

Be it further resolved that the mature members of the Church be encouraged to become members of the Episcopal Society for Ministry on Aging (ESMA) National organization to which BOMA belongs.

Resolution #7 was moved, second and carried with the following amendment "Be it further resolved that church members, parishes, and missions be encouraged to become members of the Episcopal society for ministry on Aging (ESMA) National Organization to which BOMA belongs.

BISHOP-ELECT'S CONVENTION ADDRESS
NOVEMBER 14, 1986
18TH ANNUAL DIOCESAN CONVENTION

I GREET YOU IN THE NAME OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST!

THIS IS A MOMENT OF GOD'S GRACE FOR ME. A YEAR AGO THE ELECTION FOR BISHOP IN NEW HAMPSHIRE WAS ABOUT TO TAKE PLACE. NEVER IN MY WILDEST IMAGININGS COULD I HAVE GUESSED THEN THAT I WOULD BE STANDING HERE NOW. AND LAST YEAR AT THIS TIME YOU WERE CAUGHT IN THE TENSION OF BOTH REJOICING AND SORROW AS YOUR BISHOP WAS CALLED TO GREATER RESPONSIBILITY IN THE CHURCH. WHAT A YEAR WE HAVE HAD -- YOU AND I -- AS OUR PATHS HAVE DRAWN CLOSER TOGETHER UNDER GOD'S GUIDANCE. IF NOTHING ELSE OF VALUE IS SAID TONIGHT IN THIS ADDRESS, LET ME SAY CLEARLY TO ALL WHO MAY BE DISCOURAGED, OR DOUBTFUL, OR IMPATIENT, THAT THIS YEAR IN OUR LIVES IS A WITNESS TO GOD'S PRESENCE AMONG US. INDEED GOD IS "WITH US ALWAYS, EVEN UNTO THE END OF TIME." IF GOD FILLS TIME, THEN I AM CONVINCED TIME CAN BE COMPASSIONATE.

I WANT TO SAY THAT STRONGLY BECAUSE I KNOW THIS YEAR OF ELECTING A NEW BISHOP IS NOT EASY ON A DIOCESE. PRESSURE IS PUT ON EVERYONE IN LEADERSHIP POSITIONS, AS ROLES SHIFT AND NEW RESPONSIBILITIES ARE ASSUMED IN NEW SITUATIONS. THEN A FEW OF YOUR ABLEST AND MOST LOYAL CLERGY ARE ASKED TO RISK THEMSELVES IN THE ELECTION PROCESS. I KNOW HOW DIFFICULT THAT IS WHEN YOU ARE PART OF THE DIOCESE. I KNOW THE GRACE THAT IS NEEDED TO WELCOME ONE WHO COMES IN FROM OUTSIDE THE DIOCESE. YOU HAVE TREATED ME WITH A SPIRIT OF GENEROSITY AND UNDERSTANDING WHICH HAS TOUCHED ME DEEPLY. I GIVE YOU MY PERSONAL THANKS AND THAT OF THE DIOCESE, FOR WHAT YOU HAVE GIVEN DURING THESE PAST MONTHS AND FOR WHAT YOU CONTINUE TO GIVE IN OUR LIFE TOGETHER. YOU ARE PART OF THAT PROFOUND EXPERIENCE THAT PROCLAIMS GOD'S LOVING PRESENCE IN OUR LIVES.

PEOPLE HAVE ASKED WHAT BEING BISHOP-ELECT IS LIKE. IT'S BEWILDERING; IT'S MIND-BOGGLING; IT'S EXCITING; IT'S SCARY; IT'S AWESOME. BEING BISHOP-ELECT IS TO BE IN A KIND OF SUSPENDED ANIMATION, A BREATHING, PRENATAL STATE. I HAVE A DEEPER APPRECIATION OF WHAT LIFE IS LIKE FOR THOSE WHO LIVE TOGETHER BEFORE GETTING MARRIED! AT LEAST WE ARE NOT WITHOUT BENEFIT OF CLERGY, AND THE DATE IS SET! LIKE A WEDDING I AM NOT SURE MUCH WILL CHANGE AFTERWARDS, EXCEPT FOR THE COMMITMENTS MADE AND THE INVITATION FOR GOD'S SPIRIT TO EMPOWER THE RELATIONSHIP. THESE MAKE A BIG DIFFERENCE, AND I LOOK FORWARD TO THE ORDINATION WITH TREMENDOUS THANKS FOR THOSE WHO HAVE DONE SO MUCH TO PREPARE FOR IT. IT WILL BE A GREAT CELEBRATION OF THE LIFE OF THIS DIOCESE.

LAST JULY WHEN I SLOWLY BECAME AWARE THAT THIS DIOCESAN CONVENTION WAS COMING EARLY IN MY TIME WITH YOU, I REALIZED THAT PROBABLY THE BEST I COULD DO AT THIS POINT WAS TO REFLECT A LITTLE ON WHAT I SAW. I KNEW THE FIRST MONTHS, EVEN THE FIRST YEAR, HAD TO BE A TIME OF LISTENING AND LEARNING FOR ME. NOW THAT I HAVE ACTUALLY SPENT TIME BEHIND THE BISHOP'S DESK AND AT DOZENS OF MEETINGS, I KNOW THE TRUTH OF NEEDING A PERIOD OF TIME IN WHICH TO LEARN AS MUCH AS I CAN. THIS MAY BE A RELATIVELY SMALL DIOCESE, BUT AN EXTRAORDINARY AMOUNT OF ACTIVITY IS GOING ON. I FEEL AS THOUGH I HAD STEPPED INTO A JUGGLING ACT AND SOMEHOW I NEED TO DEAL WITH THE DOZEN OR SO BALLS THAT ARE CIRCLING IN THE AIR!

ONE SOURCE OF OUR ACTIVITY IS REPRESENTED BY ALL OF YOU GATHERED HERE. WE ARE A RICH DIVERSITY OF PEOPLE. YOU KNOW THAT BETTER THAN I. I WAS AT THE E.A.S.T. MEETING SEVERAL WEEKS AGO AND HAD MY UNDERSTANDING ENLARGED BY LISTENING TO DIFFERENT ETHNIC GROUPS TALK ABOUT THE ISSUES FACING THEM. OUT OF THE FIVE SUNDAYS I HAVE BEEN VISITING PARISHES, FOUR OF THEM HAVE BEEN ON NEIGHBOR ISLANDS, AND I HAVE BEGUN TO GAIN A SENSE OF WHAT LIVING THERE MEANS IN THE LIFE OF THE DIOCESE. OUR DIVERSITY DOES NOT ALWAYS MAKE FOR AN EASY LIFE, BUT IT CLEARLY GIVES US OPPORTUNITIES FOR DREAMING NEW DREAMS AND MOVING IN CREATIVE WAYS.

ONE OF THE WAYS THIS DIOCESE HAS RESPONDED TO THE UNIQUE SITUATIONS OF LIFE ON THESE ISLANDS IS IN THE DIACONATE PROGRAM. WHAT YOU HAVE CREATED IS A MODEL FOR MANY OTHER DIOCESES. THE SPIRITUAL FORMATION COURSE, THE TRAINING PROGRAM, THE EMPHASIS ON A WELL-DEFINED SERVANT MINISTRY, THE CALLING FOR THIS DISTINCTIVE MINISTRY TO ENABLE LAY MINISTRY -- ALL OF THAT IS ONE OF THE MOST EXCITING DEVELOPMENTS IN THE DIOCESE. AND THE LEADERSHIP OF DOROTHY NAKATSUJI IS REMARKABLE, AS WELL AS ESSENTIAL.

PROBLEMS COME, OF COURSE. EVERY MINISTRY, INCLUDING THE EPISCOPATE, HAS PROBLEMS! WE NEED TO BE CLEAR THAT WHILE EVERYONE IS CALLED TO MINISTRY BECAUSE OF BAPTISM, NOT EVERYONE IS CALLED TO HOLY ORDERS THROUGH ORDINATION. THE HARDEST JOB IN THE CHURCH IS TRYING TO EXPLAIN TO SOMEONE IN A LOVING WAY THAT THE CALL THEY HEAR IS LEGITIMATE AND WORTHY, BUT FOLLOWING IT SHOULD NOT NECESSARILY LEAD THROUGH ORDINATION. OUR CHURCH IS GUILTY OF EITHER HAVING MADE TOO MUCH OF ORDINATION AND THE WEARING OF A SPECIAL COLLAR, OR NOT ENOUGH OF BAPTISM AND ITS POWER TO MAKE US A SPECIAL PEOPLE. WE NEED TO BE CAREFUL THAT THE DISTINCTIVE DIACONATE PROGRAM, OR ANY OTHER ORDAINED MINISTRY, DOES NOT LURE PEOPLE AWAY FROM THE PRIMARY CALLING WE ALL HAVE AS LAITY. WHEN THERE IS A CLEAR NEED FOR THE SERVANT MINISTRY TO BE EMBODIED THROUGH THE ORDINATION OF SOMEONE WHO IS CALLED, THEN LET US REJOICE IN THE PROCESS WE HAVE AND WHICH IS WORKING WELL. I HOPE WE WILL NOT BECOME SO CLERICALLY ORIENTED THAT WE CANNOT ALSO REJOICE IN LAY MINISTRIES AND HOLD THEM UP AS EQUALLY VALUED OFFERINGS TO GOD'S GLORY.

THIS DIOCESE HAS NOT OVERLOOKED LAY MINISTRY, I AM GLAD TO FIND OUT. YOU HAVE WORKED AT RAISING UP THE VISIBLE, IN-HOUSE MINISTRIES, OF LAYREADERS, ALTAR GUILD, VESTRY MEMBERS, DELEGATES TO CONVENTION, AND SUCH. YOU HAVE ALSO TOUCHED ON THE HARDER-TO-DEFINE OUTREACH MINISTRIES AND THE ESSENTIAL ONE OF BIBLE STUDY. VERNA DOZIER HAS BEEN HERE AND WILL RETURN AGAIN SHORTLY AFTER THE NEW YEAR TO HELP US CLAIM THE GREATEST GIFT OF ALL MINISTRIES, A FAMILIARITY WITH THE BIBLE. WITHOUT THAT NONE OF US HAVE THE INSPIRATION OR EMPOWERMENT TO RESPOND, EXCEPT TO OUR OWN DREAMS OF GRANDEUR.

WE NEED TO CONTINUE BUILDING ON THE FOUNDATIONS OF LAY MINISTRY WHICH ARE ALREADY STARTED. I SEE THE COMMISSION ON THE MINISTRY OF THE LAITY AS ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT GROUPS IN THE DIOCESE. BUT WE NEED TO GUARD AGAINST A KIND OF ZEALOUS FERVOUR HERE TOO. WE CAN GO MINISTRY NUTS! THE MINISTRY OF THE LAITY IS THE ESSENTIAL MINISTRY OF THE CHURCH AND IT IS AN ESSENTIAL ANTIDOTE TO CLERICALISM. IT EXPRESSES THAT SIDE OF GOD'S NATURE WHICH CATCHES US UNAWARE, WHICH POURS OUT LOVE BEYOND OUR PREDICTING, WHICH IS POWERFUL BEYOND OUR IMAGINING. WE SHOULD NOT TRY TO TIE LAY MINISTRY INTO NEAT PACKAGES OF SO MANY COURSES ON A SATURDAY, OR SO MUCH TRAINING OVER A FEW MONTHS. LET US PROVIDE THE RESOURCES, THE TRAINING, THE TEACHING WHICH WILL BE HELPFUL TO PEOPLE, BUT MOST OF ALL LET US REJOICE IN PEOPLE'S LIVES. LET US CELEBRATE THE GIFTS THEY BRING TO THE LIFE OF THE CHURCH. LET US SEE CHRIST IN EACH OTHER. THAT IS THE ESSENCE OF LAY MINISTRY.

IN THIS CONTEXT I AM PLEASED TO ANNOUNCE THAT THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SEABURY HALL SCHOOL HAS CHOSEN A LAYMAN FROM THE DIOCESE OF WESTERN LOUISIANA TO BE ITS NEXT HEADMASTER. HE IS MR. THOMAS OLVERSON. HE AND HIS WIFE, ROGERS, AND THEIR CHILDREN WILL BE COMING TO A CRITICAL MINISTRY IN THIS DIOCESE AND HE WILL WITNESS, AS MANY OTHERS DO, TO THE STRENGTH OF THE LAITY AMONG US.

MINISTRY IS A LARGE ISSUE IN THIS DIOCESE. I THINK WE COULD NOT BE DEALING WITH ANYTHING THAT IS MORE IMPORTANT THAN THIS, AND I HOPE WE WILL BE OPEN TO EXPLORING MANY DIFFERENT MODELS AND STYLES OF MINISTRY. IN A DIVERSE DIOCESE, A DIVERSE AND MULTIFACITED APPROACH TO MINISTRY SHOULD BE NO SURPRISE.

A CALLING WE ALL HAVE AS GOD'S PEOPLE, WHETHER WE ARE ORDAINED OR NOT, IS TO BE PEACEMAKERS. JESUS WAS SUCH A PERSON AND CALLED HIS DISCIPLES TO EXERCISE THIS MINISTRY. THE NEED FOR THIS IN OUR WORLD IS TERRIFYINGLY EVIDENT. PROBABLY THERE ARE AS MANY WAYS TO GO ABOUT IT AS THERE ARE PEOPLE HERE. I HAVE NO DOUBT THAT OUR PRESIDENT AND HIS ADMINISTRATION ARE WORKING FOR PEACE AND THAT HE IS DIRECTING THE MILITARY, IN WAYS WHICH HE BELIEVES WILL BRING PEACE. HIS SINCERITY I DO NOT QUESTION. THE ISSUE FOR ME IS WHETHER OR NOT THE POLITICAL PROCESS AND MILITARY STRENGTH ALONE ARE EFFECTIVE IN MAKING PEACE. DO WE PLACE TOO

HIGH A PRIORITY ON GOVERNMENT AND ARMIES IN CREATING THE PEACE WE NEED? IS OUR HOPE FOR THE FUTURE MISPLACED?

GOVERNMENT AND ARMED FORCES CLEARLY HAVE THEIR ROLE TO PLAY IN ORDERING A JUST AND CIVILIZED WORLD. CHRISTIANS HAVE RESPECTED THAT SINCE THE EARLIEST DAYS. AT THE SAME TIME CHRISTIAN HOPE IS NOT CENTERED ON EMPEROR AND HORSE, BUT ON GOD AND GOD'S POWER TO WIN PEOPLE'S HEARTS AND CHANGE THE COURSE OF HISTORY FROM DEEP WITHIN THE SOUL, MOVING OUTWARD. HOPE OF ANY SORT IS NEARLY IMPOSSIBLE IF PEOPLE STRUGGLE CONSTANTLY WITH THE OPPRESSION OF FEAR -- FEAR OF POVERTY, OF NO JOBS, OF DISEASE, OF A FUTURE THAT IS WORSE THAN THE PRESENT, OF ANNIHILATION. THEREFORE CHRISTIANS ARE CALLED TO WORK FOR BASIC HUMAN RIGHTS, TO RESPECT THE DIGNITY OF EVERY HUMAN BEING, AND TO PERSUADE GOVERNMENTS OF THEIR RESPONSIBILITY TO BE JUST AND ORDERED, FOR THE GOOD OF ALL THE PEOPLE.

CHRISTIANS ARE CALLED TO WORK FOR A WORLD IN WHICH HOPE CAN BE BORN AND THEN TO CENTER THAT HOPE ON GOD.

PEACEMAKING IS NOT SOLELY THE JOB OF OUR PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS. WE, OF ALL PEOPLE, KNOW THAT. PEACE THAT COMES FROM A HOPE CENTERED ON GOD HAS ITS ROOTS IN OUR SPIRITS, IN OUR WORDS, IN OUR ATTITUDES, IN OUR OUTREACH, IN OUR RELATIONSHIPS WITH OTHERS. PEACE DEPENDS ON WHO WE IDENTIFY AS THE ENEMY, AND WHETHER OR NOT WE HAVE THE COURAGE TO LIVE WITHOUT ENEMIES, IN A WORLD WHERE THERE ARE NO LONGER STRANGERS.

I URGE YOU TO VOTE, AND WRITE LETTERS, AND CALL YOUR REPRESENTATIVES, AND RUN FOR PUBLIC OFFICE, AND EVEN TAKE MORE DRASTIC STANDS OF CONSCIENCE, SO LONG AS YOU ARE ALSO WILLING TO FACE THE CONSEQUENCES OF YOUR ACTIONS. IN ADDITION, I URGE YOU ALSO TO BE PEACEMAKERS ON THE LEVEL OF YOUR OWN HEARTS AND SPIRITS, IN HOW YOU REACH OUT TO ONE ANOTHER, IN HOW YOU THINK AND TALK, AND RELATE TO PEOPLE OF OTHER NATIONS AND POLITICAL PERSUASIONS. WE CANNOT MAKE PEACE THROUGH ANGRY TIRADES OF SELF-JUSTIFICATION. SURELY THE PRINCE OF PEACE GUIDES US IN OTHER PATHS.

IN THE SAME SPIRIT I WOULD SAY A WORD ABOUT THE ISSUE OF ABORTION, WHICH IS ADDRESSED IN A RESOLUTION WHICH WILL COME BEFORE US AT THIS CONVENTION. THIS ISSUE JUST WILL NOT GO AWAY, MUCH AS WE MIGHT WISH WOULD! I HAPPEN TO BE ONE WHO THINKS THE GENERAL CONVENTION RESOLUTION ON ABORTION, PASSED IN 1976 AND REAFFIRMED SEVERAL MORE TIMES, IS AN EXCELLENT STATEMENT. IT DOES NOT SOLVE THE PROBLEM. IT DOES NOT TELL PEOPLE WHAT THEY SHOULD DO, OR HOW THEY CAN AVOID THE TOUGH DECISIONS OF LIFE AND THE CONSEQUENCES OF THOSE DECISIONS. THE RESOLUTION IS A GUIDE IN THE GREAT DILEMMA BETWEEN THE RIGHTS OF THE UNBORN AND THE RIGHTS OF THE MOTHER. THE RESOLUTION MAKES CLEAR THAT THOSE INVOLVED, WHO ARE CAPABLE OF MAKING DECISIONS, MUST MAKE THEM. THEY ARE URGED TO SEEK THE GUIDANCE AND COUNSEL OF THE CHURCH,

BUT THE RESPONSIBILITY FOR MAKING MORAL CHOICES RESTS WITH THOSE WHO ARE INVOLVED. I THINK THAT PUTS THE RESPONSIBILITY RIGHT WHERE IT SHOULD BE.

THIS DOES NOT SATISFY THOSE WHO WISH THE CHURCH WOULD MAKE MORAL DECISIONS FOR PEOPLE AND SIMPLY CONDEMN ABORTION. IT ALSO DOES NOT SATISFY THOSE WHO WISH THEY COULD ACT WITHOUT MORAL CONSEQUENCE AND DO ANYTHING THEY WANT GUILT FREE. I THINK THE TIME HAS COME WHEN WE NEED TO ADMIT THAT CHRISTIANS STRUGGLE FAITHFULLY WITH THIS ISSUE ON ALL SIDES, AND WE SOMETIMES MAKE DIFFERENT DECISIONS ABOUT WHAT IS BEST. THE GREATER ISSUE IS HOW DO WE DEAL COMPASSIONATELY WITH EACH OTHER IN THE MIDST OF THAT STRUGGLE. MY SENSE IS THAT WE WILL MAKE PEACE BETTER AND MORE MEANINGFULLY BY NOT DRAWING UP SIDES AND CREATING ENEMIES AMONG US.

THIS DOES NOT MEAN WE DO NOT NEED TO STUDY THE ISSUE, DISCUSS IT, FIND RESOURCES THAT WILL HELP PEOPLE MAKE DECISIONS, AND LISTEN TO THE STORIES WE HAVE TO TELL, WITH HEALING UNDERSTANDING. ALL THAT CONTINUES TO BE NECESSARY AS NEW PEOPLE FACE THE ISSUE. BUT WHAT THE CHURCH CAN DO BEST IS GUIDE AND GIVE VALUES AND LOVE PEOPLE, EVEN IN THEIR STRUGGLES. THE GENERAL CONVENTION RESOLUTION DOES ALL THAT.

PEOPLE HAVE SHARED A WEALTH OF IDEAS WITH ME IN THE PAST SIX WEEKS. THEY ARE ALL PART OF THE JUGGLING ACT IN WHICH I SUDDENLY FIND MYSELF. UNFORTUNATELY, I AM GOING TO DROP SOME BALLS. I HOPE THEY WILL BOUNCE AND COME BACK AGAIN. GOOD IDEAS SHOULD HAVE THAT KIND OF STAYING POWER AND I HOPE YOU WILL REMIND ME IF I SEEM TO HAVE LOST TRACK OF YOUR OFFERINGS.

I KNOW THERE ARE GOOD THINGS HAPPENING IN STEWARDSHIP, IN SOCIAL MINISTRIES, IN ETHNIC MINISTRIES, IN EVANGELISM. RIGHT DURING THIS WEEKEND, FOUR OR FIVE FROM THE DIOCESE ARE AT A CONFERENCE ON EVANGELISM. THEY WILL RETURN TO HELP US UNDERSTAND PRINCIPALS OF CHURCH GROWTH WHICH WE CAN USE THANKFULLY AND WITHOUT EMBARRASSMENT.

MANY OF THE IDEAS SHARED WITH ME HAVE ALSO INCLUDED THE SUGGESTION OF ADDITIONAL STAFF AT THE DIOCESAN OFFICE. THAT IS AN AMAZING AFFIRMATION OF YOUR TRUST IN BUREAUCRACY -- ALMOST A KIND OF THEOLOGICAL STATEMENT OF SALVATION BY STAFF! I DO NOT REALLY THINK YOU ARE SAYING THAT -- OR I HOPE NOT. MORE LIKELY I THINK YOU ARE SAYING SOMETHING ABOUT THE IMPORTANCE OF YOUR PARTICULAR INTEREST, YOUR HOPE THAT IT WILL RECEIVE HIGH RECOGNITION, AND THAT ACTION WILL TAKE PLACE.

MY PERSONAL INCLINATION IS TO KEEP STAFF AS SMALL AND EFFICIENT AS POSSIBLE, BUT ALWAYS WITH THE WILLINGNESS TO PLAN BETTER STRATEGY. I DO NOT SEE THE NEED TO MAKE CHANGES WITH THE PRESENT STAFF UNTIL WE HAVE A GOOD DEAL MORE TIME TOGETHER. THEY ARE AN EXTRAORDINARILY FINE GROUP OF PEOPLE, WHO HAVE BEEN

TREMENDOUSLY HELPFUL TO ME IN THESE FIRST WEEKS. PETER VAN HORNE, IN PARTICULAR, AS THE ORGANIZER OF A GOOD DEAL OF MY LIFE -- AT LEAST THE OFFICE PART! -- HAS DONE SERVICE BEYOND MY EXPECTATION. I AM VERY THANKFUL TO HIM AND TO THE OTHERS, WHO SERVE ME AND ALL OF US SO ABLY.

THE QUESTION OF ENLARGING THE STAFF, OR USING POSITIONS WE NOW HAVE MORE EFFECTIVELY, IS AN ON-GOING DISCUSSION. YOUR IDEAS ARE WELCOME AND I APPRECIATE THE CARING YOU HAVE FOR OUR MISSION AND MINISTRY.

SHORTLY AFTER I WAS ELECTED BISHOP -- I WENT TO SEE BISHOP BROWNING IN NEW YORK. I WAS FULLY SATISFIED, EVEN AWE-STRUCK, WITH THE POSSIBILITY OF SERVING A DIOCESE WITH EIGHT ISLANDS, FIVE OF THEM WITH CONGREGATIONS. HE, HOWEVER, HAD MORE UP HIS SLEEVE, AND TALK ABOUT GUAM ENTERED THE PICTURE. YOU MAY KNOW MORE THAN I THE BACKGROUND OF THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THIS DIOCESE AND GUAM. I WILL BE VERY BRIEF AND JUST SAY THAT IN JANUARY I WILL TRAVEL THERE TO EXPLORE WITH THEM THE POSSIBILITY OF GUAM ONCE AGAIN COMING UNDER OUR JURISDICTION. IT WOULD MEAN SOME TIME ON MY PART FOR VISITATION AND ON YOUR PART TO INCLUDE THEM IN MEANINGFUL WAYS IN THE DIOCESE. DISCUSSION OF ALL THIS WILL CONTINUE WITH THE PRESIDING BISHOP, WITH OUR STANDING COMMITTEE AND COUNCIL.

A LETTER FROM ALISON DINGLEY, A COUPLE OF WEEKS AGO, SAID THAT ONE OF THE BENEFITS OF HAVING A NEW BISHOP -- AND, SHE MIGHT HAVE ADDED (BUT WAS KIND NOT TO) A BISHOP WHO NEEDED A LOT OF HELP UNDERSTANDING WHAT WAS HAPPENING -- IS THAT IT OPENED THE DOOR FOR OTHERS TO DREAM DREAMS AND ENVISION NEW WAYS. I HOPE THAT IS TRUE. IT CERTAINLY WAS FOR HER AS SHE SHARED SOME REMARKABLE IDEAS. I INVITE YOU TO DREAM DREAMS OF HOW THIS DIOCESE CAN RESPOND TO OUR LORD'S CALL TO GO OUT AND MAKE DISCIPLES OF ALL THE NATIONS. I INVITE YOU TO ACCEPT CHRIST'S PROMISE TO BE WITH US ALWAYS, AND SO TO EMPOWER US TO DO HIS WORK.

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THE AGENDA

TRINITY'S HISTORY

In 1973 a small group of Episcopalians began coming together for worship on Sunday mornings in one another's homes in the Kihei area. As time passed, this committed group requested of our then Bishop, Lani Hanchett -- if a priest might be found who would be willing to conduct Sunday services. Such a priest was found in the person of Fr. Norman Ault. Fr. Ault was no stranger to Maui for he had served St. John's Church, Kula for a number of years as their Rector.

With a priest, a small but dedicated congregation --- a location was now needed, as home services excluded the possibility of offering Episcopal/Anglican Worship to Kihei's many visitors. Store-fronts and the local County Public Park became home for this initial group for the next three years.

Under Fr. Ault's capable leadership -- this group of Christians began laying the foundation for the event we celebrate today.

In 1975, these devoted men and women petitioned the Convention of the Diocese of Hawaii for Mission status. The name by which this young Mission Congregation would be known is -- Trinity Episcopal Church by-the-Sea. By this time Trinity's Family had grown from the original seven members to about 25 in number with a large number of visitors swelling their ranks at Sunday morning worship.

With Mission Status -- a sense of permanence was sought. A site

was needed that could be identified with Trinity by-the-Sea. So the search was on for a more permanent location. One day about 950 feet off of the main Kihei Road hidden in dense kiawes and brush the ruins of an old building were uncovered. With some research, it was discovered that the ruins were that of an earlier church built by David Malo in 1853. The church was Hawaiian Congregational in those days and was named Kilolani. There was also a cemetery adjoining the church which had also fallen into ruin.

After some additional research, it was discovered that the three acres of property on which the ruins and the cemetery were situated belonged to the State of Hawaii. Without delay, the Trinity congregation obtained a 65-year lease from the State of Hawaii and at last, a permanent, fitting home was found for Trinity by-the-Sea.

Through the years, Trinity continued to grow, especially in its ministry to Maui's numerous visitor population. In 1978, the Bishop's Committee and Congregation decided that a full-time Vicar was needed. After a search which ended in the summer of 1979, Fr. Morley Frech was called and appointed by our former Bishop, Edmond Browning, to be our first and ultimately, our last full-time Vicar.

Many surprises came with this decision. The cost of a full-time priest which had been previously an unknown expense, the possibilities of a complete Church Life as opposed to just a

Sunday morning experience, and taking our commitment and putting it into actions were only some of the changes we faced as a family.

But we were very serious about what we saw as a need for an ongoing Episcopal presence in Kihei and our congregation grew at an alarming rate. From 25 members to 130 resident members and with as many as 300 visitors during our winter season, we can attest to the fact that we've come a long way since 1973.

In January of this year, our Trinity Family made the decision to build. Not a church --- but a parish hall. We once again were in need of a place from which we might expand our ministry.

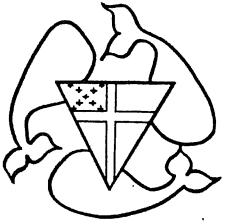
With the assistance of a consultant, the Rev. Chad Minifie, of the College of Preachers, we embarked upon a Capital Campaign last May. Our goal was \$300,000. Through the sacrificial giving of our congregation and the generosity of our part-timers, we surpassed our goal in just six weeks, raising to date some \$360,000. We are presently in the bureaucratic process of obtaining the necessary permits to begin building. We hope to break ground sometime after the first of the year.

As only we can do it, our Trinity Family wasn't satisfied with these events. A Special Meeting of the Congregation was held on September 19th and we voted unanimously to seek Parish Status in the Diocese. We rejoiced on October 3rd when we learned that the Standing Committee had accepted our request. We are here tonight to take our place in our Diocesan Family as the Parish of Trinity Episcopal Church by-the-Sea.

Mahalo for this opportunity to share a little of our history

with you and by all means -- the next time you are on Maui
please join us at Trinity and share our Aloha spirit!

Bishop-elect Hart--the Committee appointed to respond to your address greet you and the Members of this 18th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Hawaii--similarly in Christ's Name! We bid you and your lovely Bride, Elizabeth, a warm and loving aloha--welcome to these Islands which we call home. Welcome to this Diocese--to what is unmistakably now, your new home.

You began your address by saying: "This is a moment of God's grace for me."--Just so there's no misunderstanding or corner on humility almost right reverend sir--your very presence among us at this Convention and since the moment you accepted election and the call to be our next bishop--we too believe that we share in your moment of grace!

You spoke of "the grace that is needed to welcome one who comes in from outside the Diocese." Bishop-elect we also realize that it takes a lot of grace for a person such as yourself to take upon your shoulders the awesome responsibility of being our Chief Pastor needless to say, coming to love each one of us--"warts and all."

Our Committee thanks you for beginning our walk together in faith here in Hawaii with such openness and sensitivity. For though we have only had the pleasure of knowing you for but a matter of weeks--you took the ultimate risk and shared with this Convention in your address last evening matters of the heart. That's HEART! This is the kind of stuff leadership is made of and we deeply appreciate such candor.

One thing we hope you know already--you are not alone when you "stepped into that juggling act." Although we weathered well the Interim--this time only made us more conscious of how very much we look to and need a bishop in our midst!

As you have so quickly discovered, Hawaii is not your average Diocese. Our separations sometimes run a bit deeper than the great channels which separate our islands and the other island communities of the Pacific Basin with which we share a common heritage--yet as Christians we live in the hope of unity. That together in Christ we can dream the dreams which you have called us to dream--to build the bridges that will permit us to celebrate our diversity without having to make enemies of the very people we claim to be our sisters and our brothers.

Bishop-elect Hart, mahalo--for your words about ministry. Thank you for holding up before this Convention--the often forgotten or overlooked truth that whether we serve the Lord in a special collar, a stole worn diagonally across our chest, or a miter--we are first called to be the "laos"--the people of God; and together go about ministering in Christ's name. And, we share

your hope that "we shall continue to rejoice in the ministry of the laity and hold them up with the clergy as being equally valued offerings to God's glory." Whatever calling from God we follow in our lives--we must never forget that in the beginning was baptism! Baptism--Servanthood ministry are inseparable and you stood before us last night as an example of just such a Christian in ministry.

Your call to the basics of what makes us tick--of what gives us our authority as followers of Christ in 1986--is indeed needed in our world today. A view of baptism which gives us direction--an increased understanding of Scripture which empowers, as you said, our response--both of these open our eyes to see the Christ in us all.

Now before the response takes longer to deliver than the address itself--the Committee thanks you for renewing in us our daily calling to being peacemakers. In the life of the Church, there are so many needs--so many causes which seem to bombard us from time to time--that are important one year and forgotten the next. But you Sir, have reminded us that such matters as peacemaking cannot be a fad but rather a way of life and that we are where it must begin.

We applaud the forthrightness of your words concerning abortion and our responsibility as Christians when faced with this issue. One of the greatest things we have going for us here in Hawaii is knowing that there will be a compassionate ear awaiting us in the Bishop's office whenever we are faced with this or any other agonizing decision in our struggle to be a Christian in this modern world.

Yes, our Committee could have taken this opportunity to lay at your feet a number of additional suggestions. But Bishop-elect to use your own words--you have enough balls in the air. Instead Sir, we have chosen this response to pledge to you our love--our concern--and most importantly our God-given talents and abilities so that together You, as our Chief Pastor, and We, the members of your new Diocesan Family, might labor together in the Lord's vineyard here in these Islands--and that we might share with you many new dreams--new hopes--for this Diocese. As it says in the Service of Ordination--more specifically in the Presiding Bishop's address to the Bishop-elect: "Your joy will be to follow him who came, not to be served, but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many."

DONALD--we await with eagerness your response to that charge on November 30--because we so very much look forward to sharing the joy of ministry with you here in this land of Aloha--our Hawaii. Aloha and God bless!

**AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED AT THE
GENERAL CONVENTION OF 1985, AND TO BE FINALLY
ACTED UPON AT THE CONVENTION OF 1988**

- I. That in the first paragraph of Article I, Section 4, the words "confirmed adult" shall be inserted before the word "communicants," to read as follows:

Sec.4 The Church in each Diocese which has been admitted to union with the General Convention shall be entitled to representation in the House of Deputies by not more than four Presbyters or Deacons, canonically resident in the Diocese, and not more than four Lay Persons, confirmed adult communicants of this Church in good standing in the Diocese, but not necessarily domiciled in the Diocese;...

- II. That in the first sentence of Article X the following words shall be struck: "and Administration of the Sacraments and Other Rites and Ceremonies of the Church, together with the Psalter or Psalms of David, and the Form and Manner of Making, Ordaining and Consecrating Bishops, Priests, and Deacons, the Form of Consecration of a Church or Chapel, the Office of Institution of Ministers, and Articles of Religion." The sentence will then read:

The Book of Common Prayer as now established or hereafter amended by the authority of this Church, shall be used in all the Dioceses of this Church.

- III. That in the first sentence of Article II, Section 7, the words "Veterans' Administration Medical Centers and Federal Correctional Institutions" be inserted after the words "United States," so that the sentence shall read as follows:

It shall be lawful for the House of Bishops to elect a Suffragan Bishop who, under the direction of the Presiding Bishop, shall be in charge of the work of those chaplains in the Armed Forces of the United States, Veterans' Administration Medical Centers, and Federal Correctional Institutions who are ordained Ministers of this Church.

- IV. That Article IV be amended by substituting the word "elected" for the word "appointed" in the first sentence, and by adding the following clause after the word "thereof" in the same sentence: "except that provision for filling vacancies between meetings of Convention may be prescribed by the Canons of the respective Dioceses." The sentence will then read:

In every Diocese a Standing Committee shall be elected by the Convention thereof, except that provision for filling vacancies between the meetings of Convention may be prescribed by the Canons of the respective Dioceses.

SUBJECT: Annual Report of the Treasurer

1985

The Overall financial condition of The Episcopal Church in Hawaii at December 31, 1985 was excellent. The Balance Sheet showed Assets of \$22, 323,169 as against \$20,565,013 for the prior year, an increase of \$1,758,156. This year there was a significant increase in the Investment Fund and moderate increases in the Real Estate Fund and the General Fund.

The following table shows that the Assets of the Diocesan Corporation have increased substantially (almost doubling) during the past ten years.

The value used in the above figures for land and buildings is at Book Value(cost). If market value were used the total assets of the Diocese would be considerably higher.

The Operating Statement shows that our Income for 1985 was \$837,232, slightly less than the \$840,000 budgeted for the year. The same Operating Statement shows Expenses for 1985 of \$820,754, somewhat less than the \$840,000 budgeted for the year. Total Operating Income exceeded operating Expenses by \$16,478. This is the eighth consecutive year that we have enjoyed a modest budget surplus. It should be noted that all parishes and missions paid their 1985 assigned assessments. There are no delinquencies. We rejoice that this is the ninth consecutive year that all Diocesan Assessments have been paid in full.

We attach herewith copies of the certified Balance Sheet with notes showing Assets, Liabilities and Fund Balances at December 31, 1985. You should know that our Chart of Accounts has been modified so as to allow for the auditing of the Income and Expense accounts beginning with the year 1986. This means that we will have a certified Income and Expense Statement each year in addition to the certified Balance Sheet. For further details you may consult the Certified Auditor's Report prepared by Coopers and Lybrand CPA which is on file at the Diocesan Office.

1986

1. Attached to this report is the current Budget vs. Actual Operating Statement as of September 30, 1986. For the first three quarters of 1986 things look good, but we need to watch our budget very closely for the remainder of the year to stay within the budget limits. With the exception of two churches the timely payment of assessments this year by our parishes and missions has been good.
2. As of September 30, 1985, we have received in cash a total of \$1,211,176 or 80% of our \$1,513,228 Venture in Mission pledge goal. All programs with the exception of the Aiea Family Center have been funded to at least 85% of their allocation. There are several churches which are committed to completing their goals so collections should slowly reach the 83% level. As of September 30, 1986 \$1,114,613 had been disbursed to the various approved VIM projects. Attached is a report on Venture in Mission at 9/30/86.
3. Attached is a report on our Theological Education Offering for 1985. You will note that we reached \$26,861 or 99.15% of the 1% goal. Thirty-four of our forty churches took part. Now is the time to begin checking on the performance of your parish or mission so that the performance for 1986 can exceed last years record.
4. The performance of our Diocesan Investment Portfolio at 8/31/86 stood at a market value of \$45.19 per share. The following comparative figures show the positive performance of the Portfolio since the employment of our present Investment Manager (Atalanta/Sosnoff Capital Corporation) on October 1, 1982.

The annualized rate of return since 10/1/82 was 22.74% at June 30, 1986. This good performance was attained with a minimum amount of risk.

Please be aware that the Diocesan Investment Portfolio is available to our churches, schools, and other entities as an investment vehicle. We recommend it to you - give us a call.

5. The Harbor Pointe Development at St. Timothy's (Aiea Family Center) has moved forward considerably this past year as interest rates have fallen and real estate sales have accelerated. At this writing 39 apartments have been sold. The \$273,000 received so far has reduced the principal balance due us from \$618,000 to \$345,000. When the Aiea Family Center's share of the cost of the sewer is deducted the amount due in now is \$291,215. These payments when added to interest earned on the mortgage and on cash together with proceeds of the fund drive has placed Aiea Family Center at St. Timothy's in a position to begin construction. Construction of the Center has at long last commenced. Those of us who have been involved in this project for many years, and have survived, rejoice and say Alleluia!

6. As you will note on the Assessment Sheet attached, the Income of our Parishes and Missions in 1985 increased as follows:

7. The setting up of the Shared Travel Expenses Fund for the 1986 Diocesan Convention has been accomplished. An early remittance by each church of their contribution to the fund will enable the Treasurer's office to reimburse those who travel from the Neighbor Islands. We used the accumulated surplus in the fund for the Special Convention and that is why the requirement from each church was lower for that Convention than it is for the upcoming regular Diocesan Convention.

8. We have followed the practice of recent years as we prepared the 1987 Diocesan Budget. Budget Area Meetings were held on all islands at seven different locations. Suggestions and comments from each meeting were recorded and studied by the Diocesan Council. A revised budget has been approved to be presented to the Diocesan Convention. Additional income for the 1987 Budget was limited and requests for funding skyrocketed so budget balancing has been difficult.

9. During 1986 a number of our churches have been involved in fund drives and building programs. These churches include St. Mary's, Honolulu, St. Christopher's, Kailua, St. John's, Kula, Christ Church, Kealakekua, St. Timothy's, (Aiea Family Center), St. John's By the Sea, Kahaluu, Christ Memorial, Kilauea, Kohala Mission, Kapaau and the St. Timothy's Children Center at Aiea. Help has been provided in expediting approvals and paperwork and in obtaining lines of credit where required. Things are happening in 1986.
10. The Treasurer and Accountant continue to monitor the availability of cash at the Diocese so as to properly carry on the work of the Diocese and to invest to advantage wherever possible. A number of churches, schools, and clergy were helped with loans from Diocesan cash, the Clergy Home Loan Fund and our own line of credit at First Hawaiian Bank.
11. The Operating of the Queen Emma Gift and Book Stall is now being handled by St. Andrew's Cathedral effective January 1, 1986. We hope that the 1986 sales will surpass the record sales of \$42,000 which we enjoyed in 1985.
12. We have had our computer capability in operation for three years. During the year we purchased two more terminals from the Cathedral - one for the Director of Ministry Development and one for the Public Relations Officer/Chronicle Editor. We now have five terminals in operation and our storage capacity is holding up well.
13. The Camp Mokuleia Fund Drive moved into high gear during 1986 and has reached \$2,850,000 of the \$3,500,000 goal. We continue to help with administrative and investment matters as necessary.
14. We have followed the instructions of the last Diocesan Convention ordering the divestment of stocks of companies doing business in South Africa from our Diocesan Investment Portfolio. Divestment was completed prior to the June 30, 1986 target date. This decision has made the job of our Investment Manager much more difficult as it eliminates the possibility of purchasing more than one hundred and fifty of the most outstanding corporations in America.
15. The normal maintenance of the records and books of accounting of the Diocese has been carried on in accordance with the Canons and they have been audited through 1985 by Coopers and Lybrand, Certified Public Accountants.

LOOKING AT 1987

Some matters we need to be concerned with for the new year:

1. Continue to "mop up" Venture in Mission collections and distribute same.
2. Continue to support the Camp Mokuleia Fund Drive effort as called upon.
3. Continue to encourage all parishes and missions to complete an annual audit of their books of accounting and to keep them in accordance with the Uniform Accounting System approved by General Convention.
4. Continue the good parish performance we have had in the preparation of the Annual Parochial Reports with Special emphasis on the changes in reporting for the 1986 reports.
5. Continue to encourage participation in and reporting on the Annual One Percent Theological Education Offering.
6. Continue as a member of the Stewardship Committee and the Convention Committee providing information and input as appropriate.
7. Continue to help expedite the Budgeting Process so as to enhance the principal of responsibility budgeting and accounting.
8. Continue to monitor the performance of our Investment Portfolio and encourage the use of it as an investment vehicle. Continue timely reports to each entity in the portfolio and to the Bishop and Council.
9. Complete a study on the possibility and feasibility of the Diocese funding retired clergy medical premiums for HMSA or other coverage to supplement Medicare.
10. Continue to help our new Bishop become oriented to the financial affairs of the Diocese.

CONCLUSION

As this Treasurer's Report indicates the year 1985, the last year of the Browning Episcopate, was an outstanding year financially for the Diocese of Hawaii. The year 1986, although an unusual one without a Bishop for eight months, is shaping up as another good year. We praise God for this and for blessing us with a new Bishop, a competent and devoted staff and for the contributions of time, talent and treasure of so many in all facets of ministry in this Diocese.

1. Summary Of Significant Accounting Policies

Accounts And Records -

The accompanying balance sheets reflect the assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Diocese of The Episcopal Church in Hawaii which comprises the central administrative body for the various departments within the Church's organization in Hawaii. The accounts and records of the Church do not reflect the financial position and results of operations of parishes, missions or institutions (departments) which conduct the activities of The Episcopal Church throughout the State of Hawaii. Land and buildings and certain trusts of these departments are held by the Church and accordingly have been taken into account in the accompanying balance sheets.

The accounts of the Church are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting in order to help ensure observance of restrictions and designations placed by donors and others on the use of the resources available to The Episcopal Church in Hawaii. In the accompanying balance sheets, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups.

Description Of Fund Groups -

General Fund:

This fund accounts for resources available for designated and general operations of the Church.

Investment Fund:

This fund accounts for investments maintained in the Church's investment pool or held in trust by the Church. The Church's investment pool includes contributions to the Church for which the donor has stipulated that the principal is to be invested together with funds received from parishes, missions, and other related organizations who participate in the Church's investment pool. Income is restricted for purposes designated by the donor or the participating organization.

Real Estate Fund:

This fund accounts for all known land, buildings and other properties of the Church.

Trust Investments -

The Church through its fund management advisor, Atalanta/Sosnoff Corporation and custodian, Hawaiian Trust Company, Limited, maintains an investment pool on behalf of itself, parishes and missions, and certain funds.

Short-term trust investments are carried at cost, which approximates market, and marketable securities are carried at market quotations. Indicated market values were obtained from quotations close to or at year end. Trust investments in mortgage loans, agreements of sale and other investments are carried at principal amount.

Income, which is distributed quarterly, is recorded when received. Realized and unrealized gains or losses from investments are treated as additions to or deductions from principal and, accordingly, have no effect on income available for distribution.

Special Investments -

Special investments are carried at cost, if purchased, or market quotations on the date of receipt of gifts. These investments are held in trust for special designations. In the case of life interest, income realized is paid directly to the designee or donor.

Receivables From Properties Sold -

Receivables from properties sold are recorded in the fund for which the proceeds will be utilized. Receivables from sales for which the proceeds are designated for specific parishes or other departments are recorded in the General Fund with a corresponding payable to the designated parishes or departments.

Land, Buildings And Other Properties -

Title to all real property (other than real property of St. Clement's Church) is vested in The Episcopal Church in Hawaii; accordingly, such property is accounted for in the records of the Church. The carrying values of certain properties are based upon amounts which represent either estimates of expenditures made by the Church, missions or parishes, or assigned values on properties donated by other persons.

In common with the practice of many similar nonprofit organizations, the Church does not provide for depreciation on buildings and other properties.

Pension -

The Church participates in a retirement plan for lay employees. Retirement costs are based on the aggregate cost funding method and the Church's policy is to fund costs accrued.

The Church also contributes to The Church Pension Fund established by the Canon of the General Convention which covers clergymen of all dioceses, parishes, missions and other ecclesiastical organizations.

- (a) These notes payable to First Hawaiian Bank are unsecured and due on demand. Interest rates on these notes are at 1/2% above the bank's prime rate (9.5% at December 31, 1985). Unless a specified monthly payment is stated, interest payments are made quarterly.
- (b) In November 1982 the Church executed a demand note with First Hawaiian Bank to borrow \$225,000 which was disbursed to Hawaii Loa College during 1982 and 1983. The note, endorsed by Hawaii Loa College, is collateralized by certain of the College's real property with interest payable quarterly at 1/2% above the bank's prime rate (9.5% at December 31, 1985). The Synod Of Southern California And Hawaii and The Hawaii Conference Of The United Church Of Christ have executed guaranty of repayment agreements in favor of the Church, each undertaking primary responsibility for repayment of \$75,000 of the \$225,000 loan.

At December 31, 1985 the Church had an undrawn unsecured line of credit of \$160,000 with First Hawaiian Bank for renovations at St. Christopher's Church with interest at the bank's prime interest rate plus 1/2%, due November 1988.

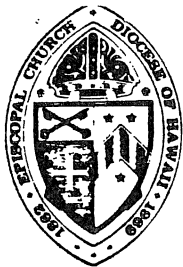


Dear Ros:

report of the election process
committee 1986

A few years ago, Marshall McLuhan said, "There come ages in history, when we turn to the future because the pain of the present is so great." I think that's how the members of the newly appointed Election Process Committee felt at the Hawaiian Diocesan Convention in 1985. Only two months prior, our Bishop had been acclaimed Presiding Bishop at the Anaheim Convention of the Episcopal Church USA. It was a bewildering time for us all. Yet, this time last year, Edmond Browning addressed this Convention with his suggestions for an Election Process Committee - to be composed of the entire Standing Committee plus a few extra to round out geographical and ethnic representations. And then it was off to a planning retreat early in December with Bishop Richards of the Office of Pastoral Development of the House of Bishops. There we were presented with an "updated" version of our search for Ed Browning (it seems we were pioneers in those days - process wise). So it seems only fitting that we should report the successes and failures of this experience to you, the sponsoring Convention.

The timeline was chosen at the Anaheim Convention, . It was a VERY TIGHT schedule, and we foolishly tried to keep to it. One of our largest obstacles was this shortness of time, with no awareness of our own ability to say "no, this is too rushed." We had our survey of the diocese one Sunday (January 19) in the context of the normal worship. There was no time to train anyone to administer it, or to even seek input as to the appropriateness of the various questions, which were prepared by a professional group of non-Episcopalians (not their fault!). We received names for consideration beginning February 19, with a deadline of March 15, and Easter happened to fall on March 30. This posed problems for clergy response, with Holy Week and its normal busyness, as well as mail delays. Much of the pressure was in response to the pressure of summer, as well as the Presiding Bishop's schedule. Nonetheless, it meant insensitivity. We used past forms to send out as our questionnaires, based on the thought that the questions were pretty good - only to discover during the screening process that answers were wanted to questions we didn't ask.

We took "no" too easily. There should have been more time both for us and for the candidates to discern the working of the Holy Spirit. We were reminded quite late in the process that Ed Browning said "no" twice before finally letting his name go in. We're not looking for the person eager to be Bishop (we had a lot of them), we were looking for people who were happy and doing well where he or she is -- perhaps we needed time to court them away from those positions.

We started with almost 80 names from across the country as well as some overseas possibilities. By April we had a list in the high 40's, and then at one four-hour meeting we took that number down to 7. A bit too quick, wouldn't you say?

The chair and a couple of other members missed this and another meeting, and at some point the members of the committee moved from a style of seeking consensus to instead seeking unanimity. There was no need for unanimous decisions by us, as nominating committee, when the Electing Convention doesn't operate on that principle. The EPC did reflect the diversity of the Diocese, and we were greatly impacted by the resignation of Fr. Norio Sasaki for reasons of conscience. He was impossible to replace.

We were never clear about who we represented - an ethnic group? a woman? a lay person? a member of the clergy who teaches in school? There were many "groups" we could technically represent (like Political Action Committees), but there was no "elected representation" and so no constituency. The only groups who were vocal about their agendas were the clergy and their spouses (who had a workshop specifically for that purpose with Roy Oswald of the Alban Institute), Seabury Hall on behalf of the schools, and E.A.S.T., on behalf of the various ethnic ministries of the Diocese.

Where we stumbled, we stumbled over process - more is not necessarily better. As in government, "That process is best which processes least." We relied too heavily on written information and recommendations, which by their very nature were superb - it makes you look for more people walking on water! Good people were undoubtedly passed over because nobody "knew" them, and we were becoming numb to the glowing rhetoric. The actual person doesn't necessarily, in fact seldom, fits the mental image one develops on reading answers to questionnaires. The clergy who "knew" (personally or by hearsay) the candidates had an unfair advantage over the laity who did not. And so the slate to the Electing Convention was less than satisfactory to that body, as the number and variety of nominations from the floor reflects. Nonetheless, the Special Convention went extremely well, with the Holy Spirit present to elect the right person. I believe the committee does deserve some credit for that as well. We worked hard, we worked well together, even when the committee of the whole took over tasks better handled by a subcommittee. We had marvellous VOLUNTARY help from Artie Winston (and husband) who worked almost single-handedly against the high tide of confidential paperwork, all coded and distributed, despite personal hardship and inconvenience.

SUGGESTIONS FOR THE NEXT GO AROUND

1. DO NOT RUSH THE PROCESS - it was unfair, unthoughtful and rude to the prospective candidates. It made us sloppy at times. There was not time to seek out potentially great candidates, and then a better slate (Don't forget this just because we ended up electing Donald!)

2. Do not be so secretive. It didn't work, of which we were reminded again and again. We were seriously hindered by not being able to check on the candidates, outside the specified references. There is too much reliance on recommendations and snap judgements based on the questionnaire.
3. MUCH better training is needed for participants at all levels of the Election Process. Roles, job descriptions of committees, flow chart, potential flaws and weaknesses and issues should have been addressed early. It would have been helpful to see or have discussed (if we'd had the time) the evaluation of the previous nominating committee.
4. Budget limitations were not clearly defined, due to the audit in a crucial part of our process.
5. Involve the Diocese at all levels much more in the process, but particularly in prayer - something more than a collect a Sunday. The prayer cycle for the election of a Bishop from the Anglican Fellowship of Prayer could have been more widely circulated earlier.
6. Paring the list down so drastically, then spending so much on the teams' interviewing trips, forced our hands to accept candidates from the interviewees, even though they may have not been what we expected face to face.

it might be better to bring even a dozen candidates to Hawaii where all members of the committee could meet and assess them, along with the written matter submitted.


Although the travel interview process was most interesting and enjoyable, we didn't feel it was the most efficient way to gain the greatest amount of information about a larger number of people. There is nothing that takes the place of face to face conversing with a person to size up her/his potential as Bishop or any other role in life. This would also give the candidates an earlier opportunity to look us over, appraise Hawaii (our Profile notwithstanding!) and make an evaluation.

After a workable number have been selected from our face to face interviews, we could then designate people to contact church members, associates, etc. by phone.

7. There may be a completely new way of approaching all of this so that we could select a Bishop from a slate of candidates that include a wider spectrum of "styles" - rather than a process that may screen out the potentially controversial charismatics, conservatives, etc., etc. Can we handle an uncomfortable "situation" that may arise from floor discussion? We think so.

Again, we elected a Bishop **the right bishop**
the process worked for us. Amazing grace!

1986 ANNUAL REPORT
Director, Ministries Training Program

1985-86 marked the year the Diaconate Training Program was renamed the Ministries Training Program to indicate our belief laity are entitled to educational opportunities equal to those seeking ordination. With the combined efforts of the Commission for the Diaconate (COD) and the Commission for Ministry of the Laity (CML) we look forward to developing other academic and practicum courses which will enhance the exercise of lay and ordained ministries.

The raising up of ethnic ministries and the development of programs of study for those with limited proficiency in English remains a concern COD and COM will continue to work on.

Hawaii continues to act as resource to other dioceses through written and verbal communication. We, in turn, are benefiting from these dialogues.

MINISTRIES TRAINING PROGRAM CLASSES - Please note: the class year denotes the anticipated year the training program will be completed and does NOT refer to the ordination process.

Class of 1986 - This group of four has completed the course work and satisfactorily passed Canonical Exams. They are currently enrolled in a continuing education course entitled, "Sermon Preparation and Delivery." Members are from St. Christopher's, St. Clement's, St. George's, and St. Paul's-Honolulu.

Class of 1987 - The five students in this class are currently enrolled in Liturgics, Theology and Pastoral Ministry Education courses. They are from Holy Nativity, St. Clement's, St. John's-Eleele, and St. Luke's.


Class of 1988 - 18 students completed the Spiritual Development Course in June. Two of these 18 are considering seminary. Six students are continuing in the Program and are currently enrolled in Old Testament, Church History, and Hospital Chaplaincy courses. One student from the Class of 1986 has re-entered the Program following a leave of absence. He is enrolled in the Old Testament Course only. Members of the class are from Good Shepherd, Holy Innocents', St. Clement's, St. Elizabeth's, St. Philip's, and Trinity by the Sea.

The ministry of the Director of the Program also includes staff support to the CML, COD liaison to COM, and member of the Board of Directors of the Provincial HAPI-MD (Hispanic, Asian, Pacific Island-Ministry Development) project, Hospice Hawaii, Inc., and HMSA.

The COD and CML reports note the names and accomplishments of these groups. Working with these two commissions as well as the COM has been a valuable experience. The COD continues to be one of the most productive and effective groups I have ever worked with.

The 1985 faculty and Canonical Exam Readers are again commended for their fine work. A special thank you for the continued support and assistance of Nancy Minuth, Mary MacIntosh, Ruby Nakamura, the Revs. Richard Chang, John Engelcke, Sue Hanson, Linda Neal, Peter Van Horne and the many others who have enabled me to carry out my ministry.

HISTORIOGRAPHER'S REPORT -- 1986

ACQUISITIONS in the Episcopal Church Collection at the State Archives in the past year:

1. From the Kennedy family: Bishop Harry Kennedy's Consecration Certificate, honorary degrees, citations, pictures, six large scrapbooks of his episcopate - a treasure trove for future historians.
2. Two volumes of the "IHS Story", comprising a complete file of press clippings of Claude DuTeil's project.
3. A brass alms basin from a shelf in the Bishop's office inscribed: "Humbly offered by Robert Hichens, A.D. 1862." That was the year the Anglican Mission reached Hawaii.
4. The Charter of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands as amended 15 January 1902.
5. Two scrapbooks of the work of Hoa Kokua Hospice Volunteers, 1980-1984, as funded by Venture in Mission.
6. Service books in Chinese used in our early missions, a gift of Fr. Franklin Chun.
7. A kinsman of the late Father Bray, Iolani's famous coach, has provided the Archives with a most interesting genealogical chart of Father Bray's family. He was a descendant of the Rev. Thomas Bray (died 15 Feb. 1730), founder of the SPG and SPCK, and mighty benefactor of the early Church in America. Most of Father Bray's family were high achievers, but he was never one to speak of them.

A UNIQUE EXPERIENCE befell your historiographer this September when he and Ruth acted as guides for the granddaughter of the late Rev. Frank Merrill, who wished to visit the graves of her grandparents and her aunt, Miss Mary Merrill, in the churchyard at St. Augustine's, Kohala, where Father Merrill served from 1911 to 1915. The granddaughter, Martha Merrill Tripp, with her husband, Hermon, had travelled from their home in Connecticut. Betty Bowman, author of St. Augustine's Centennial history, and her husband, Pierre, invited the party for breakfast before they all attended the Sunday worship at St. Augustine's.

OTHER ACTIVITIES OF THE YEAR: considerable correspondence about the earlier years of the Church in Hawaii; conferences with writers who needed details about the Church in past decades.

Since the resignation of the Right Reverend Edmond L. Browning to become Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, the Standing Committee has functioned in accordance with the national canons of the Church as the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese of Hawaii. To function as such means that the Standing Committee found it necessary to make decisions and to take actions normally reserved to the Diocesan Bishop. For example, the Standing Committee received Letters Dimissory for clergy transferring into the Diocese from other areas, issued Licenses to Officiate to clergy serving only temporarily in the Diocese, approved the calls given to new Rectors and Vicars of congregations, delegated members of the Standing Committee to preside at the Celebration of the New Ministries of these Rectors and Vicars, and approved applications for the re-marriage in the Church of divorced persons.

The Standing Committee has continued its participation in the ordination process of the Diocese, and has had three joint meetings with the Commission on Ministry for the purpose of interviewing persons concerning their applications for ordination to the Diaconate and to the Priesthood. These joint meetings have been a positive step in furthering cooperation between the Standing Committee and the Commission on Ministry. The Diocese was very fortunate to have the Right Reverend Frederick W. Putnam, retired Bishop of Navajoland, among us while he was Interim Rector of the Parish of St. Clement's. With the permission of the Presiding Bishop, Bishop Putnam officiated at the ordinations of Robert L. Banse and Virginia Brown Hunt as Deacons, and the ordination of John Connell to the Priesthood.

During the Interim period in the life of the Diocese before the arrival of Bishop-elect Hart, the responsibility for the day-to-day management of the Diocese was placed in the hands of the Interim Management Team consisting of Mr. Thomas M. Van Culin (President of the Standing Committee), the Rev. David K. Kennedy (Vice-President of Diocesan Council) and Mrs. John A. Lockwood, Esq. (Chancellor of the Diocese). The Diocese owes them a debt of gratitude for the many hours of work and commitment put forth by them in seeing that the affairs of the Diocese were tended to until Father Hart's arrival.

With the arrival of Bishop-elect Hart, the Standing Committee and the Diocesan Council took joint action placing in his hands upon his arrival the responsibility for the on-going management of the Diocese, and all of us have assured him of our willingness to cooperate with him in any way necessary.

We are grateful for the prayers and the support you have given us during 1986, and we offer to Bishop-elect Hart our best wishes and prayerful and earnest support as he begins his ministry among us.


In 1987 Seabury Hall will change its Headmaster and Chief Executive Officer. On retirement of the founding headmaster, The Rev. Dr. Roger M. Melrose, a new person will direct its school life under a new chairman of the Board, bishop-elect Donald P. Hart.

For eight months a Search Committee has used the diocesan outline for choosing a new rector/bishop. The Committee was formed by Bishop Browning and chaired by Donald Malcolm a member of the Board of Trustees of Seabury Hall.

By this time the Convention is held the names of the final candidates will be known with the selection made around the beginning of 1987 to be in place by approximately July 1.

It is hoped that the diocese will continue to give the new headmaster the support given me for twenty-three years.

What will I do on retirement? God knows.

In 1986, we celebrated of the Statue of Liberty, and the nation gloried in the unveiling of a renovated "Lady Liberty". From the perspective of Hawaii, the Kalihi-Palama Immigrant Service Center shares in the pride of being part of a nation of immigrants seeking liberty which is symbolized by the statue. We also share the pain experienced by our clients whose welcome here is mixed with ignorance, fear, racism and bureaucratic red tape. Hue Cao, a refugee from Viet Nam, residing in Hawaii won a national essay contest for school children which was part of the celebration of "Lady Liberty", yet her family was not able to accept the car that was one of her prizes because it would jeopardize their welfare benefits. This land of opportunity has not been able to provide this hard-working family with employment at a sufficient level to enable them to support themselves.

The Kalihi-Palama Immigrant Service Center, an agency of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii, provides a ministry to newcomers caught in similar conflicts as they endeavor to make homes for themselves in this land. Our Immigrant Services Unit served 5,431 families comprising 7,048 individuals during the first seven months of 1986. They have come primarily from Korea, Samoa, Taiwan, Hong Kong, China, the Philippines, Viet Nam and Laos and have been here five years or less.

Our Immigrant Youth Program served 863 non-English speaking students in the Honolulu District of the public school system during the first six months of 1986. We also provided a summer program for 62 of those students which included a weekend at Camp Mokuleia.

Our Refugee Resettlement Program resettled 137 refugees primarily from Indochina during the first eight months of 1986.

In May we began a new program funded by a grant from the Gannett Foundation to teach English as a Second Language with the help of computers. During the summer, the Learning Center served 60 students in two separate programs.

Newcomers to this land, whether immigrant or refugee, are both a challenge and a resource. They are also sojourners to whom we as people of the covenant owe hospitality, and they are embodiments of Christ whom the Baptismal Covenant commits us to serve. KPISC is the agency through which the Episcopal Church in Hawaii carries out that commitment.

CAMP REPORT - 1986

Camp Mokuleia spent the past year maintaining its commitment of service to the Diocese and community while running one of the most successful fund-raising campaigns in the history of the Diocese.

The spring and summer filled the Camp's facilities to virtual capacity while the previous winter and fall enjoyed record bookings for those seasons. Overall occupancy the last two years was at an all time high. The Camp's operating budget is almost \$300,000 annually.

Programs continue to center on community organizations, churches (Episcopal and non-Episcopal), public and private schools (including outdoor and environmental education), special camps for immigrant youth, the physically disabled, children with cancer, and, finally, the ever popular Summer Camp, which expanded to seven weeks this year.

Our most exciting new venture this year was a camp for senior adults which included a 98-years-young camper and a host of seniors enjoying camping and camp fires for the first time. We hope we can expand services to this new population group. It is always rewarding to see new campers enjoying Mokuleia for the first time.

While programs and camp usage continue at a fast pace, fund-raising for the "new" Camp Mokuleia passed the \$2.5 million mark in July. This is a remarkable achievement led by the tireless efforts of Alice Anne Bell and a great host of literally hundreds of volunteers working thousands of hours. The Diocesan portion of the campaign has exceeded \$700,000 and many congregations are still working.

The Camp's efforts received national recognition from the Kresge Foundation in Michigan with a challenge grant of \$250,000. The campaign must raise an additional \$750,000 to receive this grant. This would bring the grand total to \$3.5 million, the amount needed to implement the present goal.

Construction on the new Dining Hall will begin in 1987. The new lodge, support facilities and swimming pool will follow as funds allow.

Camp Pecusa on Maui is undergoing a face lift under the watchful eye of Holy Innocents'.

I am one who is grateful for all that Camp Mokuleia does for me. And I am grateful most of all to the children and youth who have been my teachers these past nine years.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

The Rev. Karen Swanson had a dream of a diocesan-wide Vacation Bible School and the summer of 1986 saw that dream come true. With some very hard work by Karen and in joint sponsorship with Queen Emma Center, children from throughout Oahu learned about Hawaii in a new light. We certainly hope to see this as an annual happening.

L.O.V.E. '86

This teacher-training event gets bigger and better each year. Over 300 Christian educators from throughout all the islands and of many varied denominations attended this year's event held at Makiki Christian Church. Our key-note speaker, The Rev. David Perry, started the day off on a high that never let down.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION TRIVIA.....

We still are looking for new and committed committee members - what an opportunity to share your knowledge about children with other concerned volunteers.....We are an active member of the Film Hui -- need films to show on various subjects? 1986 Annual Report

Since then, Hawaii Episcopal Youth (HEY) has sought to bring the youth of this diocese together on a regular basis. It is our prayer that, in taking part in these programs, the youth will come to better understand themselves in relationship with our Lord, to better understand one another, and to better understand that we are all important members of God's family.

To that end, HEY offered the following programs during the past year:

-Caroling (Dec. 21st) - Five parishes from Oahu joined voices and visited with the people in several nursing homes and hospitals in Honolulu.

-Oahu-wide Picnic (Feb. 9th) - Youth from seven congregations came together for an afternoon of fun, food, and fellowship.

- The Diocesan Youth Camp (May 9th-11th) - Youth from eleven congregations from around the diocese gathered for the weekend and took part in a program entitled "The Breakfast Club". The emphasis was on community building.

The commission believes that, during the coming year, we need to expand in several areas. First, in order to better serve the youth of this diocese, we need both youth and adult representation from all the islands on this commission. Secondly, it is imperative that we encourage and support island-wide programs on all the islands. Finally, we recognize the need for youth leadership training and workshops, and would like to offer such programs here in the diocese.

CAMPUS MINISTRY

The Episcopal Campus Ministry Commission in 1986 has strengthened and expanded the existing ministry based at Canterbury House near the UH-Manoa campus, is repairing and maintaining the facilities there, especially raising the funds to rebuild the roof of the pavillion, is widening the scope of the ministry to include more students not at the Manoa campus, is continuing to nurture the ministry at UH-Hilo, and is continuing our participation in the ecumenical campus ministry at UH-Manoa called University Christian Ministry.

The programs carried on in 1986 were the SCOPE newsletter sent to over 500 student, faculty, staff, friends and clergy (both diocesan and provincial); weekly Morning Prayer and Holy Eucharist in C-House during the Spring semester; monthly potlucks; catechism classes; a new program called Canterbury Trails in which the fellowship visits a different Episcopal congregation a month; bible study; ecumenical worship; a progressive dinner among the UCM denominations; faculty-staff dinner; the annual UCM Winter break camp on a neighbor island; sending a student to the National Gathering of Students, Faculty, Chaplains and friends at Estes Park, Colorado; counseling; outings; Holy Eucharist and brown bag lunch on campus in the fall; an ecumenical program of getting to know the differences between participating UCM denominations; participation in diocesan events; a hunger project aimed at raising the awareness among the the UCM ministries and the campus community.

To strengthen and expand the ministry based at Canterbury House in January a program called the Campus Ministry Development Grants began. This program calls for two students spending an average of five hours a week applying themselves in terms of program development and planning, follow through and evaluation. The purpose is two-fold: (1) to assist the chaplain with staff work and relieve him for other ministries, and (2) to help develop leaders for campus ministry. So far three students have participated in the program. This has allowed the chaplain to focus some of his energy on faculty staff ministry. He has been able to hold a faculty staff reception, develop a directory and is planning program geared towards involving faculty and staff in campus ministry.

Also, the ECMC has raised over \$11,300 towards the repair of the pavillion roof from pledges and gifts from the Episcopal Church Women, Epiphany Church, the Women of Good Samaritan, Queen Emma Chapel and an \$8,000 grant from the United Thanks Offering. The hope is to complete the roof renovation this fall. The students were busy this summer as well, completing the painting of C-House's exterior.

This year also saw the inclusion of students from Kapiolani Community College, Leeward College and Hawaii Loa College. It has also seen students from non-Episcopal churches joining in our activities. The hope is that the campus ministry can expand from its base at Canterbury House.

1986 has alos saw the loss of the Rev. William Austin as ecumenical campus minister at UH-Hilo in January. The ecumenical campus ministry is in a holding stage for the time being, and Holy Apostles' Church is in the process of developing a lay based listening ministry there.

Finally, campus ministry is a place where much ecumenical cooperation and dialogue can and does occur. Participation in UCM has enriched both students and the faculty and staff. The University is a context in which open minded dialogue and inquiry are the norms. The ecumenical program is a definite strength of campus ministry.

As Episcopal Chaplain at UH-Manoa and as staff to the ECMC, Canterbury Fellowship Student Council, and UCM I am pleased to say that at the beginning of my fourth year in this position, the campus ministry is developing a strong base. Much thanks to all who have participated, contributed and grown with this program. Special thanks to Dr. Kenneth L. Jackson, ECMC Convenor, and to the ECMC members.


Consultations have been provided to St. John's-by-the-Sea; St. John's, Kula; and Holy Apostles, Hilo.

With the Ministries Training Program (MTP) well underway, the Commission for the Diaconate turned its attention to "fine-tuning" matters which relate directly to the ministry of our Diocesan and Parish deacons and the program, in general.

One of the first orders of business in 1986 was the revision of the "Inquirer's Pamphlet" and the "Student Handbook". These revisions took into account the Diocesan focus upon ministry of the laity. The pamphlet and handbook which had previously guided interested students through the Diaconate Training Program, now aid all interested persons in strengthening their respective ministries lay or ordained via the MTP.

In order to better assist the rectors/vicars and advisors of our deacons, the COD established a system and report format for those who are engaged in a deacon's support network. It is our hope that through these periodic reports, the deacon's ministry, as well as the advisor's role will be enhanced.

Once again this year, the Commission on Ministry requested that the COD compose, administer, and evaluate the Canonical Examination for this year's class. This was accomplished and we are pleased to report that all four individuals successfully completed their courses of study and the examination.

As many of our MTP graduates have written excellent papers in their various courses, the COD has decided to share these works with the Diocese at large. This will happen through the media of a "Monograph Series" to be published annually. The Series will include those papers of MTP students, which, after review by the Editorial Board of the COD, are found to be of high quality. It is our hope that the first edition of this Series will be circulated at this year's Diocesan Convention.

This report would be incomplete without expressing our Commission's gratitude to the Rev. Dorothy Nakatsuji for much of the behind-the-scenes work which she does in her role as Director of the Ministries Training Program! The paperwork, telephoning, and general organization which is seldom visible in a report such as this just would not happen without this "key" individual diligently doing her job. Dorothy is too humble to tell you what all she does do in the name of this Program, so we feel that as the Commission which works so closely with her that we need to share this with everyone in the Diocese. Mahalo, Dorothy!

URBAN AND REGIONAL MINISTRY FOR 1986

The members of the Commission are appointed annually by the Bishop. During 1986 the following accomplishments can be reported:

- 1) The commission members represent most of the human social service programs of the Diocese of Hawaii and are in touch with those programs not represented by commission members. The Commission serves as a switchboard for sharing information about various programs in progress and to the identification of needs not being met as opportunities for future ministries are discerned.
- 2) A major priority in 1986 was to investigate the concept of a unified approach to human services ministries in other dioceses and especially those of comparable size and resources. In the Roman Catholic Diocese of Honolulu this is known as Catholic Charities and likewise in other Episcopal dioceses. Our Commission prefers the name Episcopal Community Ministries. The research continues as we seek to receive the concerns of our Bishop in planning for 1987.
- 3) Mini-Grants were made to the following parishes and missions to assist them in human service projects.
 - A) St. John's By-the-Sea, Kahaluu for Kualoa-Heeia Ecumenical Project (K.E.Y.) Farm Training Program.
 - B) St. Michael & All Angels, Kauai, Youth Work and Christianity Project.
 - C) Trinity Church By-the-Sea, Maui, AIDS Education and Support Groups.
 - D) Chinese Episcopal Ministry Project of St. Peter's and St. Elizabeth's, Honolulu, Counseling and Tutorial Services for Immigrant Children and Youth.
 - E) St. Philip's Episcopal Church, Maile, Maile Community Outreach Project.
 - F) Grace Episcopal Church, Molokai, Molokai Planning/Issues Forum.

A total of \$2,400.00 was provided in Mini-Grants to the above listed Parishes and Missions for assistance in human service ministries at the congregational level. The evaluations and reports submitted by the grantees reveal that the Mini-Grant funding touched the lives of many persons in a variety of ways.


- 4) The Community Clearing House has also been supported by a \$300.00 grant for 1986.

This new commission was appointed in late December, 1985, by former Bishop Browning. It met first on February 6 and has met 5 times since. All islands are represented on the commission; 8 members are lay, 5 are clergy.

The commission has:

- invested considerable time and energy in becoming acquainted with each other, exploring, challenging, affirming and expanding our own beliefs about ministry, especially lay ministry, in order to gain a base from which to work with mutual understanding ...
- sponsored the Vestry and Bishop's Committee Workshop on Oahu, planned and coordinated by Diana Lockwood ...
- co-sponsored with the Liturgical Commission a conference on Baptism and the Prayer Book led by The Rev. Robert Brooks ...
- reviewed the data from the Ministry Conference presented at the 1985 Convention as to its implications on the work of this commission ...
- prioritized the issues facing this commission. To date we have
 - produced a Statement on Ministry, published in the June Chronicle as a guide for the work of this commission and the understanding of the nature of our role as ministers ...
 - completed work on a needs assessment process to be used by teams of commission members in consultation with each congregation ...
 - gathered material on a variety of ways to affirm the ministry of the laity, to be distributed soon to congregations.
- adopted a policy of decentralizing specialized ministry workshops, such as convention delegate training. It is our recommendation that such workshops be presented by qualified persons resident on each island. Guidelines and suggestions for implementation would be supplied by the commission and additional resource material or persons arranged for upon request.
- scheduled a return visit by Verna Dozier in January 1987, during which she will conduct a workshop on each island to train lay persons to lead Bible study groups.

When the results of the needs assessment process have been reviewed, the commission will proceed to either develop or recommend programs which lead to a broadening of the definition and understanding of ministry.

The commission wishes to thank The Rev. Dorothy Nakatsuji, staff support person, for bringing her experience and expertise to the work of the commission.

PEACE AND JUSTICE COMMISSION

The Peace and Justice Commission in 1986 has undergone some internal reorganization and has continued its work on the issues of racism, diocesan investments, the situation in South Africa, the situation in the Negro islands of the Philippines, the situation in Central America and domestic violence. The commission also serves as the liaison between other Peace and Justice or social justice organizations within the Province and the National Church as well as within the ecumenical community and the community at large. It also serves as a counsel of advice for the bishop on these issues and concerns and seeks to keep the diocese abreast of them.

In 1986 some internal reorganization was required due to the 1986 Block Grant received and to our convenor's election to Executive Council of the Episcopal Church. Bettye Harris has served well as convenor, but needed to let someone else convene the commission. The members asked David Ota to be the interim convenor, which was approved by the Standing Committee, until Bishop Elect Hart appoints someone else. St. Elizabeth's Church was asked to provide secretarial help and has graciously responded.

The concern of racism has been under study for almost two years. A study of a small cross section of the diocese was done by Sr. Joan Chatfield. The commission also undertook a survey this past summer in which Alice Scheuer is making a report. The commission will study these two reports and come up with some suggestions.

A subcommittee has also been watching the diocesan investments in regards to the the action of the 1985 diocesan convention to divest from businesses in South Africa. It has also tracked the debate going on in the larger church, especially the debate between the Diocese of Newark and the Church Pension Fund.

This year the commission has communicated to the diocese about the Commemoration of the 10th Anniversary of Soweto and encouraged the churches to participate in the commemoration. It has also ordered for use within the diocese, South Africa: An American Dilemma, a video tape produced by Trinity Church, N.Y. St. Andrew's Cathedral is conducting a forum using the tape in September and October. Members has also been involved in grassroot organizations addressing the issue of apartheid in the community.

Concern over the plight of the people in the Negro islands of the Philippines has drawn the attention of the commission, and a plan is underway for the diocese to respond in 1987.

The commission is also co-sponsoring a two-person play, "A Peasant from El Salvador" with other church and community groups to be done in November. The hope is to raise our awareness on the situation in Central America.

The commission has also kept in contact with the Provincial Peace Education group of the Province, the Public Issues Office of the National Church, and also with other peace and justice organizations.

Finally, I would like to thank my fellow members of the commission for their support and encouragement: Mrs. Charleen Crean, The Rev. Dr. Gerald G. Gifford II, Mrs. Bettye Harris, Mrs. Alice Scheuer, Mr. Rollie Smith, Judge Michael A. Town and the Rev. Timoteo Quintero.

The Evangelism Commission has quietly been at work since the last Convention preparing for the Diocese's participation in a national pilot project to train lay and clergy evangelism consultants for the Diocese of Hawaii. Early in 1986 eight dioceses sent delegations to the two initial training conferences; a dozen, including Hawaii, will participate in the two sessions to be held in California in October and November.

Six people from our Diocese will be trained to assist congregations to increase their effectiveness at attracting and holding on to new members using the strengths that already exist within the congregations. Thereafter, congregations which wish to put heavy emphasis on the Church's mission to serve those who do not know God or who seek to to know him better will have well trained help available locally should they desire it.

Hawaii's delegation to the training conferences will be the Rev. John Connell, David Lowery, the Rev. Dr. Elsbery Reynolds, Hatsune Sekimura, the Rev. Joanne Stearns and Ernest Uno. Immediately upon return from the training conferences our delegation will form three two person teams and begin the process of consultation for evangelism with our six pilot congregations: Christ Memorial, Holy Nativity, St. Barnabas', St. Christopher's, St. George's and St. Timothy's.

The Evangelism Commission apologizes for its absence at Convention this year, but we will be at the second training session the weekend that Convention meets. We ask your prayers for us, even as you will be in ours.


