

20 Practices for Growing Stewards in your Congregation

	Stewardship Practices	Reflections	Resources and Activities
1	Make a commitment to grow generous givers as a faith response to God and the congregation's overall ministry. Recognize generous gifts of time, talents and treasure.	How do your members practice being good stewards? How do your members share their stewardship stories? What impact does this have on other members?	Form a Stewardship Team or Task Group. Read the book Generous People by Eugene Grimm or Ask, Thank, Tell by Charles Lane. Both are available from Augsburg Fortress.
2	Define a clear Congregational vision , mission and purpose that includes a visible role for stewardship ministry.	How is stewardship reflected in the congregation's vision, mission and values statements? How do you tell others?	Take a look at <i>Discerning Your Congregation's Future</i> by Oswald and Freidrich from Alban Institute. Talk about attitudes toward stewardship in your congregation.
3	Teach good stewardship as a faith practice that helps others discover the joy of generous living and giving in Jesus Christ.	What stewardship practices guide your living and giving? How do you explain the difference between financial stewardship and fundraising?	Use 2 Corinthians 8 and 9 to teach about principles of good stewardship. Refer to the ELCA guidelines on commercialism and fundraising at www.elca.org.
4	Foster a regular prayer life as a spiritual discipline that connects faith and generosity.	Stewardship is a spiritual matter, not a financial matter. How have you found this to be true? How have others in your congregation found this to be true?	Refer to monthly <i>Prayer Ventures</i> in the Action Packet, then develop specific prayers for your congregation.
5	Encourage the practice of firstfruits and proportionate giving by members and the congregation.	What portion do you return to God? What portion do others your congregation return? How does your congregation model first fruits and proportionate giving?	Use a proportionate giving chart as part of your annual response process. Grow Mission Support 1% per year.
6	Invite members to practice 10 - 10 - 80.	10% to God, 10% to savings, 80% to live on. Where are you?	Look at the website www.10-10-80.com. Introduce this practice to youth and others.
7	Share an increasing percentage of congregational income with ministries beyond your congregation.	Congregations with an outward focus to their giving usually have a stronger ministry. How have you found this to be true?	Use <i>Making Christ Known</i> magazine. Consider the StewardShop "A Story to Tell."
8	Strengthen personal relationships with others by sharing faith stories and the joy of Christ.	What have you learned from the faith stories of others? Invite others to share their faith stories through writing, song and art.	Refer to the Stewardship Assessment Tool, "Stewardship Stories" provided at www.elca.org.
9	Identify, explore and nurture the spiritual gifts of others to help them fulfill their calling and passions.	What are the assets of your congregation? How can you build on these and not just the tasks that need to be done?	Refer to <i>Discovering the Gifts of the People</i> provided at www.elca.org.
10	Develop an "asset-based" climate, using the assets of people rather than focusing on needs.	How does your congregation see the glass? Is it half full or half empty? What factors influence your perspective?	Read books <i>The Great Permission</i> and <i>The Power of</i> Asset Mapping available from Augsburg Fortress.
11	Provide a multitude of service opportunities to people of every generation.	How has your congregation moved from Time & Talent to Volunteer Ministry to Gifts-based Ministry? How does your congregation teach whole life stewardship?	Look for opportunities to serve on a Ministry Team or as a Community Volunteer, Mission Interpreter or Mission Partner.
12	Develop a year-round approach to stewardship that includes lifestyle, earthkeeping, planning, education and giving.	How does your congregation live this by example? How does your congregation celebrate what God has created?	Go to www.elca.org and look at "Stewardship Resources." Develop a year-round stewardship calendar.
13	Separate the annual financial response from the budgeting process.	How does your congregation separate the invitiation to respond from the annual budgeting process? Look at the possibilities.	Read "Stewardship is about money, but it is not ONLY about money" from <i>Step by Step</i> at <i>www.elca.org</i> .
14	Develop a program budget in addition to a line item budget. Present both to the congregation.	How does your congregation highlight ministries and not the operating costs of building or staff?	Refer to "Learn the Value of a Program Budget" in Step by Step (page 20) at www.elca.org.
15	Engage in an annual financial response for commitments, pledges or an estimate of giving.	Every congregation should be familiar with at least three response methods and rotate. What has been most effective for you? Why?	Read How to Improve Financial Stewardship. Look at response methods and ideas at www.elca.org/resources/stewardship.
16	Ask boldly for tithes, offerings, bequests, commitments and participation.	How are you personally inviting members to make a commitment? How do you recognize the different motivations of donors?	Consider offering the StewardShops "Asking Words," "Asking for Contributions" and "Thanking Six Times."
17	Provide quarterly reports to people thanking them for their giving and informing them about congregation income.	How often do you say thanks? What ways do you thank others for their generosity? How can this be done more effectively?	Provide a written statement of year-end giving with a cover letter highlighting ministries touching others.
18	Provide regular opportunities for special offerings and Second Mile Giving.	How often do you have special offerings? What ministries do your members feel called to support? Why these?	Select at least four opportunities during the year: Global Mission, World Hunger, Campus Ministry and others.
19	Encourage individuals and families to write a will or living trust as part of a Legacy Plan .	How do you encourage Legacy planning? How often do you invite peope to review their plan?	Contact the ELCA Foundation at www.elca.org. Consider offering two workshops each year.
20	Establish a mission endowment fund with a specific purpose and educate people about it.	What special ministries does your congregation want to make happen inside and beyond your walls?	Start an Endowment fund. Invite people to be Willing Witnesses. Contact the ELCA Foundation at www.elca.org.
